Remember too that our Scouts and other youngsters have to be taken out of town if they are to participate in such beneficial programs as "Learn to Swim" classes that could just as easily be held at home if we only had the facilities. Think what it would mean to you, your family, and your community, to have a clean, sanitary, well supervised swimming pool right here at home, within easy reach on these hot summer days. Perhaps you can even see a picnic ground adjoining and play equipment. Think it over and then decide that we can do something about making this dream a reality. We have yet to see the thing that Baird couldn't do if it wanted to. You are that kind of folks. 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




