Special Election Called For May 12 For Election Of Five Aldermen

C. J. Lohoefer, Mayor of the City of Clarendon, has called a special election to be held on May 12, for the election of five Aldermen to the City Council. The election will be held at the City Hall.

Persons desiring to have their names placed on the ballot as a candidate for Aldermen have until April 7th to file with Dossa C. Day as City Secretary. Under a special election for the election of Aldermen, the law provides that placing of a request for name on the ballot must be filed with the City Secretary instead of the Mayor as in ordinary circumstances. A filing fee of \$1.00 is also required in a special election for Aldermen.

The City Commission met for the last time last Monday afternoon and attended to the final business that needed to be considered. At the close of the meeting, the ballots for the change of city government of the election held on March 17 were canvassed. The Mayor signed the order about 6:30 p.m. and thereafter the Commission form of city government ceased to exist and the Aldermanic form was declared to be in force. The Mayor and the two commissioners automatically become Mayor and Aldermen under the Aldermanic form for the remainder of their elected terms.

The elected terms for the two Commissioners who became Aldermen will terminate in April, so until the special election for five Aldermen on May 12, there will be no City Council to pass ordinances.

When asked if this meant that there would be no City government until May 12, Bill Lowe stated that under the statutes that the City would continue to have the same legal effect and continue city operations just as in the past, but that there just would be no City Council to pass ordinances or attend to other policy making decisions. He stated that this would work much in the same way as the State government when the legislature is not in session.

This leaves the Civil Court of Appeals, Amarillo final authority in this dispute. This means that the Clarendon Junior College District is definitely reduced to the old boundary; that the annexation election and 60 cent tax rate election are void.

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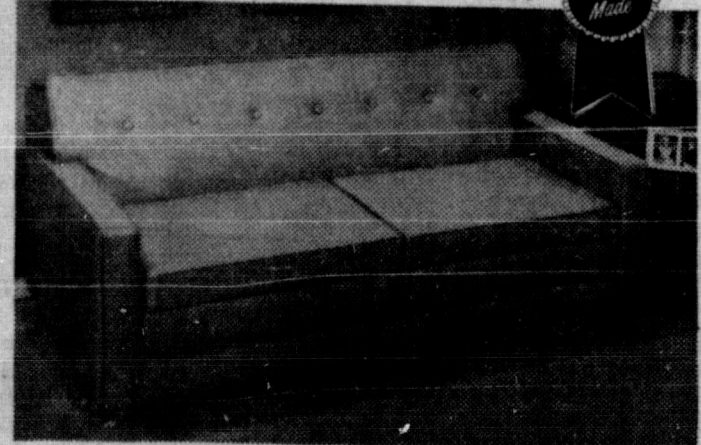

act on the proposed "Economic Opportunity Act of 1964," the measure in which President Johnson spells out his plan for what he called "a national war on poverty." Committee hearings have begun on its provisions. No one can be certain how the American people and their Congress will view the proposed legislation, but this much is sure: discussions about it will bring to light many aspects of the problem President Johnson's program is aimed at correcting.

The President told the Congress, "There are millions of Americans — one-fifth of our people — who have not shared in the abundance which has been granted to most of us, and on whom the gates of opportunity

have been closed." Many of these citizens on whom, as the President said, "the gates of opportunity have been closed," live in "pockets of poverty" — areas in which levels of income, employment, and education are extremely low.

Among the groups on whom the focus of attention is falling is that comprised by descendants of the "first Americans" — the American Indian. Poverty is not limited to city slums and so-called "distressed areas" — it exists in the wide open spaces of east and west, on the lands Uncle Sam set aside as Indian reservations. Philo Nash, the Commissioner of Indian Affairs in the Department of the Interior, states the situation bluntly: "Most Indians are poor, desperately poor — as poor as any body we know of in this rich country of ours."

