Dr. Wright Has Broad Medical Background

Dr. Richard Carleton Wright was greeted with a lobby full of patients on his first evening at Medical Center Tuesday night. He will be here each Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 8 to 11 p.m. until April 16th at which time he will be on full duty. For our readers information, an outline of his past medical record is listed below. We all welcome Dr. Wright to our community.

Dr. Richard Carleton Wright, now an active member of the Staff of Medical Center Hospital, was born in Haverhill, Mass., July 15, 1926. He graduated Haverhill High School in 1938.

He entered and graduated from the United States Naval Hospital Corp School in 1944. After serving two years in the Navy attached to the Marines, he was discharged Pharmacists Mate Third Class in 1946. After his discharge, he entered Suffolk University in Boston as a pre-osteopathic student. He graduated in 1950 from Iowa Wesleyan College with a major in Chemistry and a minor in Biology. He then entered graduate work at Kirksville College of Osteopathy and Surgery, Kirksville, Missouri, where he graduated in 1954 with a D. O. Degree. He then entered his internship at Portland Osteopathic Hospital, Portland, Maine, where he finished in 1955. After practicing in Standish, Maine, for 17 years, he entered residency at Cherry Hill Medical Center July of 1972 in Obstetrics and Gynecology.

In April of 1973, Dr. Wright came to Texas to set up his practice in Groom. He has been there prior to his Staff Appointment to Medical Center.

His Post-Graduate training includes courses in Emergency Medicine, sponsored by the Hahnemann Medical School, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. On two different occasions he attended courses at the University of Vienna with emphasis in Dermatology, Obstetrics and Gynecology. He attended individual studies under Dr. H. Gabaro in 1960 and '64 concerning Plastic Surgery, Barcelona, Spain. He also studied under Dr. John Rowles at the London College of Osteopathy, London, England in 1960. He attended a Semester at the University of Maine in 1968 with emphasis in contemporary Physics. He attended a symposium on Family Practice with related subjects in Drug and Alcohol abuse, Hypertension, Hypnosis, Renal Diseases and Hematology.

His professional association include: Member of the American Osteopathic Association, Maine Osteopathic Association, Cumberland County Osteopathic Association, New Jersey Osteopathic Association and Texas Osteopathic Association. 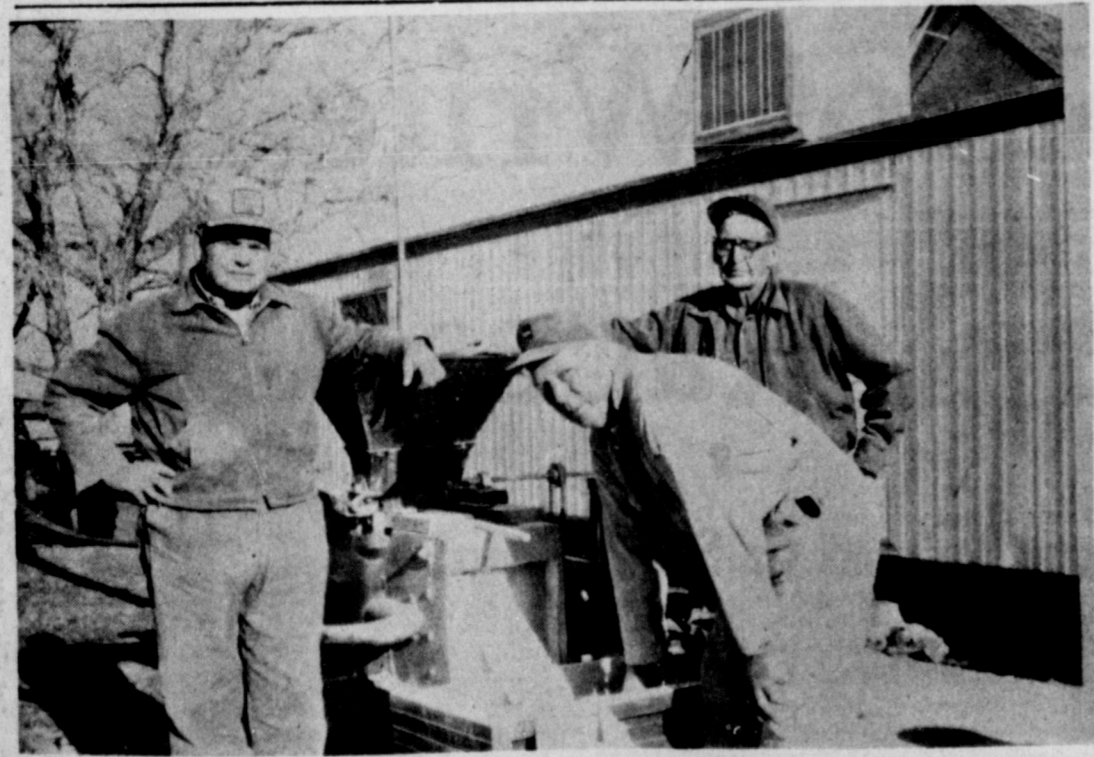

BICENTENNIAL REPORT NUMBER ONE

(Others Will Follow)

From The Donley County Living History Commission, Inc., on the affairs of the Bicentennial Celebration

WHAT IS THE BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION?
It is America's 200th birthday, as of July 1976, and Donley County's 100th birthday.

