Hospital Has New Equipment And New Diagnostic Study

The Medical Center Hospital is becoming top-notch, more so almost every day. Dr. Richard Wright reported yesterday that a new Pulmonary machine had been added which will measure the amount of air a body handles, intake and outlet which is quite valuable in the diagnosis of lung, heart and other associated troubles. With other equipment we are now able to give more diagnostic study on every case and have rapid communications with proper media in Amarillo on most any type case that appears.

Dr. Wright was in Denver the 4th thru the 7th attending the American College of Osteopathic General Practitioners Symposium on Cardiology. 150 hours every three years of post graduate study is required and Dr. Wright is most eager to stay up on all new methods of treatment and diagnosis that are available.

Dr. Wright also stated that he had made several contacts and has several prospects of additional doctors to help ease the load at the Medical Center.

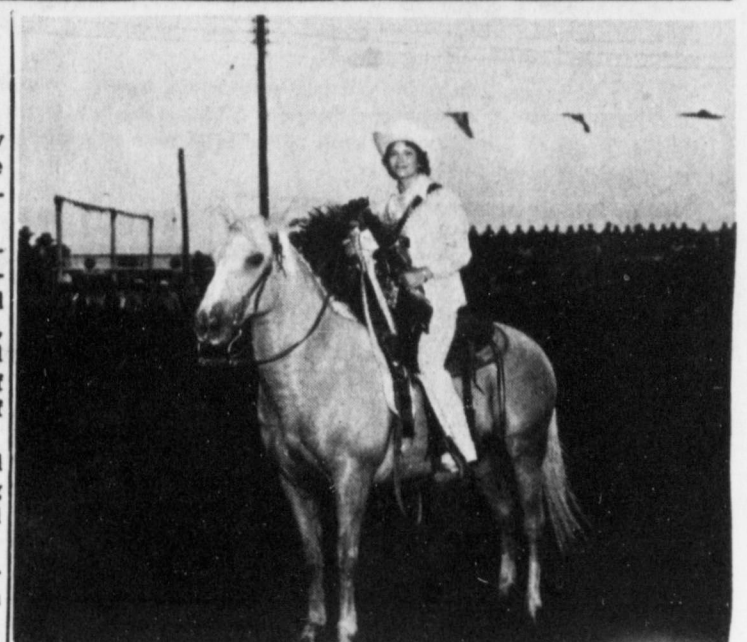

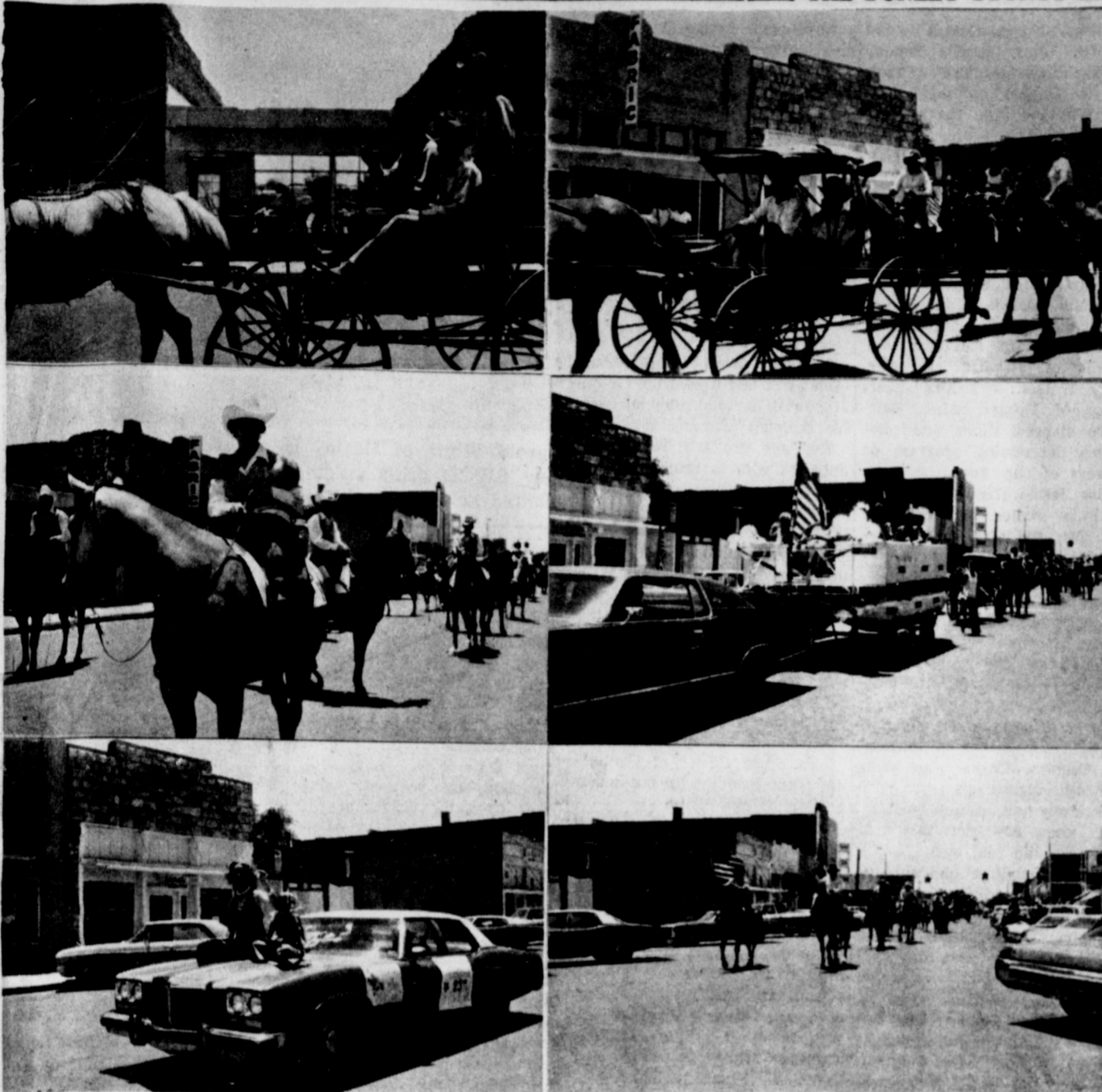

THE COST OF WATER

Earlier this year, I asked the U. S. Corps of Engineers to review the economic feasibility of importing water into West Texas from the Lower Mississippi River. I took this step because I felt that agricultural values had significantly increased since the data used in the major study issued on this matter in June of 1973. I reasoned that if the values of agricultural products had significantly risen, then the economic feasibility of importing water might be improved. And future water for Texas is so important that we should continue a vigorous and active search, now, along all avenues which might prove to be a water supply for the future.

In the 1973 survey, the Bureau of Reclamation and the Corps of Engineers determined that the import proposal would return annually only about 14 cents in benefits for each dollar invested. Of course, the proposal was judged "not economically feasible."

I noted, however, that the study had used 1972 construction cost figures, and estimated agricultural prices made strong gains in 1973. I therefore asked the Corps of Engineers to reconsider the economic feasibility of the import proposal, using current agricultural prices to es-

