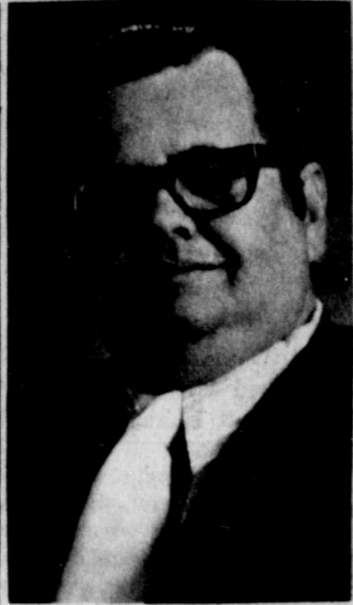

Don't miss him. It all begins at the First Baptist Church, Friday at 7:30 p.m.

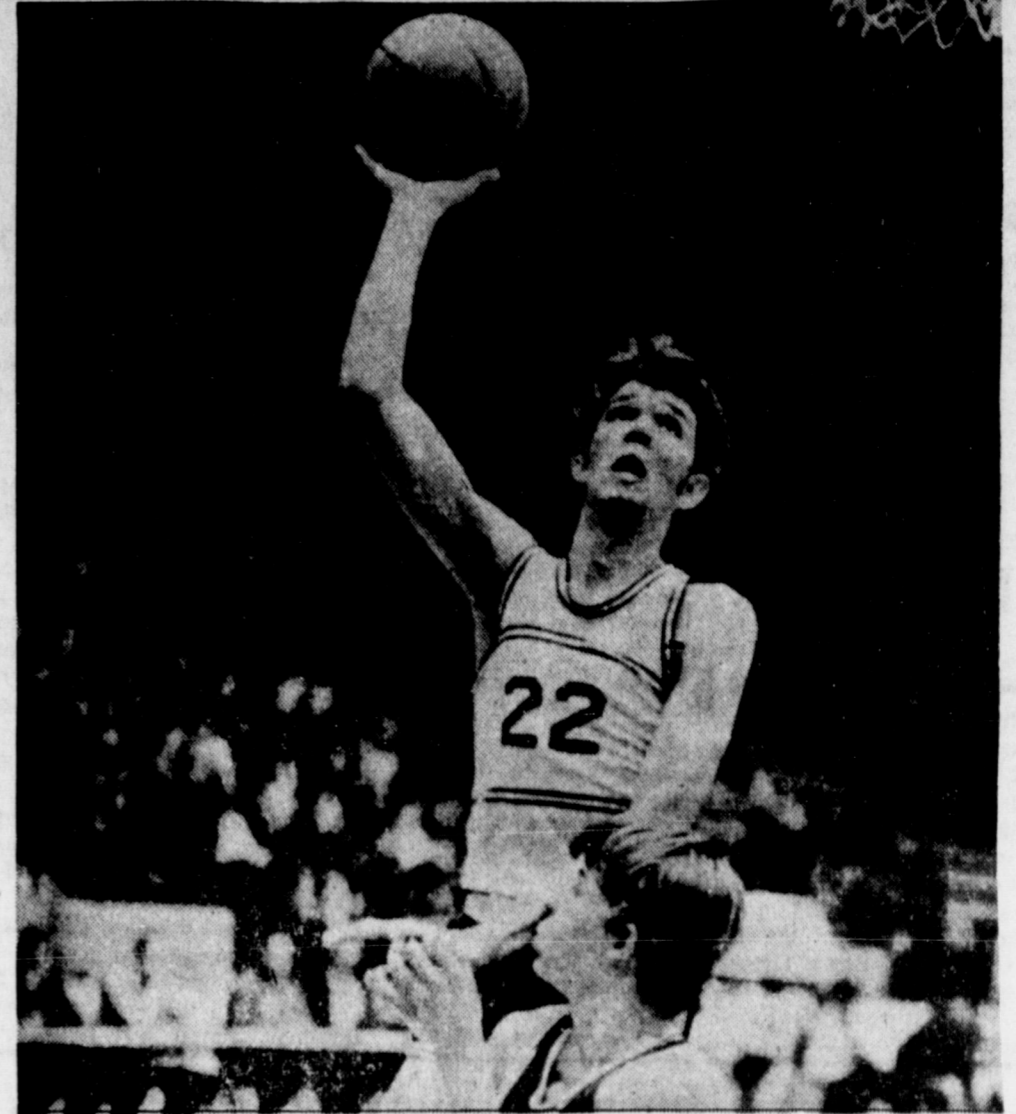
Band To Sponsor Flea Market March 9

Willard W. Knox Rites Held Friday

Funeral services for Willard W. Knox, 72, a resident of Donley County since 1912, were held at 10 a.m. Friday, February 22, 1974, in Schooler - Gordon - Robertson Funeral Chapel with Dr. James O. Brandon, Minister of the First Baptist Church, officiating. Interment was in the Citizen Cemetery with arrangements under the direction of Schooler - Gordon - Robertson Funeral Directors.