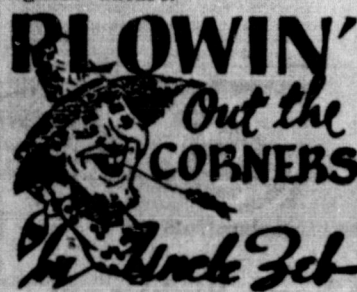
According to the 1960 census, there were 552,228 Indians and Alaska Natives, 509,147 Indians in the United States excluding Alaska. More than half of the total live on reservations. Approximately 380,000 Indian people come within the scope of the programs of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, and most of these live on reservations in sparsely populated rural areas far from cities where industrial employment might be available. This is the situation affecting Indians on reservations:

- *Unemployment runs between 40 and 50 percent — seven or eight times the national average.
- *Family income on the reservations averages between one-fourth and one-third the national average. Average Indian reservation family income was \$1,500 for 1962.
- *Nine out of ten Indian families live in housing that is far below minimum standards of comfort, safety, and decency.
- *Average schooling of young adults on reservations is only eight years — two-thirds the national average.
- *The average age at death on

the reservations is 42 years, two-thirds the figure for the national population.

Indians do, indeed, make up one of the Nation's "pockets of poverty." Publicity concerning the Indians has centered on that small minority of tribes and individuals which have received enormous sums from oil and gas and other minerals. But the great majority of Indians lack the vocational training needed to compete for the few skilled jobs that can be found in their home areas. Unskilled agricultural jobs are growing fewer as more and more farmers follow the trend toward mechanized operations. A young Indian adult with no more than an eighth grade education is lucky to get a job of any kind — but he must generally content himself with a low-paying job which leads nowhere in terms of salary and advancement. Much worse is the plight of the Indian who has less than an eighth-grade education or no education at all.

Through vocational training programs, programs aimed at improving housing, programs to improve grazing and agricultural resources, programs aimed at providing credit for business and individual development, encouragement of tribal enterprise, and school construction programs, the Bureau of Indian Affairs is tackling the arduous and complex and long-term job of helping Indians help themselves into a brighter future.

DOMESTIC PARCEL POST RATE INCREASED

Postmaster Mike McCully re-

mindes residents of Clarendon that an effective date of April 1 has been set for new domestic parcel post rate increases.

The parcel post increase — approved recently by the Interstate Commerce Commission and averaging about 13.1% — is expected to yield about 75.4 million annually.

Catalog rates will be increased approximately 13% and will produce added revenue of about \$2.4 million if 1962 volume is maintained.

The higher rates do not affect air parcel post or international parcel post.

Postmaster McCully said he has been advised by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski that the decision of the ICC will assist the Post Office Department in carrying out its objective of reducing the drain on the Federal Treasury by \$100 million.

The last parcel post increase was on February 1, 1960, the postmaster pointed out.

To illustrate the effect on the new rate here, Mr. McCully noted that a six-pound parcel — which is the average weight — for local area delivery will cost 37c instead of 32c.

