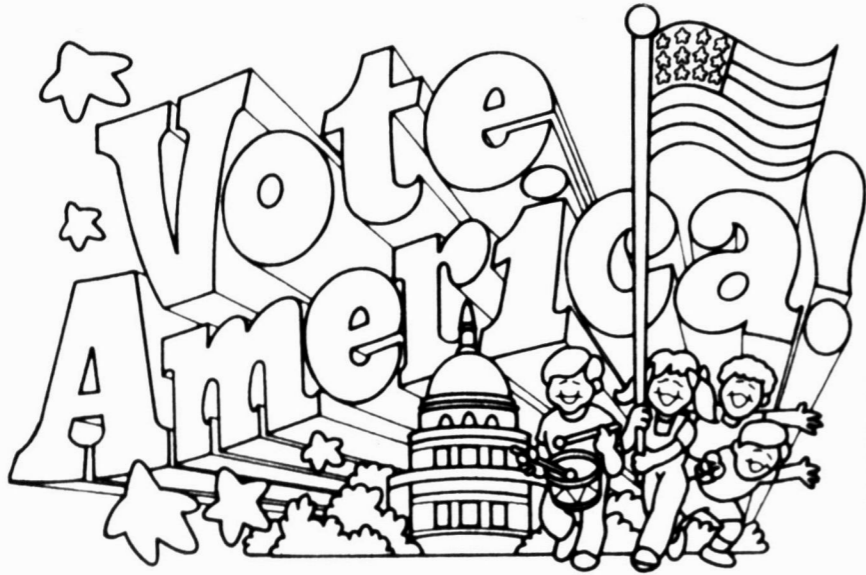

Write-In

Voting

Wanda Smith winner of the May Democratic Primary, who resigned effective Oct. 1 to join the staff of Chamberlain Motor Co. will be the only name on the General Election ballot for tax assessor/collector Nov. 6.

Donley County voters should use the write-in column to elect their choice for tax assessor/collector. Six people filed for this position. There were: Cathie Jewett, Dana Bell, Sandra Eads, Mary McAnear, Debbie Blackburn, and Donna Allen. Bell and Jewett later withdrew their names.

There are two ways you may vote for a write-in candidate. (1) You may mark an x by the name of each of the candidates, and when you come to tax assessor collector, write-in one of the write-in candidates name in the write-in column. You do not have to mark thru Wanda Smith's name for your vote to count. (2) You may mark an x at the top of your ballot to vote a straight ticket. Then you should go down the column to tax assessor collector column and write-in your choice in the write-in column. This vote WILL count for your write-in candidate even through you vote a straight ticket.

This straight ticket voting, and then writing in a write-in candidates name was confirmed by Democratic Chairman Billy Ray Johnston. Mr. Johnston called Austin to confirm that this was correct. If no write-in candidate receive a majority of votes then Mrs. Smith is re-elected to this position. The Donley County Commissioners Court will then have to appoint someone to the position of tax assessor/collector to serve until the next election. It is a clear choice - the voters either use the write-in system of voting or the Donley County Commissioners will appoint someone to be tax assessor/collector until Jan. 1, 1987.

With the resignation of Mrs. Wanda Smith who won the Primary election in May for tax assessor/collector, this position is open and four candidates have filed as write-in candidates. They are: Sandra Eads, Donna Estlack Allen, Mary McAnear and Debbie Blackburn.

Sandra Eads was born and raised in Memphis. She is married to Eddie Eads and they have a 4 year old daughter. She is a charter member of Beta Sigma Phi. Her husband, Eddie, is employed by Osburn Furniture and Appliance.

Sandra was appointed October 1 to fill the vacancy for Tax Assessor/Collector, by the Donley County Commissioners Court.

Mrs. Eads stated, "Since being appointed Tax Assessor/Collector, I have met a lot of interesting people from all over the county and have gained lots of experience. I have found the job to be challenging, worthwhile and very fulfilling. I would like very much to continue to serve the people of Donley County as Tax Assessor/Collector."

Donna Estlack Allen moved to Clarendon in 1944 with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Homer Estlack and brother, Allen Estlack. After graduating from CHS she moved to Tulia where she worked in the office of a Certified Public Accountant. She moved to Hart in 1968 where she worked as secretary to the Superintendent of Schools and the last four years in Hart she worked in a boutique. She moved back to

Clarendon 14 months ago and has worked part time for the Clarendon Housing Authority.

Mrs. Allen has two children, Kyle, who attends New Mexico Military Institute and a 15 year old daughter, Kari, who is a sophomore at CHS. She is a member of the First Methodist Church where she helps with the children's choir. She is also a member of the Beta Sigma Phi sorority.

