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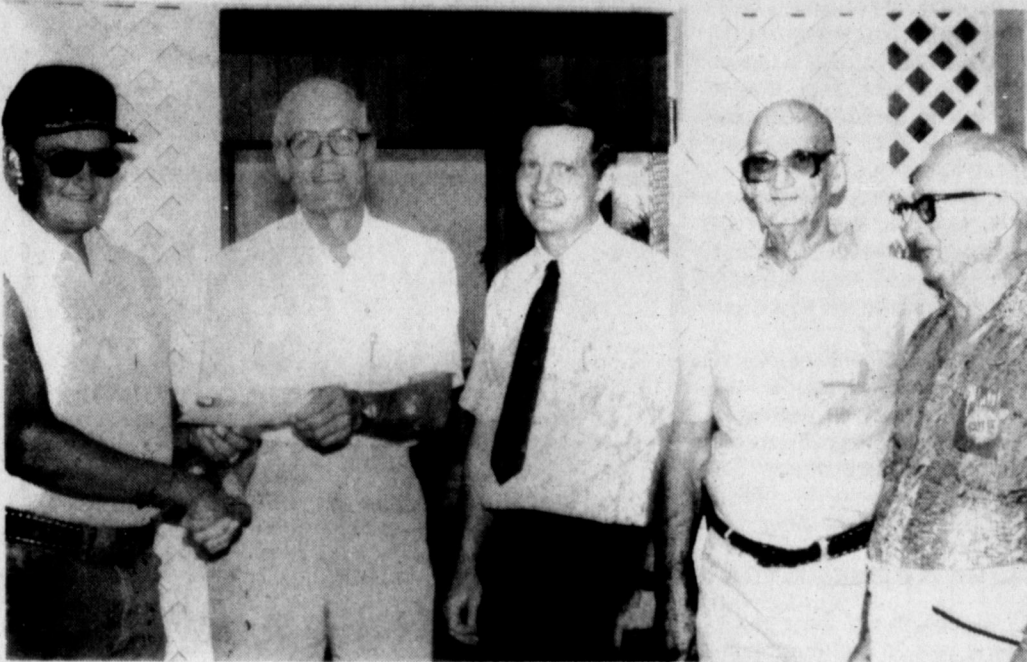

Turtle Race

Turtles, turtles, turtles, where are the turtles? If you want to see 3 or 4 hundred of them, come to Clarendon Saturday, July 7th. The street will be blocked off between Henson's, Stavenhagen Furniture, Bains Fountain and the College Automotive building and the turtles will be painted all colors with many designs. You will see three of the fastest turtles in the county taking off to win their owners a \$50 bond each.

If you are a little miss or master, age 0-4 have your daddy or mommy come by Henson's and register your turtle, no phone calls will be accepted. This will be the first race run. The second race will be owners from 5-8 years old and the third race will be 9-14.

If you already own a turtle, that's great. If not all you have to do is drive up and down the country roads and they will be racing to get out of your way. These turtles must be what we call terrapins, no water turtles will be accepted.

You must register your turtle at Henson's in person. No phone calls will be accepted. It does not cost anything to register.

Farm News

The final certification date for all spring seeded crops is Monday, July 16th. These include grain sorghum, corn, cotton, Acraeage Conservation Reserve, and any other crop you have not already certified. To avoid the rush and long lines, we encourage you to come in as early as possible. PLEASE MAKE SURE YOUR MEASUREMENTS ARE ACCURATE. Failure to comply within the 5 1/2 tolerance will result in loss of program benefits. Measurement service is available through the deadline of July 16th. You are encouraged to certify your acres even if you plan to bale, graze or plow due to disaster. In doing so you will protect your farm bases and farm history.

Proper maintenance of ACR is required. Failure to do so will result in a penalty. Wind and water erosion must be controlled. WEEDS MUST BE SPRAYED, PLOWED, OR SHREDDED. Periodic spot checks for proper maintenance will be made by both county and state personnel.

Producers participating in the 1984 Wheat Program are eligible to enter the loan with their new crop wheat. The loan rate for Donley County is \$3.29 per bushel. Producers that enter the loan must either provide for storage in advance for the 9 month loan period or the loan rate will be reduced to prov-

ide storage. Producers who do not have sufficient production under loan to satisfy their wheat PIK must harvest the 1984

crop for PIK. For those producers who must harvest for PIK, satisfying this must be done prior to selling the commodity.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is asking for public comments on programs listed above. The comments, which must be received no later than August 6, 1984, can be mailed to Analysis Division, Room 3741-S, ASCS-USDA, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013.

Oil and Gas Applications

Austin, Texas, June 14-- A total of 4,367 drilling applications were processed by the Railroad Commission in May, according to RRC Chairman Mack Wallace. In April, the Commission processed 3,735 applications, and 3,855 were handled in May 1983.

