Plans are being finalized for the annual July 4th celebration which will begin Wednesday, July 4th and continue through July 7th. The Outdoor Entertainment Association headed by Don Thornberry has planned a full schedule of activities.

Rodeo performances are scheduled nightly to begin at 8:30 except for Thursday, July 5, when the time will be 7:30 p.m. Tickets for box seats are now on sale and may be purchased from Frank Wooten at Palmer Motor Co. A box for all performances is \$13.50 plus regular admission. General admission tickets will be \$1.50 for adults and 50c for children under 12 years of age. Parking space is limited around the arena. Space is \$5 for all four performances and may be purchased from James Owens at the Saddle Shop.

Mrs. Peggy Day will be the Rodeo secretary. Rodeo books will open Tuesday morning, July 3, at 8 a.m., place to be announced next week.

Thursday night, July 5th, will feature events for young cowboys and cowgirls. The rodeo will start an hour early, at 7:30 p.m. to make this possible.

A Horse Show will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday, July 7 and continue through most of the day. This is an A.Q.H.A. approved show and will be an interesting addition to the local celebration.

Other events planned include a Western Parade at 2 p.m. on July 4th. The parade is being managed by the Chamber of Commerce. Jim Formway will serve as Chairman. He will be assisted by the C. B. Radio Club. For any information relating to

the parade contact Jim and he will be glad to help you as will any of the C. B. members.

Also Wednesday afternoon, July 4th, there will be the gathering of Old Settlers at the Mulky Theatre at 2 p.m. Ernest Kent will be in charge as he has been for several years. The Old Fiddlers contest will be held in conjunction with this event and will likely start around 3 p.m.

ACTS 2:2, 3 - There came a
sound from heaven as a rushing
mighty wind . . . and there ap
peared unto them cloven tongues
like as a fire.

Two elements of nature that
call to mind many events of
my childhood are used by the
writers of the Scriptures. Some
times they used them in refer
ence to God and other times
they are used in reference to the
devil. But, both are impressive
in their own right in the experi
ence of man, and may respond
to them according to his own
knowledge of them.

For instance there is the
wind. It can blow gentle and
calmly - and to a young boy
hooping on a hot summer after
noon, a cool, gentle breeze is a
refreshing joy when you are a
long way from the water jug.
Or, the wind can be a frighten
ing thing when in the night the
trees are being whipped about
vigorously, and the wind howls
only as it can in the darkness,
and you see your father and mo
ther leaning hard against the
door to keep it from flying open
while only a few miles away a
twisting wind damages houses,
harns and other structures. Yet,
does not the wind itself reveal
to us something of the nature
of God; his power; his presence

among us. At times he moves
among us so that we are scarce
ly aware of his presence. At o
ther times he is like a raging
wind, making his presence known
unto all in a mighty and force
ful way. Yet, both are Him -
God among us. John writes in his
Gospel (3:8) The wind bloweth
where it listeth and thou hear
est the sound thereof, but can
not tell where it cometh, and
whither it goeth . . . The wind
is a totally enveloping element;
it filled the whole house where
they (the disciples) were seated
(Acets 2:2). And so it is with
God, when and where two or
three are gathered together,
they find themselves lifted, in
spired, and empowered by the
presence of the enveloping and
invisible but ever so real God.

Then, there is the fire. It
warmed our house, cooked our
food and I remember my mother
boiling water in the old black
wash pot to wash our clothes.
Fire was and yet is a servant
of man. But, on occasions it lets
loose with a destructive force,
burning homes, businesses,
crops, natural resources; etc.
As fire is used to soften the
hardest of metals, so does God
work with hardened hearts to
bring love, joy, and peace to
the life of men. Paul writes (I
Corinthians 3:13, 15) The fire
shall try every man's works of
what sort it is . . . If any man's
works shall be burned, he shall
suffer loss: but he himself shall
be saved. John the Baptist de
clared that Jesus would baptize

WEEKLY NEWS REPORT
As I indicated in my last
Weekly News Report, I intend
ed to continue with my discus
sion this week of the provisions
of the Senate version of the new
farm legislation under study by
the House Agriculture Commit-

tee. However, in passing their
farm legislation June 8, the Sen
ate amended their bill to such
an extent that the whole com
plexion of this legislation has
been changed. The changes made
by the Senate are of such mag
nitude that they have caused
great alarm among members of
the agricultural community.
Those of us who are on the
House Agriculture Committee
have continued to meet in our
respective sub-committees in
order to save this legislation.

After extensive discussion and
research, we began to meet in
full committee Thursday with
the intention of writing up our
version of the new farm legisla
tion and with the hope of re
porting a bill to the Congress
which will meet with the ap
proval of the farmers and ranchers,
the Administration and the Con
gress.

