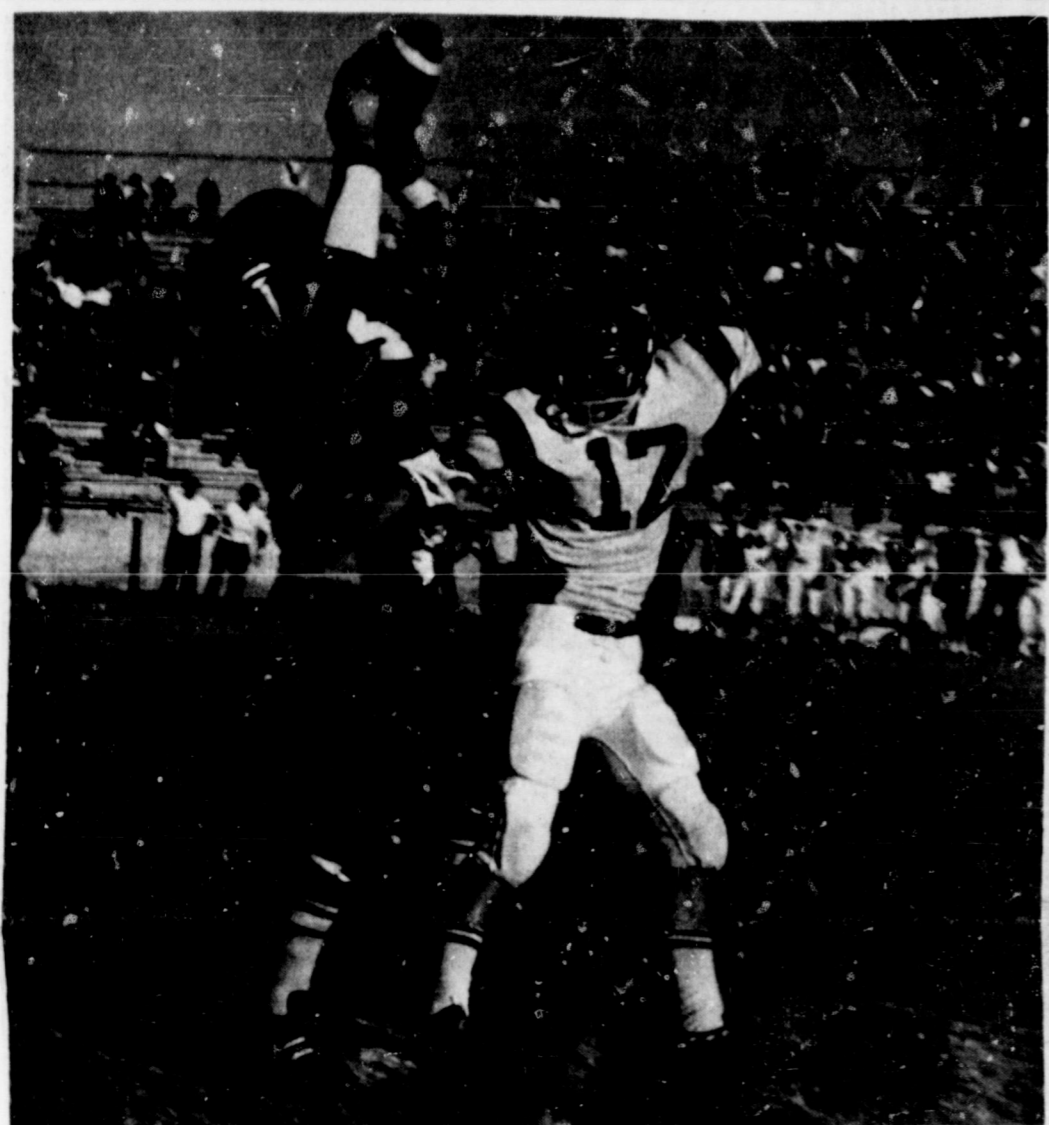

Funeral Rites Held For Jake Chamberlain

Funeral services for John Jacob (Jake) Chamberlain, 69, one of the areas most colorful cowboys, were held at 4:30 p.m. Sunday, December 24, 1972, in Murphy Memorial Chapel with Rev. Paul Hancock, Minister of the First Christian Church, officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery with arrangements under the direction of Murphy Funeral Home.

