

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



Social Security benefits were being paid to 983 residents of Donley county at a rate of \$115,-000 a month at the close of 1972, Travis C. Briggs, Social Security District Manager in Amarillo, said today.

Of the social security beneficiaries living in Donley county, 706 are retired workers and their dependents, 199 are receiving benefits as the survivors are getting benefits as disabled workers or their dependents.

Although most social security beneficiaries are older people, about one of every four is under age 60. In Texas, 375,417 people under age 60 are collecting social security payments each month. Nearly 210,000 are under age 18, receiving payments because a working father or mother has died or is getting social security disability or retirement benefits. Most of the 38,072 beneficiaries in Texas between 18 and 22 years of age, are getting student's benefits under a provision in the social security law permitting the continuation of a child's benefits beyond his 18th birthday, and up to age 22, if the child is attending school full time. Also in the 18-22 age group

are some other types of beneficiaries illustrating the broad family protection that the social security program provides workers of all ages. Some are children of retired, disabled, or deceased workers who became disabled before reaching 22 and who will probably never be able to work and become self-supporting. Wildlife Diseases Dangerous To Man

Of all the diseases which may be transmitted from wild animals to man, rabies is the most

Texas State Department of Health Laboratories report that during the first four months of 1973 there have been 85 confirmed cases of animal rabies. Of that number, 61 involved wildlife - 45 skunks, 11 foxes, one coyote, two raccons and two Texas had 343 cases of ra-

bies last year — 281 in wildlife. The state led the nation in 1971 with 323 rabies incidents, which was a far cry from the 658 cases reported in 1961.

The disease begins with a depression of the spirits and swelling of the lymphatics in the region of the wound. Choking and spasmodic breathing follows with increasing spasms of the respi-

Fever, mental derangement vomiting and secretion of saliva often accompany the disease. Death usually occurs within two to five days after the appearance of the first symptoms.

Positive diagnosis of rabies involves killing the suspected host to examine brain tissues. Fortunately, however, man seems to be highly resistant to rables and only 20 percent of those bitten by a known rabid animal will contract the disease. Treatment for rabies in man

fatty deposits of the stomach. Why bother with such painful treatment if man has only one chance in five of contracting the

disease? Once the first symptoms appear the only treatment for the disease is making the individual as confortable as possible because death is almost inavitable once the disease reaches such

an advanced stage. The rabies cycle begins in Texas each spring when migrating bats return from Mexico to their homes. It has been estimated that five percent of all bats returning to Texas are infected with rabies.

Bats react slowly to the disease: therefore, the virus incubates longer and affects more bats within the same cave.

The disease begins to spread when infected bats fall to the floor of the cave and small mammals such as foxes and skunks enter the caves to feed on crippled adults and helpless young bats.

Get the best price possible by comparison pricing in your newspaper advertisements; then decide what you can spend for luxury

> 3. Use the cost per serving comparison rather than the cost per pounl. Determine which is the best buy. Boneless meat which is all edible is certainly a better buy if prices per serving are

4. Get a copy of the Texas Department of Agriculture's bulletin, "Save on Your Beef Dollars." Information in the bulletin will explain to you what "grade" means, what "yield" means, and how to choose bargain beef. Write to John C. White, Commissioer, Texas Department of Agriculture, P. O. Box f2874, Austin, Texas 78771. 5. Do not "buy up" commodities that cannot be kept indefinitely. Bacon, for example, can

be kept only about a week. 6. If you live in a rural area, check with some of the vegetable farmers about buying directly from him. Freezing fresh produce is not difficult if you follow directions. Write for the booklet, 'Freezing and Canning Texas Agricultural Products," from the Texas Department of Agricul-
