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Sixteen Candidates Now In Race For Five City Alderman Places

According to the last tally Wednesday morning, 16 candidates have either signed up or have been petitioned for the Alderman election to be held Tuesday, May 12.

The petition bearing the names of 13 candidates filed last week was withdrawn Monday after it was learned a recent change had been made in election laws which now states: Article 13.53 Election Code — Petition must be signed by 5 percent of votes cast in last Mayors election or 25 signatures and only the number of candidates to be listed on the petition as the total number of offices to be filled which is five in this case. The election code also states that candidates may file up until 30 days prior to election date.

Any person qualified can still file for alderman through Saturday of this week, April 11th.

The five candidates by petition are B. L. (Mutt) Graham, A. R. Henson, Jerry Hawkins, Joe Lovell, and B. J. Land. Land withdrew his name as a candidate Wednesday morning. As we were going to press we were notified that Joe Lovell had withdrawn his name also.

Tech Librarian To Speak At Program

In connection with the observance of National Library Week, April 12-18, the Library Faculty Committee of Clarendon Junior College will present Ray C. Janeway as the main speaker at an assembly next Wednesday (April 15) afternoon at 2 o'clock in the college auditorium.

Mr. Janeway is well known throughout the library profession for his never tiring efforts in library administration from the local to national level. He has served as president of the Texas Library Association and last year was given the Association's highest honor being selected Texas Librarian of the Year by the membership.

A graduate of the University of Kansas, Janeway received his library science degree from the University of Illinois. He has served as librarian at Bradley University and the University of Illinois before coming to Texas Tech in 1948. The new three-million dollar library at Tech is one of his most recent accomplishments.

A reception will be held in his honor following the assembly in the library. The public is invited to both the program and reception.

Special recognition will be given during the program to persons who have given books and library materials to the library during the current book drive. Only 267 more books are needed to reach the goal set last fall when the drive began.

Fedric, McAnear And Schollenbarger New Trustees And Regent

A total of 552 votes were cast in the school trustee election last Saturday which was considered a fairly normal vote for this type of election.

In the trustee election for the Clarendon Independent School District, Steve Fedric led the ballot with 401 votes, James McAnear followed with 387 votes and Bill G. Thornberry received 186. Bill Craft received 84 write-in votes and five other persons received 1 and 2 votes each. Fedric and McAnear were the two trustees elected to take the place of Hershel Heath and Joe Robinson who did not choose to run again.

In the college regent election 508 votes were cast. R. E. Drennan received 420 votes, Delbert Robertson 402, George Schollenbarger 362 and Bud Hermesmyer 127. Ten other people received from 1 to 4 write-in votes. Drennan, Robertson and Schollenbarger are the three regents elected.

In the county school board election, W. H. McDonald, Precinct 1, received 21 votes.

Family Hears From Son Living In Alaska

Mr. and Mrs. Joe J. Jones who live on West 4th Street in Clarendon have received a letter from their son, Stanley Jones, who lives 20 miles east of Homer, Alaska. Homer is some 250 miles from Anchorage and 110 miles from Seward. Stanley has some land in Alaska. Following is the letter telling of the recent earthquake in the area. March 28, 1964 Homer, Alaska

Hello,
Well, I guess you folks are wondering about this bunch since we had the earthquake. We are all present and accounted for. Boy, that was quite a shaker. It hit here about ten minutes until six on Friday evening. I was down on the back side of the place chopping the ice out of the cows watering hole, and had just finished and was on my way to the house.

When I noticed the trees, I thought the wind was getting up. Then all of a sudden I realized that it was not the wind, but an earthquake. I was in the trees and it looked as if the trees were all going to fall so I ran out into an opening, and by that time it was shaking so hard that I couldn't keep my balance. I stopped and was trying to stay on my feet, but in spite of all I could do, I fell twice. It looked as if the trees were going to all shake to the ground. I had the feeling that I was standing up in a boat in real rough water and the boat was moving in every direction as well as up and down. The most noticeable sound was the ground cracking and the tree roots breaking.

The cattle stampeded and they were having trouble running because they couldn't stay on their feet.