"My hobbies are bridge, reading and most of all spending time with my children and enjoying them. I have had experience in bookkeeping, typing and I enjoy working with the public. I would like to serve the people of Donley County as Tax Assessor/Collector," Mrs. Allen said.

Mary McAnear works as a checker for IGA Foodliner store. Mary moved here from Memphis when she married Sam McAnear and the couple has two children, Connie and Stewart and one granddaughter. Both of the McAnear children are graduates of CHS.

Sam and Mary farmed in Donley County before moving to Idaho. They returned 13 years ago and have farmed in the area ever since.

"I am asking for your vote for the position of County Tax Assessor/Collector as a write-in candidate. I feel that I am qualified and I would appreciate your vote on November 6. Remember, your vote does make a difference. Thank you," Mrs. McAnear stated.

Debbie Blackburn is currently working for Donley County in the sheriff's office as Chief Dispatcher, Jailor and Sheriff's secretary. Broncos out last

Irish 14-0

The Clarendon Broncos beat the Shamrock Irish Friday night 14-0 to keep their playoff hopes alive. It was a mixture of good defense and offense that once it gained field position it put the 14 points on the board in the second quarter. The defense bent but never broke. The Irish gained 319 yards to the Broncos 215 yards. The Irish threw 36 passes and completed 18 for 209 yards, but when the chips were down the Broncos pass defense rose to the occasion each time. Robert Youngblood, Leland Howell, Booney Gardner and defensive player of the week Brent Hayworth made up the defensive secondary. Linebackers Dewey Mincey and Richard Torres also played the pass well.

The first quarter saw Shamrock keep the Broncos in the hole. The Irish moved the ball and when stopped kicked deep in Bronco territory. The Broncos had the ball two times in the quarter and started from their 6 and 4 yard lines and each time Rod Keown kicked them out of the hold. Keown kicked six times during the night for a 37 yard average.

The start of the second quarter was no different as the Broncos took over on their own 10 yard line but this time the Broncos would move 89 yards only to fumble on the Irish one yard line. The drive started with Rodney Smith gaining 12 and 10 yards and then Trent Sharp threw a con't pg 2

pass to Dewey Mincey who made a good catch and run for 40 yards. The ball was now in Irish territory and on 4th down Sharp hit Hayworth with a pass to the Irish nine yard line and on the next play Gardner ran to the one and fumbled and the Irish recovered. The Bronco defense held and Hayworth caught the Irish punt on the fifty yard line and handed off to Smith who ran 44 yards to the Irish

8 yard line. This time Gardner scored on the first play behind the good blocks of offensive player of the week Bret White, Dean Cearley, Tim Cole and Russell Alexander. Sharp kicked the extra point to put the Broncos ahead 7-0.
Following the kick off the Irish failed to move and on fourth down the swap was mishandled and Bronco ends Lynn Alderson and Tim Cole tackled the punter on the Irish 35 yard line. Smith made 13 yards

around right end and after Smith and Gardner made good gains the ball was on the 10 yard line. Sharp went right to pass and reversed his field as Keown picked up a good block and Sharp hit Hayworth in the end zone for the touchdown. Sharp kicked the point after and the Broncos increased their lead to 14-0.

The Irish moved into Bronco territory but Youngblood made an interception and returned it 60 yards, but a penalty rubbed out a lot of the run back. The half ended with the score that was to be the final score 14-0.

The third quarter was a repeat of the first quarter as the Broncos took over the ball on their 10 twice and 15 yard line the other time. Protecting a 14 point lead was the most important thing so the Broncos played it close to the last. A Bronco fumble gave the Irish the ball at the Bronco 25 yard line. The quickly moved to the nine. The Bronco defense came to life and pushed the Irish back to the 18 and Mincey intercepted at the 10 yard line.

The fourth quarter was played between the thirty yard lines. Howell recovered an Irish fumble after Gardner made a big hit on an Irish receiver.

White and Sharp shared offensive player of the week and Hayworth was defensive player of the week.

Smith had 107 yards on 22 carries and Gardner had 46 yards on 12 carries up the middle. Sharp completed 3 passes in 8 attempts for 62 yards.

The Bronco defense was led in tackles by Howell and Torres with 19. Mincey had 15 tackles, Youngblood,

WTU residential customers paying less than state average

West Texas Utilities Co. residential customers are paying slightly

less than state average for their electricity this fall, according to surveys reported by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

In September and October, WTU's standard residential rate for 1,000 kilowatt-hours was \$74.74, while the state average was over \$76, the PUC report shows. For 500 kilowatt-hours, WTU charged \$41, while the state average was \$40.41 in September and \$40.25 in October. Average monthly usage for WTU residential customers was 1,020 kWh in September 1983 and 701 kWh in October 1983.

