Public Schools Offer Kindergarten 1973-74

Kindergarten will be offered by the Clarendon Public Schools to all five year olds who will have reached their fifth birthday on or before September 1st. The kindergarten class will be housed in a regular classroom in the physical school plant with the children attending a half day session.

The class will meet for a half day in the morning only, unless there are too many five year olds in one class. In that case, there could be a morning and an afternoon class with the students being divided into two equal classes. Each student would attend only one session.

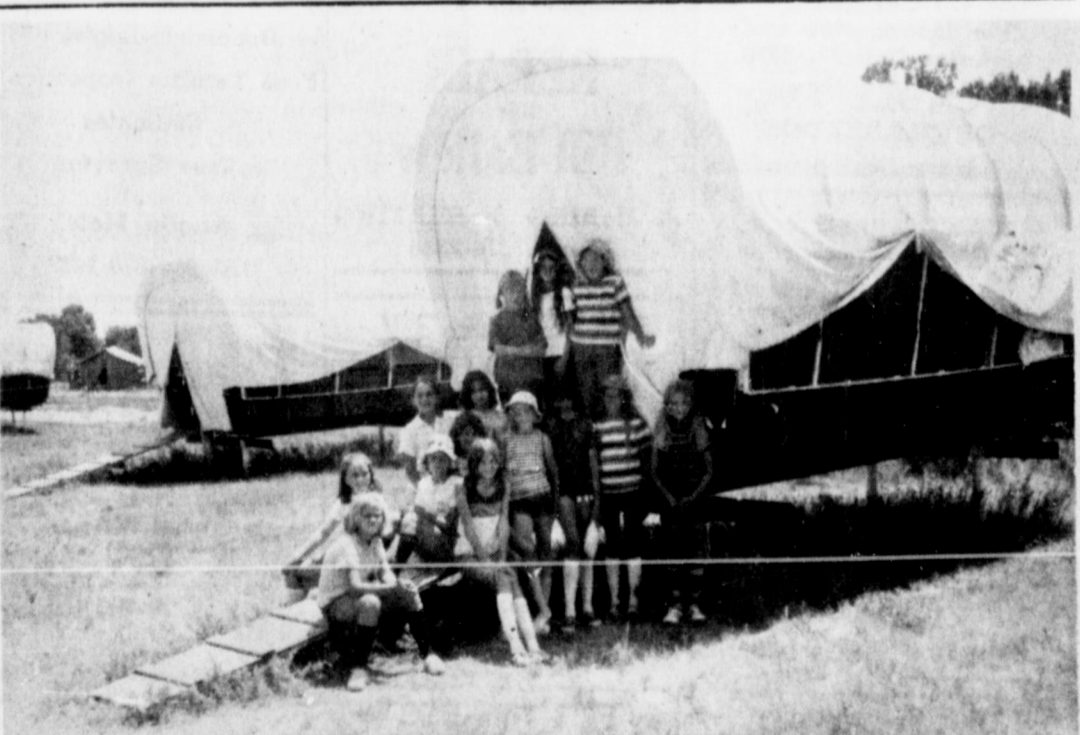
Last Thursday night, the School Board employed Mrs. Wanda Cornell to teach the kindergarten class. Mrs. Cornell formerly taught in her own private kindergarten.

The Public School is required by the state to provide a kindergarten program, but no child is obligated or required to enroll unless the parents so desire. The kindergarten age children will enroll at the same time as all elementary students and will attend their first class August 21st.

Parents may permit their children to eat in the cafeteria if they wish. They will be charged the same rate as the other elementary grades.

Vocational Nursing Program Offered At Clarendon College

The Vocational Nursing Program will be taught at Clarendon College in cooperation with the area health service units; namely, Hall County Hospital, Memphis; Childress County Hospital, Childress; Groom Memorial Hospital, Groom. The training will be designed for personnel in this area of the state of Texas. The hospitals will provide adequate work experience for students. The course work, upon satisfactory completion by the student, entitles the student to a certificate of completion and an opportunity to apply for and take the State Board of Vocational Nursing Examination. Those passing the examination will then be licensed by the state of Texas as Licensed Vocational Nurses (LVN).