Mr. Knox died Wednesday morning, February 10th, of a apparent heart attack while working on the windmill near his home in Lelia Lake. He was born at Blum, Texas September 22, 1901 and married Vivian Creamer August 19, 1928 at Clarendon. Mr. Knox moved to Donley County from Childress and was owner and operator of a service station and garage in Lelia Lake. He also maintained the Lelia Lake Community water supply. He was a Baptist.

Survivors include his wife Mrs. Vivian Knox of the home in Lelia Lake; four sisters, Mrs. Bessie Reynolds, Mrs. Ruth Dodson, Mrs. Isabel Howard, all of Amarillo, Mrs. Altha Floyd of Lelia Lake; one brother, Noel Knox of Floyd, New Mexico; several nieces and nephews, two of which are Mrs. Ann Stepp of Clarendon and Mrs. Sue Butler of Victoria, Texas. Bearers were Quinn Aten, Elmer Dishman, Leo Smith, Ellis Chenault, Earl Shields, and Luther Butler.

Hedley Defeats Allison To Advance To Regional Play At Levelland Fri.

No New Candidates For Local Elections

The deadline for filing for a place on the ballot for three local elections in April is next Wednesday, March 6. This includes city, public schools and college regents. The deadline for filing for the hospital district is March 16.

At the present time, the three incumbents for City Alderman have signed up. They are Bob Kidd, Dave Croslin and Dr. Chas. E. Deyhle. Three are to be elected. Several inquiries have been made by prospective candidates regarding filing fees etc.

There are no filing fees for any of the local offices mentioned above. If you are interested you need to be a qualified resident voter and taxpayer.

In the public school trustee election the three incumbents have signed up. They are Leo Smith, Richard Tunnell and L. A. Watson. Three are to be elected. The school business office will be open until 5 p.m.

In the College Regent election, three incumbents have signed up. They are Frank Phelan Jr. Bill Todd and Chauncey Hommel. Three are to be elected. The hospital board deadline is not until March 16 and no candidates have signed to date. Places coming up are 4, 5, 6 and 7. Terms expiring are O. C. Watson, John Jones, Virgil McPherson and Bright Newhouse.

Tuesday night was a very important night for the Hedley team and residents of the area for at that time the team advanced to Region 1-B Tournament at Levelland in a game played in Amarillo Civic Center to take Class B Bi-District honors. Led by Dan Bolin and Leon Freeman the Hedley Owls dropped Allison by a score of 60-41. The Owls took a 20 point lead by halftime and maintained their advantage throughout the game. This was Hedley's 31st win against five losses this season.

Channing defeated Follett at the Civic Center in Amarillo Tuesday night and will also advance to Regional play at Levelland.

Hedley is slated to open the Regional Tournament at Levelland Friday afternoon at 3 p.m. opposing Anthony. Likely Hedley will play Channing sometime during the Regional play, however, this should pose no problem to the powerful Owls. Tournament play will progress on a win-lose basis. At this point it is not known at what time the Owls will play following games.

All in the area are backing Hedley to win Regional and advance to the State Tournament set for March 8-9.

The U. S. Senate voted this past week to extend the energy shortage when it passed legislation designed to force a reduction in the price of crude oil, and the House, at this writing, appeared ready to follow suit this week.

The majority of my colleagues in the Congress seem to be acting out of panic instead of good sense, seeking short-term convenience instead of real solutions. They seem to think they can legislate an end to the energy shortage. Actually, passage of the Emergency Energy Act in the form it passed the Senate would extend the shortage. Over the past years, the Congressional majority has acted unwisely in passing measures which have removed much of the profit incentive from a very high risk business. At the same time, the Congress has refused to pass necessary legislation, like the bills I have re-

peatedly introduced to provide domestic exploration incentive and to de-regulate natural gas pricing, which would have encouraged the increased domestic energy supply which consumers now need.

