Coach Walker Pleased With Turnout Of Prospects For Broncho Squad

Picked by Texas Football magazine to finish fourth in District 2-A this season, the Clarendon Bronchos hit the gridiron trail this week and opened nearly three weeks of practice before their first game on September 3. The Bronchos, under head coach Jeff Walker, have eight returning lettermen and five regulars from last season to form a well-balanced eleven.

Under senior quarterback and junior fullback Archie Smith, the Bronchos have two players that may develop into all-star material before the season is finished.

One of the big changes in Walker's plans for the coming season is the moving of defensive specialist Odell Louis over to tailback on the offensive team.

The young coach hopes to come up with an improved defense and a sharply defined passing game over last season.

The first workout was held Monday morning and a twice-a-day schedule will continue until the first day of school. A scrimmage, with Lefors, has been scheduled for Broncho Stadium on Friday, August 27.

A total of 41 players reported for the first workouts. As the practice sessions continue, Walker will split the two teams into two organizations, varsity and B teams. "We don't know which boys will be moved up to the varsity at this time," Walker said after Wednesday morning's workouts. "A decision will probably be made after our scrimmage with Lefors."

Returning lettermen are Mooring, Smith, Louis, guard Mike Horton, tailback Larnce Gardner, wingback Mac McClellan, end Richard Thornberry and center Bill Monk.

Horton and Thornberry are expected to be the anormen in the line for the Bronchos.

Texas Football, the annual publication of the prospects of schoolboy teams in the state, picked White Deer to capture the District 2-A title this year. The magazine also felt the Bucks would reach the state finals in 19 weeks. The second place choice went to the Canadian Wildcats, and picked to finish third in the race was Wellington. Clarendon, Canadian and Wellington were given a chance to upend the Bucks for the district title.

"A lot is going to depend on our chances this year," Walker said. "We are going to need a great deal of leadership out of



SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

PARALLEL TERRACES

Do you plan to construct terraces on your cropland after crops are harvested? If so, now is the time to start planning and making arrangements to get the work done.

Parallel terraces may be the

answer to saving your soil, increasing production, and making the job of farming easier. Parallel terraces can be laid off to fit four and six row equipment. Construction cost is greater than for conventional terraces, but there will be no point rows. Both cuts and fills are made over wide area and the land is smoothed so that each row carries the water that falls into it. Smoothing and leveling of the land is done before parallel terrace construction is begun. This makes farming with multiple row equipment a pleasure where parallel terraces have been properly constructed.

Where satisfactory outlets are available, graded parallel terraces may be constructed. Also, plan to get the right kind of equipment to construct the terraces. Usually three pieces of heavy equipment are needed on the parallel terrace job. These are: cat and scraper, motor grader, and elevating grader terracer. The best equipment and an experienced operator can reduce construction costs.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 47 proposing an Amendment to Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide four-year terms of office for State Representatives.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new House of Representatives shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the members elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the members of Class A shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of Class B at the expiration of four years, so that one-half of the members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected, and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified. Except in case of an election to fill a vacancy, and except in the first election following each re-apportionment, a person who has been elected to the House of Representatives shall not be eligible to be a candidate again for membership in the Legislature until the term for

which he was elected has less than one year remaining." Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. In the event the Constitutional Amendment proposed in this Resolution is adopted by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, the Governor of Texas is directed not to issue a proclamation for the election and not to publish a notice thereof for the Constitutional Amendment proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 1 of the 59th Texas Legislature, since the provisions of said House Joint Resolution No. 1 shall be included in this Resolution. But, should this proposed Amendment be rejected by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, then the terms and provisions of House Joint Resolution No. 1 shall be included in this Resolution. PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000), providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas, performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments, except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Board and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) of bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which bonds heretofore have been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for

not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest, as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4 1/2%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Fund and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price thereof, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the

moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions relating to such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes here provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated for such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund thereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased hereunder) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or in violation of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to