Mr. Chamberlain died at 7 a.m. on Saturday, December 23rd., at his ranch home 4 miles northeast of Turkey, after a short illness. He was born in Chicago, Illinois August 7, 1903 and came to Donley County with his parents in 1904. He began his career as a Cowboy and was employed by W. J. Lewis at the time Lewis purchased the RO Ranch from Alfred Rowe in 1917. In 1918 when he was 19 years of age he became wagon boss of the Lewis Ranches, a position he held at the time of his death. He was admired and respected as one of the most colorful Cowboys of all ages and was very much interested in and finding out the history of the land. He has owned his own home place for the past 24 years. He was a member of the Clarendon Masonic Lodge and a 32nd Degree Mason and was a member of the First Presbyterian Church in Clarendon.

Survivors include two brothers, Ben Chamberlain of Claude and Gene Chamberlain of Lubbock, also several nieces and nephews. Casket bearers were T. M. Bell, Jack Bell, Randy Gafford, Harley Longan, Warren Hardin and Frank Derrick.

Broncs Place Second In State With Loss To Schulenburg 14-10

The Clarendon Bronchos were champions in their own right last Friday although this was not in agreement with the final tally on the scoreboard for the State Class A Championship.

Every member of the Bronco squad put forth every effort in the game and it certainly was

no easy chore for the defense to hold the Shorthorns in check for they were big and stout. To put it all in a very few words—Clarendon supporters are very, very proud of our boys and the team spirit they have shown all season and for the coaches who have directed their activities throughout this season and in previous years.

The Bronchos opened the scoring in the game late in the first quarter with Steve Carter intercepting a 'Horn pass and racing untouched 12 yards for the 6 points. Kenneth King made the extra good. Schulenburg came back in the second quarter to even up the score 7-7.

The game was a see-saw affair until late in the third period when Kenneth King kicked a 29 yard field goal for 3 points which placed the Broncs ahead 10-7. This is the way it went until with only 23 seconds left, the Horns drove over from the 3 yard line for the winning tally.

It was a heart-breaker for the Broncs who were so near a state championship but they took the loss as good sportsmen should and those who were not seniors made the remark that they would be back to try again.

And let us not forget, the Broncs had strong support from homefolks as hundreds from Clarendon and this area were on hand to see the Broncs play . . . and many more former Clarendonites from all over the state. There was a big crowd present for the send-off early Friday morning and there were signs all along the route to Brownwood boosting the Broncs to win.

It has been a great football season . . . and being No. 2 is great . . . Broncs!

Noonkester & Shields Named To Panhandle Sports Hall Of Fame

There were twelve Panhandle area coaches and athletes, including three coach-athlete combinations from the same school among those named to be honored at 2 p.m. January 7, 1973 in Badger Gym at Amarillo College by the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame, an annual event.

Coach Clyde Noonkester and tailback Tommy Shields from Clarendon will be honored in Football. Each year for the past 14 years the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame has recognized the outstanding athletes in track and field, football, basketball, baseball, tennis and golf.

Noonkester, a 9 year coach at Clarendon High School and the Bronchos' head coach for the past six years guided the Bronchos to its finest football season ever this fall. Clarendon lost to Schulenburg 14-10 at Brownwood last Friday afternoon denying the Bronchos the State Football championship. Shields finished the season with 1,943 yards rushing and 26 touchdowns.