My biggest concern was Nelda and the kids. I was afraid the house had fallen on them. After about two minutes it calmed down enough for me to start toward the house although I was staggering like a drunk man. I managed to keep going. When I came in sight of the barn I saw it was still standing and I felt better for I was sure the barn would go before the house. I found Nelda and the kids scared to death. They had run out into the yard and held to one another to stand up. The house was in a heck of a mess. Apparently there was no damage done to the house itself but every thing inside was a shamble. All of the medicines in the medicine cabinet, all of the books on the shelves, every thing that wasn't tied down was all mixed on the floor along with water and broken medicine bottles. Such a mess you never saw. The cook stove was turned crooked and I had the tractor parked in the garage. It was turned crossways in the door. It couldn't have rolled around in the shape it was in. It was just shuffled around.

The towns that were hit the hardest were Kodiak, Valdize, Cordovia, Seward and Anchorage, with Anchorage being hit the hardest. J. C. Pennies, along with many other business places, was completely demolished. Many

big nice homes sluffed off into the inlet and in several places the streets, for a distance of several blocks, fell in, some dropping in as much as 30 ft. Power is off, water lines and sewer lines are broken and run together. Communication was cut off for a long time but the radio stations are working now. Several thousand feet of the runways at the airport are ripped out. Highways are damaged until the traffic is at a standstill.

I don't know what the casualties are yet. Chances are that you folks are hearing as much as we are about it. Here at home "the big shake" lasted for approximately five minutes, but light tremors are still being felt 27 hours later. It will be many months before all the damage can be estimated. But Governor Egan roughly estimated the damage in Anchorage alone would run well over \$250,000,000.

Well, I will close. This will let you folks know that we are ok. Love to all,

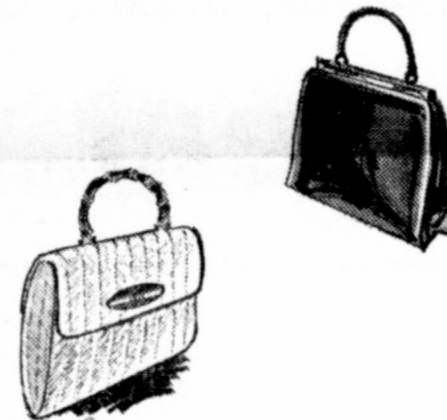
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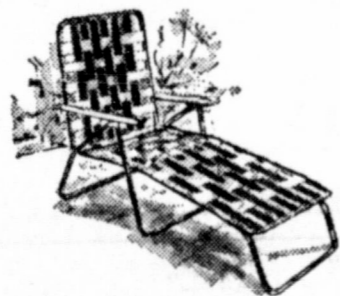
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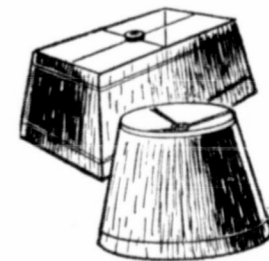
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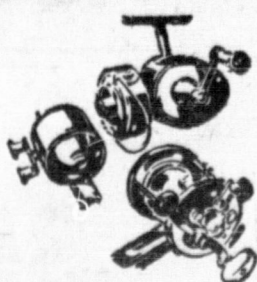
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Martin In High Court Race

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE 7th SUPREME JUDICIAL DISTRICT:

I ask you to elect me Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo. I make this request in the knowledge that the best interest of the Court and of the citizens of the district requires a change in the personnel of this Court.

I am a graduate of Lubbock High School and hold an LL.B. degree from the University of Texas School of Law. I have been actively engaged in the practice

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of law 29 years — 22 years in Lamb County and the South Plains area and 7 years in Amarillo and the Panhandle area. By diligence and loyalty to my clients' interest, I have built an excellent law practice in both areas. My clients and my record in the Courts of this District are my best recommendations. I also served on the Court of Civil Appeals and as Associate Justice wrote 176 opinions of which less than 7% were reversed. These opinions reflect the character of my judicial ability.

The Court of Civil Appeals is composed of a Chief Justice, a Senior Associate and a Junior Associate Justice. The Chief Justice and Junior Associate of the Court, no matter how diligent and capable, cannot carry the case work required of the Court if the other Associate devotes a large portion of his time to outside diversions. I served on this Court until December 31, 1956, and the docket was in good condition during that time. The Docket of the Court was not only kept up to date but the Court disposed of many cases transferred to the Amarillo Court from the Dallas Court of Civil Appeals. Although the number of cases before the Court have not increased, this condition no longer exists. Instead other Courts are having to assist the Amarillo Court — thirteen cases were transferred from the Amarillo Court to the Waco Court of Civil Appeals on January 11, 1964.

