

WHEN DID PREPARATIONS BEGIN FOR DONLEY COUNTY? EXPLAIN?

In April of last year (1973) it was felt that with Donley County's tich tradition of history, it might be possible to bring the attention of the state of Texas to bear on the county, as well as possibly the nation as a whole-if the promotion were blessed with good fortune. With that feeling in mind, people who would be capable of organizing such a promotion were assembled together and work commenced.

WHEN DID THE DONLEY COUNTY LIVING HISTORY COM-MISSION COME INTO BEING, AND WHY?

The commission was chartered by the State of Texas on August 20, 1973, as a Texas non-profit corporation. Its officers serve with no pay, and donate time and expenses. The commission was needed so as to have a legal vehicle that would properly represent all of the citizens of Donley County, in supervising the creation and development of the Bicentennial celebration; the commission additionally is to raise necessary local funds, supervise the spending of same, and is to further control and designate the application of funds that will be coming to the county in way of grants and donations. Officers are Norma Selvidge, Virgina Browder, Frank Phelan, Kay Hayes and Kenneth Price.
