## CONTINUED SNOW NETS SMALL AMOUNT MOISTURE

Our official weather observer, Tommie Saye, reporting Wednesday morning of this week, stated that the High temperature reading Tuesday was a cold 15 degrees with the low for Tuesday and Wednesday nights at 6 degrees.

The snow which started falling Saturday night measured .37 inches of moisture Sunday morning, .02 Monday morning and a trace Tuesday morning. Wednesday a .07 inches of additional moisture was measured. This is a particularly dry snow, the total moisture content has been .46.

An average snowfall of this nature would be about .10 per inch equal to about 5 inches of snow.

The general feeling is that snow has been falling and ice on the ground from 21 days up to two months, not an actual fact of course, but the answer one receives when talking with area residents. At any rate, it is too long and everybody is ready for Sunshine.

For your information as to what officially transpired at the Hospital Board Meeting Tuesday of last week, we submit the full text of the minutes of that meeting.

The Board of Directors of the Donley County Hospital District met in a called meeting Tuesday, January 2nd, 1973 at 2:00 o'clock P.M. at the Medical Center with the following present: Bright Newhouse, Delbert Robertson, R. D. Cagle, J. S. Hinds, Jane Bownds, Wes Langham, Administrator, Dr. T. E. Marshall, George Wayne Estlack and Dean Singleton, News Paper Editors.

The President called the meeting to order.

County Judge W. R. Christal presented the revised amendment to the Senate Bill to the Board. The Amendment to the Senate Bill which was approved by the Board and sent to the Legislature for approval was in error as to the division of Board members and length of terms, according to the law. The Amendment was rewritten to divide the seven members in two classes, three members and four members; the three members to be elected the first year for a two year term, then the four members to be elected in two years for a two year term.

Motion was made by J. S. Hinds that the Board approve the revised amendment. (Copy of amendment attached hereto and made a part hereof) Motion was seconded by R. D. Cagle. Motion carried. Judge Christal excused himself from the meeting.

Dr. T. E. Marshall was welcomed by the Board of Directors. The Doctor expressed his desire to have the hospital opened as soon as possible. He has some patients that need hospital care at this time. The Doctor expressed his pleasure at being in Clarendon. Dr. Marshall has applied for membership in the Texas Osteopathic Association and has applied for his malpractice insurance, which he will need before being eligible to practice in the hospital. Dr. Marshall excused himself from the meeting.

Wes Langham reported that the Medicare Number has been received for the Hospital. (See Hospital Minutes Page 6)

## A Total Of Over Eighteen Million On Deposit In 3 County Banks

West Texas Utilities Company Reports Rate Increase

A request for the first general rate increase in West Texas Utilities Company 50-year history was presented to the Clarendon City Council by WTU Manager Allen Estlack.

The Company requested a six percent increase in each step of the residential, commercial and industrial rates and the application of a fuel adjustment clause to municipal water pumping rates.

The increase will not apply to minimum bills, fuel adjustments municipal rates and power interchanges with other utility companies. "As a result," Mr. Estlack said, "the increase in the Company's total revenue will be less than five percent."

The increase will add about 2-2/3 cents per day to the average residential bill, according to Mr. Estlack. He pointed out that since 1952 the average residential rate has increased from 2.5¢ per kilowatt-hour to 2.5¢ per kilowatt-hour. During the same time, the average residential usage has increased more than 3 1/2 times.

While this is WTU's first general rate increase, the power company manager noted that WTU had voluntarily reduced rates 14 times. The firm's last major reduction was in 1954.

In asking the City's approval of the new electric rate schedules, the WTU Manager said that the new rates would be applied to bills rendered on or after March 1, 1973.

Mr. Estlack pointed out that almost every electric utility company in Texas has found it necessary to request rate adjustments and that WTU is one of the last to make such a request.

"The spiraling cost of nearly everything we buy or use to provide electric service makes the rate adjustment essential," the WTU Manager said. "The increase is the minimum needed and nothing more."

He emphasized that WTU had been caught in the "cost squeeze" as a result of the increases in the cost of equipment, services and labor, cost of new power plants, lines, and environmental controls.

With interest costs more than doubled, he pointed out that the cost of borrowing money was one of the major problems. To supply future needs, the Company expects to spend about 77 million dollars for new facilities in the next five years.

Accordinging to figures released this week by the three banking institutions of Donley County, there is a substantial increase in deposits which brings the total to near nineteen million.

The figures as released by the Farmers State Bank & Trust Co., The Donley County State Bank in Clarendon and the Security State Bank at Hedley show total deposits at the close of business December 29, 1972 at \$18,861,599.63 as compared with a total of \$15,594,648.59 at the end of 1971. This is an increase of \$3,266,951.04 and the main influx of deposits from the current cotton and grain crop is not on deposit yet due to a late, late harvest. The way the weather is acting up right now, it may be spring before some crops are gathered or turned under.