Texas veterans who served not less than ninety (90) consecutive days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States, between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955, and who upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be set aside and sold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road and construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the Constitutional Amendment adopted on November 6, 1956, shall be credited to said Veterans' Land Fund and may be used for the purpose of purchasing additional lands, to be sold as provided herein, until December 1, 1965; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on such bonds shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1965, all moneys attributable to such bonds shall be set aside for the retirement of such bonds and to pay interest thereon; and when there are sufficient moneys to retire all of such bonds, all of such moneys then remaining or thereafter becoming a part of said Veterans' Land Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds heretofore issued, and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds heretofore issued and sold

shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by the Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the retirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$200,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$200,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of same Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this state.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing loans to students at institutions of higher education; creating the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund and making provisions relating thereto.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 50b. STUDENT LOANS. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Eighty-five Million Dollars (\$85,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called 'Texas College Student Loan Bonds', shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purposes of this Section.

"(b) All moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund to be administered by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors to make loans to students who have been admitted to attend any institution of higher education within the State of Texas, public or private, including Junior Colleges, which are recognized or accredited under terms and conditions prescribed by the Legislature, and to pay interest and principal on such bonds and provide a sinking fund therefor under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe.

"(c) While any of the bonds, or interest on said bonds authorized by this Section is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"(d) The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

"(e) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution.

"(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for loans to students at institutions of higher education to be known as the Texas Opportunity Plan."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for loans to students at institutions of higher education to be known as the Texas Opportunity Plan."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Best of all, from the producer's standpoint, returns per cow over feed cost have gone up from \$199 in 1948 to \$260 in 1964. One of the biggest reasons for this, says Meekma, is that today's feeding techniques have improved so much. Of course, other production costs must be met by this income, and these costs have risen considerably since 1948. It used to be that dairymen thought they were doing a good job when they fed cows an average of 2,000 pounds of silage, 2,500 pounds of hay, and 3,000 pounds of grain. But contrast this to the 1964 ration that averaged per cow: 5,400 pounds of silage, 4,000 pounds of hay, and a whopping 4,700 pounds of grain!

The average herd size has increased 39 cows over the 16-year period—from an average of 37 cows per herd in 1948 to an average of 76 cows per herd in 1964. Currently there are 26 DHIA organizations representing a total of 342 herds reporting across the Lone Star state.

NUMBER CATTLE ON FEED UP

Cattle being fed for slaughter market in Texas totaled 354,000 head on July 1, reports the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is 19 percent above the number on feed a year ago. Nationally, the number is up 9 percent.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing Amendments to Section 4, 22 and 23 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; and certain statutory state officers; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication. RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 4, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 4. The Governor shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this state at least five years immediately preceding his election." Section 2. That Section 22, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the state in all

suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the state in which the state may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the state, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, toll, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature." Section 3. That Section 23, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the state during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not

receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury." Section 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution." Section 5. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be construed so as to extend the term of office of any officeholder previously elected to a two-year term. Section 6. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 87 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding to said Section as presently written, the following provisions: requiring automatic retirement of certain District and Appellate Judges at age seventy-five (75) or such earlier age, not under seventy (70), as may be provided by law; creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission, providing for its composition and the qualifications, methods of selection and terms of office of its members; defining the functions and procedures of said Commission, including the duty to investigate, and hold hearings in respect of disability and misconduct of District and Appellate Judges and to make recommendations to the Supreme Court of Texas for involuntary retirement or removal of such Judges; empowering the Supreme Court of Texas, in its discretion, to retire such Judges for disability and to remove them for misconduct, upon recommendation of the aforesaid Commission and consideration of the record made before it; defining misconduct for which said Judges may be so removed; providing that the proceedings of said Commission shall be confidential until filed in the Supreme Court with recommendation for retirement or removal; and providing that the removal provisions here by established shall be alternative to and cumulative of those provided elsewhere in the Constitution. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that said Section shall hereafter read as follows: "Section 1-a. (1) Subject to the further provisions of this Section, the Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Justices and Judges of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age and disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed. The office of every such Justice and Judge shall become vacant when the incumbent reaches the age of seventy-five (75) years or such earlier age, not less than seventy (70) years, as the Legislature may prescribe; but, in the case of an incumbent whose term of office includes the effective date of this Amendment, this provision shall not prevent