The May 1984 total included 3,355 applications for permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 102 applications to deepen existing holes, 315 applications to plugback existing holes, and 100 applications for service (non-producing) wells. Operators also filed 495 amended drilling applications.

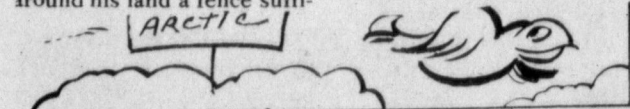
Applications for new oil and gas holes in May include 181 in the Panhandle.

any recourse? Am I liable even if I keep my fence in good repair?

A: In Texas, except in those counties and subdivisions that have adopted specific regulations, an owner of cattle that are not known to be vicious, mischievous, or diseased may allow them to roam at large, or occupy his unfenced land. Accordingly, it is the responsibility of a landowner who wishes to exclude another's cattle from his land to place around his land a fence suffi-


cient to exclude cattle or ordinary disposition. You should also be aware that generally, a landowner has no right to pen up, injure, or kill trespassing animals, although a person may, if he acts in a careful manner, drive off trespassing animals.

If you sue for damages, you will have to show that your neighbor was negligent and that your fence was sufficient to keep out cattle of ordinary disposition.

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

1985 USDA Wheat Program announced

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block today announced provisions of the 1985 wheat program, including a 20 percent acreage reduction and a 10 percent paid land diversion.

Signup for the program will be October 15 through March 1. The cash land diversion payment will be \$2.70 per bushel with 50 percent available at signup. The program also includes a \$3.30 per bushel national

average loan rate and a \$4.38 per bushel target price.

To be eligible for program benefits, producers must limit 1985 wheat acreage to no more than 70 percent of the farm's wheat base. They must also dedicate a certain amount of their eligible cropland to an acreage conservation reserve. The amount to be placed in this reserve must be equal to at least 28.57 percent of the farm's 1985 planted wheat acreage

plus 10 percent of the farm's wheat base.

Land designated for an acreage conservation reserve must have been devoted to a row crop or small grains in two of the last three years except for a summer fallow farm. The summer fallow rules will be the same as those in effect for the 1984 programs. Those rules provide that the acreage must have been devoted to row crops or small grains in one of the last two crop years.

The 1985 acreage base will be the average of the acreage planted and considered planted to wheat in 1983 and 1984.

Haying will not be permitted on acreage conservation reserve land. However, the acreage may be grazed except during the six principal growing months as designated by state ASCS officials. Block said he has also approved a standby measure authorizing, in the event of a natural disaster, implementation of emergency haying and grazing privileges. Approval of the emergency privileges would be made as needed on a county-by-county basis.

Offsetting and cross compliance will not apply to the 1985 wheat program. USDA intends to review

the size of the farmer-owned reserve before regular price support loans for the 1985 crop reach maturity. At that time it will be determined whether entry into the reserve will be permitted.

Program contracts signed by participants will be binding and will provide for liquidated damages for failure to comply with program requirements.

Deadly ticks found in Texas

Recent discovery of a foreign tick on a rhinoceros in South Texas which can transmit a fatal disease to

livestock points up the necessity for strengthening federal laws to protect this state's livestock industry, Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, said today.

About two months ago, five rhinoceros were im-

ported from South Africa. Two went to the La Coma Red Gate Ranch at Linn; three went to Waterfall Ranch at Glen Rose.

The Interior Department granted importation permits, and they may enter without any quarantine period.

One of the rhinoceros died recently. A private veterinarian in Brownsville was called to investigate. A tick known as Amblyomma hebraeum was found to have infested the rhinoceros. The ticks were first sent to the TAHC lab in Austin for identification, and that lab forwarded them to a U.S. Department of Agriculture lab in Ames, Ia.

USDA officials are now investigating the situation.

"The Texas Animal Health Commission is ready to assist USDA in any way it can in this matter," Dr. Holcombe said.

The tick transmits an acute disease called Heartwater. The disease is characterized by nervous symptoms and high mortality. It affects cattle, sheep, goats, and antelope.

New Social Security procedure

The Amarillo Social Security Office is implementing a new appointment procedure to improve service to the public beginning July 2, 1984.

Before this change, visitors to the office were served on a first-come, first-served basis.

Anyone needing information from the office should call first. "Most Social Security, Supplemental Security Income and Medicare business can be completed by" said Louis B. Prohs, Dist. Manager.

"If an interview is necessary, an appointment can be scheduled," he added.

This procedure should be particularly helpful where documents are necessary to complete a transaction.

"The caller can be advised what documents to have available for the interview and have an opportunity to obtain them if necessary," Prohs said. The end result is faster service.

