## **Water Development Board Grants** Loan For Green Belt Dam Project

The Texas Water Development Board at its hearings in Austin Mrs. Blanche C. Davis last week, by unanimous vote of its members, voted to loan the Expires Sunday In \$8,200,000 sought by the Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Oklahoma City Water Authority to construct the project.

On a separate proposal, the Texas Water Development Board gave final approval for the State passed of Texas to acquire \$2,100,000 in water conservation storage, which the Green Belt Authority can purchase back at a future date when the need arises.

Bill Lowe, attorney for the Green Belt Authority, presented the case and application to the Water Development Board.

The Collingsworth County Water District and attorneys representing the Lewis estate each filed protests to the hearings.

Bill Lowe stated that under the State law, the action of the Texas Water Development Board cannot be appealed. However. the action of the Texas Water Commission, which has charge of the water permits and feasibility of the project, can be appealed within 120 days to the District Court in Austin

Bill Lowe further stated that the Green Belt reservoir is the very first project in which the State of Texas is participating in water conservation storage under the new Constitutional Amendent. Rules and regulations to edings apparently are being formulated in this

The State participation in the water conservation storage is not a grant from the State of Texas. Some of the grounds of contest are as follows: (1) The purported Board of Regents of Clarendon Junior College District and of Clarendon Junior College had no legal right, power or authority to order or call such election. (11) Illegal and unqualified voters voting in the election in favor of the proposition submitted are in such numbers that when subtracted from the total number of votes tabulated for the election were sufficient to change the results of the election and that when the legal votes of those legally qualified to vote, if there be any legal votes, are counted and tabulated and the votes of those not qualified to vote are thrown out the results of the election would be that the election failed to carry. (14) The qualified voters voting in such purported election, who voted against the proposition submitted, were in excess of the qualified voters who voted in such purported election for the proposition submitted.

(V) Contestant-plaintiff alleges that for each and all of the above reasons, and several pages of other reasons not stated above the purported action purportedly calling such purported election, he purported election, the purorted action purportedly canvassing the results of the purported election and purportedly declaring the results of the purported election, and all actions and matters pertaining to such purported election, are void and of no force and effect and are legal nullities. 


