



Recalling The Indians Of Old Clarendon

Dr. James O. Brandon Pastor First Baptist Church

The Staked Plains, as it was alled in the 1800's, belonged to the Comanche Nation by right of inheritance and by right of a federal grant from the United States Government. Nevertheless, the Plains became the object of settlement because of its rich farm and ranch land. The Plains were a cattlemen's paradise: so hundreds of little townships popped up all across them. One of these settlements was "Saints Roost" or Clarendon as it was later called. Some around Clarendon today say that the town got its name from Lord Clarendon of England.

There is still one or two living in Clarendon who recall the Comanche Indians of the turn of the century. They were led by a young chief, half Comanche and half white, called Quannah Parker. Quannah Parker and his Comanches were a familiar sight in Clarendon. They roamed the Plains as Lords of the Plains, fitting into the landscape as if they belonged to it and were