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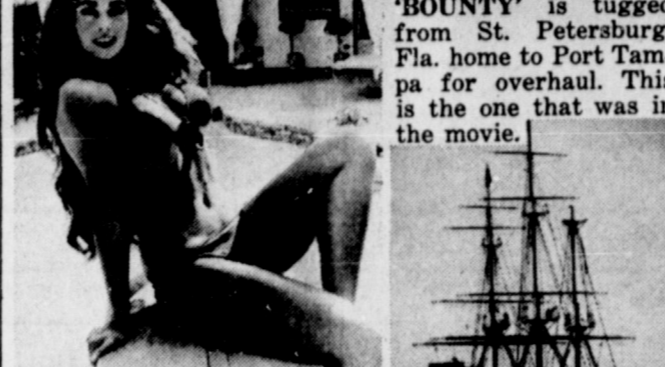

The Informed Consumer

STATE SECURITIES BOARD

The Texas Securities Board is the agency charged with protecting investors from fraud in connection with the sale of securities in Texas. It is a separate State agency, created in 1957. It enforces The Securities Act of Texas (sometimes called the "blue-sky law" because it is designed to prevent the sale of securities which have no more value than so many feet of the "blue sky"). This law is one of the strongest State securities laws in the nation.

As a general rule, securities sold in Texas must be registered with the State Securities Board, though the law provides a number of exceptions or exemptions from registration, including securities normally issued by banks, government and municipal bonds, securities issued on the New York and American Stock Exchanges, and other securities sold under certain prescribed circumstances.

In order to register securities with the agency, an applicant must file an application, including a prospectus which fully and fairly discloses the issuer's plan of business and finance and this prospectus must be furnished to each purchaser. Furthermore, the Securities Commissioner must be satisfied that the issuer's plan of business is fair, just and equitable to investors and that the price paid by promoters for their securities is fair in relation to the price the public is asked to pay. Otherwise, he can refuse to register the securities and prohibit their sale.

In many states, the Securities Commissioner or Administrator does not have authority to prohibit sales of securities on their merits when a full disclosure of material facts has been provided. It has been quipped that in those states, "you can sell people a dead horse, so long as you tell them it's a dead horse."

As a practical matter, however, the fact that a particular securities issue is a "dead horse" is not always clear in a long and complicated prospectus with complex financial statements. But

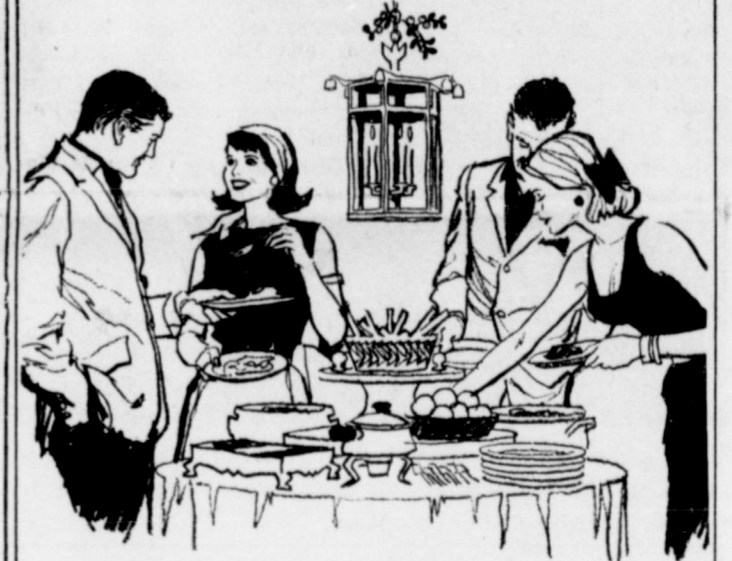

in Texas a determination of such matters is attempted prior to public sale and a number of securities issues sold in other states are not even filed for registration in Texas, because of the scrutiny they will be given by the agency. Texas law also requires that persons and companies selling securities, again with certain exceptions, be licensed by the State Securities Board. These dealers and salesmen must undergo an extensive background check and pass a written examination.

