BETTY CROCKER AWARD WINNER

Miss T-Rose Stepp is the Clarendon school's 1964 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. She achieved the highest score here in a written knowledge and attitude examination given Dec. 3, 1963. General Mills, Inc., sponsor of the program, will award her a "Homemaker of Tomorrow" pin to signify her achievement, and her test paper will be entered in competition for state honors.

The state Homemaker of Tomorrow will be awarded a \$1,500 college scholarship and will be named a national finalist. Her school will be presented with a set of Encyclopaedia Britannica, awarded by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc. The state's second ranking girl will receive a \$500 scholarship.

In the spring, state Homemakers of Tomorrow, each accompanied by a school advisor, will enjoy an expense-paid educational tour to Colonial Williamsburg, Va., Washington, D.C., and New York City. The trip will be climaxed with the naming of the 1964 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

She will be chosen on the basis of her original test score together with personal observation and interviews during the trip. Her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000. National runners-up will receive \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 scholarships, respectively.

All-time highs in the number of senior high school girls and schools enrolled marked this, the tenth annual Betty Crocker Search program. More than 484,000 girls in 14,000 of the nation's schools participated. Since the program was launched, more than three and a half million girls have participated and scholarships approximating one million dollars have been awarded.

HEATLY ANNOUNCES FOR REPRESENTATIVE

Representative W. S. (Bill) Heatly of Paducah has authorized The Donley County Leader to make his formal announcement as a candidate for re-election as Representative from the 82nd Legislative District...

In announcing his candidacy, Mr. Heatly made the following statement:

In ten years service in the Legislature, I have acted on the theory that my primary responsibility was to represent the views and interests of the people of my district and to act as their spokesman in their dealings with the State government.

One of the issues which always arises in my campaigns involves my attitude toward various organized business and professional groups. In this connection I think it is fair to state that such

In addition, the State government, functioning through approximately 150 commissions, boards and other agencies, is ably represented by people employed for that purpose. These agencies have the responsibility of collecting taxes, making regulations governing business and professional activities, and making arrests under certain conditions.

My service to the individual citizen includes obtaining for persons in need of special card admission to hospitals and special schools maintained by the State. During my ten years in the Legislature I have handled hundreds of applications of this nature.

Of importance to citizens of the 82nd District is the fact that three of the five terms I have served in the House I have been honored with the chairmanship of an important committee. I am particularly proud of the fact that I have headed the House Appropriations Committee in two sessions, a distinction enjoyed by only one previous House member.

It is my feeling that counties in the 82nd District represent a fair cross-section of the interests and needs of the entire state. Consequently, in representing interests of the people in my district, I feel I am doing a good job for all of Texas.

Of special importance, because it will be discussed in this campaign, is my record of sponsoring increased appropriations for all branches of education. Appropriations by the 58th Legislature for education represented marked increases over appropriations for the previous biennium. The in-

crease in my appropriations bill for higher education was \$63,867,687. This represented an increase of 29% and the increase for public schools was \$103,950,952, making a total increase in the field of education of \$167,818,619.

But I also believe that none of these is entitled to special privileges or favors, particularly in such matters as taxation. For example, I believe workers have a right to organize a union to promote their interests, but I also believe that no individual should be compelled to join a union or to contribute to a campaign fund or any political party or candidate in order to hold a job in Texas.

These examples illustrate my philosophy of government, but naturally my views do not always suit representatives of special interests which seek or already enjoy special favors. One of the results is that in my races for re-election I have had well-financed and well-organized opposition, particularly from representatives of the beer industry, with help from certain other organized groups.

I appreciate the fine support I received in Donley County two years ago. I hope my service has been satisfactory and that I may have the support of the people in Donley County in the coming election.

It is impossible to discuss in detail all of the matters I would like to mention. I would just say, however, that my record shows that I have consistently represented my people in this area by assisting the farmer, students with part-time jobs in college, the elderly people who have had problems with the Welfare Department and other individuals who have dealings with State agencies.

I was born on a farm near Mart, Texas, attended public schools there and later attended Decatur Baptist College. After graduation there I entered Baylor University, receiving a BA and LLB degree in 1936. I married Jonnie Green Hawkins of Wichita Falls. We have three sons, Gene and Bill, who are presently attending Baylor University and Stan, who is presently attending Schreiner Institute.

I am also engaged in the practice of law and the farming and ranching business in Cottle and Dickens Counties.

Wheat Measuring

Mr. C. H. Long is again working with us this year and has started measuring wheat. He needs the assistance of the farmer to help make these measurements and identify the fields or plots of each small grain so the wheat acreages can be properly classified.

This year we will measure only those farms for which a card is returned to our office indicating that the producer wants price support on his wheat or measurements made for history purposes.

1964 Cotton Acreage

March 4, 1964, is the final date for a farmer to release any unwanted cotton acreage that will not be planted.

Farmers who desire to have their cotton acreage premeasured before planting time may file an application for this service and pay the estimated cost anytime before April 3, 1964.

1964 Feed Grain

The feed grain sign-up is well under way in our county. If you haven't been in to let us talk with you about the possibilities of the program as they concern your farm, please do so.

Expired Soil Bank Land

Farmers who had Soil Bank Contracts to expire on December 31, 1963, are reminded that if the permanent cover on this land is maintained it will preserve the cropland classification as well as

history acreage for allotment crops for a length of time equal to the period of the Conservation Reserve Contract.
