FmHA To Begin Loan Review

Reviews will begin next week of Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) loan accounts to see which farmers in Armstrong, Donley and Gray Counties need and will qualify for a one-time set aside of part of their loan, Marvin Crabtree, County Supervisor, said today.

FmHA has been authorized to set aside up to 25 percent -- to a

maximum of \$200,000 -- of the debt owed the agency for farmers who are experiencing severe financial difficulty, if the set aside will help achieve a positive cash flow for the borrower.

"We will begin scheduling appointments for our borrowers to review their accounts, determine if they need special assistance and see if we can make that assistance

available," Mr. Crabtree said. "Not every borrower will qualify for the set aside, but there might be some other way to help, such as consolidation or rescheduling of existing loans. We will look at all alternatives."

Mr. Crabtree said all accounts will be reviewed. There are some exceptions, such as accounts in bankruptcy or foreclosure or those determined able to graduate to other sources of credit.

Broncos Lose 9-6 to Memphis in District Opener

The Clarendon Broncos opened 2-AA district play by losing a heartbreaker to the highly ranked Memphis Cyclones 9-6. Memphis entered the game ranked 40th in the state. The first half was dominated by Memphis and the second half by the Broncos. As has been the case in all of the Broncos games, it was a hard hitting defensive battle from the very start.

The Broncos won the coin toss and chose to receive and they made one first down on a 20 yard scamper by Rodney Smith. Memphis was unable to move and exchanged punts with the Broncos. Memphis started a scoring drive from their own 40 yard line. After two first downs, the ball rested on the Bronco thirty-seven yard line. Sam Carter then threw a thirty-seven yard pass to Lex Weatherly to make the score 6-0. The point after was good and the first quarter came to a close with Memphis leading 7-0.

The second quarter was a battle between the 30 yard lines. The Bronco defense led by Leland Howell, Dewey Mincey and Richard Torres stopped the speedy Cyclones each time they had the ball.

The Broncos started the second half with Dean Cearley recovering a Cyclone fumble at the Bronco forty-five yard line and on the second play Booney Gardner ripped around the left end for fifty-four yards and a Bronco touchdown. Gardner picked up some good blocks along the way. Rod Keown took the last two Cyclones on a great block. The Broncos missed the extra point and the Cyclones still led 7-6. The Bronco defense really came to life and shut the Cyclones down after Rodney Smith sacked the quarterback at the one yard line. Memphis tried a quick kick that only went 6 yards to the seven yard line. Here the Broncos missed their golden opportunity. Gardner made 3, Robert Youngblood lost two, and a third down pass to Cearley fell incomplete. The Broncos tried a field goal and missed wide to the right. The rest of the third quarter and fourth quarter was dominated by both defenses. The Cyclones tackled Bronco quarterback Robert Youngblood in the end zone for a safety to make the final score 9-6.

The Bronco offense was led by player of the week Booney Gardner with 18 carries for 102 yards, Rodney Smith 14 carries for 53 yards and Robert Youngblood 9 carries for 19 yards.

The Broncos defense was led by player of the week Dewey Mincey with 3 unassisted tackles and 9 assisted tackles, Leland Howell 4 unassisted and 9 assisted tackles, Richard Torres 15 assisted tackles. Rodney Smith had 4 tackles behind

the line as Lynn Alderson and Tim Cole had 3 each. Torres started his first game at linebacker and played

well. Smith played middle guard for the first time and did a good job. The Broncos travel to Quanah for a must win Friday night.

Quanah is 2 and 4 on the season and is led by All-State potential Stanley Payne. Payne is one of the leading ball carriers in the area. Robby Harris is starting his third season at quarterback.

Shooting to be Investigated by Grand Jury

A shooting Wednesday morning, October 10 at 3rd and Buckley St., involving Donley County Deputy Sheriff Faylon Watson and Sherman Irons of Memphis will be investigated by a grand jury according to David McCoy, 100th Judicial District Attorney.