The first 20 weeks of training are classified as pre-clinical. During which time the student attends classes for five days per week and will be taking courses in Anatomy and Physiology, Disease Control and Prevention, Pharmacology, Normal Growth and Development, Vocational Nursing Skill, Mental Health and Mental Illness, Nutrition, Personal and Vocational Adjustment, and Geriatrics. There will be other courses offered that the student will select with the help of the instructor or college counselor.

Upon completion of the 1806 contact hours for this program, the student will also receive the equivalent of 42 college semester hours. Additional training to become a Registered Nurse can follow.

All prospective students interested in the Vocational Nurses Program must complete the Minnesota Achievement Test given by your nearest Texas Employment Commission Office. This achievement test will be given on the Clarendon College campus August 23, at 9:30 a.m. or 1:00 p.m. if you do not have a TEC office near you. There is no charge for this test, and the

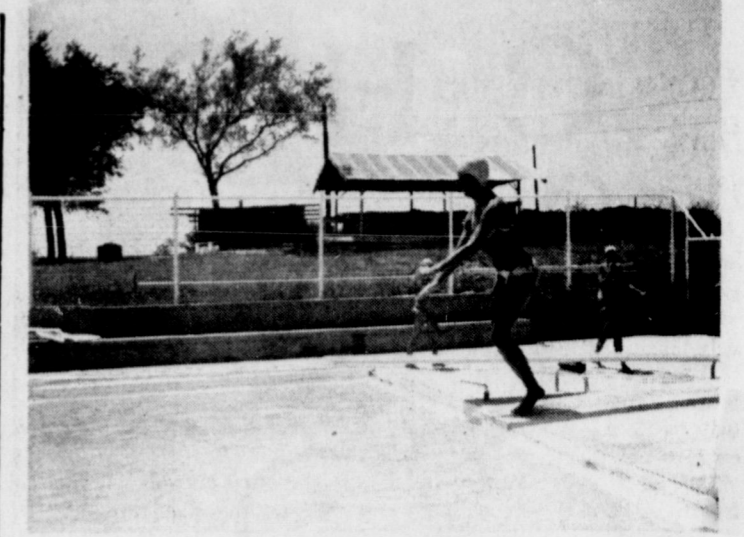

Permanent Pastures Subject Of Meet In Plainview July 20

The economics and utilization of permanent pastures for livestock production will be featured topics of a symposium set for July 20 in Plainview, according to Billy C. Gunter, district Extension agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and coordinator of the event.

The afternoon meeting which begins at 1:45 in the Chamber of Commerce Building is sponsored by a task force of the South Plains Development (SPD) program. SPD is a voluntary organization composed of citizens

interested in the economic and social growth of the South Plains. "Today we are faced with a severe shortage of beef in this country, and our rangelands are being used at full capacity," said Gunter. "The necessary expansion of the cattle industry to meet consumer demand for beef must come from the conversion of cropland to livestock production."

"Farmers on the High Plains can respond to this critical need," he added. "There is great potential for increasing economic gains in this area through the utilization of permanent pastures for livestock enterprises."

Speakers on the program include Al Novosad, Extension pasture specialist from College Sta-

tion, Frank Petr, Extension agronomist at Amarillo, George Warner of Hereford, Chester Jaynes, associate professor of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock, and Marvin Sartin, Extension economist also of Lubbock.

Their topics include cool-season and warm-season perennial grasses for the High Plains, relationships of livestock to forage, utilization of permanent pastures, and investment and returns on permanent pastures.

Dr. James R. Supak, Extension agronomist at Lubbock, will offer concluding remarks.

Cooperating in the joint meeting are the Extension Service, the Experiment Station, and Texas A&M University, with coun-

ty Extension agents in the SPD program area providing leadership.

ers can earn a special education endorsement for their teaching certificate during one summer's work.

Special education endorsements may be gained in four areas at WTSU. They are mental retardation, teaching the emotionally disturbed, language and learning disabilities, and early childhood education for teachers of exceptional children. Each endorsement requires 12 additional hours of study except for the language and learning disabilities which requires 15 hours.

WTSU special education courses are taught on the Texas "Plan A" concept of teaching, a plan whereby rather than having a special class consisting of only special education students, the trained teacher goes into the classroom and teaches the special children from plans that were drawn up for those children by individual analysis. Plan A concept in teaching is scheduled to be a reality in all Texas public schools by September of 1976 according to the Special Education and Special Schools Department of the Texas Education Agency.