him from serving the remainder of said term nor be applicable to him before his period or periods of judicial service shall have reached a total of ten (10) years. (2) There is hereby created the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, to consist of nine (9) members, to wit: (i) two (2) Justices of Courts of Civil Appeals; (ii) two (2) District Judges; (iii) two (2) members of the State Bar, who have respectively practiced as such for over ten (10) consecutive years next preceding their selection; (iiii) three (3) citizens, at least thirty (30) years of age, not licensed to practice law nor holding any salaried public office or employment; provided that no person shall be or remain a member of the Commission, who does not maintain physical residence within this State, or who resides in, or holds a judgeship within or for, the same Supreme Judicial District as another member of the Commission, or who shall have ceased to retain the qualifications above specified for his respective class of membership. Commissioners of classes (i) and (ii) above shall be chosen by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, those of class (iii) by the Board of Directors of the State Bar under regulations to be prescribed by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, and those of class (iii) by appointment of the Governor with advice and consent of the Senate. (3) The regular term of office of Commissioners shall be six (6) years; but the initial members of each of classes (i), (ii) and (iii) shall respectively be chosen for terms of four (4) and six (6) years, and the initial members of class (iii) for respective terms of two (2), four (4) and six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. Commissioners may succeed themselves in office only if having served less than three (3) consecutive years. (4) Commissioners shall receive no compensation for their services as such. The Legislature shall provide for the payment of the necessary expense for the operation of the Commission. (5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceed-

ings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement or removal of Justices or Judges shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members. (6) Any Justice or Judge within the scope of this Section 1-a may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any such Justice or Judge may be involuntarily retired for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, which is or is likely to become permanent in nature. (7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to misconduct or disability of particular Justices or Judges, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court. (8) The Commission may, after such investigation as it deems necessary, order a hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court. (9) The Commission may, after such investigation as it deems necessary, order a hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court. (10) All papers filed with and proceedings before the Commission or a Master shall be confidential, and the filing of papers with, and the giv-

ing of testimony before, the Commission, Master or the Supreme Court shall be privileged; provided that upon being filed in the Supreme Court the record loses its confidential character. (11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the judge in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed. (12) No Justice or Judge shall sit as a member of the Commission or the Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal. (13) This Section 1-a is alternative to, and cumulative of, the methods of removal of Justices and Judges provided elsewhere in this Constitution." Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age, creating the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, defining its functions; and empowering the Supreme Court, upon recommendation of said Commission, to remove District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and to retire such judges in cases of disability." Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

State offices are playing a game of musical chairs.

Better make note of these departmental moves that have just taken place, are now being made or will be completed this month:

● **Teacher Retirement System of Texas** has moved from the fourth floor of the Sam Houston State Office Building, formerly State Office Building No. 1, to the third floor of the Lowich Building.

● **Texas' new coordinating Board of Higher Education** soon will occupy the entire sixth floor of the Sam Houston State Office Building.

● **Parks Division of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department** moves out of the Sam Houston Building into the newly acquired American Legion Building — to make room for the Board of Higher Education.

● **State Building Commission** will move from the Reagan State Office Building (State Office Building No. 2) into the west wing of the Sam Houston Building.

● **Texas Tourist Development Agency**, now in the Sam Houston Building, will move into offices in the Reagan Building vacated by the Building Commission.

● **State Water Commission** will move from the American Legion Building into the east wing of the

Sam Houston Building.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr reached these conclusions in official rulings:

● **City employees** installing rest room facilities in municipal parks must be paid the prevailing wage rate.

● **Board of Pardons and Paroles** has no authority to recommend, and the governor no power to grant, a posthumous full pardon to a deceased convicted felon on application of a relative or other interested party.

● **An act authorizing Grayson County Commissioners** Court to appoint a juvenile officer and assistant is unconstitutional as a "local and special" law.

● **State employees** can collect \$12 a day travel allowance if staying at regular public lodgings, but only \$7 if they stay on military installations or at educational or almshouse institutions.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Connally has named Judge James Ellis of Lubbock's County Court at Law as judge of the new 137th District Court in Lubbock County.

Lt. Governor Preston Smith appointed to the interim committee on state and local tax policy.