An unidentified truck driver pulled into a truck stop on I-40 and told the night manager of a Texaco Station, C.E. McGinn, that he had observed someone carrying something out of the building across the street.

The Amarillo Sheriffs office received the report about 5:10 a.m. and issued a bulletin.

Mr. McGinn went across the street in his vehicle, threw a spot-light on the building, and 3 men jumped into a pickup and fled on I-40 East. McGinn gave chase, and the suspects turned onto Highway 287. McGinn was still following the suspects when Donley County Deputy Sheriff Faylon Watson joined the chase some 8 miles west of Clarendon.

Deputy Watson finally succeeded in getting the suspects stopped in Clarendon, ordered the driver and two others out of the pickup. The three were identified as Sherman Irons, 20, Johnny Garza, 21, and Ray Aquilar, 20 all of Memphis.

Irons attempted to restart the vehicle, but Garza supposedly grabbed the keys and told Irons to get out and obey the deputy. Deputy Watson ordered the suspects to lay prone on the asphalt, but Irons tried to run away while one of the other suspects was being searched, according to Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson. The deputy and the other suspects called for Irons to halt several times before the deputy shot from a distance of about 90 feet. Sheriff Thompson said the deputy believed the men were armed as the manger of the service station had reported a bullet hole in his truck hood. He said he thought it was a backfire

at the time, but imagined one of the boys shot at him. "My deputy was afraid for his life and the lives of the people in the neighborhood and had no choice but to shoot," Thompson said. Thompson also stated he felt the shooting was justifiable but called in both the Texas Rangers and the District Attorneys office for an independent investigation into the matter.

Letters to the Editor

To Whom It May Concern:

We have worked day and night for the past 9 1/2 years to keep a day care for Donley County.

We first opened in February 1975 with 3 kids in the old gym behind the old grade school. We moved 75 bird nests, replaced windows and built bathrooms. We were given a month to find a new home when the building was sold to a new industry moving into town.

Steve and Helen Rogers being the free hearted people that they are gave up half of his garage to us and helped us remodel it into a new home for our kids.

On February 16, 1980 the roof fell in on us all. We had a fire that cost Steve and Helen their home and the materials they had stored to finish their new home. Steve lost his business, we lost the day care, PPH and Community Action home. The people of the town responded to our plight and we had a new place within 24 hours.

We moved to 819 S. Gorst on February 18, 1980 and rented from Opal White for a couple of months. M.L. and Eureka Mays bought the building and we have rented from them ever since.

We've had as few as three kids and as many as 40 kids.

Title XX has helped us since February 1979 with funds to supplement what we could raise in Clarendon.

We have not had the local support that we could have used. The people helped at the time of the fire then closed their minds to the fact that we existed. We have worked nights and weekends to supplement our costs. We've had a couple of wonderful people who have donated money and time to helping us with our needs.

We've had all the help and support we could use from TPCAC and AAB. We've used any surplus money (and that wasn't enough at times) to keep extra kids. Over and above what Title XX had contracted for. In the years we've been under contract with XX we've had numerous budget cuts and high operating expenses. Usually the budget runs out in mid November. We then have had a choice of closing or trying to keep going on faith and what money had been saved through the year. We also kept children who did not qualify and charged their parents accordingly.

Sometimes the monies we collected from the private kids were all that made the difference in whether we stayed open or closed.

We can't say we feel good about closing. We love our kids, our parents and the people we worked with. We are not quitters but we are realistic and see we have come to a place where there is no further place to go.

A few facts that may not be common knowledge: 1. The Day Care employed 2 to 4 full time employees, 4 part time employees for a yearly payroll of \$40,834.20. 2. Rent \$4,800, 3. Utilities \$3,182.09, 4. Food \$5,786.42, 5. and a place to stay for 35 children while their parents worked at Medical Center, Skinners, Mary's Country Kitchen, Dr. Hudson's, Claude Rest Home, Cash Ranch, School Cafeteria, City, Greene Dry Goods, County Courthouse, Alderson, Clarendon Press, Gibson's and Dairy Queen, Western Skies, Allsup's and some were enrolled in Clarendon College and some were enrolled in JTPA.

