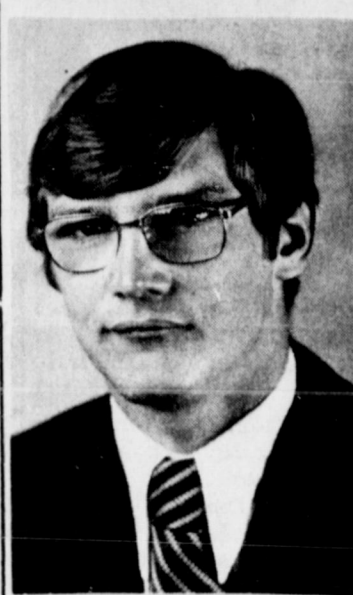
## MR. & MRS. STARK TOUR THE ORIENT

Well, graduation is getting closer and closer. The Seniors were busy Tuesday and Wednesday picking up their caps and gowns.

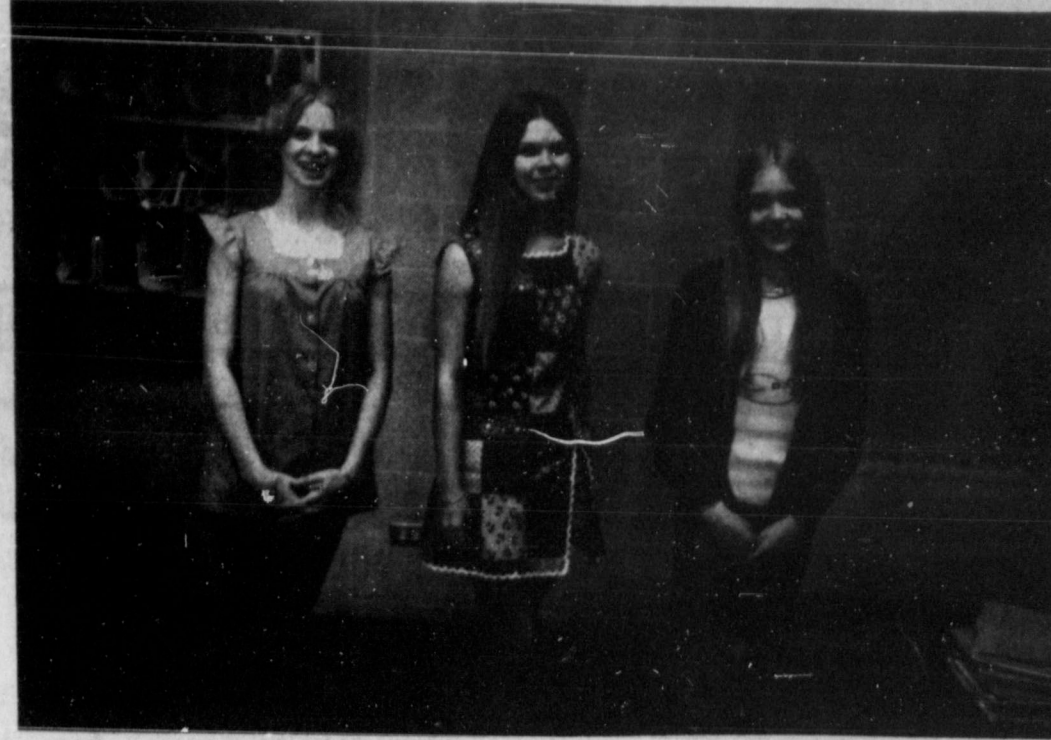
The Annual Staff sponsored the Salad Supper Saturday night. It was held in the High School Cafeteria. Everyone enjoyed all the different salads.

**Your Church Is Too Small**

By Rev. Weldon Rives

Luke 12:32— . . . Fear not, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom.

I read the other day about the church believed to be the smallest church in the world. It is situated in a little village in North Yorkshire, England. It has a tiny tower and will seat only about fifteen people and it dates back to about A.D. 840. As I thought about this small church I realized that, while the building of any church may be too small, its greatness is best measured by its spiritual outreach, and in this area there are some small churches that are big and a goodly number of big churches which are small. The question arose; what makes a church too small? Well, here

are a few possibilities from among many. A church is too small when it has lost its vital sense of the presence of God. There are many churches which are highly active with a seven-day-a-week, non-stop string of activities, but they are falling at the point of making people aware of the presence of God. This was apparently the case when Jesus cleaned the temple (Matthew 21:12-13) proclaiming it a house of prayer; but (man had) made it a den of thieves. The church of God must be a ministering church seeking to save those who are lost and nurture those upon the path of eternal life.

