

maintenance. The rule applies to any garments and hosiery, both domestic and imported. Even home sewers will benefit from this rule, which Mr. and Mrs. Wendell Spier requires piece goods as well to and Kathy and Mr. and Mrs. Don be accompanied by care labels, their mother, Mrs. Blanks, here which you can affix permanent ly to them by normal household methods, such as ironing.

Specificially, the label must fully inform you how to wash, dry, iron, bleach, dry clean, and otherwise regularly care and maintain a particular article; warn you if the care procedures that usually apply to such a garment would diminish its use; be made readily accessible, and not hidden in a pocket, for example; and remain legible for the use ful life of the article.

Examples of instructions you' be seeing: "Machine warm. Gentle cycle. Do not use cholrine bleach;" and, "Dry clean only. Do not use petroleum solvents, or the coin operated method of dry cleaning."

Exemptions from the rule in clude headwear, footwear, and handwear, as well as certain articles selling for less than \$3 which are completely washable. If an attached label would spoil a garment's use or appearance, a non-attached, but permanen

label must be provided. Besides informing you of the proper cleaning procedures for your chothes, an added advantage of the new rule is that at the time of the purchase it will be easier for you to choose between apparel which can be conveniently maintained and those which are more time-consuming because of costly care procedures that may be involved.

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