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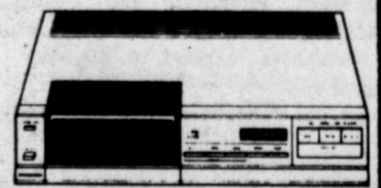
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Tumbleweed Talent Show a Big Success

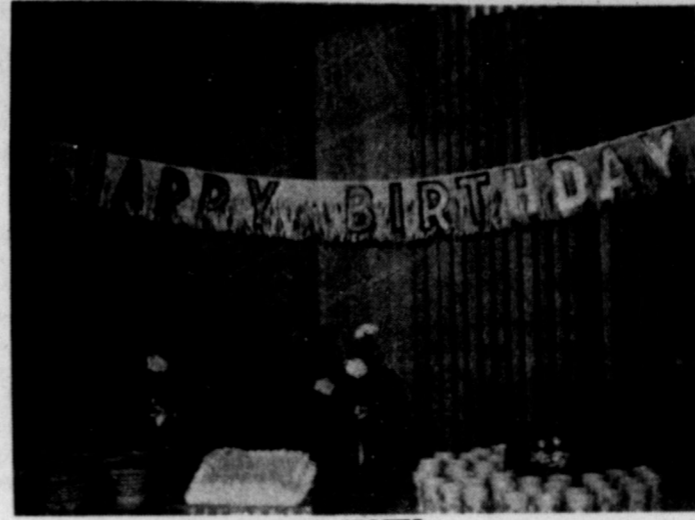

Clarendon Receives \$4,180.25 in Local Sales Tax

October checks representing taxes collected on sales made in August and reported to the state comptroller's office by September 20 show that checks totaling \$58.2 million in local tax payments to the 990 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock states, "So far this year, these payments are running better than 16 percent ahead of last year and most Texas cities can expect even bigger checks for the rest of 1984." The Comptroller explained next month's checks will reflect the first increases from new goods and services taxed for the first time beginning October 2.

The three cities in Donley County received \$6,476.59 as compared to \$4,180.25 in the same pay period in 1984. Today the cities have received \$81,736.99 as compared to \$78,272.80 for 1983. This gives the cities a 4.43% increase over the same pay periods of 1983.

Armstrong County increased by 1.06 percent. Collingsworth County had an increase of 10.05 percent and Hall County had a 15.85 percent increase.