The survey included 19 utilities, among which were 10 investor-

owned companies. Highest rates in the state were those of El Paso Electric Co., which charged \$98.37 for 1,000 kWh. Lowest rates reported were by the Lower Colorado River Authority, which charged \$53.09 for 1,000 kWh.

WTU currently is awaiting the outcome of a rate case pending before the PUC. A settlement agreement presented to the PUC hearing examiner would raise WTU's base rates but lower the fuel cost recovery, resulting in only slight changes in the various rates now in effect. A final decision by the three PUC commissioners is expected in November.

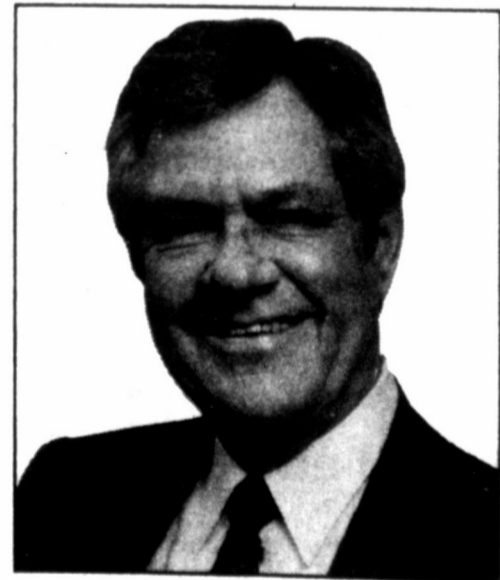

Health Hints for Today

INFLUENZA has started. We've seen a few cases with the chills, fever, muscles aches and pains and the bad cough. If you haven't had your flu vaccination yet, get it soon. This vaccination will not help the intestinal flu, which is really gastroenteritis with nausea, vomiting

and diarrhea. The intestinal flu is still going on strong with many cases, so be careful. If it lasts more than a day or two, see your doctor. A few of these cases of the 24 hour bug have gone on two weeks before the patient finally went to the doctor. ASTHMATICS are in their worst

season. It's not just the weed pollens but the humidity which aggravates the asthma. If your asthma is very mild Primatine Mist or tablets help. If your asthma is severe and you take medication, be sure to take it as prescribed during this season of the year. Don't skip a prescribed medication because you don't think you need it, for by the time you do need it, it may be too late to be very effective.

Please take notice that 1985 feed grain and cotton bases have been mailed out. Feed grain yields were included with the same notice.

1985 COTTON PROGRAM

Just a special note to all cotton producers about the new program. To qualify for the farms full yield on

the paid land diversion (10% of the cotton base). The land diverted must have been devoted to cotton in one of the last three years. If it has not been devoted to cotton in at least one of the last three years the County Committee must determine that the acreage diverted, if planted, could have produced the farms yield. If the Committee cannot determine that the land would produce the farms yield they must assign the potential production that it could be produce and that yield will be used for the farms final paid land diversion.





Junior High, Clarendon. Information relating to the county program may be obtained from the director. Other information concerning the 1985 Regional Bee, scheduled for April 27 on the campus of WTSU, will be available on request from Gene Parker, bee coordinator. Parker is director of placement for WTSU. "We are looking forward to having these outstanding young people on the campus of WTSU next April. The university takes a great deal of pride in working with this educational program and

placing great emphasis on learning," Parker said. The deadline for directors to report their county champs to Jeane Bartlett, Spelling Bee Editor for the Amarillo newspaper, will be April 6. The winner of the 1985 regional bee will be sent to Washington, D.C. to take part in the National Spelling Bee, early in June, with all expenses paid, courtesy of the Amarillo Globe-News. This includes expenses for one parent. Rules, established by the national sponsors, the Scripps-Howard Newspapers, state that any student who will not be older than 16 by June 1, or in a grade higher than the 8th by the end of the current school term, may participate. A Junior Bee for younger students, grade six and under, will also be conducted in each county if directors so desire. The county junior winners do not spell in the Regional Bee, but are special guests of the sponsors and will be recognized and awarded trophies. The booklet, "Words of the Champions," containing more than 3,000 words and prepared by the national sponsors, is used in most school events and county contests.

The booklet is available from the Amarillo Globe-News and is priced at only 40-cents each. Orders should be mailed to Spelling Bee Editor, Amarillo Globe-News, Box 2091, Amarillo, Texas 79166.