Sens. Galloway Calhoun Jr. of Tyler, David Ratliff of Stamford and Jack Strong of Long-

view. On the committee for restoration of the flag of Santa Anna, he placed Sens. Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo and Charles Herring of Austin.

House Speaker Ben Barnes selected five public-at-large members of a committee to study the problem of salt pollution of underground and surface water of inland areas and recommend legislation that's needed. They are former Congressman Joe Kilgore of Austin, former Smith County Judge Harry Loftis of Tyler, Charles P. McGaha of Wichita Falls, Runnels County Judge W. H. Rampy and former Atty. Gen. John Ben Sheppard of Odessa.

Barnes named Reps. G. F. Mutscher of Brenham and Maurice S. Pipkin of Brownsville to the Legislative Budget Board.

Reps. W. S. Heatly of Paducah and Ben Atwell of Dallas automatically are budget members since they are chairmen of appropriations and revenue and taxation committees of the House.

Earlier Barnes picked a committee composed of Reps. Roger Thurmond Jr. of Del Rio, Bill Rapp of Raymondville, John E. Blaine of El Paso, Dick McKisack of Dallas and Jack McLaughlin of Fort Worth to study the Texas liquor control act.

ANTI-POVERTY PROJECTS OKAYED — Three more Community Action programs and four additional Neighborhood Youth Corps applications have been approved by Governor Connally.

Community Action projects in Houston, San Antonio and Mercedes carry federal grants totaling more than \$2,000,000.

NYC grants of \$155,040 will permit employment of 393 students in Luling, Anderson County, San Jacinto County and Trinity County.

CHEMICAL PLANT AT DIBOLL — Borden Chemical Company has purchased a 100-acre site at Diboll on which to construct a synthetic resins plant, Governor Connally announces.

An initial \$1,000,000 expenditure is contemplated. Company reportedly will market resins in East Texas for such applications as plywood and particle board adhesives and foundry core binders.

Selection of Diboll for the new plant site attests to the growth of and prospects for the southern pine plywood industry in Texas, said Connally.

INTERCOASTAL CANAL DILEMMA — Joe Moore has a \$400,000 problem and, so far, no solution.

Moore, a member of Gov. John Connally's staff, is trying to find a way to allow Texas to live up to its commitment made by Gov. Allen Shivers exactly 10 years ago.

In August of 1955, Governor Shivers gave the state's endorsement to a proposal for the widening and deepening of the Intra-coastal waterway from the mouth of the Sabine River to just north of the Brazoria County line across West Bay.

He assured the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers that local sponsors would meet the cost of the right of way so that the canal could be widened to 140 feet from 125 feet.

"All that was needed to keep the project going in 1955 was the state's commitment," Moore said. "There was no need to produce the right-of-way money then. But there is now, if we're not going to lose the project. The state has at least a moral commitment to aid in getting local sponsors."

Although no firm figures are available, Moore believes acquisition of right-of-way for the project through Jefferson, Chambers and Galveston Counties would cost about \$400,000. The federal government's cost of widening and deepening the waterway is expected to be in excess of \$6,000,000.

Completion of the project would open the channel to Mississippi River Barges.

TRAIN LAKES — Changing times were reflected in three recent actions of the Texas Water Commission.

Actions amend West Texas Water permits at the request of the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railway Company.

Company built three lakes years ago—in Nolan, Lampasas and Mills Counties—so that their steam-boiler engines would have water supplies.

Permission to use the lakes for recreational purposes now has been granted, since today nearly all engines are diesel and don't need water.

Nolan County's lake will provide irrigation water for the Sweetwater Country Club.