David Thompson To World Music Festival In Vienna, Austria

David Thompson grandson of Mrs. Edna Brewer, has enjoyed a trip of a lifetime. He is a member of the Hugoton, Kansas Band that attended the World's Music Festival in Vienna, Austria.

ed to attend. Hugoton was the smallest town to be represented and the smallest band with its 58 members. Not only this but it was the smallest ever to be invited.

The fund drive was started with Food Sales, Sunday Dinners at which time cafes closed to encourage support of the drive, Car Washes, and a Garage Sale from December through June. Donations were made, parents helped and the citizens of the community worked together enjoying their work and knowing the wonderful opportunity this trip offered these young people.

The Band left the United States July 5, 1973 and returned July 17. Word from the Festival was that the Hugoton Band's performance was excellent. The attendance was 60,000.

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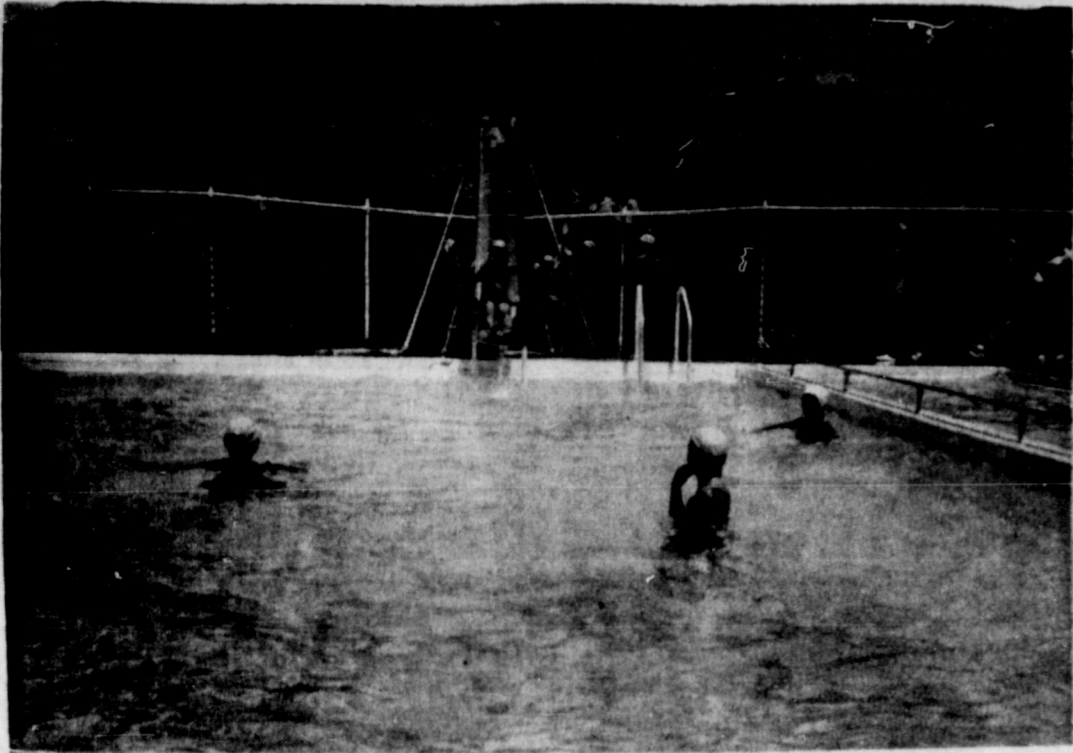

Bearers were Fred Bourland, L. E. Hughs, Caryl B. Baldwin, J. R. Ross, Van Schooler and Jerre Hincley.

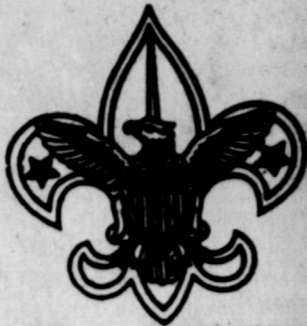
MOISTURE NEEDED NOW AS TOTAL SHOWS 15.12