If Jesus' vision of the welfare of the people finds no place in the concerns of the church, then it is too small. I think this judgment upon the church is best seen in the story of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37). The priest and the Levite who passed by and the Samaritan who stopped to help the man who had been robbed and beaten, the church which is far too much concerned with its own little life to be troubled, polluted, or detained by the suffering of persons about it. Therefore it gives evidence of its smallness and needs to hear the words of Jesus (Matthew 10:39): He that findeth his life shall lose it; and he that loseth his life for my sake shall find it.

How often do we see the smallness of a church by its rejection of some of God's children. Sometimes this is due to race, color, creed or theological disagreement. We fall to hear Jesus say to us (John 10:16): Other sheep I have, which are not of this fold; them also I must bring, and they shall hear my voice; and these shall be one fold, and one shepherd. And he gave evidence of this on many occasions when he went to those other than the house of Israel because Israel would not accept him! The church in which all the brothers of Christ are not welcomed is too small for Christ himself.

How big is your church? Let us work and pray that all churches are big enough for Christ who is the corner stone. Peace and peace in Christ Jesus.



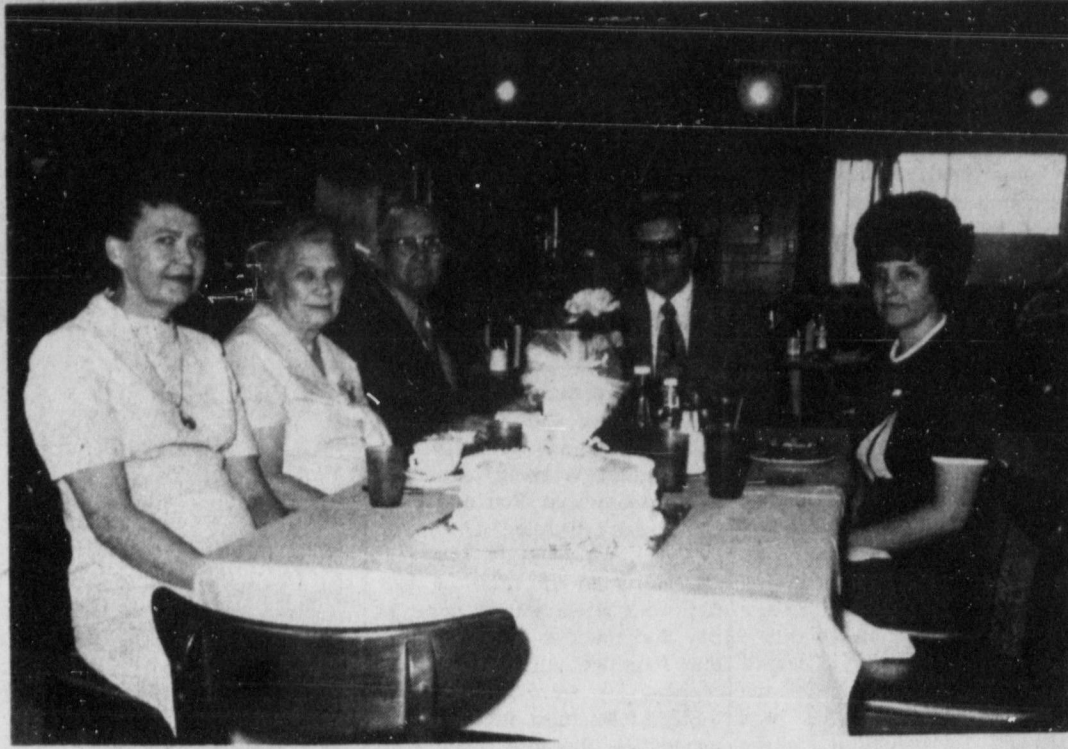

Lone Star Gas Files For Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas Company today announced that it will file an application with the Texas Railroad Commission Friday (May 11) for an increase in the city gate rate for gas delivered to each town served by the company in Texas.

as to the Dallas - Fort Worth area; (2) the right to recover costs and return of \$0.8 million on approximately \$9.6 million in advance payments and prepayments the company thus far has made to producers as a part of new gas purchase agreements; (3) to bring the company's weighted average cost of gas used in the Commission's calculation of Lone Star's base city gate rate up from the 16.29 cents per thousand cubic feet to the present level of 20.53-cents per thousand; (4) to allow Lone Star to "pass on" 100% of its increased cost of purchased gas on a monthly basis, rather than the presently allowed 65% every six months.