As a case in point, the Congress voted in 1969 to reduce the oil depletion allowance. This increased the industry taxes between \$500 million and \$600 million during each of the next two years. Also, the industry spent some \$500 million less in 1970, and again in 1971, than it had spent in 1969 on domestic exploration. In other words, the Congressional majority took from the industry the funds which it had been spending in seeking new domestic energy supplies. Now, when those supplies would have been on line, we do not have them.

Apparently, the Congress has still not learned the obvious lesson: we can't force profit incentives down and encourage increased production at the same time.

The bill also plays politics with the price provision by allowing the President, if he chooses, to raise the average price of crude as high as \$7.09 a barrel. The majority in the Congress feels that the President will be forced to opt for this higher price. Then, they will be able to blame him for the action. This is an old game the Congressional majority has played for too many years: give away power to the Executive Branch and then complain when the President is forced to use the power he has been given.

This nation must make decided and rapid progress toward energy self-sufficiency if we intend to remain a leading world power, not subject to foreign economic blackmail. To attain self-sufficiency by 1980, this country will have to decrease its annual growth rate of consumption from 3.6% to 2%, and, at the same time, increase its annual growth rate of domestic production from 3% to 4.7%.

We can't achieve this goal if the Congress continues to discourage domestic production activities.

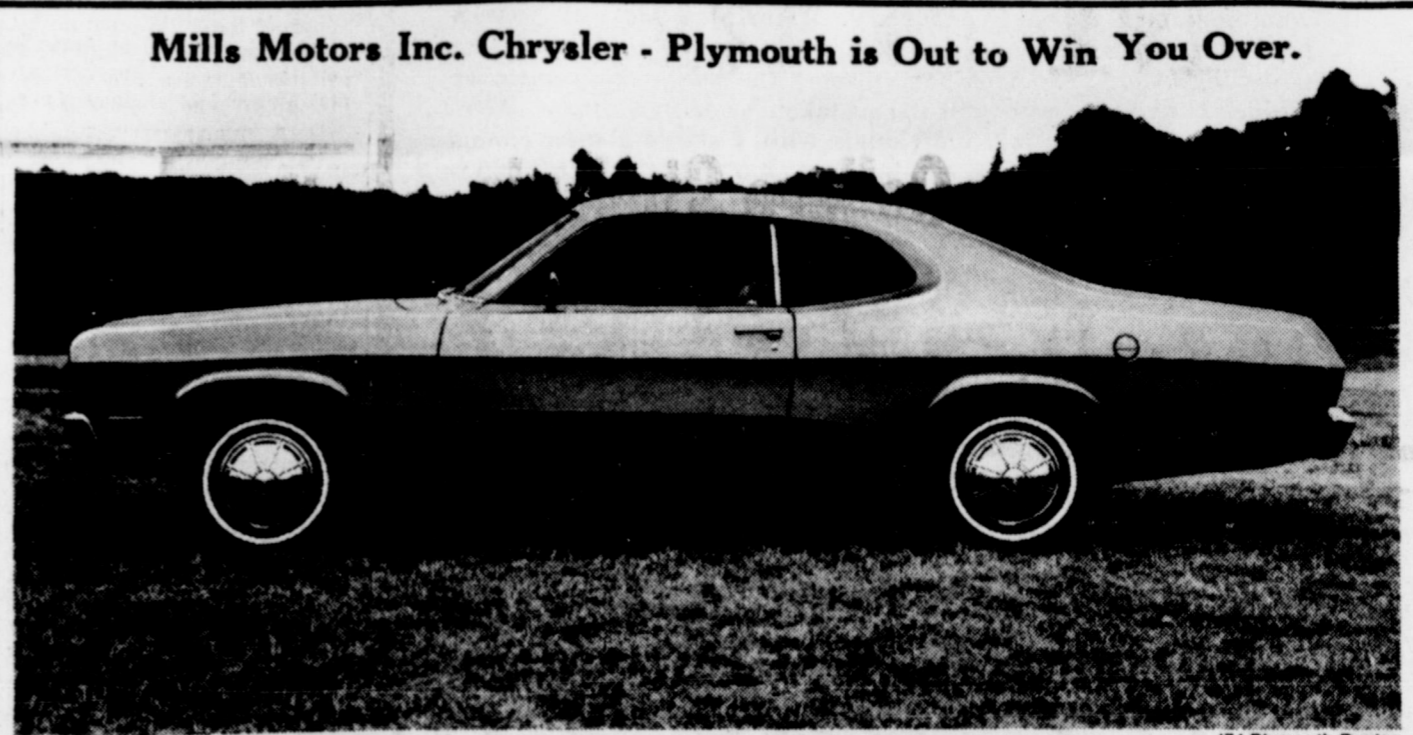

MATTHEW 5:29—"If thy right eye offend thee, pluck it out, and cast it from thee."