To detect and prevent violations of the law, the State Securities Board has a staff of lawyers and accountants in Austin and in branch offices in Dallas, Houston and Lubbock. The agency works closely with my office and with District Attorneys across the State, as well as having a vital cooperative relationship with the U. S. Securities and Exchange Commission.

When any citizen feels he may have been or is about to be the victim of a securities law violation, he should contact the State Securities Board at its Austin office or at any of its branch offices.

IRS Answers To Taxpayers Questions

Q—I filed a complaint against a local department store which I thought had raised prices illegally. Now they've cut off my credit. Isn't this kind of retaliatory action forbidden by the price regulations?

A—Yes. New Price Commission regulation prohibits retaliatory action by a seller against a buyer who exercises any of his rights under the Economic Stabilization Act or regulations. The rent guidelines prohibit similar actions by landlords.

If any firm has taken retaliatory action against you for filing a complaint, you may call your local Internal Revenue office for help.

Q—What penalties can the IRS impose upon landlords found to be violating rent controls?

A—The Internal Revenue Service can order landlords in violation of the rent regulations to restore overpayments to tenants, rollback rents to legal limits and pay a penalty of an amount double an overcharged rent. Cases in which flagrant and willful violation of rent rules occur will be turned over to the Justice Department for litigation and possible prosecution.

For information on how you can help the IRS enforce rent controls, see IRS Publication S-3026, "How to Spot a Rent Violation." It's available free by dropping a postcard to your Internal Revenue district office.

Q—My County recently reduced property taxes. Does this mean that my landlord must reduce my rent?

A—Yes. If your local real estate taxes go down, your rent must be reduced too.

Q—How does an employer treat new employees with respect to the 5.5 percent general wage and salary ceiling?

A—Basically, the new employee is subject to the same guidelines as the old employee if the job requirements are similar. The 5.5 percent standard applies to the appropriate employee unit to which he belongs.

Q—If a Tier I subsidiary firm raises prices without notifying, does this violation have any effect on the parent corporation?

A—Yes. Neither the parent corporation nor any of its subsidiaries may implement any further price increases until the particular subsidiary's price increase has been properly notified and approved by the Price Commission and the Commission has approved the parent's other increases. The subsidiary's failure to notify before raising prices also freezes increases previously granted to the parent corporation and its other subsidiaries that have not yet been instituted.

Q—When does the IRS require a wage-price inquiry to be in writing?

A—The IRS will ask a caller to put his oral inquiry in writing only when he desires a written reply or if the request is so complex that it would not be feasible to handle it by phone. There is no administrative appeal procedure if a person feels the answer he receives to an oral inquiry is unsatisfactory. Except for rent violations, a person is not required to submit a complaint of an illegal increase in writing.

Cotton Classing News From USDA Office

Cotton harvest moved into high gear over the Memphis, Texas area this week, according to W. E. Cain, in charge of the USDA, AMS, Cotton classing Office in Memphis, Texas.

The Memphis Cotton Classing Office graded 13,140 samples this week to bring the season total to 68,775. This compares to 29,325 on the same date a year ago.

The predominant grade classed this week was Strict Low Middling (41) with 33 percent followed by Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) with 29 percent and Middling Light Spotted (32) with 22 percent.

The predominant staple classed this week was 33 with 52 percent followed by staple 32 with 43 percent.

Pressley, or strength, tests showed 62 percent of the samples tested 75,000 psi or higher. The average for the week was 77,000 psi.

Trading in the cotton market was active this week as prices slipped 75 to 150 points on the most active qualities traded early in the week. Middling Light Spotted (32), staples 31 and 32, closed at 24.50 to 25.25 cents per pound. Strict low Middling (41) and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42), staple 32, closed at 24.00 to 25.00 cents per pound. This was for cotton miking 3.5

to 4.9. The average price paid farmers for cottonseed at the gin was \$52.00 per ton.