As a member of both the Cot
ton and Livestock and Grains
Sub-committees, I would like to
point out the crucial recommen
dations these sub-committees
are bringing to the attention
of the full Agriculture Com
mittee. While these recommen
dations may be altered by the
Full Committee, they were
reached through many hours of
debate, study and consideration
of the interests of the farmer

and rancher.

COTTON
The "target price" for cotton
was set at 38 cents and the loan
at 90% of the 3-year world mar
ket average. The Secretary of
Agriculture would also be au
thorized to adjust the loan to re
flect the current world market
price.

The set-aside, research and
other basic provisions of the
ex'ting cotton programs are
continued and a new cotton boll
weevil eradication program is
provided.

The Sub-committee made no
change in the current \$55,000
payment limitation, but the Full
Committee has approved an am
endment to lower this to \$37,
500.

LIVESTOCK AND GRAINS:
The "target price" for wheat
was set at \$2.05 and for corn
at \$1.40 and grain sorghum at
\$2.37 cwt. Loans were raised to
\$1.49 per bushel for wheat, \$1.19
per bushel for corn and \$2.02
per cwt for grain sorghum.

Again the basic provisions of
the current set-aside program
are retained.

One key change for wheat is
the repeal of the wheat certi
ficate program and its replace
ment with direct government
payment on wheat.

As I write this we are in Full
Committee going over all the
provisions of the bill which in
clude not only an extension of
the basic farm programs, but
the Food Stamp Program, PL-
480, and many others as well.

Although our task is a difficult
one, I am hopeful that we will
be able to come up with a good
bill.

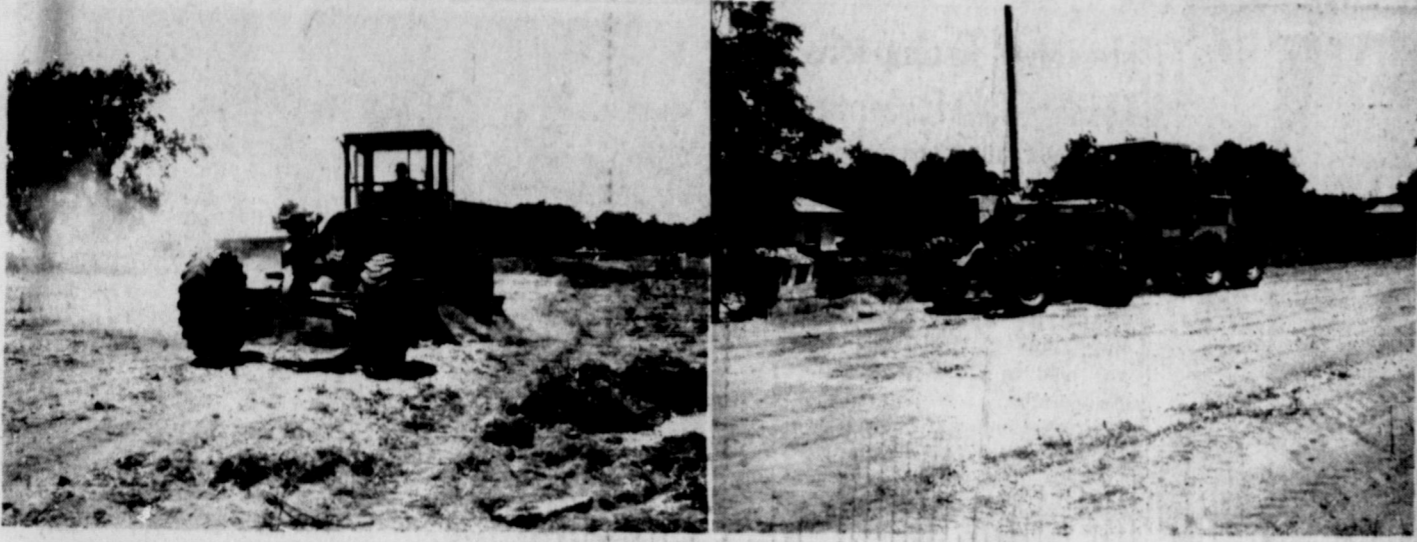

Deadline Nears For Highway Sign Permits

Owners of signs along Interstate and federal-aid primary highways face a June 30 deadline to apply for a permit and a license for them.

The Texas Highway Beautification Act, in effect since June of 1972, requires owners of signs which are within 660 feet of Interstate or federal-aid primary highways and are visible from main traffic lanes to file permit requests with the district offices of the Texas Highway Department. The permits cost \$5 each.

Before permits can be approved, sign owners must obtain a \$25 state license and post \$2,500 bond for each county in which they have a sign. Maximum bonds of \$10,000 are required of owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond applications can be obtained from Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department, P. O. Box 5075, Austin, 78763, or any Highway Department district office.

Since advertising the sale or lease of property upon which they are located or related solely to activities conducted on the property are exempted by the act along with underground utility markers, signs erected for official purposes by Federal, State and local governmental agencies and, in some cases, those posted by churches and nonprofit service organizations.

