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

Legislators have a lot more eft to do than they have done so far in almost four months.

Of the nearly 1,700 House bills and almost 1,000 Senate bills introduced, fewer than 100 actually have reached the Governor's

If the 63rd Legislature ac complishes as much as the 62nd did numerically (more than 1,000 oills passed), about 99 per cent of the floor action must be capsuled in the brief period before the May 28 adjourament dead-

Slow-moving debate in the House - where more than 200 amendments were offered - on the \$9.7 billion appropriation bill fanned some speculation that a special session may be necessary to complete mandatory

Gov. Dolph Briscoe, who holds the key to calling such a session, has made clear he doesn't want one.

CONSTITUTIONAL HEARINGS BEGIN - The Constitutional Revision Commission began the first of its three-month's series of hearings in the Panhandle and Far West Texas.

Initial hearings were held in Amarillo, Lubbock, El Paso, Midland-Odessa and San Angelo before moving South to San Antonio. A total of 18 hearings will hear citizens' views on how the constitution should be revised.

Witnesses offered suggestions on everything from dipping cattle in cold weather to legislative pay and the rights of individual citizens. Some told the Commission it should move cautiously in changing the constitution.

Further hearings are slated at Arlington, Texarkana, Tyler, Lufkin-Nacogdoches, Houston,, Laredo, Corpus Christi, McAllen, Beaumont-Port Arthur - Orange. Abilene, Wichita Falls, Waco and Austin between now and the end of June.

by Travis C. Briggs Retirement is a most delightful time for many people. It is and freedom from day to day responsibilities of a job. Unfortunately, it is still necessary to comply with other responsibilities connected with retirement, according to Travis C. Briggs social security manager. For example, the social security office should be notified promptly if any change occurs which may affect monthly payments—such as change in mailing address or going to work for more than \$2100 a year. Reporting is necessary when beneficiaries become unable to manage their own

funds or die. Dependents and survivors receiving benefits under social security should also report marriage, divorce, adoption, change in school attendance, etc. Reports may be made by mail, in person, or by telephone. A "Reporting Card" may be obtained from any social security of-

"Failure to make these reports timely could result in overpayments which would have to be paid back to social security", Briggs concluded.

### Social Security And U. S. Servicemen

Starting in January, people who were on active duty with the curity credit, according to Travis C. Briggs, social security district manager in Amarillo.

As a result of a change in the social security law, Briggs said, wage credits of \$100 are granted for each month of active military service performed in this 11year period. "Similar social security cre-

dit is already provided for mili-Social security contributions on basic military pay are deducted from paychecks. There's no paycheck deduction for these additional military wage credits.

Monthly social security paynents to retired and disabled workers and their families - and to the families of deceased workers - are based on average earnings over a period of years.

Social security benefits paid to some people have been low because they were partly based on low military earnings in the 1967-68 period for which additional military wage credits were not previously provided.

About 130,000 social security beneficiaries will be entitled to higher social security payments under the new law, according to Briggs.

# Veteran News

Q-If I purchase a mobile home with a VA guaranteed loan, just what does this guarantee?

A-VA guarantees up to 30 percent of loans - up to a maximum of \$10,000 for mobile homes and up to \$17,500 if the loan covers a lot as well as the mobile home. The guarantee usually permits eligible veterans and widows to arrange "no down payment" loans with private lending institutions.

Q-To settle a disagreement in my family, can you tell me if many veterans participate in job and farm training programs under the G. I. Bill?

A-In Fiscal Year 1972 (ending June 30) there were nearly 170,-000 veterans in on-job training programs, which is 20,000 more than in FY 1971 and nine times the total in FY 1968.

Q-What is the income limit governing entitlement to nonser vice-connected disability and

death pensions for veterans? A-The income limit to such pensions for a veteran or widow with no dependents is \$2,600, and \$3,800 for a veteran or widow with dependents.



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

where their money is. The opportunity will come when Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials hold public hearings in counties across the state concerning changes in laws affecting fish, game animals and fur bearing animals.

Clayton Garrison, executive director for the department, said the hearings are the first step toward setting the coming hunting and fishing regulations. The proposals will be set forth at the hearings, and citizen comments will be invited.

Detailed reports of the hearings will be submitted to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, The reports will be used by the commissioners when they are considering changes in game and

fish regulations. Garrison said department officials are hoping for a good turnout at the public hearings. "Citizen participation at these hearings is absolutely essential if we are to get a full picture of many variables affecting fish and wildlife programs," he said. "We sincerely urge anyone interested in our fish and wildlife resources

to attend these local hearings." The hearing in Donley County will be held at the Courthouse in Clarendon, Wednesday, March 28, at 8 p.m.

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
