# Qualified voters of Donley

County will have another opportunity to exercise their right to vote this coming Saturday, April 11th. A familiar question being asked is "What are we voting on this week." The issue to be decided in the county-wide election Saturday is whether bonds of Donley County shall be issued in the amount of

\$100,000 bearing interest at a num and maturing not to exceed 20 years; and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in said county sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity.

The proceeds from the sale of said bonds are to be expended primarily for the purchase of right-of-way from the easterly city limits of Clarendon to the Donley-Hall County line along U.S. Highway 287.

A two-thirds majority vote is necessary for the issue to carry which means that every qualified voter, whether for or against the issue, should make an effort to cast their ballot. Voting places will be set up as in a general election.

It has been explained that it will cost taxpayers less in the long run to vote the bonds than to raise property valuations and issue warrants to purchase the right-of-way on 287. It is understood that the Highway Department is ready and waiting to go ahead with the four lane project to the east county line.