Although approximately 15,000 permits have been approved it is estimated that thousands of signs remain in violation of the act.

Social Security

Q—I've been receiving social security benefits for the past two years. I still don't know what the retirement test is. How do the recent changes affect me?

A—The retirement test means simply the amount of earnings a beneficiary can have and still be entitled to all of his benefits. In 1972 a beneficiary could earn as much as \$1680 and receive all of his social security benefits. If he earned more than \$1680, he lost some of his benefits depending on how much over the \$1680 he earned. Beginning with 1973, this earnings limitation was raised to \$2100. This means that you can work and earn \$2100 a year and still receive

all of your benefits for that year. Q—I've never been able to understand the retirement test. What is it all about?

A—Through 1972 the Social Security Law considered that a person was "retired" if he didn't have earnings from work of more than \$1680 per year. If the beneficiary earned over \$1680, social security concluded that he was only partially retired and he had to give up \$1 of his benefits for each \$2 he earned over the \$1680 and up to \$2880. If he earned over \$2880, then he had to give up \$1 in benefits for each \$1 he earned in excess of \$2880. Beginning with 1973, however, the earnings limitation has been raised to \$2100. If the beneficiary goes over this amount, he gives \$2 he earns. The one for one rule \$2 he earns. The one for one rule has been completely eliminated.

Q—I was divorced from my husband after having been married for over 20 years. He died last month and I will be 60 in three months. Can I be entitled to widow's benefits on his record?

A—Yes, providing you are not now married and providing he paid social security long enough to be fully insured.

Q—Do you have to pay social security taxes after you start receiving social security benefits?

A—Yes. If you continue to work in covered employment after becoming entitled to social security benefits, you must continue to pay social security tax on your earnings. There is no age limit and no exemption.

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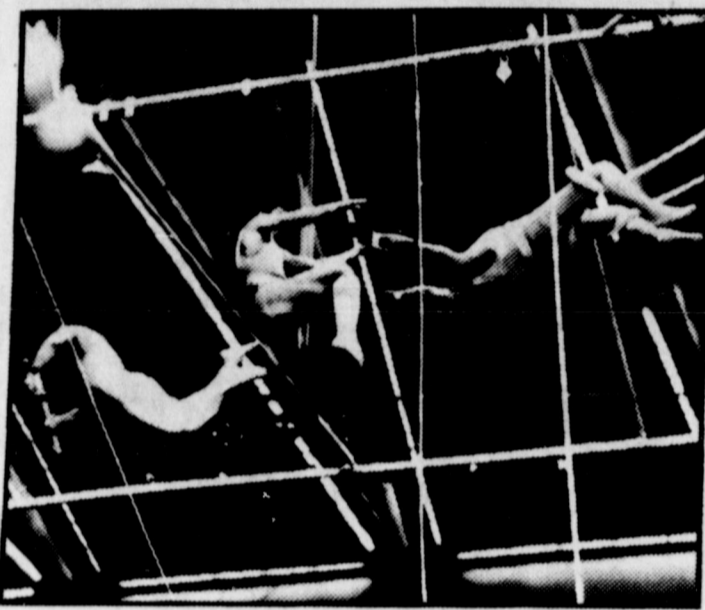

Record Northern Pike Landed

The fish was 37½ inches long and 17 inches in girth.

The previous northern pike record was a 13-pound fish caught from Greenbelt Lake in 1971.

Native to northern climes, pike have been imported to Texas to supplement local predator fish such as largemouth bass.

Anglers throughout the South and West where pike have been introduced have welcomed it for its sporting qualities.

Also, no species of fish has inspired more fables than the pike. The fish's malevolent eye and underslung jaw grimly taking a lure has caused many an angler of old to wax a little poetic about his catch.

Anglo-saxons compared it to the ancient weapon, the pike, hence the name esox lucius, the pitiless pike. Its baleful eye and tail-drooping posture caused anglers to identify it as Luce, the

Forage Collecting Machine To Be Shown At Halfway Friday

Increasing feed costs for livestock production and the fact that much material that could be used in feeding cattle is wasted by going through the combine should stimulate interest in a demonstration to be conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation on Friday, June 22. A forage collecting machine, a device which catches all grain and chaff which goes through the combine, will be running on wheat and triticale at 2:00 p.m., according to Dr. T. C. Longnecker, Director of the Research Foundation. This machine is towed directly behind the combine and is operated by an 18 hp gasoline

engine. When the trailer is full, it can be tripped automatically by the combine operator and leaves a uniform stack in the field.

"Observations in this area and reports from Iowa and South Dakota indicate that the potential value of the feed material of the forage going out the back of a combine may be worth as much as \$50.00 per acre as cattle feed," said Longnecker. This would apply to wheat, triticale, corn, soybeans and grain sorghum.

Everyone who is interested in seeing this machine in operation is invited to the research farm 14 miles west of Plainview at Halfway beginning at 2:00 p.m.