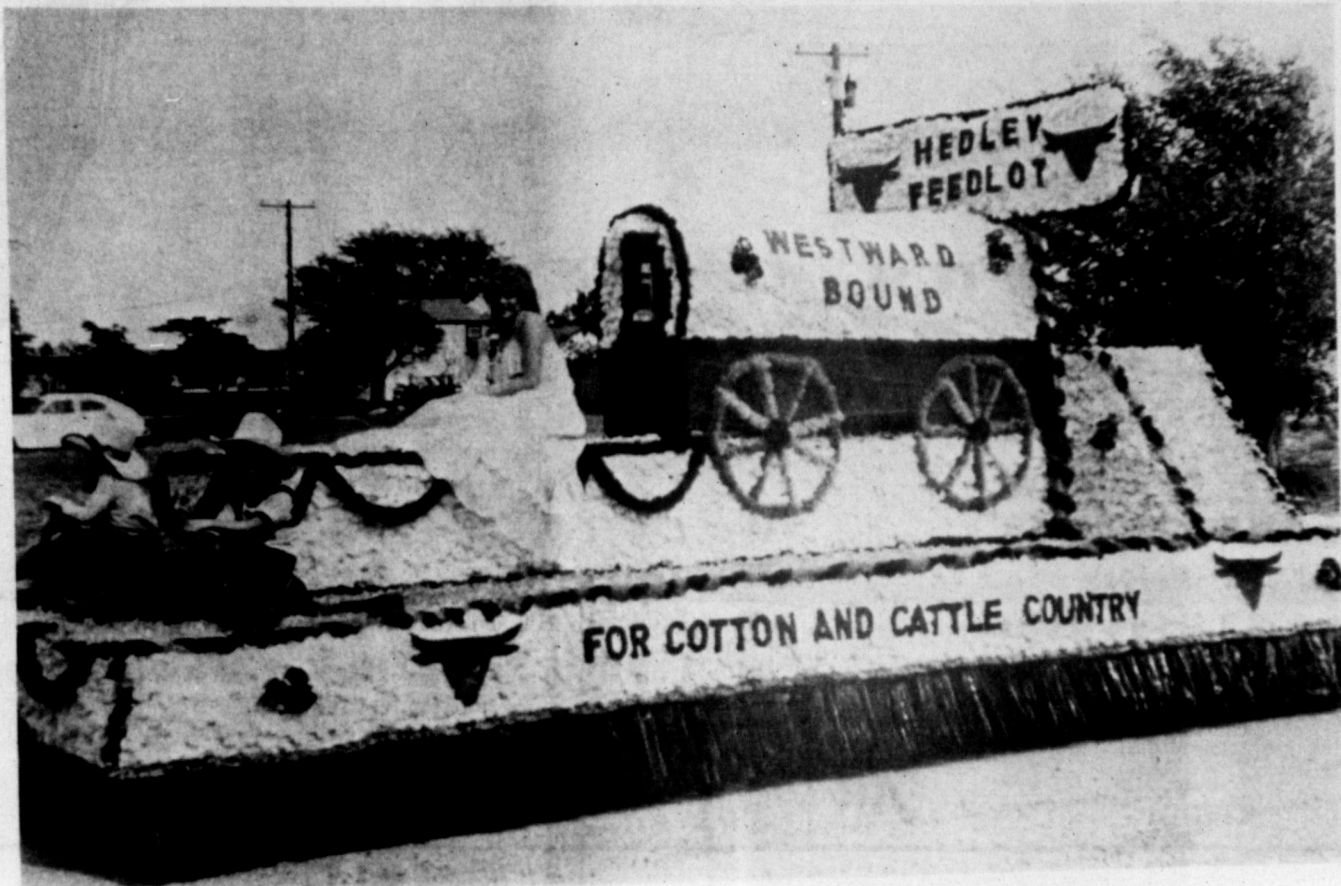
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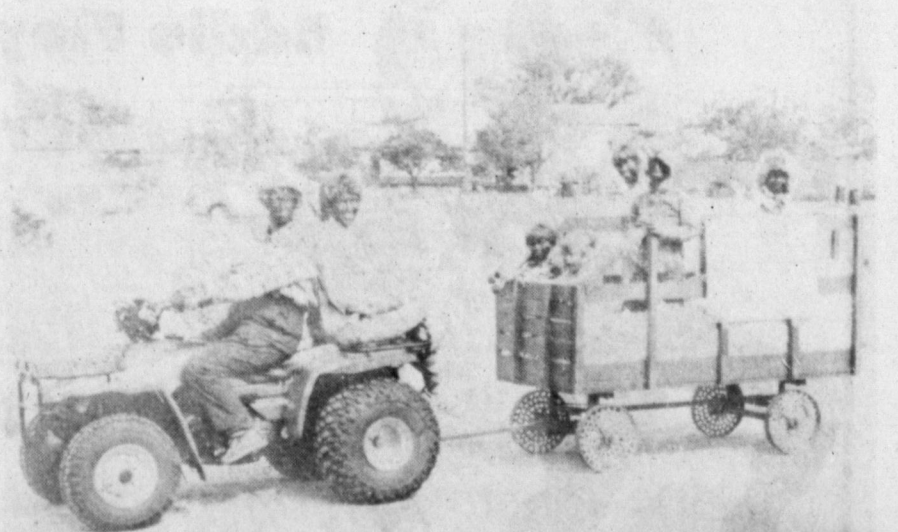

