Mandatory usage of child safety seats effective October 31

The Texas Coalition for Child Passenger Safety will join other groups in providing information and education to the public during Texas Child Safety Seat Education Week August 27-September 1, according to Dr. Ben H. White, outgoing chairman of the statewide

The special observance was declared as a result of a House Concurrent Resolution passed in June by the Legislature and signed by Governor Mark White. The resolution was introduced by Representative Chip Staniswalis of Amarillo.

In the same Legislative session mandatory usage of child safety seats was enacted and will become effective October 31, 1984.

"This special observance week is an excellent opportunity for citizens to become familiar with the new law and to find out about statewide and local efforts to help citizens comply," said Dr. White.

The new law will require residents of Texas to transport children up to two years old in federally approved child safety seats and children from two up to four years old in the child safety seats or safety

An offense is punishable by a fine of \$25 to \$50, and the Court shall dismiss the charge if the person shows proof of acquisition by purchase, loan, or rental within 10 days after the offense.

The law exempts violations involving a person operating a vehicle for hire and a person transporting a child in a vehicle in which all seating positions equipped with the child passenger safety seat systems or safety belts are occupied.

Although the new law becomes effective October 31, 1984, fines will not be assessed until January 1,

A key effort underway since March is the SAFE RIDERS program being carried out by the Texas Department of Health in cooperation with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. It is a statewide public awareness campaign on the benefits of using child safety seats

correctly and consistently. In addition the program includes a more intensive demonstration project on public awareness and services in the Dallas-Fort Worth

Information and literature about child safety seat usage can be obtained through the program's Spanish and English information line 1-800-252-8255, which operates from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

A statewide Child Passenger Conference will be held September 13-14 in Austin under the sponsorship of the SAFE RIDERS program, the Texas Coalition for Child Passenger Safety, Texas Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics, Center for Health Promotion Research and Development-UT Health Science Center at Houston, Texas Medical Association, Texas Medical Association Auxiliary, Texas Pediatric Society, and Texas Safety Association.

The conference will include workshops on operating loaner programs, obtaining funds and resources for child passenger programs, organizing a community discount sale, and facts about the new law. More information on the conference topics and registration can be obtained through the SAFE RIDERS information line 1-800-252-

Resources materials on correct safety seat usage, starting loaner programs, holding low-cost seat sales, and other community activities will be available to the public through the SAFE RIDERS program.

Many private and public sector organizations have been active in educating parents on the proper use of child safety seats and helping them obtain the devices, according to Dr. White.

City sale tax payment down

for June

State Comptroller Bob Bullock today sent checks totaling \$98.3 million in local sales tax payments to 988 cities that levy the one percent sales tax.

Although bookkeeping changes that were part of last year's tax deadline speedups made the August 1984 payment smaller than the previous August payment, Bullock said year-to-date comparisons can be made accurately.

"This 12 and a half percent increase is honest growth over last year because both this August payment and last August's are based on all sales reported during the first half of both years," Bullock

The August checks were for taxes collected on sales made in June and the second quarter and reported to the Comptroller by July 20.

Clarendon's net payment this period is \$10,702.62, down from \$13,958.86 for the same period in 1983. Total payment to date is \$56,916.00 which is down from \$59,346.45 for the 1983 payment period. This is a 4.10 percent

Hedley received \$1,027.28 which is down from \$1,513.58 from the same period last year.

Howardwick received \$220.11 this pay period which \$386.66 for the same period in 1983.

7 inches of rain falls in parts of county

A large portion of Donley County received moisture starting Wednesday afternoon and continued through Sunday night. As much as seven inches have been reported in some parts of the county.

The cotton crop was looking good but this rain was beneficial to it. It probably made the difference between a good cotton crop and a poor one. The cotton had not suffered from the lack of moisture as much as the grain crop and the pastureland.

Some ranchers reportedly had been selling off their herds because of the lack of grass. This was the first general rain the county had received all year.

The rain was the heaviest between Hedley and Memphis. The rain fell so hard Wednesday afternoon, cars were pulling off Highway 287 because they could not see to drive.

Did you know?

Our present highway system is one of the finest in the nation. It is a valuable asset to our state and to each of us as Texans. To extend the useful life of our road system, and to protect the \$60 billion investment which it represents, we must remain committed to the task of maintaining it in good condition.

In today's dollars, that \$60 billion translates to over \$100 billion invested in our highway system. To protect that investment, the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is shifting its focus from construction to maintenance and preservation. Only about 9% of the State budget is designed for highways - and although legislation has provided for general fund transfers that will assure a highway work program equal to \$750,000,000 in 1979 dollars, this amount is insufficient even to maintain our highway system in its present condition. The life expectancy of a highway is roughly twenty years; much of Texas' highway network is now well over 25 years old. Repairs are essential if these older highways are to remain useful - but the present funding level makes no provision for these repairs. Moreover, it does not provide for the new highway construction that becomes more and more necessary as our population grows.

