That's what sudies show in Parmer County on Amarillo tine sandy loam soil. This research was conducted for the past two years by Wen-dell Robertson, research asso-ciate at the USA Southwestern Great Plains Research center Great Plains Research center Great Plains Research asso-tate at the USA Southwestern Great Plains Research asso-tere, and Dur Arthur Onken, assistant professor, South Plains Research and Extension Center, Lubbock. Results indicate that nitro-gone by heavy applications of irrigation water on sandy soils, arge amounts of rainfall could produce the same effect, say the essearchers. This frequently appled prior to preplant irriga-tion. However, research shows

different levels of nitrogen(an-hydrous ammonia) varying from before shredding to early side-dress, all treatments in the Parmer County test also in-cluded about 50 pounds of phos-phorus per acre applied prior to preplant irrigation. Nitrogen was applied at a rate of 80, 120 and 160 pounds per acre. A split application was also made in one of the intradiments in which one-half of the nitrogen was applied after bedding and the remainder applied sidedress.

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