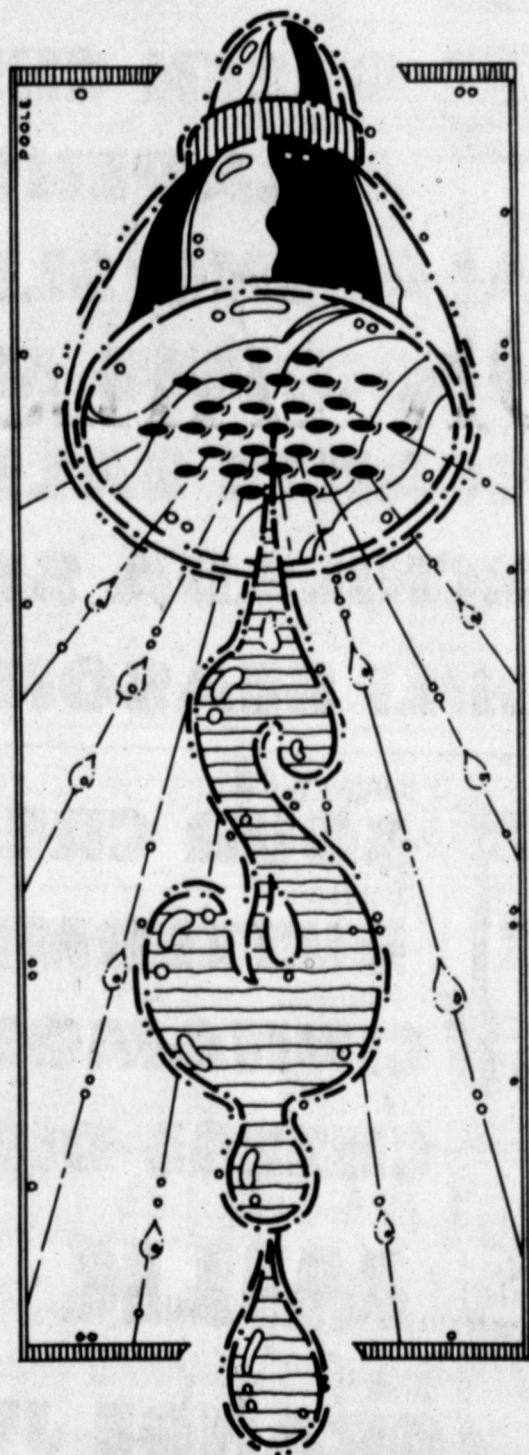

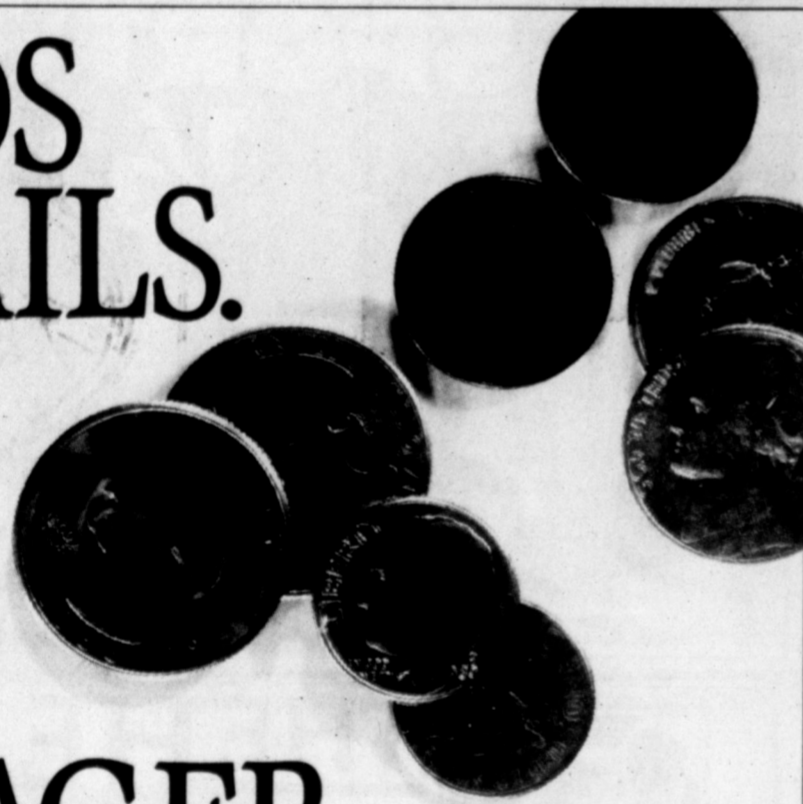

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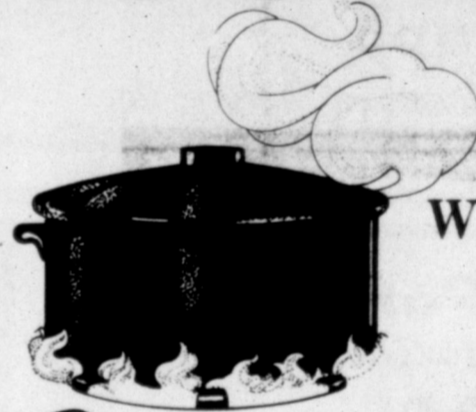
