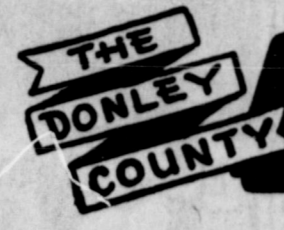

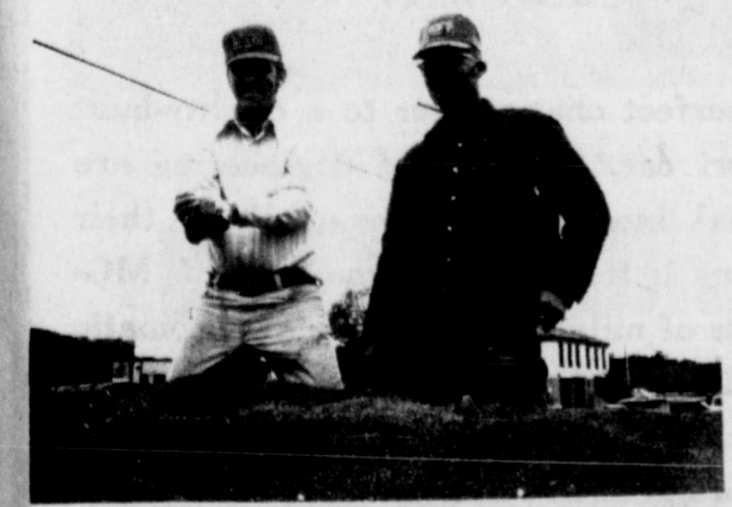
## Farmers State Bank Announces Retirement And Promotions

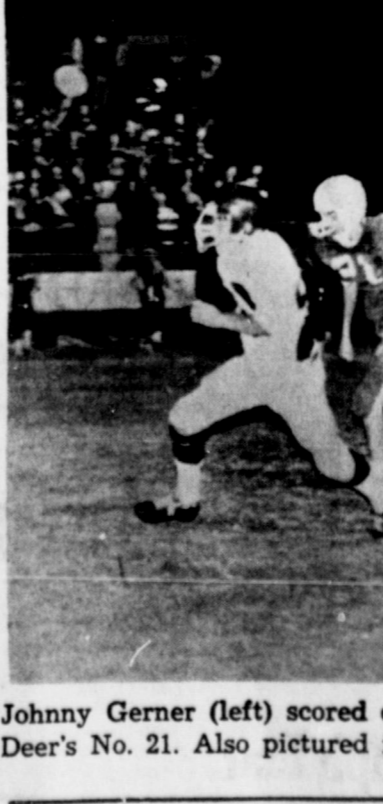
## Scout Troop 33 Is A Most Active Troop

Sue Hall and some of her friends were fascinated by the water faucet exhibit at the Fair. It was pretty good.