WHEN DID PREPARATIONS BEGIN FOR DONLEY COUNTY? EXPLAIN?

In April of last year (1973) it was felt that with Donley County's rich tradition of history, it might be possible to bring the attention of the state of Texas to bear on the county, as well as possibly the nation as a whole—if the promotion were blessed with good fortune. With that feeling in mind, people who would be capable of organizing such a promotion were assembled together and work commenced.

WHEN DID THE DONLEY COUNTY LIVING HISTORY COMMISSION COME INTO BEING, AND WHY?

The commission was chartered by the State of Texas on August 20, 1973, as a Texas non-profit corporation. Its officers serve with no pay, and donate time and expenses. The commission was needed so as to have a legal vehicle that would properly represent all of the citizens of Donley County, in supervising the creation and development of the Bicentennial celebration; the commission additionally is to raise necessary local funds, supervise the spending of same, and is to further control and designate the application of funds that will be coming to the county in way of grants and donations. Officers are Norma Selvidge, Virginia Browder, Frank Phelan, Kay Hayes and Kenneth Price.

WHAT HAS THE COMMISSION DONE TO DATE?

The commission has leased the 228 acres that lie just east of

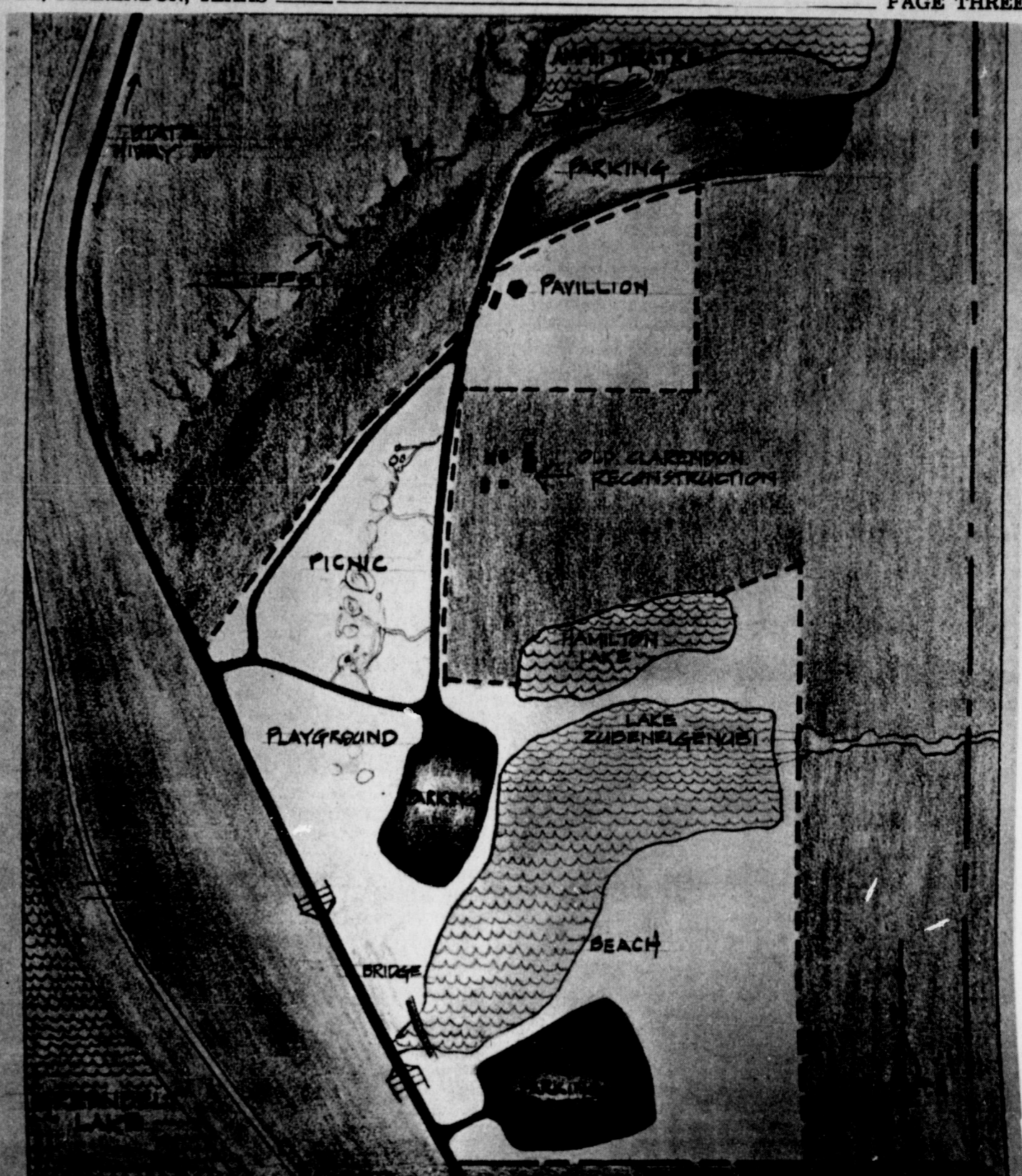