I remember, as a youngster of about nine or ten years, wanting to go to the movie one Sunday afternoon. We lived on a farm about two and one-half miles west of Rotan, Texas in Fisher County. We had our shortages then, too, only they were not fuel oil but money. For many years I got to go to the movies on Saturday, and occasionally on Sunday. Our heroes were Tom Mix, Buck Jones, William Boyd, Gene Autry, and Roy Rogers, just to name a few. I don't remember what was showing on that Sunday afternoon, but I wanted to go, I don't even remember why but I was not going to get to go and I was greatly disappointed. You know the severity of a nine year old's disappointment.

As I walked through the living room, which also served as my parent's bedroom, I remember saying: "Some day I am going to have a movie screen in my living room so I can watch the movie anytime I want to!" You know that children do dream - this was long before any thought of television. How ridiculous was my thoughts that were born in that moment of great disappointment.

Well, now everywhere you turn there is that movie screen; in living rooms, in dens, in kitchens, in bedrooms. And now, I am coming quite concerned about what is to be seen on the "one-eyed monster" these days. Some movies are not worth seeing - with all their nudity, profanity and glorification of gambling and drinking. The morality of our nation is declining and few voices are being raised to awaken the people out of their tranquility.

One voice which is heard of occasionally is that of George Parks, editor - publisher of THE ROSCOE TIMES, the weekly

ALLOTMENT NOTICES: Allotment notices for the 1974 crop year were mailed January 18, 1974. If you have any questions concerning the notices please come by this office.

COTTON PRODUCTION: Production records should be brought to this office as soon as possible after harvest. Some people are waiting until they sell their cotton. This is not necessary. The gin can complete the 503 card before you sell your cotton.

DESTROYED WHEAT: If your wheat crop is destroyed by natural causes (hail, drought, etc.) you should contact this office before you destroy the remainder of the wheat.

RECP: There will be a RECP Program for 1974. Details of this program have not been received as of yet. As soon as we have any information concerning the program we will let you know.

PROGRAM INFORMATION
1. **BACKGROUND** — It would appear that the intent of the disaster payment provision of legislation is only to provide some relief to those farmers who suffer a disaster to the extent that there would be little or no income

resulting from crop production. With this in mind we believe it to be essential that the disaster payment provision be administered in a manner, to the extent permitted by law, to assure maximum uniformity of coverage to producers of the crops (wheat, feed grains and cotton) and this type payment not be made on farms where there is a substantial return from other crops. In view of the foregoing, the following disaster payment determinations have been made:

A. Follow-up crops planted for harvest on failed wheat and feed grain acreage within the allotment will nullify eligibility for disaster payment on the failed crop unless the follow-up crop also fails.

B. Coverage will be extended (both prevented and failed planting) only to the historical allotment on each farm. In the case of cotton, this would be the basic allotment and would not include acreage leased or reapportioned to the farm.

2. ALLOTMENT FOR DETERMINING PAYMENTS

A. Disaster Payments.
1. Feed grain and wheat. Limited to basic allotment.
2. Upland cotton. Farms receiving temporary allotment:
a. Increases. Limited to basic allotment.
b. Decreases. Limited to effective allotment.

B. Deficiency Payments.
1. Feed grain and wheat. Limited to effective allotment.
2. Upland cotton. Limited to acreage planted within effective allotment.
3. In other words, any cotton allotment transferred to a farm (either by lease or reapportionment) will be eligible for target price (deficiency) payments, but will not be eligible for disaster payment (prevented or failed.)

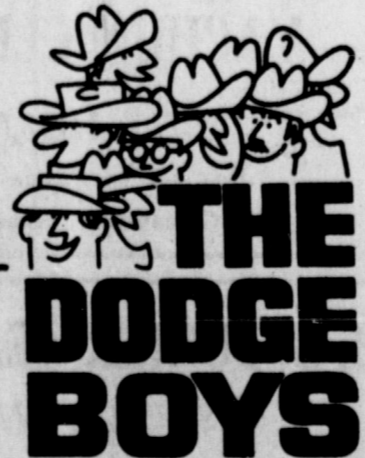

Selective Service News Information

Young men born in 1955 will have their Selective Service lottery numbers drawn on March 20, even though there is no draft or plans to resume calls for involuntary military service, Col. Melvin N. Glantz, State Director of Selective Service, for Texas announced today.