The cost adjustments would mean an 8.1-cent per thousand cubic feet increase in the city gate rate, and an increase of \$10.5 million in Lone Star's annual revenues when costs are flowed through to customers, based on a 1972 volume of approximately 130 billion cubic feet.

The company further noted that all proposed rate increases are cost justified and within nationally established price control guidelines for utilities established last year.

Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State Capitol

Daring more federal court challenges, the House Reapportionment Committee has advanced a "redistricting" bill that makes virtually no changes in present representative districts.

The committee bill, approved 12-8, would retain multi-member House districts in all but the three metropolitan counties of Bexar, Dallas and Harris.

Rep. Joe Wyatt of Bloomington, the sponsor, said he would accept an amendment on the House floor to give Tarrant County single-member districts like those in the three larger counties.

Chairman Rep. Fred Head of Troop favored dividing all urban counties, which now have two or more representatives, into single-member districts. Committee action, in effect, took control of the bill from Head on the floor.

A three-judge federal court in January (1972), ordered single-member House districts for Bexar and Dallas counties and gave the legislature until July 1 to rewrite a 1971 reapportionment scheme.

Representatives were warned before the vote that if the U. S. Supreme Court upholds the 1972 ruling, it is likely to order single member, individual House districts in all urban counties.

The bill as advanced further did not meet federal court disapproval of a 9.9 per cent population spread between smallest and most - populous Texas House districts.

However, Wyatt contended the Supreme Court in a Virginia case later upheld a 16.4 per cent deviation.

UNNECESSARY "ENERGY" AIDS - The House Natural Resources Committee held a hearing on HSR 131 last week - a measure that requests advertisers to "not use advertisements to urge the public to use more power or energy than is reasonably necessary."

House authors are Representatives Ben Grant, Marshall, and Woody Denson, Houston.

Grant testified before the Com-

mittee that his bill was not intended to regulate advertising of energy companies in Texas - but to urge advertisers to "teach or persuade the public to conserve or decrease the use of energy and to avoid all wasteful uses of power."

He cited some of the copy used by Conn Edison - a major utility in the East.

A spokesman for the Southwest Electric Power Company told the Committee that his company was against the bill because they did not feel the state should "get into the business of curtailing advertising."

"We have a surplus of power," he said. "Conn Edison has a shortage. We need to urge our consumers to use more electricity in the winter for heating purposes. We have the power available, and we need to sell it in order to pay for our bonds."

"Our consumers use our power supply in the summer when air conditioning is needed," he continued. "But we need to 'sell' them on winter-time power consumption through our advertising programs. We don't think the state legislature should get into advertising controls in Texas."

Grant said he was merely trying to encourage advertising to avoid waste of energy, and that he would oppose "mandatory" regulations also.

The bill was sent to the Oil and Gas subcommittee of the Natural Resources Committee. VENDING MACHINE FIRMS EYED - The attorney general's office and 14 other government agencies are investigating operations of 11 vending machine corporations in five cities.

Visitorial letters were served on the firms requesting that books and records be made available for inspection.

The Department of Public Safety, State Comptroller, State Securities Board, Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission and law enforcement agencies in the cities are cooperating in the probe, coordinated by the Attorney General's Organized Crime Strike Force.

Firms are located in Dallas, Houston, Fort Worth, Grand Prairie and San Antonio.

Details of the investigation were not disclosed. Refusal of a Grand Prairie concern to allow inspection of records resulted in filing a misdemeanor complaint in Dallas County Criminal Court No. 2.

DISASTER AID AVAILABLE, LIMITED - The federal Small Business Administration will make disaster loans in Hale, Navarro and Frio Counties as a result of April 15 tornadoes.

Sen. John Tower announced the aid, but Governor Briscoe said the Office of Emergency Preparedness rejected his request to declare Hale and Navarro Counties major disaster areas.

Tower said 15 other counties have been declared eligible for emergency loans from Farmers Home Administration due to weather damage including excessive rainfall. The counties are Concho, Crosby, El Paso, Franklin, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Hudspeth, Montgomery, Lamb, Lynn, Lubbock, Reeves, Wharton and Wood.

RECORD WHEAT HARVEST REPORTED - Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reported the first wheat harvest of

1973 in Frio County averaged 26 bushels an acre, a record high.

