## Tax Returns Offered In Bonds

Savings Bond Chairman for Callahan, Howard E. Farmer, today reminded taxpayers that the Treasury Department will once again offer them the opportunity of taking income tax refunds in United Savings Bonds.

The savings option, introduced in 1963, in addition to the two standard options of taking tax refunds in cash or applying them to next year's tax.

"When a taxpayer elects to take his refund in Series E Bonds," Mr. Farmer said, "his money goes to work immediately on two jobs. It begins to build his financial security. At the same time, it contributes to our country's economic strength. Those who elect the U. S. Savings Bond option join millions of Americans who are investing in their country's future in this way.

"When you check the Savings Bond line on your 1965 tax form," Farmer continued, "you automatically assure yourself of two advantages: you provide yourself with an easy method of holding on to your tax refund dollars and a sure way of making it grow one-third larger at maturity. When your mark is made, the rest is automatic. For example, if you're entitled to a refund of \$42, you'll get a \$50 face-value Series E Bond, (cost \$37.50), plus a check for \$4.50. "This 25th Anniversary year of the E Bond is a good time for more taxpayers to get in on this opportunity," Mr. Farmer said. "Choosing bonds is the surest way I know of to make your tax refund really mean something to you."

## Registration Begins

L. B. Howard, Superintendent of Baird Schools, has announced that all children who will be six years of age on or before September 1, 1966, need to secure and fill out census blanks as soon as possible.

These census blanks may be secured from the Superintendent's office, or by calling and having one sent to your home.

In a called meeting Monday night, Jan. 24, at 7 p. m., held at Wilma's Cafe, February 1 was selected by the Steering Committee as kickoff date for the Baird Community Center Membership Drive.

E. L. Foster of Coleman, Area Supervisor for Farm Home Administration, and John Curry, also of Coleman and with FHA, explained to a number of Baird and Clyde residents, present at the meeting, procedure necessary to obtain a loan for recreational facilities and specified the necessity of an initial entry fee.

The entry fee was set at \$25, payable in a lump sum or \$5.00 per month for five months. This money would be left in escrow until the project was completed (approximately 5 months) at which time members would begin paying regular dues of \$7.50 per month for family membership.

It has also been decided that 150 memberships will be needed for this project to be successful. If that goal cannot be reached, and the project should be abandoned, initial entry fees will be refunded.

The Center will cost approximately \$100,000, which will be borrowed through the FHA on a 40-year loan at 5% interest.

Upon completion, the Center will feature a complete golf course, with golf instruction available, community building, with complete club meeting facilities; recreation area, picnic area, playground equipment, miniature golf, archery range, diving range and numerous other family recreational facilities.

improvement for the area.

## Deadline Nears For Poll Tax

Tuesday is the deadline for paying poll taxes in order to be eligible to vote in all elections during 1966, County Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell reminded County residents today.

County residents may mail the form appearing in this paper and \$1.75 to the Tax Assessor-Collector's office. The envelope must be postmarked before midnight Tuesday to be valid. All information requested on the form should be filled in and the form must be signed.

For persons over 60 years of age to be tax exempt in the 1966 elections, they must have had their 60th birthday before January 1, 1965. They will not need an exemption certificate as this requirement applies to cities of 10,000 or more population.

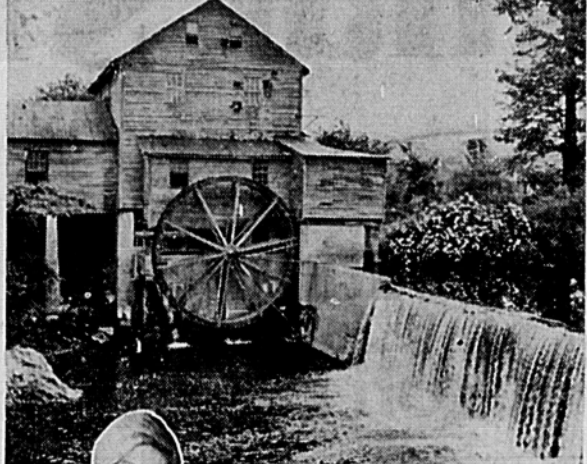

AUSTIN — A substantial tax increase will be needed next year to provide for fast-growing colleges and universities.