The sixth annual Selective Service lottery drawing for the nation's young men who become 19 years of age during 1974 will be held in Washington, D. C. on that date.

"Although the nation is at peace, it is generally recognized that there is the need to maintain a strong defense capability in order to insure continued peace," Col. Glantz said.

"The present 'standby' Selective Service System, which continues to register and classify young men, in a vital part of our defense preparedness program."

Texas has approximately 110,000 19-year-olds who will have their lottery numbers established by this drawing, according to Glantz.

The Military Selective Service Act requires all young men to

register with the System at the time of their 18th birthday. They are assigned their Random Sequence Number through the lottery which is held during the year in which they become 19 years of age. They are potentially vulnerable to induction throughout the calendar year of their 20th birthday; thereafter each year, they are placed in a lower priority selection group.

The President's induction authority would have to be restored by the congress before these young men could be inducted. The Defense Department has issued no calls for draftees since December 1972.

In reminding Texas' young men that penalties for failing to register can range to as much as five years' imprisonment or a fine of \$10,000, or both, Col. Glantz said that Selective Service has provided ways which enable men to register with min-

imum inconvenience.

In Texas, registration places have been established in every county. In addition to Selective Service Sitem Area Offices, there are more than 1,200 uncompensated registrars operating in County Courthouses, Schools, National Guard Armories, and in other public places. Broad publicity has given notice to young men having responsibilities under the law to register that registrars are available to them.

Veteran News

Q—Can the Veterans Administration still guarantee GI home loans for widows based on deaths of their husbands in service in 1946?

A—Yes. The Veterans Housing Act of 1970 restored unused, expired loan benefits to veterans and unmarried widows of

World War II and later periods.

Q—I was discharged from service June 15, 1966, and would like to enter on-job training. What's the time frame?

A—Veterans discharged after Jan. 31, 1955, have eight years from date of last separation or until Aug. 30, 1975, whichever is later, to use flight, farm cooperative and on-job training benefits provided by the Veterans Administration.

Q—I live in a state which has no burial space for veterans in its national cemetery. Will the Veterans Administration pay anything toward costs of burial plots in private cemeteries for such veterans?

A—Yes. Under Public Law 93-43 enacted in June 1973, VA pays up to \$150 in plot and interment costs of veterans not buried in national cemeteries.

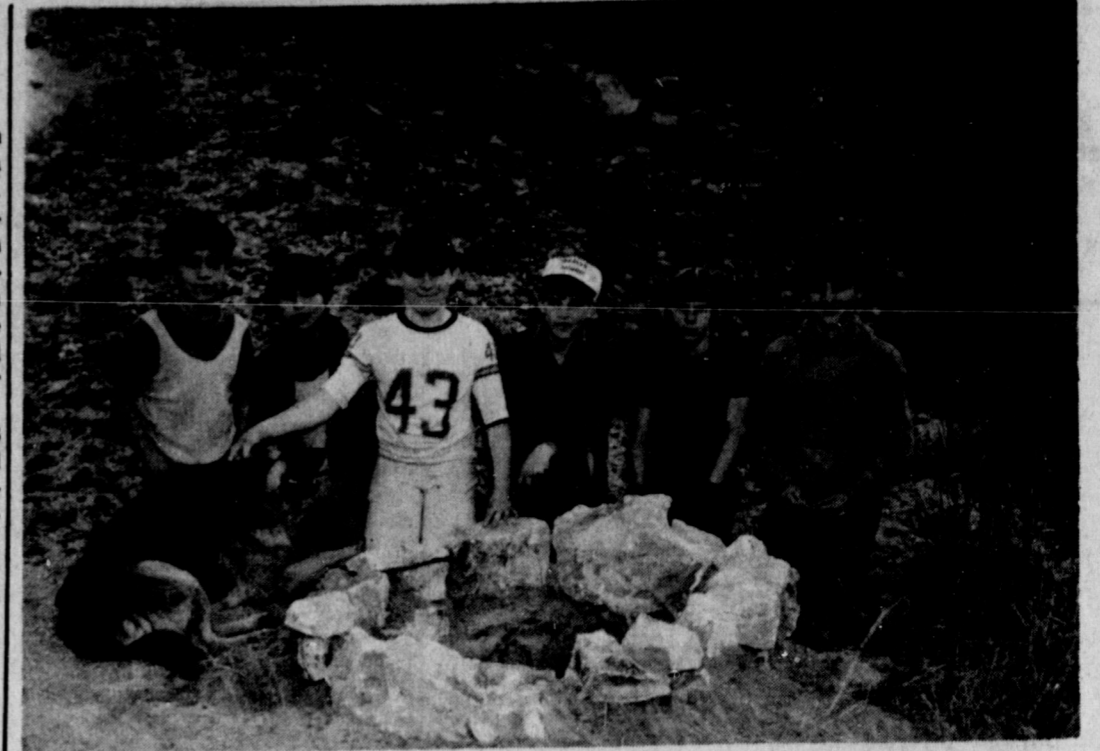
In conjunction with his discussion, Mr. Jackson explained the many opportunities available through the Christian Education to sophomore students who will be leaving Clarendon College.