More important than the mere number of cases disposed of by the Court is the type of justice under the law as reflected by the Court's opinions. In 1956, while I was on the Court, the majority of the Court, the then Chief Justice and my present opponent as the other Associate Justice, wrote an opinion styled "Stanley v. Stanley, 294 S. W. 2d, Page 132". This case reflects that a 40-year-old career army sergeant married a former school teacher who

had been successful in the finance business. The sergeant contributed nothing to the marriage but, the undisputed record discloses, in six years squandered \$84,044.63 of the profits earned by his wife's business. He also squandered \$41,911.13 of the wife's capital investment. On dissolution of the marriage, it was the sergeant's theory the wife had mingled her earnings, as community property, with her separate capital and through such commingling of her earnings with her separate capital, he was entitled to one-half of all remaining property owned by his wife. In the judgment of divorce, the trial court awarded the sergeant an additional sum of \$29,881.89.

The widow appealed from the trial court's judgment and on appeal the Chief Justice and the other Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, such Associate being now a candidate for election to the Court, agreed with the sergeant's theory and affirmed the judgment of the trial court awarding him the additional sum of \$29,881.89. This opinion of the majority of the Court was directly contrary to the undisputed audit of a Certified Public Accountant who traced all funds and proved that all the wife's earnings had been squandered by the sergeant and a large part of her original capital and that her earnings were not mingled with her capital. As an Associate Justice of the Court, based on this audit and the applicable law, I wrote a dissenting opinion holding that the sergeant was only entitled to his equity in a 1955 Station Wagon for which he had traded an old Station Wagon owned by him at the time of the marriage.

Other similar and equally inequitable opinions were rendered by the Court acting as a majority and on which I dissented, but the above opinion is discussed here because the same reflects clearly and unequivocally the

opposite points of view on the duty of the Court as held by me and my opponent for Associate Justice. The most essential element of every judgment of the Court of Civil Appeals should be justice under the law and facts. If the citizens of this district will take a few minutes' time to go to a lawyer's office and read the Stanley opinion, I am confident I will be elected to the Court of Civil Appeals by an overwhelming majority vote.

As a member of such Court, I never have and I never shall subscribe to the proposition that justice under the law and a citizen's property rights should be bartered for political favors. No Court judgment should dissipate an elderly person's savings of a lifetime where the basis of such judgment is a strained and superficial ruling under a highly technical theory not supported by the evidence. The personal rights of every citizen and the property rights of every citizen have always been a sacred trust of the Courts. This essential and vital element of our judicial system should not be lightly cast aside in order to favor a friend or political supporter. I am certain the present members of the Court with whom I would serve subscribe to the principles herein set forth.

I ask every citizen to support me on the principles enunciated herein. I particularly ask every client whom I have ever represented to give me in the coming campaign the same untiring loyalty and effort toward my interests that I have exhibited over the many years of my practice for their interests. I pledge to every citizen that their rights and property shall be secure under the law. It shall be my constant endeavor to write opinions of the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals that shall be based soundly upon the law and the facts and shall reflect credit and

honor upon such Court.

We have been notified that due to the continued drought conditions, the emergency grazing for soil bank land has been extended until April 30. Before any soil bank land can be grazed, however, prior approval must be given by the County Committee. The proper forms to sign are available at the Donley County ASCS Office.

Barley

We would like to remind anyone who is participating in the feed grain program and who has barley seeded that barley is a part of the feed grain base and we will have to measure it. Please notify the office as soon as possible if you do have any planted so that it can be measured.

Wheat Measurements

All field measurements for wheat have been completed and we will be through with office computations very soon. Notices will be mailed just as soon as each farm measurements are completed. If you are planning to stay within the 1964 wheat allotment, all excess must be plowed up and reported to this office by May 1.

New Farm Bill

Several producers have been inquiring about the farm bill, which is now pending action in Washington. We understand that the bill will be acted upon April 8. If the bill is passed, we will be getting the provisions of the program shortly thereafter. We in turn will pass the information on to you immediately. As of

now, however, we know nothing at all about the program.

Should the bill pass, be sure to watch your newsletters, special newsletters and this paper for the details because this is very important to you.