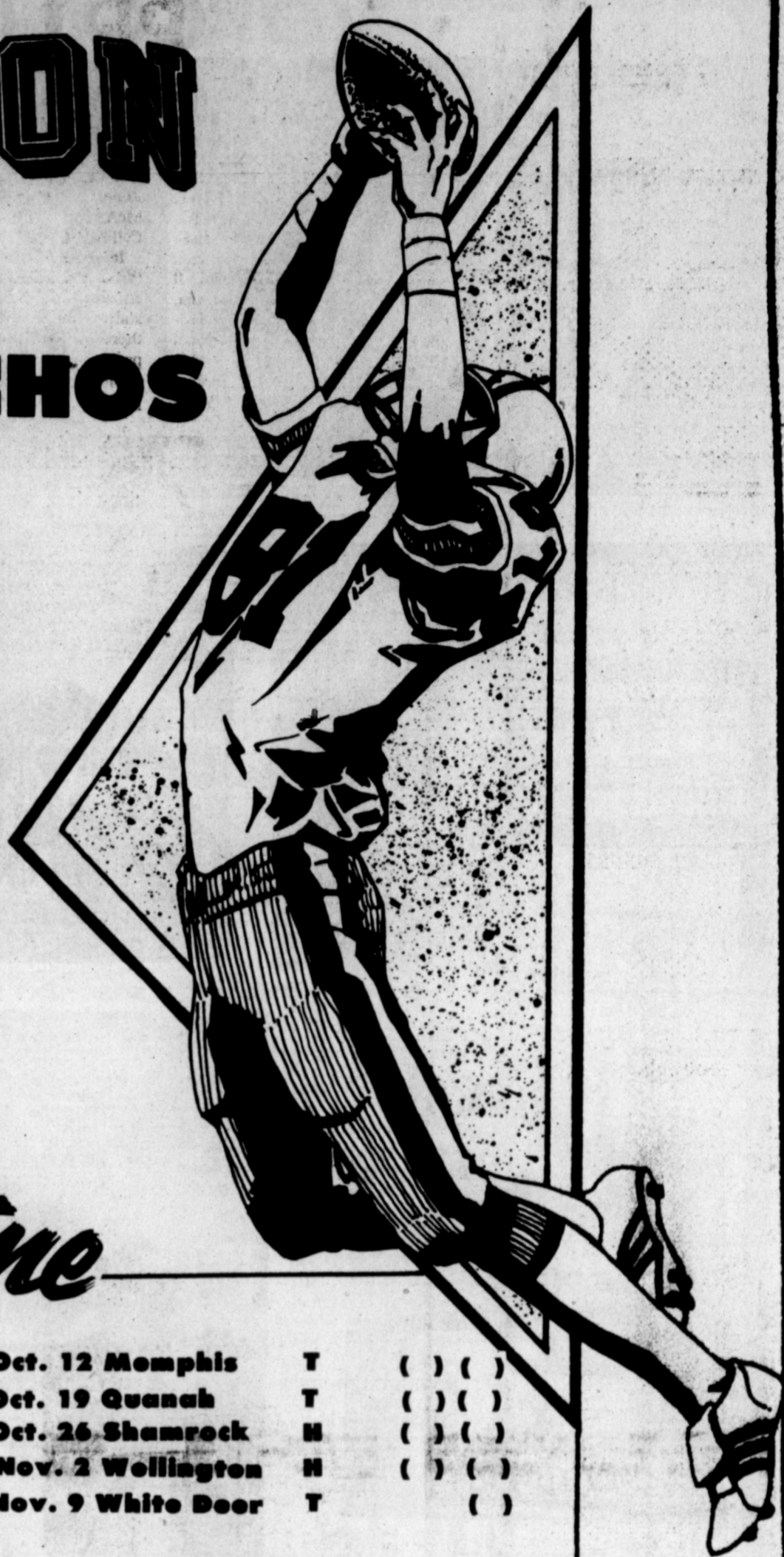

etc. All firefighting equipment and EMS equipment was on display. Attendance for the open house was very good.