Frank Erwin, chairman of the Committee for the Governing Board of Texas Colleges and Universities, estimates that higher-education expenditures will go up \$1,000,000,000 for the coming biennium -- above the present \$432,000,000 budget. That is a hike of nearly 25 per cent.

Some authorities feel that increased expenditures for education will run closer to \$170,000,000.

Erwin predicted that college-university enrollments will double by the early 1970's and admitted that the task of providing facilities for all appears virtually hopeless.

Texas, he said, must be enthusiastic in support of new taxes for education as they were in backing increased appropriations last year.

Other sources said the higher education budget looming next year may reach \$650,000,000. In that event about \$500,000,000 may have to come from direct taxation.

Should an increase as large as now foreseen become necessary, pressure almost certainly would be renewed to hike the \$50 a semester tuition fee required at state institutions. In the past, however, legislators have been quicker to raise taxes than tuitions.

After hearing the sobering story of the financial plight of the colleges, the Coordinating Board for the Texas College and University System settled down to its first meeting of the year.

Board authorized a local election on establishment of a new junior college district to serve the Port Arthur-Nederland-Port Neches area, but postponed until July a decision on a similar institution for Scurry County.

Board members learned that Texas' new \$85,000,000 state-supported loan program for college students will be fully operative by next fall.

CANDIDATES FILING — A rash of entries in Democratic primary races for statewide offices indicates there will be plenty of action on the political front this spring after all.

Houston natural gas producer Stanley C. Woods 43, announced he will take on Gov. John Connally and called for a support-

ing team of candidates to oppose other major incumbents. State Rep. Bill Hollowell of Grand Saline was scheduled to reveal this week whether he will join Woods' "team" as a candidate for lieutenant governor.

Hillsboro friends paid the filing fee of Secretary of State Crawford C. Matin for attorney general. Whether he gets opposition from State Sens. Franklin Spears of San Antonio and Galloway Calhoun of Tyler is in the hands of the State Supreme Court which has heard arguments on their eligibility to run.

Incumbents Treasurer Jesse James, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert, Agriculture Commissioner John White, Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, Supreme Court Associate Justice Clyde E. Smith and Court of Criminal Appeals Judge W. T. McDonald are among those who have deposited their hats in the ring. District Judge John F. Onion of San Antonio is opposing McDonald.

Liberals still are looking for a Democratic opponent to run against Atty Gen. Waggoner Carr in the race for U. S. Senator.

State Rep. Paul Haring of Goliad already is actively campaigning for Byron Tunnell's seat on the Railroad Commission.

OIL ALLOWABLE EDGED UP — Texas' oil allowable has been edged up for the second month in a row -- to 32.7 per cent of capacity for February.

The percentage factor applied by Railroad Commission adds up to a production ceiling of 3-100,000 barrels a day next month. January allowable of 32.6 per cent permitted slightly less. But it was the most promising start Texas oilmen have enjoyed in eight years.

Commissioners, after setting the allowable, went into conference with an Air Force general to learn what effect the accelerated fighting in Vietnam would have on petroleum demands. Best guess at the moment: not too much.

RECREATION GRANT SET — Texas has established eligibility for a \$3,500,000 grant from the Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund for acquisition and development of state and local outdoor recreation areas.

Will Odom, chairman of Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission,

said Texas' state-wide outdoor recreation plan was approved by the Department of Interior's Bureau of Outdoor Recreation.

Funds will be allocated to the state for sharing among agencies on a city and county level. Included are water improvement districts and river authorities.

Texas' plan may include initial emphasis on development of existing park and recreation areas, particularly those located on lakes and streams.