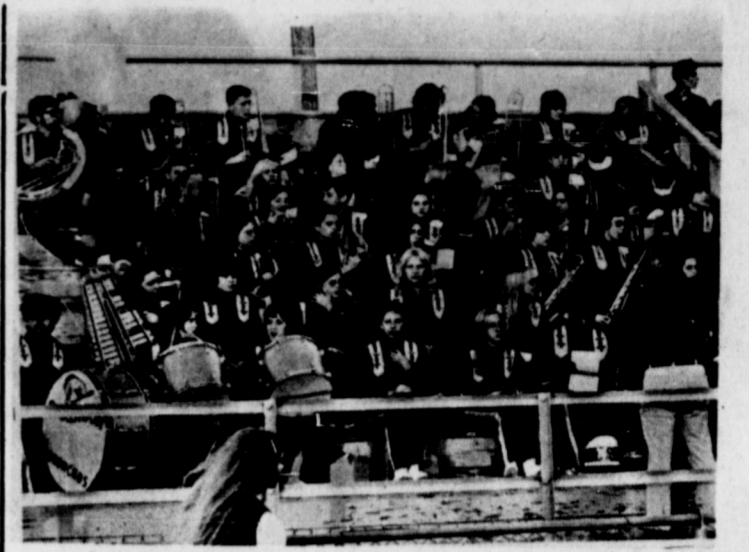

## NEWS FROM Congressman Bob Price 13th District, Texas

"The Internal Revenue Service has seriously threatened the cattle industry by the proposed disallowance of prepaid feed as a business deduction. For example, if feed is bought and paid for in one year but not consumed until the following year, it cannot be deducted until it is consumed," commented Representative Bob Price (R-Texas) after attending a meeting with Members of Congress and cattle industry representatives on Capitol Hill today.

The action came in the form of a "memorandum of technical advice" from the Washington Office of the IRS to its District Director in Dallas, Texas, and concerned limited partnerships operated by Western Beef Cattle Fund, Inc., of Amarillo, Texas.

Price further added that, "prepaid feed, bought and deducted in one year but not used until the following year, has been an issue for many years. But in most cases, the courts have refused to support the IRS action."

To cite a recent case, as brought out in an article appearing in the Wall Street Journal, "an Iowa farmer gave a feed dealer a check for \$20,731 on December 31 one year as payment for feed until the following year. He deducted the payment for the year he made it, but the IRS balked.

It ruled the outlay wasn't a current expense but rather a deposit on a later purchase, and thus wasn't deductible until the farmer received and used the feed. The tax agency noted the dealer retained title to the feed until well into the following year. A United States Appeals Court, however, recently gave the farmer his deduction for the year he had taken it. The court pointed out that he paid the money under a binding contract to purchase feed. It asserted the law doesn't require that a buyer acquire title to a commodity before he can deduct his payment for it.

A contrary statement some time ago by the IRS's Los Angeles District Director, though it didn't figure directly in the Iowa case, was assailed by the appeals court. The IRS official's statement the court said, is "wholly untenable."

Representative Price also indicated that the Treasury Department submitted similar proposals to the House Ways and Means Committee last spring. But, cattlemen were told that any change in the tax laws would not become effective until such proposals were enacted by the Congress. "It would appear," the Congressman added, "that the IRS is taking over the prerogative of the Congress by this action."

"As a result of the increase in price of feeder cattle and feed grains during the last twelve months," Price said, "it will require an additional \$100 million of equity capital plus about \$300 million of borrowed capital just to maintain cattle production in the state of Texas at the same level as a year ago. In addition, the consumer wants the cattle industry to increase beef supplies!"

"The cattleman has to look to the investment community for equity capital and this action by the IRS will seriously curtail that source of funds," Price continued. "The cattle industry must have a constant flow of new capital just as other industries. Beef production will not expand at the rate of consumer demand if the recent action by the Internal Revenue Service is allowed to stand," Price concluded.

## Commission Approves 2nd Split Dove Hunt

A second experimental split mourning dove season was set in a July 12 meeting of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Commission.

The commissioners acted on the recommendations of the department staff for a fall North Zone season of Sept. 1 — Oct. 14, 1973; and a fall South Zone season of Sept. 22 — Nov. 4, 1973.

The winter hunting season in both zones is slated to run Jan. 5 - 20, 1974, with the exception of the Trans-Pecos Regulatory District where the winter season will be Jan. 5-15, 1974.

In those counties of the South Zone which have white-winged dove hunting, the mourning dove season will be concurrent with the Sept. 1 - 2, Sept. 8 - 9 whitewing season with additional mourning dove hunting Sept. 22 - Oct. 31, 1973.

Bag and possession limits on both mourning and whitewing doves remain the same as they were last year — 10 and 20 re-

spectively. Hunting hours for both species of doves are noon to sunset. Originally, the split mourning dove season was proposed as a one-year experiment to evaluate the effects of winter hunting on dove populations and harvest.

The commission approved a second year for the experimental split season because inclement weather across most of Texas in the January segment curtailed hunting.

