Scouts Receive God & Country Award Sun.

Twelve Boy Scouts received the God and Country Award in the presentation program held Sunday afternoon, February 10, 1974 in the Harned Sisters Fine Arts Center, Clarendon College.

Five churches were represented in Clarendon with the fifth church presentation being made in Amarillo. This number was the largest to be presented and represented the most churches for any presentation of this award. Several from one church or another have received the God and Country Award in the past.

From the Calvary Baptist was Dan Hall; the First Baptist—Keith Floyd, Chris Ford, Rickey Price, and Gary Thomas; the First Christian—John Tucker and Dean Hawkins; from the Presbyterian—Butch Blackburn; and from the United Methodist—Steve Rives, Dan Sawyer, and Donny Garman. Paul Hermesmeier was the first member of the Catholic Church in Clarendon to receive the award. He was presented the Ad-Altare-Dei Award at the Blessed Sacrament Church in Amarillo Sunday evening. Rev. Greka from St. William Church in Tulla made the presentation. Twelve boys and two adults received the award in the Amarillo service, the largest group at any one time in the Amarillo church.

Dr. Gideon To Teach Here March 1, 2, 3

On March 1, 2, and 3, the First Baptist Church of Clarendon will have as its guest, the distinguished scholar and Bible teacher, Dr. Virtus Evans Gideon.

Dr. Gideon was born at Winters, Texas, December 29, 1926. He is married and has one son. He received his education at Hardin-Simmons University, and received his doctorate in Theology at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1956. He has studied at the University of St. Andrews, St. Andrews, Scotland, 1964; and Brite Divinity School, Texas Christian University, 1970-71.

Dr. Gideon is Professor of Greek and New Testament at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary at the present time. He previously was professor of Greek at Hardin-Simmons University.

Dr. Gideon is co-author of *The New Smith's Bible Dictionary*; author of *Luke: A Study Guide*; is one of the Editors of the *Biblical Sunday School Commentary*. He has written various curriculum materials for the Baptist Sunday School Board and materials for Tyndale Press. He helped in the revision of the *Jamieson, Fausset, Brown Commentary*.

Dr. Gideon will be teaching the Book of Colossians in the First Baptist Church on March 1, 2, and 3. The class will begin on Friday, March 1, at 7:30 p.m. and will close out on Sunday evening during the evening worship hour, March 3, at 7:00 p.m. You are cordially invited to attend and study under this distinguished scholar.

The hospital will be receiving even more than had been anticipated and the Medicare account has been a point of controversy with some local residents for quite some time.

A house full of ways to save on your gas bill....

There are many ways you could be adding to your gas bill, and not be aware of it. Take a few minutes and check:



- Insulation, weather stripping and/or caulking around doors and windows.
- Fireplace damper for tight fit.
- For holes and leaks around window air conditioning units and roof-top ventilators.
- For clean filters regularly.
- Gas appliances periodically for proper adjustments.



- Do:
- Close drapes on sunny days and open them on dark ones, when using gas air conditioning. Reverse this process when using gas furnace.

In The Bundle Of Life

I Samuel 25:29—"The soul of my Lord shall be bound in the bundle of life with the Lord thy God."

Nabal is often thought of as being the man who died twice: "his heart died within him... and about ten days after... he died" (I Samuel 25:37, 38). Nabal was a wealthy Calebite who pastured his large flocks of sheep and goats in Carmel on the edge of the Judean wilderness. David and his band of followers had protected Nabal's flocks from predatory raids and at shearing time sent men to collect payment "for services rendered." When Nabal refused to pay, David and his band of followers advanced to avenge the affront, but Nabal's wife, Abigail, quickly sent ample payment to David, thus ending the danger. However, when Nabal was told of the action of his wife he apparently suffered a stroke and died within ten days. Shortly thereafter David took Abigail for his wife.

This incident is most frequently remembered because of Abigail's words to David which soothed his anger when she delivered unto him the ample payment for the watchcare of the

flocks: "The soul of my Lord shall be bound in the bundle of life with the Lord thy God" (I Samuel 25:29). This is perhaps man's highest honor and most priceless privilege, to be bound up in the bundle of life with the Lord. For so being bound with the Lord God man shares the creativeness of God and participates in his purposes. To be bound up in the bundle of life with the Lord is to live protected by His power and grace so that, while we will still experience sorrow and suffering in this life, we shall be able to so endure that we shall receive "in the world to come life everlasting" (Luke 18:30b).