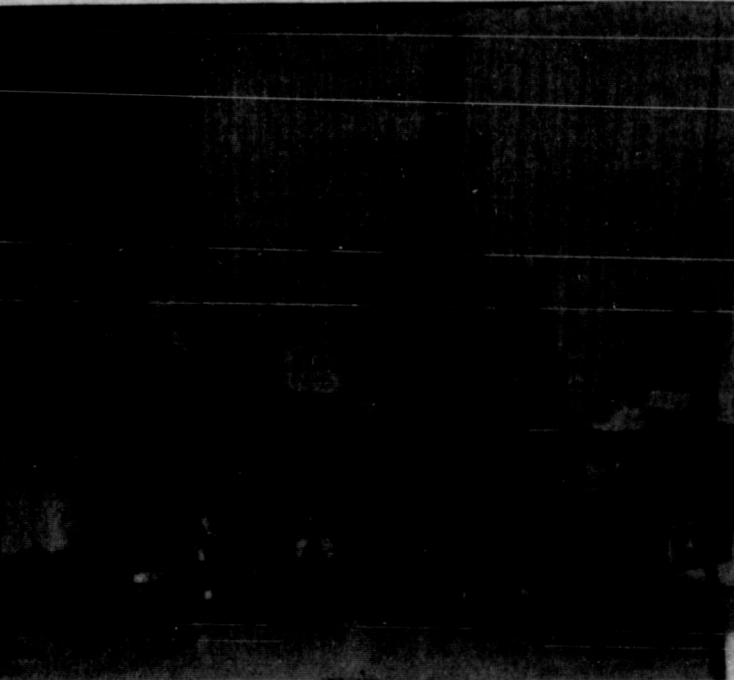

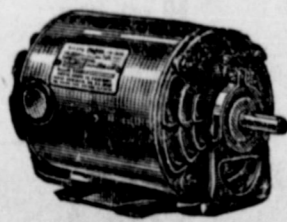

NEW PUSH ON SALINE WATER CONSERVATION I was privileged to be at the White House on August 11 as President Johnson signed into law a bill we had passed in the House and Senate to step up research efforts in water desalination. As the Nation faces twin prospects of declining water reserves and growing population, it is essential that we find new, efficient, and economical ways to remove salt and minerals from sea water along our coasts and from brackish water inland.

During the Rose Garden ceremony, President Johnson expressed the hope that by 1970 a research breakthrough would be achieved making possible desalinating plants capable of producing 100 million gallons per day of potable water. This is a goal long dreamed of; the country would benefit immeasurably were we able to provide desalinated mu-

nicinal and industrial water supplies in quantity at low cost. However, there is no firm prospect that the goal is technologically obtainable.

In the past five years, approximately \$80 million has been spent on what amounts to refinements of the ages-old distillation process of purifying salt water. I helped originate the saline water conversion program in 1952, and I have been proud that its extension has come over the years only after our House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs was satisfied that research and development funds would be spent on concrete, worthwhile projects. This year, as legislative recommendations came before the Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation, of which I am chairman, I was deeply disturbed that desalination "experts" in and out of Government were seeking a \$200 million blank check to pursue ill-defined goals by means and methods not adequately explained. Our Subcommittee gave its approval to a \$10 million program extension whose costs were spelled out in detailed objectives. Our view prevailed as the bill passed the House. The Senate boosted the total. In the final, enacted version of the measure, Congress is to have the opportunity to approve research and development plans to be proposed during the five-year program extension period.

There are now five pilot or demonstration plants each testing a separate conversion system—at Freeport, Texas; Guantanamo Naval Base, Cuba; Wrightsville Beach, N. C.; Webster, S. D., and Roswell, N. M.

The pilot plants built at Webster and Roswell were designed to find a means of providing pure water for smaller U. S. cities now faced with brackish supplies. Small plants are going to be needed because a survey by the American Water Works Association indicates that more than 1,000 U. S. communities are using brackish water. In addition, attaining the ability to build small plants would greatly aid local communities now forced to import water supplies by pipeline from long distances. Many of these communities do have water sources near at hand; the problem is that the nearby water is not fit to drink and can be made so only after a desalination process. Research will be pushed in this important aspect of the problem.

The dramatic focus in saline conversion is on such population centers as New York City which face catastrophe if water problems are not solved. The Northeastern drought is now four years old. A fifth year of drought could bankrupt water supplies for New York and many other cities of the Northeast. It is possible that a

WATCH FOR POISONING IN CATTLE Each year animals in the area are lost after grazing on sorghums, Sudangrass, Sudan, sorghum hybrids or Johnsongrass. The cause may be prussic acid poisoning, says County Agent, Ronald Gooch.