Some 91 percent of the 7.1 million doves harvested last year were taken during the fall portion of the season.

#### SUMMARY OF PROPOSED SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

#### NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 9 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days;

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session;

Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

#### NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person who meets the other requirements of homestead property; and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person who meets the other requirements of homestead property; and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

#### NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

#### NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioner's court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

#### NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

#### NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million;

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who served after September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam to be eligible

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#### NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, and transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals."

#### NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)

Article XI of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a) which:

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and villages.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

#### NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply cooperative."

When shopping for shoulder pads, select lightweight ones for a soft, fluid line rather than a rigid, raised shoulder.

"If too thick, pads distort a garment's natural shape", Mrs. Simmons explained.

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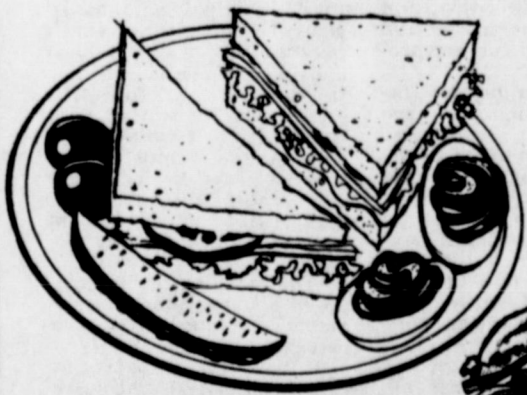
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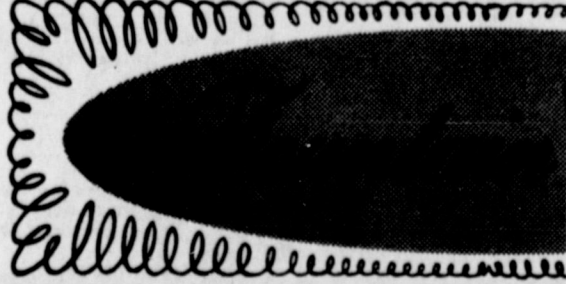

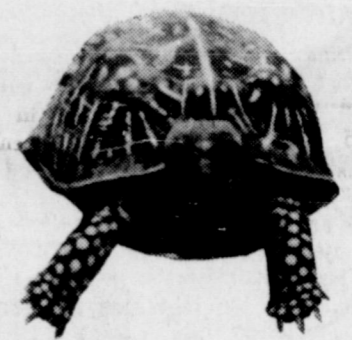

### Knowledge Of Salvation

First United Methodist Church

Road Romans 10:8-15

Knowledge — or assurance, if you please — of forgiveness and the experience of the joy of salvation is set forth by Paul in these few verses of his letter to the Church at Rome. There are five steps involved, let's briefly look at them, but for the fuller significance of them, you will need to study them in greater detail yourself.

First: Acknowledge your own

sinfulness (vs. 9), "If you will confess with thy mouth." We must be willing to admit our imperfection before God and man at the altar of the Church. To fail to do so is to bring about rejection — there are no Christians secretly. Discipleship that glorifies God in Christ Jesus must be lived openly; sometimes daringly. The first step must be confession.

Second, Accept in our hearts the forgiveness God offers (vs. 9b) — "Believe in your heart that God has raised him from the dead, and you shall be saved." This requires faith and trust that knowledge, reason, experience affirms beyond the reaches of logic that God was in Christ Jesus — the Divine humanized

before us. Third, We must decide whom it is that we shall bow ourselves down before — God or mammon. Jesus said that whatever we ask believing it shall be granted if we invoke his name before the Father. Salvation also comes by the name of Jesus as we call upon the Lord knowing our own unrighteousness and his forgiveness, and by being aware that there is no other name on earth whereby we may receive the gift of salvation.

Therefore, the fourth step is to believe in him upon whom we call. Trust is essential; the step of faith is that firm ground will be beneath us when we step out into the abyss of faith and hope, believing all the while that his

arms are beneath us and will bear us up at all times.

