Broncos open basketball season against Claude

The Clarendon boys basketball team opened their season on Tuesday, November 11th against Claude. The first half the Broncos could not get their offense going and the score at the half was 18-29. But in the second half the offense got on track and the defense was tough outscoring the Mustangs 29-19. The final score was 47-48. The defensive players of the game were Dean Cearley and Trent Sharp, who also scored 24 points. Randy Crump and Trent Sharp had the best all-around games.

On Thursday, November 29, the Broncos played Spearman in the first round of the Spearman Tournament and fell 39-63. The score at the half was 24-26. "The first half was the best defensive half of a game we've played this year," said Coach Lovell. Leland Howell had the best all-around game. Leland Howell, Rodney Smith, and Dean Cearley led the rebounding with seven each. Trent Sharp was the only Bronco in double figures with 12 points.

In the second round of the tournament, the Broncos beat Guyton JV 52-50 in overtime. The game was marred with numerous fouls and turnovers by both teams. In the overtime period both teams held the lead several times, but a shot by Stanley Gardner with just seconds left in the game gave the Broncos their first win of the young season. Playing honors went to Trent Sharp and Randy Crump. Dean Cearley, Rodney Smith, and Trent Sharp led the rebounding with eight each. Trent Sharp had 25 points and was the defensive player of the game.

In the consolation game, the Broncos lost to a strong Dalhart team 51-75. Despite the loss, the Broncos played their best game of the year to the 3A team. Dean Cearley and Leland Howell had outstanding games and Stan Garland was the defensive player of the game. Trent Sharp led all scorers with 18 points.

The Broncos' record is 1-3. "We have a good team that should win a lot of games when we play with more consistency." The Broncos play McLean at 5:30 (in the Shamrock gym) in the first game of the Samnorwood Tournament this weekend and on Tuesday the 11th at Groom at 8:00.

Payroll Taxes Increase Jan.1

Beginning January 1 payroll taxes will be 14.1% employer and employee combined on the first \$39,600 of pay. This year it is 13.4% on the first \$37,800. For the self-employed, net rate will be 11.8% up from 11.3% now. Benefits will increase 3.5% beginning with the January 3 checks. Earning limits will be higher next year. Amount of job pay that beneficiaries can earn without loss of benefits up to \$5400 for those under 65 and \$7,320 for people 65 through 69. Benefits will be reduced \$1 for every \$2 earned above these limits.

Hunting Season in full swing by December

Jim Donaho, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Clarendon, encourages sportsmen to be observant while hunting afield.

"You might learn some ways to improve the habitat of your favorite game for the 1985-86 hunting season," Jim said. "For instance, inland duck hunters will likely see more ducks on stock tanks and farm ponds this year. During the summer drought, water levels receded lower than usual, exposing more pond bottom for a longer period of time."

"Excellent duck food plants, such as smartweed and wild millet, grew on the exposed bottoms. Runoff from October rains filled the tanks and ponds, flooding these waterfowl foods with shallow water. Surface feeding ducks - mallards, pintails, teal, gadwall, and widgeon - feed in these areas of the pond."

Donaho said Japanese millet, which is commercially available, can

be planted along the water's edge next summer. Even if fall rains do not flood your plantings, surface feeding ducks will feed on dry land.

"Your hunting sport may be deer, quail, turkey, or pheasant," Donaho said. "While hunting, keep in mind that good habitat is the key to success. Identify the important characteristics of good habitat for your game. After hunting season closes, come to the SCS office at Clarendon for assistance in improving the habitat of your favorite game animal."

The local SCS field office gives technical assistance to landowners, operators, and others through the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District.

During the six weeks of training the airman studied the Air Force mission, organization and customs and received special training in human relations.



WAYNE HARDIN
Hardin to present research before American Chemical Society

Wayne Hardin, a graduate student in chemistry at West Texas State University, will present his research before the southwest regional meeting of the American Chemical Society in Lubbock, December 7.

Hardin, a Clarendon native, will speak on "Synthesis and Magnetic Properties of Copper (II) Ibufenac." He hopes to give some insight into the magnetic interactions, structural features, and bonding of the molecule.

In future years this research may prove helpful to organic chemists in the creation of pain-relieving drugs. Copper complexes of aspirin are more effective as anti-inflammatory drugs than plain aspirin, and less likely to cause gastrointestinal ulceration and bleeding. And ibufenac is a potent anti-inflammatory drug. Hardin believes future biological experimentation, building on his research, might develop a new drug for, say, rheumatoid arthritis.

At present, however, the research is in the inorganic field. Since June of 1983, Hardin has been examining magnetic susceptibility and electron paramagnetic resonance data for copper ibufenac.

The research is funded by the Robert A. Welch Foundation.