When deposits are up, the loan column is up also. The three banks showed a total of \$11,397,528.23 in loans at the close of business December 29, 1972 as compared with a total of \$9,239,816.73 in 1971. This is an increase of \$2,157,711.50 in loans but con-

deposits.

We have excellent banking institutions in Donley County and at the rate of growth shown by all three we should go over the twenty million mark by December of this year.

Registration At CC Set For Jan. 15-16

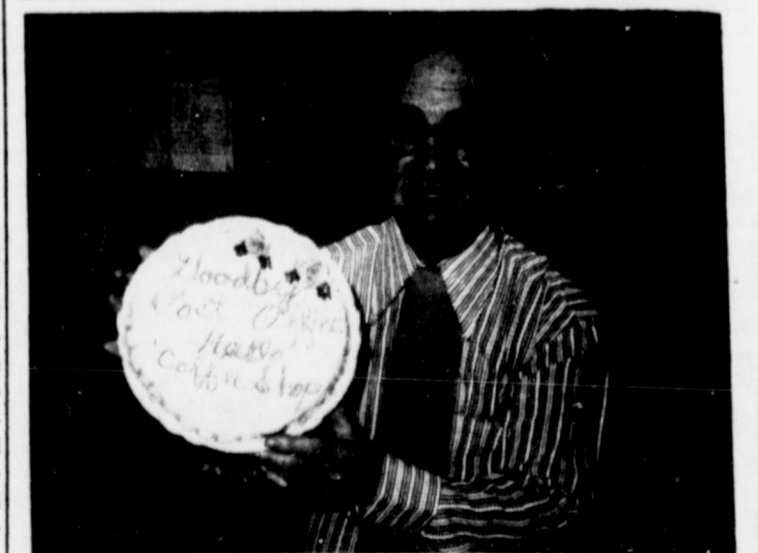

This question has been asked since so many accidents take place in this bad weather. How do you call an Ambulance? What number do you call? Will someone please give this information to your reporter?

EDITOR'S NOTE — To receive Ambulance Service persons may call 874-3533 or 874-3760. Personnel is on duty at all times at either of these numbers.

Exemptions from the rule include headwear, footwear, and handwear, as well as certain articles selling for less than \$3 which are completely washable. If an attached label would spoil a garment's use or appearance, a non-attached, but permanent label must be provided.

Besides informing you of the proper cleaning procedure for your clothes, an added advantage of the new rule is that at the time of the purchase it will be easier for you to choose between apparel which can be conveniently maintained and those which are more time-consuming because of costly care procedures that may be involved.

### The Informed Consumer

#### CARE LABELS FOR A PAREL

When was the last time you decided to wash a new dress, only to discover that you threw out the washing instructions two days before? Consumers often tell me how confusing wash day is, with today's blends, synthetics and finishes all requiring special cleaning procedures. Colors run, clothing shrinks, and material is damaged because of improper care.

The traditional source of care information, personal experience, based on trial and error, no longer meets the needs of consum-

ers. Now, thanks to a new regulation by the Federal Trade Commission, you will be getting answers to questions about washing, wringing, fluff drying, or dry cleaning certain kinds of clothing. As of July 3, 1972, clothing and yard goods must have a permanent label disclosing instructions for their care and maintenance.

The rule applies to any garments and hosiery, both domestic and imported. Even home sewers will benefit from this rule, which requires piece goods as well to be accompanied by care labels, which you can affix permanently to them by normal household methods, such as ironing.

Specifically, the label must fully inform you how to wash, dry, iron, bleach, dry clean, and otherwise regularly care and maintain a particular article; warn you if the care procedures that usually apply to such a garment would diminish its use; be made readily accessible, and not hidden in a pocket, for example; and remain legible for the useful life of the article.

Examples of instructions you'll be seeing: "Machine wash warm. Gentle cycle. Do not use chlorine bleach;" and, "Dry clean only. Do not use petroleum solvents, or the coin operated method of dry cleaning."

### Social Security

Starting in 1973, people who are working while getting social security benefits can earn more but never lose more than \$1 in benefits for each \$2 earned, according to Travis C. Briggs, social security district manager in Amarillo.

"The more you earn, the higher your total income will be," Briggs said. "Under the new social security law, social security payments will be reduced by \$1 for every \$2 earned over \$2,100 in a year."

Previously, monthly payments were reduced by \$1 in benefits for every \$2 earned between \$1,680 and \$2,880 in a year—and by \$1 for every \$1 earned over \$2,880.

"People 72 and over will continue to get their full social security benefits regardless of earnings," Briggs said. Under the new law, people under 72 can earn as much as \$2,100 in a year and get their full social security benefits. Different rules apply to people getting social security disability benefits if they work.

In addition, starting in 1973, full benefits can be paid for any month in which an employee's wages are not more than \$175—or he didn't perform substantial services in self-employment. Previously, the monthly limit was \$140.