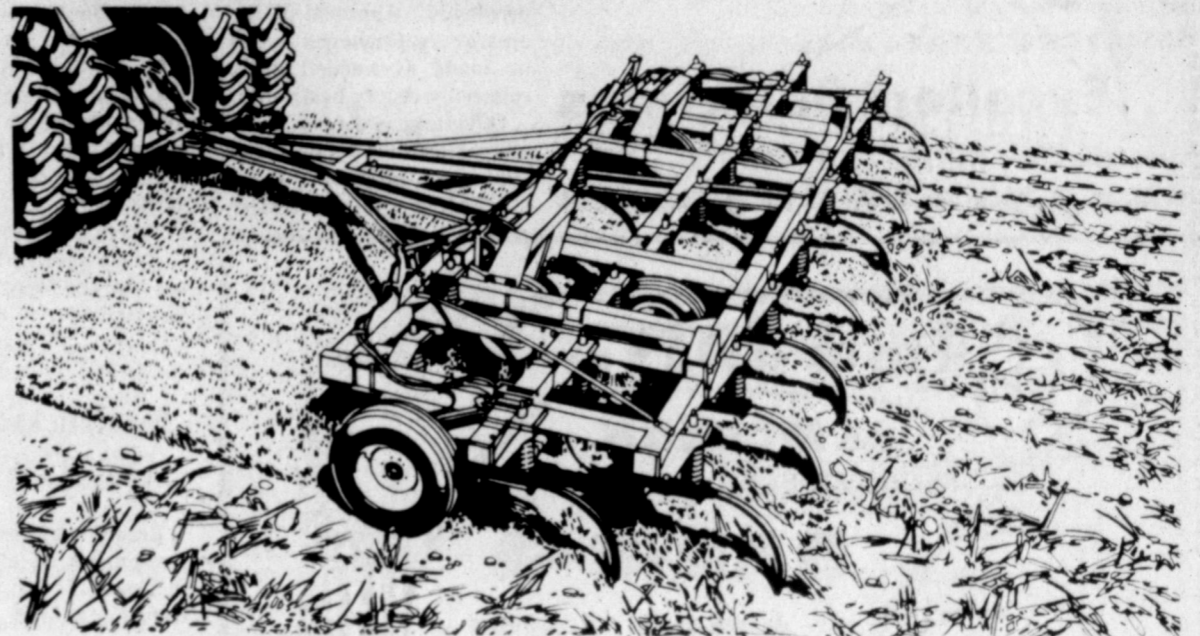

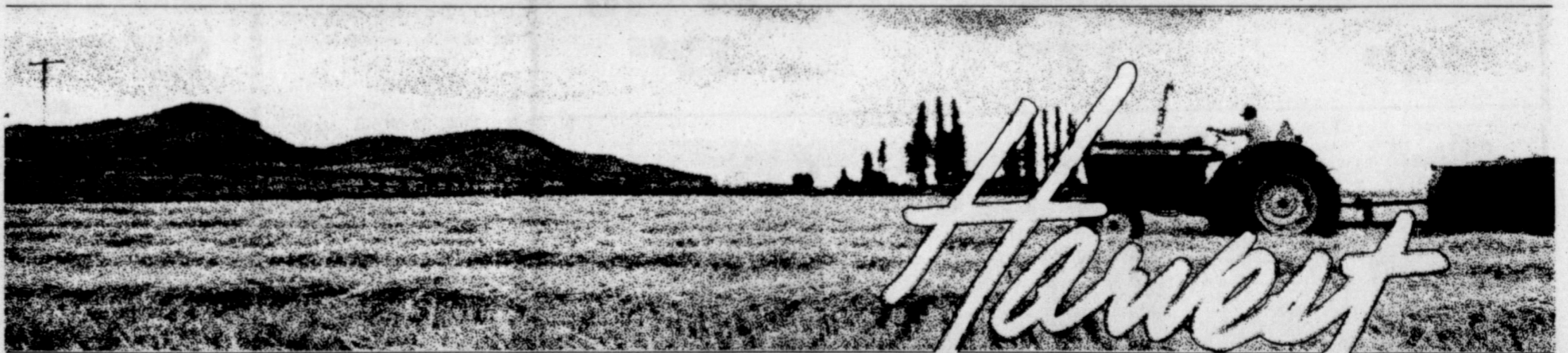

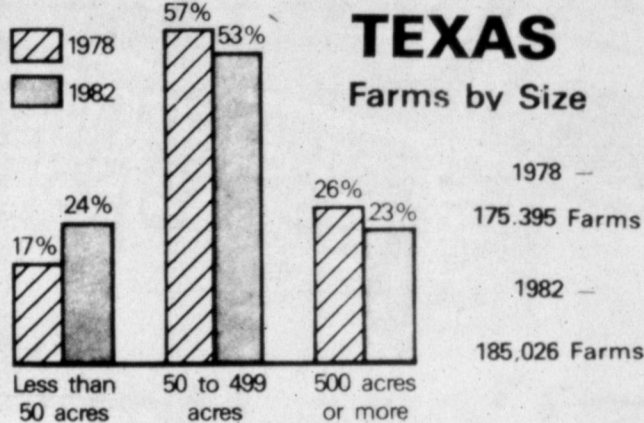
Berry Summerour, Dalhart, the field day's master of ceremonies and president of the TJHA, placed second in the achievement competition.