Parks and Wildlife Department is preparing a manual of instruction for political subdivisions to guide them in making applications to share in the program.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Connally has appointed John H. Crooker Jr., Houston; William C. Donnell, Marathon; Mrs. Savannah C. Lockey, Troup; and J. L. Huffines, Greenville to the Board of Regents of the State Senior Colleges. Mrs. Lockey and Huffines are re-appointments. Donnell succeeds Ed Gossett of Dallas and Crooker succeeds Newton Gresham of Houston.

To an advisory committee on the Water Code, Smith appoint-

ed Judge Joe R. Greehill of Austin; Victor W. Bouldin of Houston; Joe D. Carter of Austin; Dean Carlton of Dallas; Prof. Corwin W. Johnson of Austin; Neal King of Mission and Roy D. Payne of Austin.

PROJECTS APPROVED — Governor Connally has okayed three "head start" program for needy pre-school children in Travis, San Patricio and Collin Counties.

He also cleared a \$102,078 federal grant for Community Action Program development in Dallas' war on poverty.

Travis County Head Start funds of \$199,247 (matched by \$23,761 in local support) will help train 616 children in Austin, Del Valle and Manor.

A San Patricio County project planned by a Sinton group will be financed by \$22,371 in federal money plus \$2,542 in local support and will provide a program for 50 children of Odem Independent School District.

McKinney Independent School District in Collin County will receive a \$43,132 federal grant (and put up \$5,385 locally) to operate a program for 100 youngsters.

DRAFT QUOTAS TOLD — State draft boards are scheduled to induct 1,372 single and married men without children during February.

Quota actually is less than January's 1,475 and December's 1,523 and represents Texas' share of national call for 29-400 men. Inductees will be 19-25 years old.

Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, emphasized that no married men with children or expected children, will be selected to fill the February call. But he warns that information on unborn children certified to a doctor should be promptly transmitted to draft boards.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES — Community Mental Health Centers and state financial aid for them are constitutional. So held Attorney General Carr in an opinion requested by Dr. S. H. Frazier, commissioner of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

In a separate opinion, Carr said the new Code of Criminal Procedure provides for sale, after 30 days, or abandoned or unclaimed personal property seized under search warrants.

Earlier Carr informed Agriculture Commissioner John C. White that labels on economic pesticides must carry either the name and address of the registrant of the product, the manufacturer, or of the person for whom manufactured.

MUSEUM PLAN REVEALED — A \$10,000,000 permanent Texas Institute of Living Culture is proposed by Governor Connally as the state's exhibit for the 1968 HemisFair in San Antonio.

Connally will ask the Legislature to appropriate an additional \$5,500,000 for the project. He described the exhibit as a kind of super-museum, capable of future growth. It would depict the state's history and culture from the days of the cave man to manned space flights.

COLORFUL PLATES — Purchasers of Texas personalized or prestige license plates will get more for their \$10 additional fee this year. Plates will have a reflectorized silver background with up to six green letters or figures.

1965 TRAFFIC FATALITIES UP — An unexpected rash of traffic fatalities in December broke a year-long downward trend in fatal accidents and pushed the 1965 traffic toll to a new high. Previous record came in 1964 when 3,006 deaths were recorded. But during 1965, total deaths reached 3,018. The December death toll is the highest on record as 345 persons died.

FIRST TEN PROJECTS APPROVED — Texas Highway Commission has approved the first ten projects in Texas to come under the Highway Beautification Act. Those counties with approved projects to screen auto wrecking yards are: Palo Pinto County, \$2,500; Hill County, \$5,700; Montgomery County, \$3,500; Travis County, \$2,500; Bexar County, \$3,700; Aransas County, \$5,000; Robertson County, \$2,000; Dallas County, \$3,000; El Paso County, \$3,300, and Moore County, \$3,300.

Commission also approved the planting of palm trees along a 3.6 mile stretch of U. S. 83 in Hidalgo County and the widening of Loop 249 from 7th Street to U. S. 77 in Harlingen.