The rapid growth of cities in Texas has increased the urgency of a long-standing problem: urban mobility. Many Texas cities are finding their downtown business areas so clogged with traffic as to seriously curtain accessibility. Solving these traffic problems must become a priority in highway project funding.

Mr. Moore died at 10:50 a.m. on Monday, August 6, 1984 in High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo following a lengthy illness. He was born January 29, 1921 in Clay County, Texas and was married to Willie Abston Blevins on October 1, 1977 in Clarendon. He had been a resident of Donley County since 1965 coming here from Abilene. He had worked for 14 years for Howardwick Lions Club where he had served as Past President, Past Secretary, Zone Chairman, and had served the past 2 years as Deputy District Governor. He was a member of the Howardwick Volunteer Fire Department, a veteran of World War II, and a member of the Clarendon Church of Christ.

Recall for the Governor

Losing freedoms in a Constitutional democracy such as ours is a matter of chipping away at bits and pieces...a sort of war of attrition waged by the political leaders of the moment against the legal restraints that limit their powers to reform the system.

It is sometimes necessary, in the interest of progress, or for the preservation of order in emergencies, or in recognition of changing times, to give a little ground to the governing group, but we must always give way grudgingly, and carefully.

We Texans may have given away a much bigger chunk that we yet realize when we allowed our legislators to pass the public school reforms demanded by Ross Perot and Governor Mark White last

Mark White had more political clout, or maybe Ross Perot had more money, than most of us realize when that unlikely duo "railroaded" (that's the Governor's own term; the school reform package through a special session of the Legislature.

In the course of it, at any rate, they succeeded in destroying an elected Board of Education and substituting a smaller and more maneuverable board to be appointed by the Governor himself, presumably with Perot's blessing, to wield formidable new powers over our local (and elected) school district boards.

Although the huge new tax package which that worthy pair pushed through along with its school reform package may take a painful enough bite out of the taxpayers to stir a political storm in a few months when the full impact begins to be felt, greater damage may have been done in irretrievable loss of local control over public school education in this state.

It may become irretrievable, at any rate, if we permit that power to become consolidated in the hands of the fifteen people appointed to the State Board of Education, owing allegiance only to the Governor and his controller.

A regular, and Constitutional, session of the Legislature is coming in January. A concerted state-wide effort needs to be organized now to un-do much of the White-Perot "Railroad Act of 1984" when the Legislature convenes again. There are Constitutional safeguards in a regular session procedure which were not present in the Governor's special session...safeguards which demand more time, more careful consideration of bills. and more than a simple majority vote to ram them through...safety factors not present under the special session rules.

Your own representatives, Buck Buchanan, Foster Whaley, and other members of the Panhandle delegation in the House of Representatives, held fast under pressure against the "railroad act". Let them hear your appreciation, and assure them of your support in the future.

Your own State Senator, Bill Sarpalius, held out but gave in finally to the steamroller. Let him hear from you, too...it might stiffen his backbone.

A great deal more is involved here than a pay boost for teachers, which the teachers themselves are finding now was largely a fraud. The future of our public school system is at stake...and beyond that, of local control over almost everything connected with public education.

An important chunk of your freedom has been chipped away this summer, and it may be gone forever unless Texans take action.

A recall election for Mark White might even be in order. It probably wouldn't work, but it might generate enough steam to warm the seat of his government uncomfortably.

Heifer weight, size important

Cattlemen can improve their calf drop by paying close attention to the selection of replacement

"The key is to select replacement heifers based on weight and frame size," says Dr. L.R. Sprott, beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Texas A&M University System.

"This should be done when heifers are 15 months old so that they can be bred to calve at two

years of age," Sprott points out.
Studies have shown that heavier, large framed heifers will have a higher pregnancy rate, particularly during the second breeding season.

In a study last year on the Four G Ranch in Waller County, heifers were divided into three weight groups at about 15 months of age and placed with bulls. Similar comparisons were made regarding frame size.

The heaviest heifers had more

than an 84 percent pregnancy rate in the first breeding season, from 5 to 8 percent higher than the two lighter weight groups, notes Sprott. However, the big difference came in the second breeding season when the heaviest heifers boasted a 90 percent pregnancy rate compared to 74 and 79 percent for the two lighter weigh groups of heifers.

Sprott also notes that the larger framed heifers had higher pregnancy rates throughout the test

"This study clearly shows that selecting heavier, large framed replacement heifers can lead to an increased calf crop," points out Sprott, "both during the first and second breeding seasons."

Canned foods

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

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
