





Until the beginning of May, only 282 of the flesh-eating worm cases had been identfied in the Lone Star State.

Only 54 positive cases were reported by the Mission Lab in May. 1973.

Non-screwworm samples submitted by producers dipped somewhat in May. "With the Gulf Coast ticks expected to create additional worm problems, especially in the southern portion of Texas, all producers should join in the battle against screwworms," adds Meadows.

To make the battle more effective, producers should carefully check animals regularly for wounds, submit samples from worms found in wounds, treat all wounds, and spray or dip livestock on a regular basis.

### Social Security To **Increase Benefits**

The second part of a two-step increase in monthly social security benefits will be included in checks delivered in July, according to Travis C. Briggs social security manager in Amarillo, Texas.

The overall increase will amount to 11 percent for most people getting social security payments. A 7-percent increase was included in checks starting in April.

The increase will enhance the financial security of about 30 million people who get social security benefits. People getting social security checks don't have to do anything to get the higher payments. The increase will be added automatically.

Starting in July, average social security retirement payments will go from \$161 to \$181 a month. Average social security disability payments will go from \$184 to \$206 a month. Average survivors payments to a widowed mother with two children in her care will go from \$418 to \$435 a month.

For 1974 the amount of yearly earnings subject to social security deductions has been increased from the first \$10,800 to the first \$13,200, but there is no increase in the contribution rate. Employees and employers will continue to pay 5.8 per cent each on covered earnings, and the rate for self-employed peo-