## Countains Slow In Returning Medicare Cards

About 1-4 of the Callahan County social security beneficiaries 65 or older who received enrollment cards for the medical insurance part of Medicare through the mail have not yet returned them, R. R. Tuley Jr. social security district manager in Abilene, reported today. This enrollment card is important. Social security beneficiaries can use it to sign up for medical insurance, which will help pay doctor's bills when Medicare becomes effective next July, he continued.

This card should be filled out and returned to social security as soon as possible. Anyone who has lost the enrollment card can get another by checking with the field representative who visits Baird regularly, or by writing the Abilene social security office, but he should do it soon.

Social security beneficiaries, along with nearly all other people who will be 65 or over before 1966, will have medical insurance when the plan goes into effect only if they sign up by March 31, Tuley said.

Men and women 65 and over who receive monthly social security or railroad retirement benefits will automatically have hospital insurance, the other part of Medicare. Hospital insurance will help pay hospital bills and related expenses.

Nearly everyone 65 and over can receive Medicare, even if they don't receive social security benefits, or even if they never have worked under social security, he added. But, a person will have this protection only if he applies for it. For more information, get in touch with the Abilene social security district office, located at Room 2321, Federal Building, or talk with a representative of that office when in your neighborhood. All Post Offices have schedules of such visits.

## President Urges Postal Speed-Up

President Johnson recently directed Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien to take steps to increase services where needed and improve parcel post delivery services also.

"A good, stable, dependable postal system is vital to the well being of the nation's economy," President Johnson said in granting the Postmaster General authority to seek service improvement funds from Congress. "I want you to explore all the techniques available to modernize our postal service and make certain they are being used to provide the American people with the best postal system in the world at the lowest possible cost to the taxpayer." The Postmaster General said that the service improvements will be made as soon as Congress provides the funds -- hopefully within the next few months.

Authority to make the postal service improvements was contained in a letter to the Postmaster General, replying to a proposal by Mr. O'Brien that such action be taken.

In addition to the above mentioned service improvements, postmasters would be authorized to resume selling money orders on Saturdays as part of the window service restoration in these cities where money order sales have been curtailed.

Postmaster General O'Brien said that the service improvements would be a meaningful step in the President's program to upgrade the quality of Federal services.

