
# The Clarendon College Rodeo Hedley Riding Club







"There'll be no 'right-to-work law in the proposed new Texas constitution," predicted Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Bill Hartman, Beaumont Enterprise - Journal, at a meeting of the Texas Daily Newspaper Association last

Answering a question from a newspaperman at the summer meeting of the Texas Daily Newspaper Association in Guadalajara, Mexico, Hobby and Hartman said the Texas Constitutional Revision Commission will not have "right-to-work" in the proposed constitution which will be submitted to the legislature in November. Hartman is a member of the commission.

"It will be impossible for 'right-to-work' advocates to get the two-thirds vote necessary to get it back in the constitution at next year's Texas Constitu-

The convention - beginning in January - will be writing a new constitution to present to Texas voters in 1974.

Hobby also told the Texas publishers that the most important Concon is reorganization of the executive branch.