Most of the cases of skin cancer might have been avoided simply by putting on a hat or shirt or both. Prolonged over-exposure to the sun should be avoided, and even "sun-worshippers" should use common sense. Skin cancer is almost 100% curable when diagnosed early and treated promptly.

A good rule to follow is: Have a look-see by your doctor of any sore, blister, pimple or newly developed blemish in the skin does not show signs of healing within two weeks. Don't stop with the skin. Any sore of the lip, tongue or anywhere in the oral cavity should be watched. These symptoms usually do not mean cancer, but only a physician can determine definitely whether cancer is there or not.

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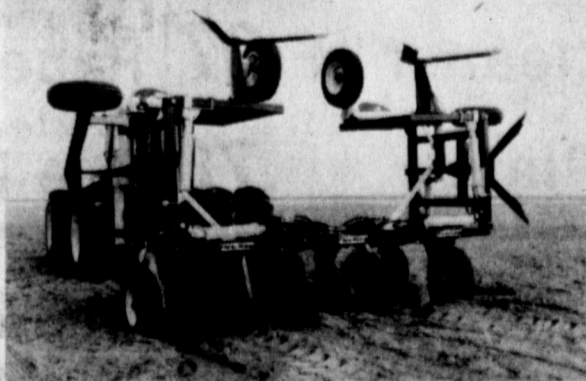
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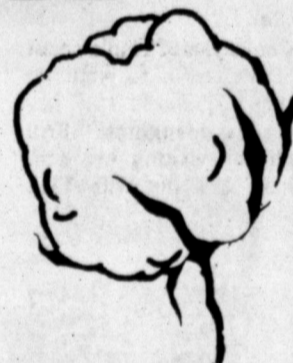

How to kill waterweeds

Waterweeds, (moss), use up pond fertility, interfere with fishing, do not provide food for sport fish (bass), and may give the fish an unpleasant flavor. As weeds die and decompose, they create a low-oxygen condition in the water which may cause a fish die-off.

The most effective and least expensive ways to control most waterweeds are having deep edges and highly fertile water.

You can kill submersed weeds by applying fertilizer on the weed beds in winter. Begin fertilizing in December. This method takes 4 to 5 months but is the safest and least expensive way to kill weeds. Use an 8-8-2 or

similar fertilizer. Broadcast the fertilizer from a boat over the weed beds, applying about 200 pounds per surface acre. Repeat every 2 weeks until there is a heavy growth of single-filament algae.

The totally shaded weeds die in early summer. The whole mass floats to the top, remains a few days, then sinks to the bottom and quickly decomposes.

Winter fertilization is not successful if a large amount of water flows through the pond. In summer, don't fertilize if your pond has growing beds of submersed waterweeds. The weeds use the fertilizer and no microscopic plants can grow.

You and the Law

Q: What constitutes a lottery and is there a law that prohibits a lottery in Texas?

A: A lottery is defined under Texas law as any scheme in which prizes are distributed by chance among persons who have paid or promised something for a chance to win anything of value, whether the scheme is called a pool, a lottery, a raffle, or some other name. Lotteries are illegal under Section 47.03 of the Texas

Penal Code which makes it a third degree felony to promote a lottery or raffle, or even sell or possess a lottery ticket if anyone or any organization stands to gain from the event. "Gambling promotion" carried a possible prison term up to 10 years. Therefore, it is illegal to participate in lotteries or raffles, even those conducted by a church or charity group to raise funds.

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NICOTINE ON PRESCRIPTION
A nicotine-containing chewing gum has been available in Canada, England, and some European countries. The gum has now been approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for distribution on prescription in the United States.

Nicotine absorbed into the bloodstream from the gum may help satisfy the "craving" for nicotine that would otherwise be obtained from tobacco products. According to the FDA, the individuals who are most likely to benefit from the stop-smoking aid are those who have a high physical dependence on nicotine (those who smoke more than 15 cigarettes daily, prefer brands having greater than 0.9 milligrams nicotine, and find that the first morning cigarette is hardest to give up).

A cure-all for smokers: Probably not. There have been many products available as aids to stop smoking. Most are available without a prescription. Occasionally a study is reported in which some individuals using such products - including the nicotine gum - do stop smoking. Sometimes they do not. Many experts believe that smoking deterrents are effective when used by persons who really want to stop.