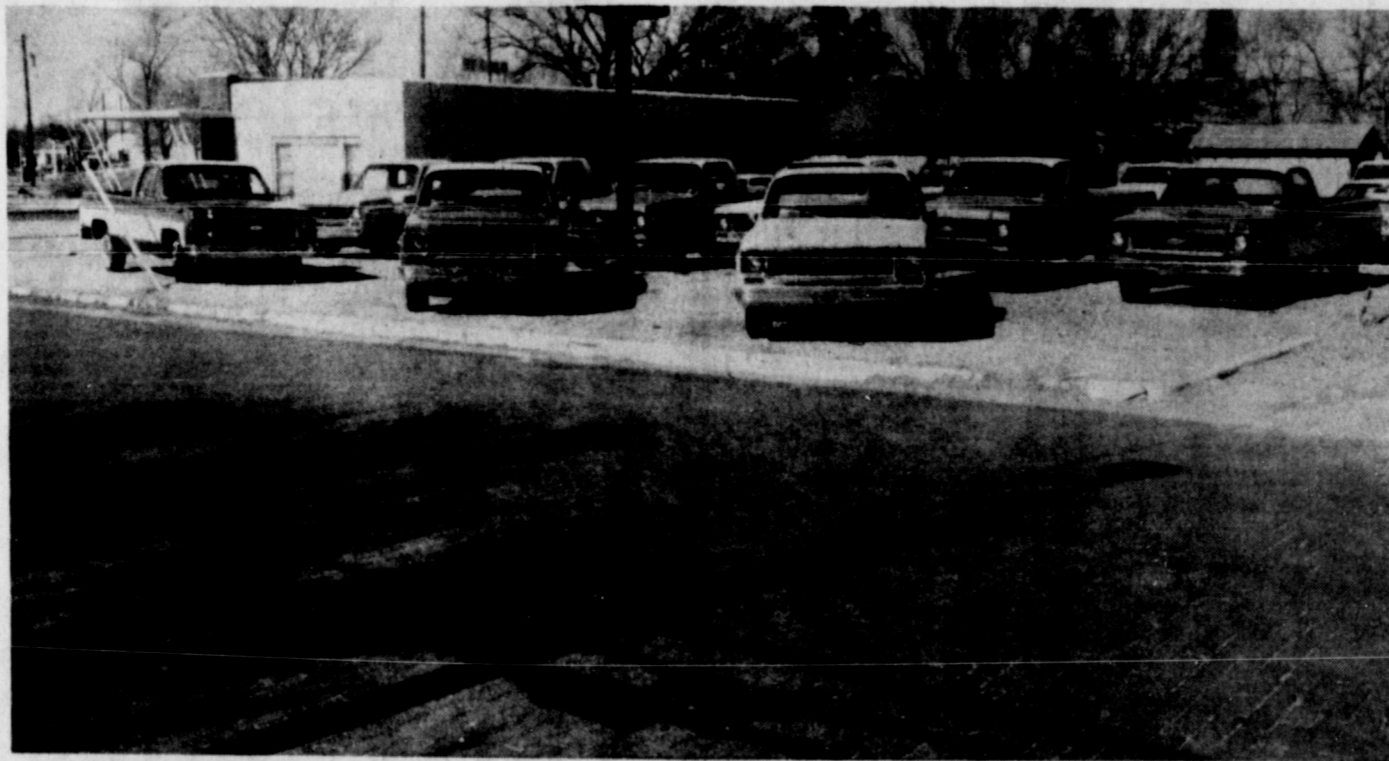
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