A \$68,000 acquisition and development project for a park in the City of Turkey, has been announced by Gov. Preston Smith. Half the project's cost will be paid from the U. S. Department of Interior's Land and Water Conservation Fund, and half will be paid by the City of Turkey.

The project includes acquisition of approximately 10 acres of land and development of 15 acres to include a group shelter with restrooms, camper sites, picnic units, a ball field, a tot lot, renovation of two tennis courts, a multi-purpose court, croquet courts, a bicycle trail, a nature trail, landscaping, a sign and utilities.

Group Park Permit Effective January 1

A \$12 group entrance permit to state parks will be available to nonprofit youth organizations Jan. 1.

In previous action, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission approved such permits to make the state parks more available to youth organizations such as the Boy Scouts.

Such organizations must be composed of individuals 17 years of age and under and have state or national affiliation or sponsorship by a government, civic or community organization.

The \$12 permit will authorize entry to members of groups under adult supervision into any state park where entrance fees are determined on a per vehicle basis.

License Permit Filing Deadline Extended

The Texas Highway Commission has extended the license and permit filing deadline for owners of signs along Interstate and primary highways.

The Commission extended the filing deadline from December 31 to June 30, 1973. Advertising industry and individual sign owners requested the extension because the previous deadline did not permit sufficient time to comply with the Texas Highway Beautification Act.

The act requires a permit for each existing or planned sign. Also, anyone erecting or maintaining signs within 660 feet of an Interstate or Federal-aid highway must have a license to engage in outdoor advertising.

Sign owners are advised to apply for a license and all necessary sign permits as soon as possible since no further extension of the deadline is contemplated.

The State license fee of \$25 is valid for an indefinite period. In addition, sign owners are required to post a \$2,500 bond in each county in which they have signs. Maximum bonds of \$10,000 are required of owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond applications are available through the Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department, P. O. Box 5075, Austin, Texas, 78763.

In addition, owners must obtain a \$5 permit for each sign. Permits for new signs will not be issued unless they conform to the law. Sign permit application forms can be obtained from the right of way sections of Highway Department district offices.

The Informed Consumer

by Attorney General Crawford Martin

OF INSURANCE TEXAS STATE BOARD

The Texas State Board of Insurance is charged by law with the promulgation of uniform rates and uniform coverages in the major property casualty lines of insurance. The three member board has direct supervision over the rate-making functions.

The rates for fire, windstorm, hurricane and hail insurance on every insured home, commercial and public building in the State of Texas are set by the Board. It also determines liability, fire, theft, and collision rates on every insured automobile and truck in the State as well as setting workmen's compensation and liability rates for virtually every Texas employer.

Every twelve months the insurance Board resurveys these rates measuring each for reasonableness, fairness, and adequacy.

The rates must be adequate to enable the companies to operate and make a reasonable profit. On the other hand, insurance rates must not be so high as to be unfair to the policyholders.

If an insured purchases fire and windstorm insurance on his home or its furnishings, the form or language of the policy and the rules under which the form must be written will be prescribed by the Insurance Board. If an insured elects to buy workman's compensation insurance on his employees, the rates per \$100 of payroll will be published by the State Board of Insurance, as will be the rules and the form of the policy. If an insured buys a title insurance policy on his home or property, the form as well as the rate must be uniform and prescribed by the Board. Automobile insurance companies must charge the rates prescribed by the Board, but they may reduce the premium by payment of a dividend. This dividend allowance also applies to insurance companies which write fire and windstorm insurance on your home.

Finally, in addition to its rate-making authority, the State Board of Insurance determines policy rules and methods of appeals from decisions of the Commissioner of Insurance. It also licenses insurance agents, and supervises the administration and enforcement of the Insurance Code.

In the area of insurance, the State Board of Insurance is the agency which is charged with the protection of the Texas consumer.