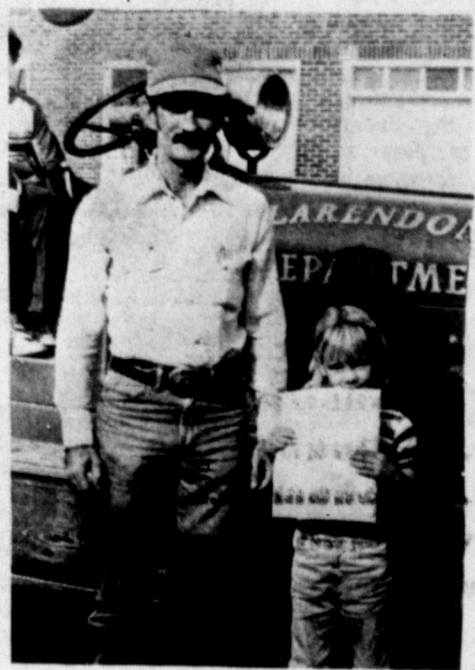
Other events held during the week, besides the open house and poster contest, included a media campaign, participation in the Hedley Cotton Festival Parade, and programs and fire drills at local schools.

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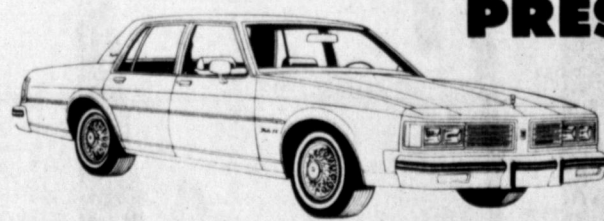
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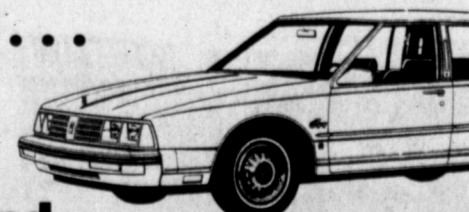


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Obituaries

Home Ec Dept Sets Up Advisory Council

ORDINANCE

An Ordinance prohibiting the removal of garbage, trash, debris, waste material or any other item of items from the city dump ground in the City of Clarendon, Donley County, Texas, and providing a penalty for such an offense, and providing for the publication thereof.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Donley County, Texas:

Whereas, there is a pressing need for an ordinance by the City of Clarendon regulating the removal of garbage, trash, debris, waste material, and any other item or items from the city dump ground located in Donley County, Texas, as described in more detail below;

Therefore, be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Donley County, Texas, that it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to remove any garbage, trash, debris, waste material or any other item or items from the city dump ground maintained at the following location:

The east one-half of the Southeast one-fourth of Section 57, Block C-6, G.C. and S.F. Railway Company Survey, Donley County, Texas.

Any person so removing or causing the removal of any garbage, trash, debris, waste material, or any other item or items from the above described city dump ground shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be fined a sum not more than \$200.00, and that each time such removal occurs shall be a separate offense and be punishable as above described.

Whereas, because of the urgent need and necessity of prohibiting such removal of garbage, trash, debris, waste material, or any other item or items from the city dump ground because of the unsanitary conditions created by such removal, it is ordained and enacted that this ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage, and publication in a paper as contemplated by Article 1013, Revised City Statutes of Texas, and the law regulating such matters.

Passed and approved this the 9th day of October, 1984.