Finally, an essential step is to hear the word from the messengers God has sent forth (vs. 14, 15). Hear them gladly, repentantly, devotedly, and obediently. God sets his light continually in our midst veiled in human frailty. However, this truth always shines forth to those who are in the house of the Lord on the Sabbath day and who are caught up into the Spirit of the Lord.

May these words of Paul help you acquire the assurance you seek of salvation in your life. Grace and peace in Christ Jesus. THINK ON THIS: Christianity is not a voice in the wilderness but a life in the World.

### Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State Capitol

New legislative sub-committee investigations of the amusement and vending machine industry have been ordered amid sensational (and disputed) allegations resulting from a 1968 probe.

Speaker Price Daniel Jr. named Rep. Arthur (Buddy) Temple of Diboll to head a House Consumer Affairs sub-panel inquiry into juke box operations and needed legislation in the field.

The sub-committee was instructed to work jointly with a Senate group headed by Sen. Ron Clower of Garland. Clower said his sub-committee will look into allegations the industry is linked to organized crime and that the regulatory state Amusement Machine Commission is dominated by big operators who do not protect customers.

Daniel said the air should be cleared of speculation, controversy and innuendo which have surrounded operation of the industry for years.

Meanwhile, Daniel unveiled some of the previously-secret records of a 1968 House investigation. Most controversial was a tape recording of testimony by Pete Martinez of Austin that he gave money to a state representative, a state senator (who is now dead) and a judge, on behalf of Raymond B. Williams of Dallas, a major amusement machine owner who previously served on the regulatory commission.

Williams has denied Martinez's testimony. Department of Public Safety Director Wilson E. Speir said Martinez, now serving a probated sentence for burglary, failed to satisfy a lie detector test that he was telling the truth and that he refused to repeat his charges to a district attorney or grand jury.

AID FOR RUNAWAYS — An experimental hot line for runaway youths to send word to their families is being installed through leadership of Gov. Dolph Briscoe and with cooperation of the telephone company and its employees.

Briscoe announced the facility, which he termed "Operation Peace - of - mind," will be manned by volunteers for 30 days. The initial Houston office

will have two statewide inbound Wide Area Telephone Service (WATS) lines, one national WATS line and three local lines in the city.

The Governor said the network will transmit messages from the runaways to their parents and friends and is not intended to "inform" on them. Volunteers will also tell the youthful wanderers where they can receive assistance anywhere in the state.

Number of the state WATS line is 1-800-392-3352. The national WATS number is 1-800-231-6946. SALES TAX BONDS REQUIRED — Businessmen delinquent in payment of sales taxes they collect from customers must post bonds ranging from \$100 to \$50,000 after January 1.

Failure to put up the required bond (based on volume of business) and pay delinquent taxes may result in court action to close a business.

Fred Russ, director of the State Comptroller's Tax Division, estimated \$35 million in state and \$7 million in local sales taxes are delinquent for the period which began in 1961. Much of this total is due to business failure.

Russ predicted \$3 million to \$4 million will be produced by the new bonding law from businessmen who are now delinquent.

Under the new law, a bond will be required of all new businesses for a two-year period. If there are no delinquencies, the requirements will be dropped. Discounts will be allowed for timely payments to the state of taxes collected and pre-payments.

BRISCOE LIKES IT HERE— Governor Briscoe says he likes his job and has given no thought to quitting after a single term.

While he said he is not ready to make a formal announcement, the Governor didn't leave much room for doubt that he will seek a second term in 1974. "I have enjoyed this job," said Briscoe. "I haven't thought about leaving."

While he was at it, Briscoe said he sees no reason to change his mind about not calling a special legislative session. He stated flatly he does not see one as needed for any purpose.

COLLEGE BOND REQUIREMENTS REVIEWED — The Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System looked over proposed rules and regulations by which three Texas schools may issue tuition-backed bonds to construct new facilities.

