

EASY TO CONTROL

Success Depends to Large Extent on Recognition.

Success in controlling coccidiosis depends to a large extent on limme diate recognition of the affected chicks, points out J. C. Taylor, associate poultry specialist at the New Jersey College of Agriculture, Rutgers university, New Brunswick.

It is possible for chicks to be-come infected with coccidiosis at any time during the growing period, but the disease generally makes its appearance when the hirds are between four and eight weeks old. Chicks that have coccidiosis will stand around near the stove or in the corner of the brooder house with their eyes closed and their wings down. The beaks and legs of the affected chicks will be white. To diagnose coccidiosis definitely, it is a good plan to cut open one or two of the affected chicks. The cece, or two blind pouches of the intestines, of diseased chicks will be greatly enlarged and filled with a hard, cheesy mass. When such conditions are found, steps should be taken to stop the spread of the

The disease is spread principally through the droppings of the af-fected chicks, and for this reason every five days. Keep the chicks off the bare ground around brooder house by moving the house to a new location. In some cases where the house cannot be moved it is a good practice to confine the chicks to the brooder house.

It has been found that feeding plenty of milk is a great help in controlling coccidiosis. The following ration composed of 40 per cent milk has proved valuable for use at the time of the outbreak: 40 pounds dried skim milk or buttermilk, 30 pounds ground yellow corn, 20 pounds ground rolled oats, and 10 pounds wheat bran. This mash should be greatly reduced so that all chicks will be compelled to eat the mash. Provide plenty of hop-per space so the chicks can eat without crowding. When all symptoms of the disease disappear, gradnally change the ration to the regu-lar feed that the chicks were given at the time of the outbreak.

Crooked Breast Bones in Turkeys Avoidable

Small Shriveled Combs Indicate Poor Layers

Some poultry breeders have the impression that the larger the comb the better breeder the bird prove. It is true that small shriveled combs of females indicate that they are either temporarily out of production or poor layers. The same kind of a comb on a male would lead one to expect him to be a poor breeder. The opposite is not necessarily true, that the larger combed birds are any better breeders than those with combs of average size. Exceptionally large disfigure and handicap the individual.

Theories to Determine Sex of Little Chicks

Many rules and theories have been proposed for determining the sex of the chicks at batching or even from the egg. To date, most methods have proved unreliable, in the Barred Plymouth Rock breed, the size of the white spot on the head may be used to separate with some degree of accuracy the two sexes. The chicks with the large head spots are usually males. The crossing of certain breeds will re-sult in chicks, the sex of which may be separated relatively accurately on the basis of color.

Don't start the hatching season with any old rooster. Don't use pullet eggs for hatch-

Don't run away with the Idea that one rooster is good for more than fifteen to twenty hens. Don't feed too heavy with meat while you are saving eggs for hatch-

Don't keep eggs over ten days.



STARTING AND FINISHING CALVES

The practice of feeding a grain mixture to calves still running with their dams on pasture is growing in popularity, especially under intensified farming conditions where pasture is limited. Finishing calves by this system means a quick turnover and is advisable where grade herds are maintained for beef production in farming areas, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The calves may be allowed to run with their dams and have access to grain in a self-feeder in a creep, or they may have a separate pasture and be put with their dams two or three times a day. Spring calves fed a grain supplement while nursing can be marketed in the fall when weaned at an average weight of about 500 pounds and usually bring greater net returns than if carried over another year or two.

Temporary Sheep Pasture

A system of temporary pastures for sheep is advantageous in more ways than one more sheep can be raised per acre on temporary pastures than on peramanent ones with the same soils. Danger of infecton from stomach worms and other internal parasites is lessened considerably if the sheep are pastured on annual crops. Temporary pastures furnish plenty of succulent green feed, which is necessary for a good milk flow during laction periods. In winter and early spring wheat where it can be successfully grown is the best pasture, and oats and field peas drilled together make excellent forage. On rather fertile land, Rape is the most economical crop for this purpose. Where the soil is thin, soy beans are very good and can be grazed from July until the first frost, Alfalfa or sweet clover is very satisfactory in some sections, if the sheep are pastured carefully,

Famous French Chef Discusses Secret of Vegetable Cookery

Chef of Ritz-Carlton, New York, Tells of French Method of Cocking Vegetables.

HY, in splte of all the adwhich have been made in American cooking during recent years, do we still hold a position inferior to the French in the culinary art?

The answer, according to Louis Diat, chef of the Risz-Carlton Hotel, New York, lies largely in a difference in attitude. The average American housewife looks upon cooking as a form of drudgery. The French housewife knows it is one of the fine arts. Because of her attitude, the American woman is often content to prepare a merely passable meal. She seldom bothers about developing the delicate nuances and blends of flavors. The French woman, on the other hand, feels that any dish which falls short of its full potentialities is a serious reflection upon her ability. Restoring Lost Flavors.

"Take American vegetable dishes." Monsieur Diat says. "So frequently they are almost tasteless. There is, though, no reason why they should be, although we have here a condition you do not find in other countries. Most French and other European cities are surrounded by truck farms. The farmers bring their vegetables into the cities in the evening of the day on which they are picked, and they are sold the next morning. In America, many vegetables brought from points four and five days distant from the market. During all of this time they are losing some of their natural sweetness.

"But although the vegetables purchased by the French housewife are usually fresher than ours, she takes pains to bring out and accentuate their distinctive flavors. Over here, we do not take such pains. Most of us have not learned, for instance, how to use sugar in cooking vegetables. The French cook will add a little sugar while cooking peas, carrots and other sweet-juiced varieties. The sugar does something we do not entirely

The amount varies with the difference in the natural sweetness of the different vegetables. In cooking most of the sweet-juiced varieties, from a teaspoon to a tablespoon of sugar should be used for each quart of canned vegetables, and for each quart of water in which fresh vegetables are boiled.