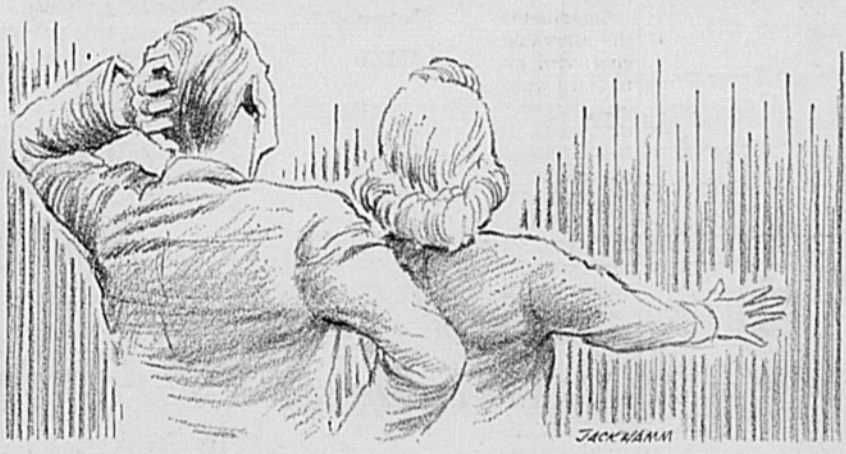

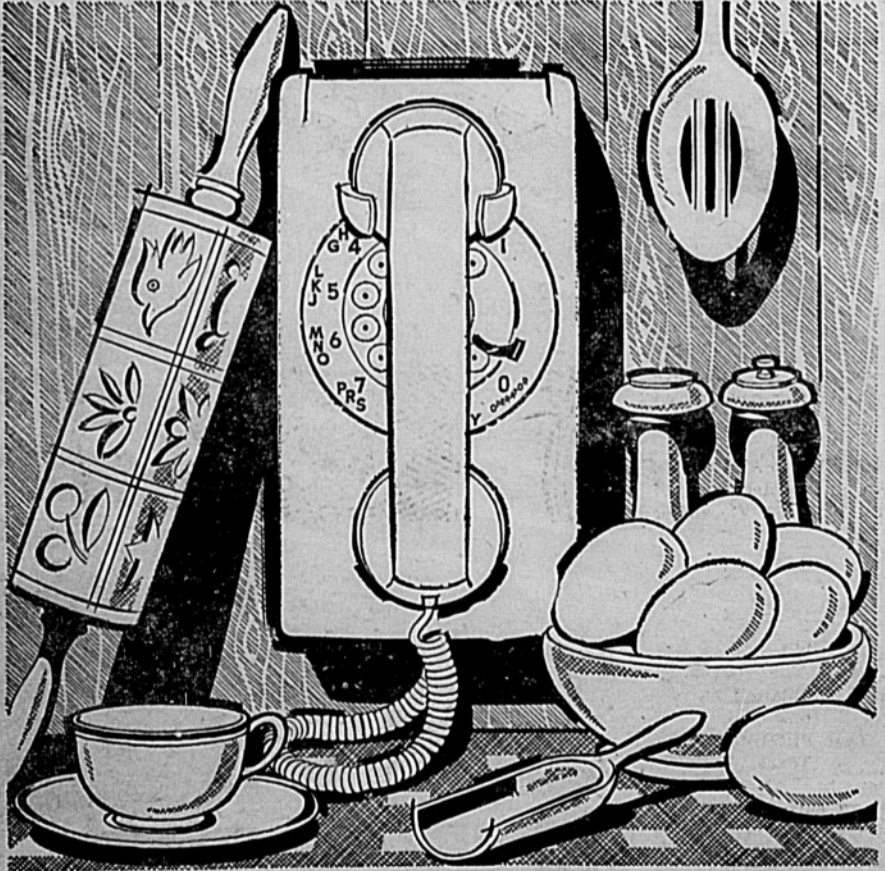

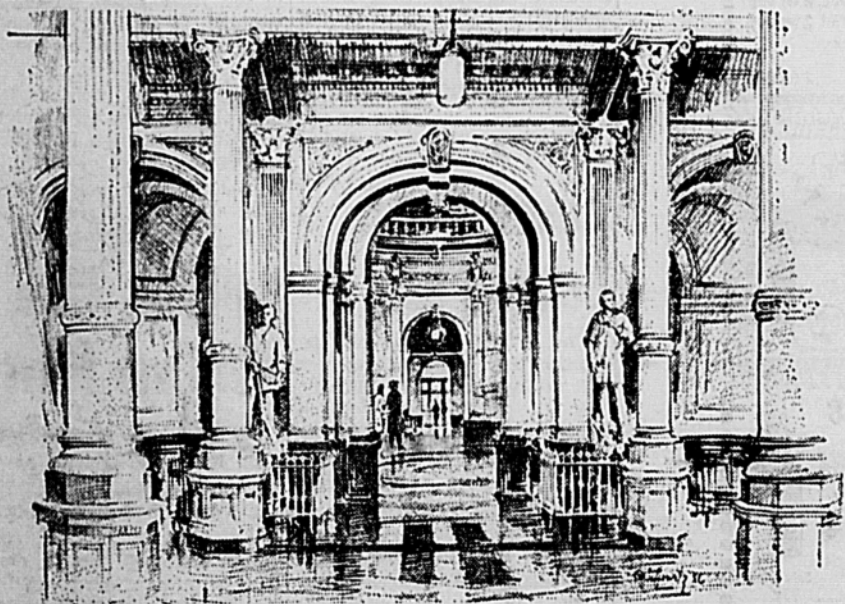