Action is expected to be taken on the rules and on tuition equalization grant procedures at a September 28 meeting in Dallas. The 63rd Legislature authorized the University of Houston to issue up to \$40 million in tuition bonds for its Clear Lake Campus, Texas A&M University a maximum of \$7.5 million for Texas Maritime Academy and Moody College of Marine Sciences and Maritime Resources and Pan American University, Edinburg, a maximum of \$10 million.

Schools must provide estimates of enrollment gross tuition revenues and total cost of proposed construction projects.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. John Hill ruled state game and fish funds may be used to erect artificial reefs on submerged lands of the continental shelf seaward of three marine league limits.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

An automatic, unmanned bank teller machine operating 24 hours a day seven days a week does not violate bank holiday laws.

Proposed plans for a Rapid Transit Authority must be furnished to the Governor's Interagency Transportation Council by the governing body of the principal city rather than by the authority governing body.

Funds contributed to an optional retirement fund by a college employee vest after one year of participation, regardless of whether the employee has been working for more than one institution. The employing college in such case has no right to obtain a refund of the state's matching portion.

APPOINTMENTS — Mrs. Jess Hay of Dallas, Harold Herndon of San Antonio and Tony Bonilla of Corpus Christi were appointed by the Governor to the Coordinating Board. Reappointed were O. H. Elliott of Austin, Dr. George V. Brindley Jr. of Temple and Fred Moore of Austin.

