I have never been able to accept the saying that "It does not matter what you believe so long as you believe something." While veterans with nonservice connected disabilities are eligible for Veterans Administration hospital treatment on a bed available basis, beds are always available to veterans with service connected disabilities.

Veteran News

Q-I would like to know who my husband has designated beneficiary of his government life insurance. Where may I obtain this information?

A-This information can not be disclosed to anyone other than the insured or his duly appointed fiduciary during the insured's lifetime, unless authorized by the insured or his fiduciary.

Q-Is there a limit on the amount of G. I. loan a veteran can get?

A-The amount of the home loan is a matter between the veteran and the lending institution. However, there is a maximum on the portion of the loan that the Veterans Administration can guarantee - 60 percent of the loan, not to exceed \$12,500.00. Q-I am insured under a "V"prefixed National Service Life Insurance policy. Can I take out more insurance?

A-Yes. A recent law (92-188) allows veterans with that type of coverage to buy up additional life insurance with their annual insurance dividends. Write the insurance center where you pay your premiums (St. Paul or Philadelphia), if you have not received an application form. Q-Can a service-disabled veteran who received a VA automobile allowance be reimbursed for the special adaptive equipment more than once? A-Yes. Payment may be made to the seller of the equipment or reimbursement to the veteran, under certain conditions, when the equipment requires repair or replacement.