those who approve and those who disapprove anyone's participation in one or another of these activities. For instance, I know of very few church groups who still hold that it is harmful to attend a movie although certain individual movies are often labeled as harmful, and rightly so! But, most churches yet are strong in opposition to drinking and gambling — including the United Methodist Church although false rumors have led some to believe otherwise.

Really, what it all boils down to is the meaning of genuine Christian living which aims at the standards set by the Gospel!

That standard e.g., that you "must be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:48) may seem unattainable, but true Christian men and women are dissatisfied with anything less and seek to convey this faith to the expression of obedience to Christ' call and they seek to convey this faith to the world.

Paul had told the Corinthians on one occasion that they were a spectacle unto men, that they were being watched. Jesus had announced that by your fruits men will know you (Matthew 7:16, 20). No wonder Paul was so anxious that the Christian at

Philippi (and at Clarendon) should live in a manner that was consistent with the Gospel. He knew that none could do more harm to the cause of Christ than professing Christianity unworthily. He knew there were enough enemies outside the church warring against the Gospel without having them in the church.

THEREFORE, he admonished the Christians at Philippi (and at Clarendon) to "make sure that your everyday life is worthy of the Gospel of Christ." PEACE!

Weeping Love Grass Seeding Thru SWCD

The local Soil and Water Conservation District purchased several new drills to add to those already owned for the use of farmers and ranchers in the district. These have been used under the supervision of Claude Thomas.

Since May 1, 1974 a total of 2470 acres have been seeded to Weeping Love Grass. There were 456 acres of this amount seeded under REAP and 266 under the new 1974 RECP. An approximate 1420 acres have been seeded under Great Plains Conservation Program. Roughly 300 acres have been seeded with a no cost-share.

This record is significant in relation to the additional expense of fertilizers and plow-up this year. The new drills have seeded around 700 acres of the total number of acres.

About 353 acres have been aerial seeded mostly in the Hedley area after shinnery plowing.

Some of the grass is being lost due to drought and blowing but taking the over-all picture in perspective, this has been one of the best years we have had reported Monty Sowers.