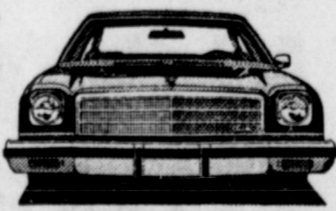

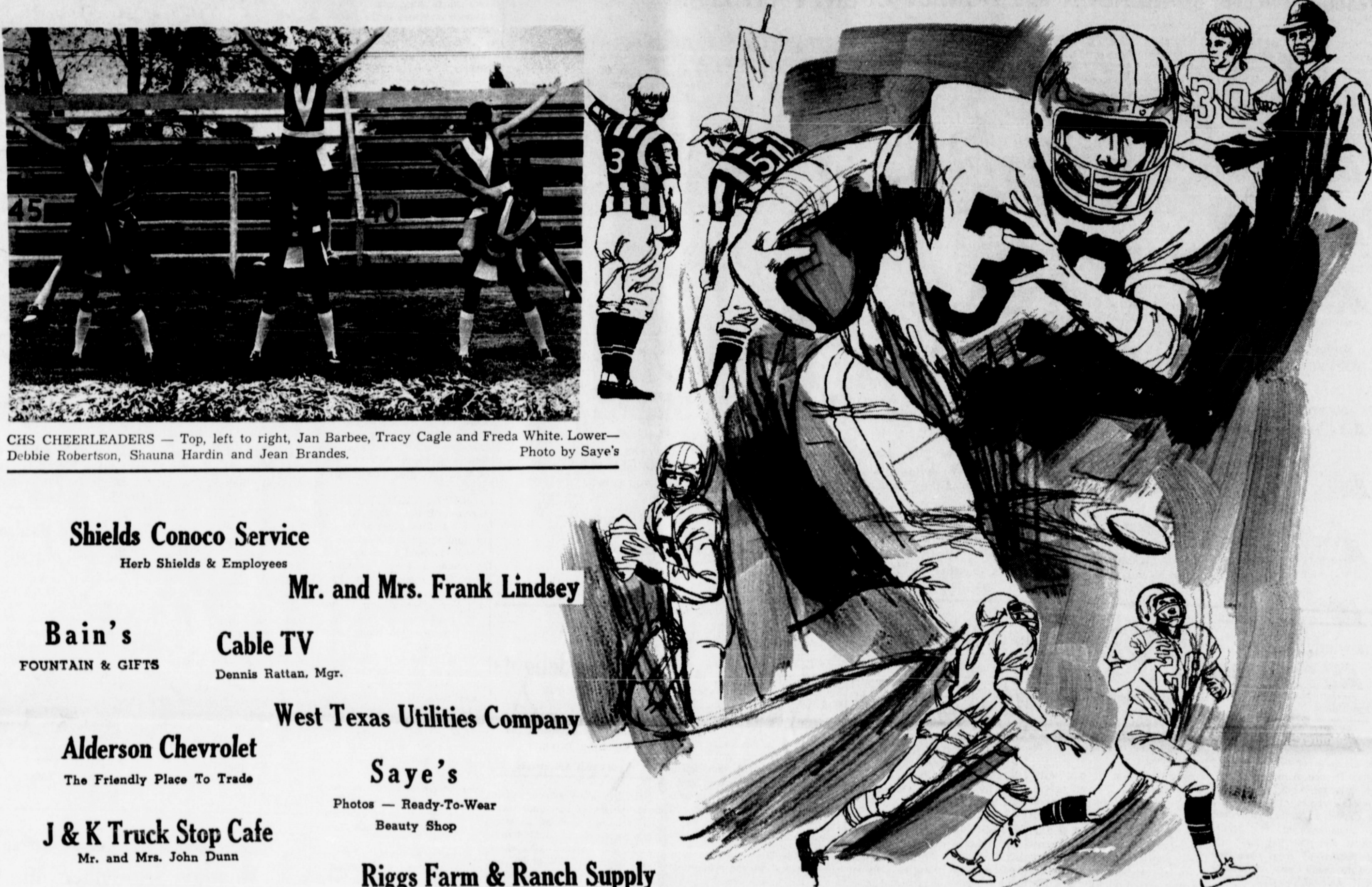

### Local Scouts Plan To Attend Atomic Energy Seminar

Fourteen local Boy Scouts have signed up to attend the Atomic Energy Merit Badge Seminar which will be held on four Saturdays, October 13, 20, 27, and November 3. At the present time four cars are planned to take the group.

The Seminar is open to both Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. Deadline for registering to attend is October 5, 1973. Sessions will be conducted at Tascosa High School in Amarillo.

After successfully completing the merit badge requirements, Scouts will be given the opportunity to take a field trip to both Kirtland Air Force Base East, Albuquerque, New Mexico and the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory, Los Alamos, New Mexico November 9-10. An overnight stop will be made at Kirtland Air Force Base and a tour of the Sandia Laboratories facilities there. Following will be a visit to the Atomic Museum at Los Alamos.

The seminar will be under the supervision of Pantex Plant (Mason & Hanger - Silas Company, Inc.) Sandia Laboratories, Atomic Energy Commission, Amarillo Area Office). Some of the participants are putting together the program.

The four planned sessions will cover Atomic History, Detection of Radiation, Reactors and Radioactive Isotopes. Films, transparencies, demonstrations, patrol size lab session, and brochures and booklets will be used. As part of their lab work, Scouts will actually work with cloud chambers, electroscopes, Geiger counters, model reactors and other test apparatus. All lab work will be under the direction of atomic scientists, engineers and technicians.

### An Interview With An Ex-Convict, Fri.

By PAT ROBERTSON

Jack Brown is probably one of the most interesting people in the world to talk to. A one time convict and drug addict, Jack Brown now spends his time traveling and talking to High school and Jr. High youth throughout the world. In an interview with Mr. Brown Friday afternoon, he told a little about his life.

In the last 12 years he has spoken to over 5 million 300 thousand youths; and "that's only in the schools," he says. During the same period of time he has also had the privilege of speaking at over 2900 churches throughout the world. Those are pretty astounding facts considering that at one time, "I was spending \$2,000 a week on drugs when I was busted in California. I was down so low that they were using me and several other convicts and some monks for drug experiments to see how much dope a man could take before he died after he got off of it; one of the monks and I were the only ones out of the whole bunch that lived."

