Congress made provision for the care of the orphans by an appropriation of \$2,500 for each child. The interest from this sum was to be used for their education.

July and August are the best months in which to cut sprouts, robbing the roots of the sustaining foliage before the storage of food in the roots is completed for the season. Many farmers who have no hay to cut are buying second-hand mowers to use on the weeds and sprouts in the pastures. There are times, however, when the mower is also important in the temporary pasture. Everyone knows that when Sudan or other hay and pasture grasses begin to get "stemmy"-that is when they shoot up the coarse seed stems and start making seed,

they are less palatable to livestock and also less nutritious. We have all seen such a pasture where the foliage has been eaten off and the bare stems left standing. If the pasture gets ahead of the animals which graze it-that is when