"Also, starting in 1973, only your earnings in the months before you reach 72 will be used to figure what benefits are due you for those months," Briggs said. "Before, earnings in the entire year you reached 72 were counted in figuring benefits due you for months before you were 72."

Another feature of the new law assured that the earnings exemption for people getting social security payments will go up automatically in future years as earnings levels increase, Briggs said. The first year there can be an automatic increase in 1975.

Social security pays monthly benefits to eligible retired and disabled workers and their families — and to families of deceased workers who were insured under social security.

Under the "carry-over" rule of the medical insurance part of Medicare, doctor bills for October, November, and December may in some cases count toward the \$50 annual deductible for both 1972 and 1973, according to Travis C. Briggs, social security district manager in Amarillo.

The medical insurance part of Medicare helps pay for doctor bills and a variety of other medical expenses of almost every one 65 and over. Before payments from Medicare begin, the patient must meet the annual deductible — the first \$50 of covered medical expenses accumulated in a calendar year.

The carry-over rule helps the Medicare patient who might otherwise have to pay the \$50 deductible twice in a short period of time," Briggs said—"once at the end of one year, again at the next year. Under the carry-over rule, doctor bills for October, November, and December which can be counted toward your \$50 deductible for 1972, can apply to the deductible for both 1972 and 1973."

Even if a Medicare patient hasn't met the 1972 deductible before October, he should send in all of his medical bills for covered services for the last 3 months of 1972, according to Briggs. The "carry-over" amount will be credited to your deductible for 1973," he said.

The bills should be sent in with a Request for Medicare Payment form, available at most doctors' offices and all social security offices. They should be sent to Blue Cross/Blue Shield in Dallas, the health insurance organization that handles medical insurance payments in Texas.

### NEWS FROM Congressman Bob Price 18th District, Texas

Immediately upon the convening of the new 93rd Congress, January 3, 1973, Congressman Bob Price introduced several bills dealing with a variety of important issues for consideration, including:

A Constitutional Amendment to permit voluntary prayer in the Nation's classrooms and other public buildings.

A Constitutional Amendment setting minimum attendance requirements for Members of Congress - failure to be present and voting on at least 70% of recorded yeas and nay votes would result in the dismissal from office of a delinquent Congressman.

A Constitutional Amendment to prohibit deficit spending by the Federal Government except in time of war or national emergency, and to require a retirement of the National Debt over a one hundred year period.

A bill to abolish the limitation on outside income for social security beneficiaries over the age of 65.

A bill to provide tax credits for expenditures made in the exploration and development of new reserves of oil and gas in the United States.

A bill to establish a Council on Energy Policy to advise the Congress and the President in the formation and execution of a national energy policy to meet the future needs of the United States.

A bill to modify the Delany Amendment to the Federal Food and Drug Act to permit the use of DMS in animal feeds when residues from such use may be present in inconsequential and harmless amounts.

A bill to re-establish November 11th for the annual observance of Veterans Day in the United States.

A bill to modify the inheritance tax laws applicable to farmers, ranchers, businessmen and other property owners.

"I believe the 93rd Congress has a great challenge ahead—we have an opportunity to take up the legislation to meet the pressing needs of the American people. As the Representative of the new 13th Congressional District of Texas, I shall vigorously attempt to promote the views of all of my constituents in the Congress and to seek legislative action in those areas which meet with their needs," Price said.

**Cotton Classing News From Office Of USDA**

Inclement weather delayed harvest over the Memphis, Texas area this past week, according to W. E. Cain, in charge of the USDA, AMS, Cotton Classing Office in Memphis, Texas. "This will allow gins and the classing office to catch up some," said Cain, as he again urged farmers to wait for their cotton to dry out well before resuming stripping operations to avoid "barkies."

The Memphis, Texas Cotton Classing Office graded 28,950 samples this week to bring the season total to 114,400. This compares to 74,000 on the same date a year ago.

The predominant grade classed this week was Strict Middling Light Spotted (42) with 36 percent followed by Middling Light Spotted (32) with 26 percent and Strict Low Middling (41) with 23 percent.

The predominant staple classed this week was 32 with 72 percent followed by staple 33 with 19 percent.

Micronaire, or fineness and maturity, readings show 66 percent miked in the desirable range of 3.5 to 4.9, and 31 percent miked 3.4 and below.

Pressley or strength, readings show 76 percent of the samples tested 75,000 psi or higher. The average was 79,000 psi.

The cotton market continued very active and prices closed fully steady to slightly higher over last week. Some average prices were: Strict Low Middling (41), 32 staple, 25.75 to 26.00 cents per pound, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42), 32 staple, 24.75 to 25.00 cents, and Middling Light Spotted (32), 32 staple, 26.50 cents per pound. This was for cotton miked 3.5 to 4.9. Prices for low miked cotton continued to weaken.

The average price paid farmers for cottonseed at the gin was \$32.00 per ton.