Brown has spent more time in prisons than most people have on their jobs. Some of these prisons include San Quentin, Folsom, McAlister, and Alcatraz to name only a few. At one time, Brown was pronounced incurable as a drug addict. He has also known many famous convicts during his stay in prison. These include the Birdman of Alcatraz, "Machine Gun" Kelly, Bonnie and Clyde, Al Capone, and many others. He calls "Machine Gun" Kelly George because they were good friends. He says about Kelly, "During the time I knew him he was well educated, read all of the books in the prison library, he was very smart, and he was a refined human being." He also says about Al Capone, "I watched Al Capone turn from the tough gangster he was to a blubbing fool who didn't even know his name." (Capone had spinal syphilis which was finally the cause of death).

Brown knew Bonnie and Clyde even before they knew each other because they all grew up on the same side of town in Dallas. Brown says that the Hollywood version of Bonnie and Clyde is all wrong. "If they told the truth about those two, nobody would believe it. Their plight didn't last as long as you might think - 12 or 13 months at the most. Clyde was a homosexual and Bonnie was evidently out to get even with some man for something he had done to her. She was the one who did most of the killing. They were just a couple of scared kids. They wouldn't have lasted as long as they did if they hadn't driven night and day to escape the law." Brown also has many other stories which are astounding like the time in one knife fight when he was stitched up by convicts who took over 272 stitches.

Brown is married to a former "Miss Texas" and during the whole time he was in and out of prison, she held their home together. It was she and her youngest daughter who finally brought Brown to Christ and he has been traveling and talking to youth ever since to try to encourage them to live the right kind of lives. Brown says he was "saved by the Grace of God." He has several books out as well as some records and tapes. He was once played by Frank Sinatra in the movie "The Man With the Golden Arm" which is the story of Brown's life. As

one person so aptly put it, "this man is everything you hear about him and more." There is one word which describes Jack Brown - "Amazing!"

### Colts Lose To White Deer Thursday Night

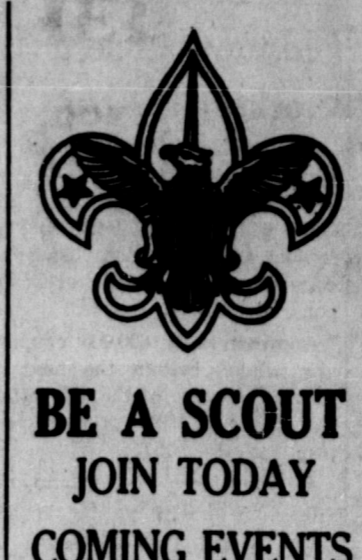

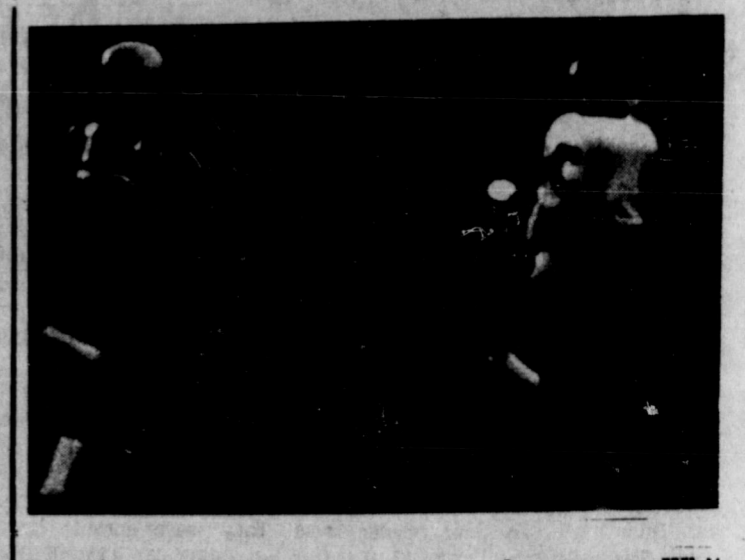
### W. Avis Rhodes Dies Mon., Rites Pending