The Texas wheat harvest is expected to reach 83,200,000 bushels this year, double the 1972 yield, from 3,200,000 acres, White estimated. Major harvest in North Texas won't start until late May, and won't reach a peak until June.

APPOINTMENTS - Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby was designated by Briscoe as chairman of a new state energy advisory council charged with recommending a coordinated state policy on energy.

Briscoe's executive assistant, Charles Purnell of Dallas, was named vice-chairman. Heads of 11 state agencies and representatives of 13 industries, sciences and professions will be permanent council members.

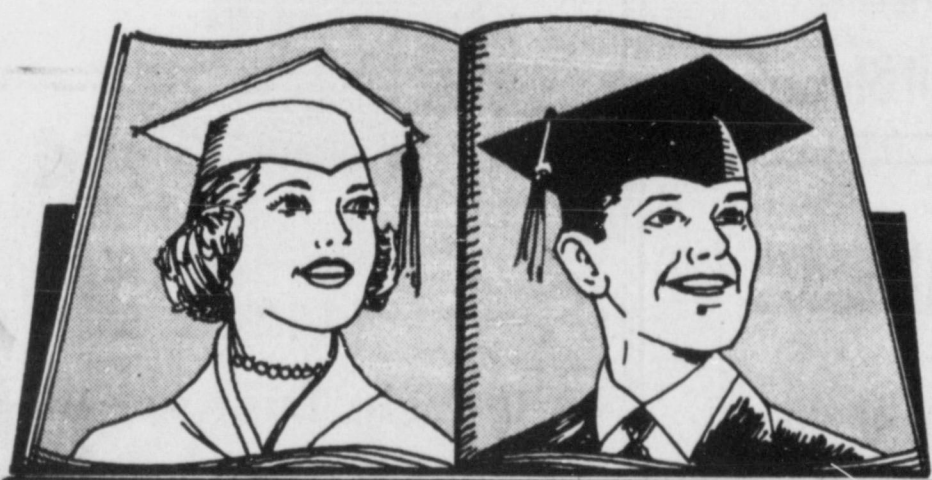

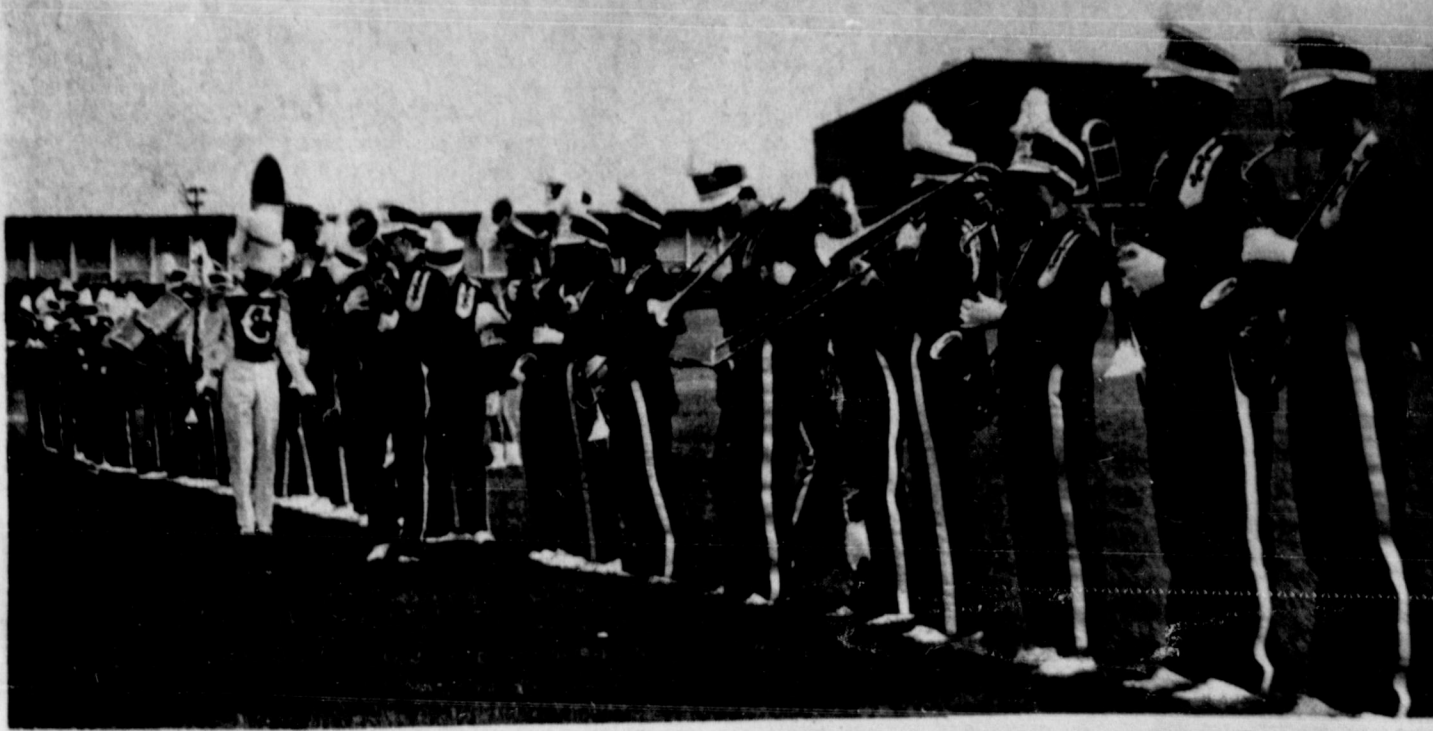

Everyone reported an enjoyable time.

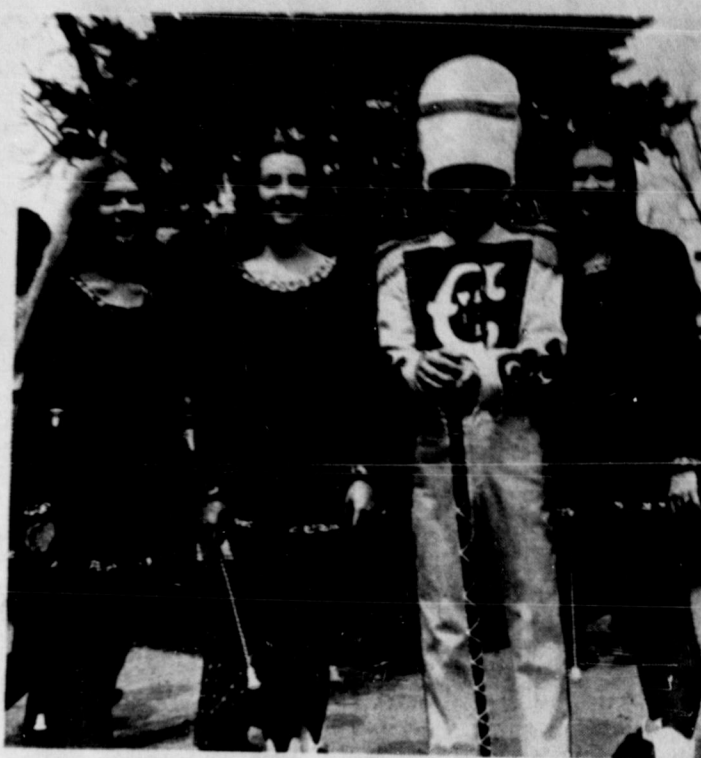

**School Teachers And Social Security Pay**

School teachers who get social security monthly benefits on their own work record, as a widow, or as a wife, may be eligible to get social security benefits during the summer months. Travis C. Briggs, District Manager in Amarillo, said today.

Although a teacher's contract is an annual salary, paid in twelve monthly installments if the teacher so requests, there can be one, two or three months during the summer when no work is done.

Teachers, the same as any other social security beneficiary can get their social security check when they do not work and earn more than \$175 a month.

There's an easy way for teachers to determine if they are qualified for their monthly social security check. Divide your yearly contract salary by the number of work days set by your state. This will give you the daily rate of pay.

For example: If you have an annual salary as a teacher of \$9500 and your state requires 190 work days, you divide the \$9500 by 190 and you then have a daily rate of pay of \$50. If you work only three, or any part

of three days during a month, then you would have earnings of less than \$175 a month. If you work on four or more days during a summer month, then you would be over the \$175 a month and would not be entitled to get your social security check for that month; Briggs added.

Since these events normally occur during the summer months, generally in June or August, you would need to look carefully at your earnings to determine if you would be eligible for your monthly social security check.

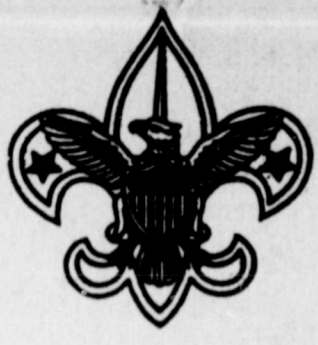