The man who is bound in the bundle of life with the Lord is bound there because his wrath is quieted within him so that he seeks not vengeance when first refused just compensation and later is fully rewarded to avert disaster. If David had refused to be satisfied he would have then become guilty of evil committed against Nabal. However, because he was willing to alter his actions according to the compensation received from Abigail the Lord God brought vengeance upon Nabal and he died. You see, too often we are determined to be the instruments of God's judgement upon our neighbors and determining what should be done we strive to bring it all to pass and thus we become guilty of breaking God's Commandments. We are convinced we're right; it's God's will, it is what He demands, thus, we administer "God's vengeance". But, really we give away to egotism and false pride and seek to strike back for per-

sonal reason, and the Lord God has no part in it at all. To "be bound up in the bundle of life with the Lord thy God" we have to leave the Lord's vengeance to the Lord for His doing.

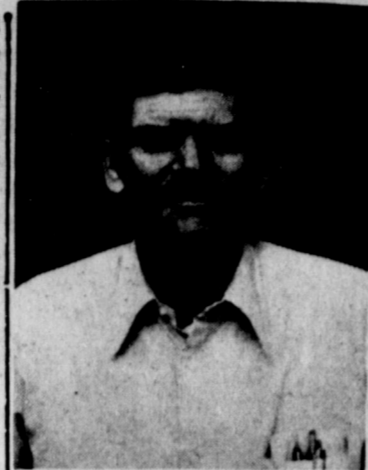

Cotton Classing News

Clear weather allowed cotton ginning to continue into the final stages over the Memphis, Texas area according to W. E. Cain, In Charge of the USDA, Agricultural Marketing Service, Cotton Classing Office in Memphis, Texas. "Most of the cotton being ginned is ground stored, or ricked, cotton," said Cain.

The Memphis, Texas Office classed 16,200 samples this week to bring the season total to 265,200. This compares to 192,200 on the same date a year ago. The predominant grade classed this week was grade 32 with 53 percent followed by grade 42 with 22 percent, grade 41 with 10 percent and grade 31 with five percent.

The predominant length classed this week was staple 32 with 58 percent followed by staple 31 with 38 percent.

Micronaire readings showed 69 percent miked in the desirable range of 3.5 to 4.9, 25 percent miked 3.0 to 3.4, and five percent miked 2.9 and below.

Presley tests showed 87 percent tested 75,000 psi or higher. The average for the week was 81,000 psi.

The cotton market was moderately active over the Memphis, Texas area this week. Prices were lower early but responded to a rising Futures market later in the week and closed one and one-half to two and one-half cents per pound over early week quotations. Some average prices paid on Friday were: grade 41, 32-57.00 to 59.00 cents per pound; grade 32, staple 31-53.50 to 55.00 cents per pound; and grade 42, staple 31-52.50 to 54.50 cents per pound. This was far cotton miking 3.5 to 4.9.

The average price paid farmers for cottonseed at the gin was \$100.00 per ton.

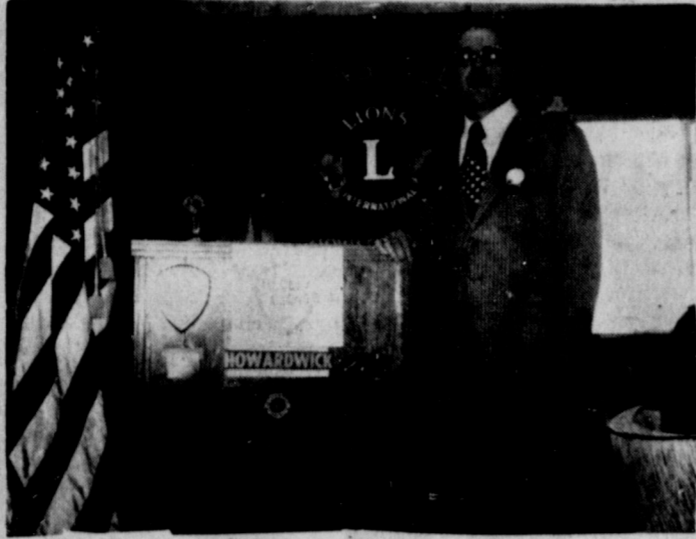