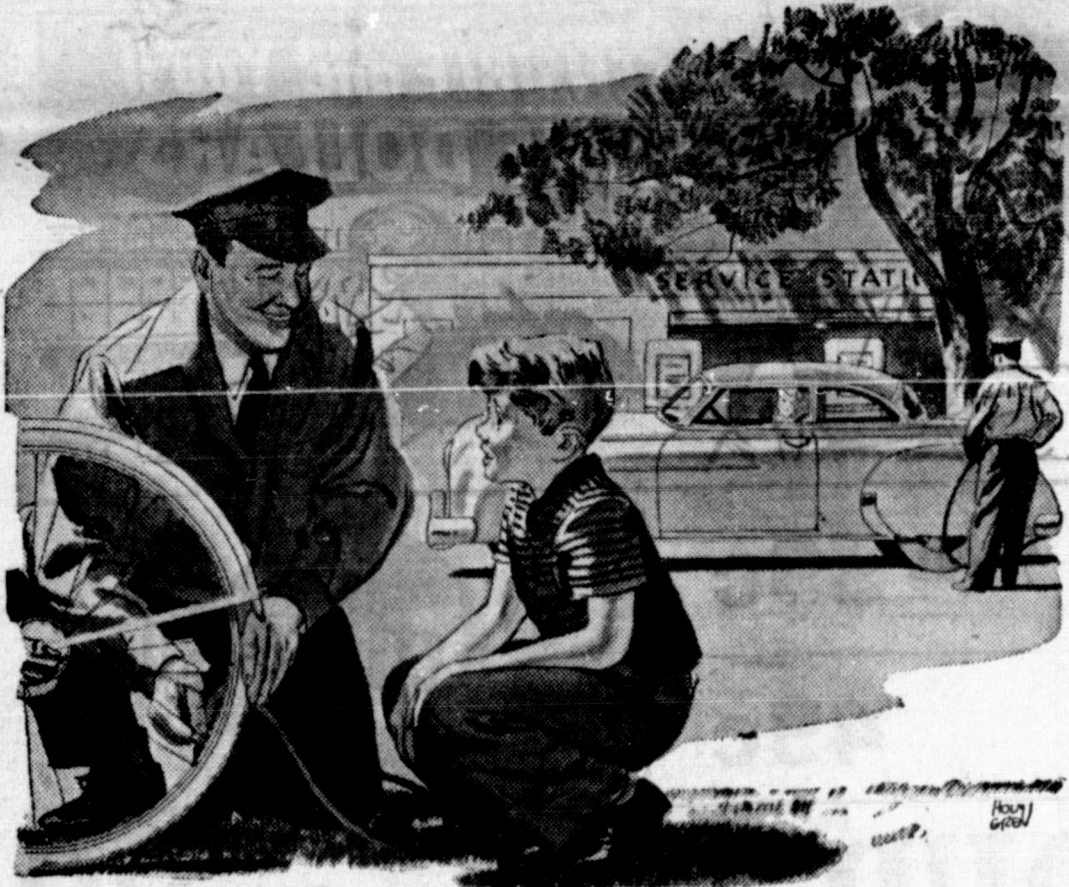

ORDER FOR CITY OFFICERS' ELECTION AND SETTING DATE FOR FILING AS CITY ALDERMAN

THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF DONLEY

I, C. J. Lohoefer, in my capacity as Mayor of the City of Clarendon, Texas, do hereby order that an election be held in said City on the 12th day of May, 1964, for the purpose of electing five aldermen for said City of Clarendon.

That in accordance with an order properly adopted according to law, said election for the entire City of Clarendon, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election, shall be held at the City Hall in said City of Clarendon, with S. W. Lowe as presiding Judge and Chauncey Hommel as alternate presiding Judge, and said presiding Judge shall appoint the necessary clerks to assist him which shall not be less than two nor more than four.

Dessa C. Day is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting and Paula Housden is hereby appointed deputy Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at the City Hall in said City of Clarendon and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceeding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A.M. and 5:00 o'clock P.M. on each day for said absentee voting.

That said election shall be held in accordance with the election code of this State and only resident qualified voters of said City shall be eligible to vote at said election.

That all persons desiring to have their name placed on the ballot to be elected as an alderman for the City of Clarendon shall file with the City Secretary of the City of Clarendon the proper request to have their name placed on said ballot as a candidate as an alderman, and pay the required \$1.00 filing fee and taking and filing the required loyalty affidavit, on or before April 7, 1964.

Feed Grain Sign-Up

March 27 is the final date for filing applications to participate in the 1964 feed grain program. There are still a few producers who have not been in to find out just how the program applies to their individual farms.

We have received further information on the payment for diverted acres when castor beans are planted as a substitute crop. If as much as 40% is diverted and all or a portion of that diverted is planted to castor beans, the payment would be 50% of the higher rate for the farm. You must state on the application how many acres you plan to plant.

If you are thinking about participating in the program and haven't signed up, be sure to come in today or tomorrow.

1963 CCC Grain Loans

All CCC grain loans may be repaid until March 31 at which time they will be forfeited to Commodity Credit. All producers who have outstanding grain loans should check the market price to see if it would be advantageous to repay the principal plus interest at 3 1/2 percent and sell the grain open market.

Dates To Remember

- March 21 — Feed Grain sign-up closes
- March 31 — Final day to repay loans
- April 3 — Last day to request premeasurement of cotton
- April 30 — Last day to graze diverted acres
- May 1 — Final disposition date for wheat