These grasses contain a glycoside which may break down into prussic acid in the digestive tract of the animal. The poisonous material is most likely to be present in young, immature stands, or is second growth following periods of drought or mechanical harvesting. There is also danger in the fall, following the first frost, reminds Gooch.

Cattle are more susceptible to the poison than sheep or goats. Horses and swine are rarely injured. An affected animal may stagger and act sleepy before suddenly dropping dead. Severe

muscular twitching sometimes occurs. Death results from suffocation, since the poison prevents the exchange of oxygen from the blood to the tissue.

A drench of molasses diluted with water may help a poisoned animal, but a veterinarian should be called at once to give additional treatment.

To prevent prussic acid poisoning: Do not graze at any time until growth reaches at least 18 inches. Do not graze regrowth that has been stopped by lack of moisture, frosted pastures, or regrowth after a frost.

Forage containing prussic acid can be fed safely if it is cut and allowed to cure completely in the field, or if it is put in silage and not fed for several months. Ma-

ture plants with few suckers are seldom dangerous if growth has been normal. Grain sorghum or Sudan stubble regrowth grazed in late fall can be dangerous. A good way to check grazing safety is to turn one or two low-grade animals into the field and watch them for a day or two. Be sure water is available to them, or the symptoms may be delayed. If the test animals remain healthy, it's probably safe to turn the main herd into the pasture.

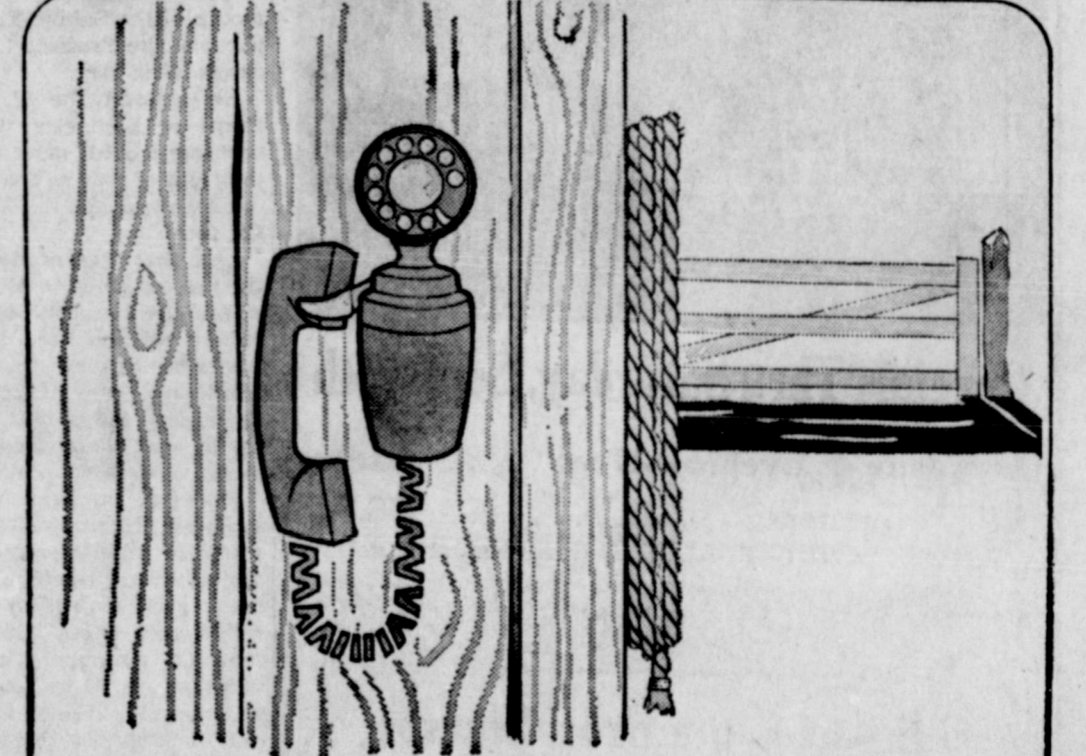

Anyone receiving a notice after August 17 will have 15 days from the date of notice to plow up excess crops or give additional diverted acres. Please check the date on your notice carefully. It is very important that you do not let the final day slip by. Any excess cotton standing after the final disposition date will be subject to marketing quota penalty.
