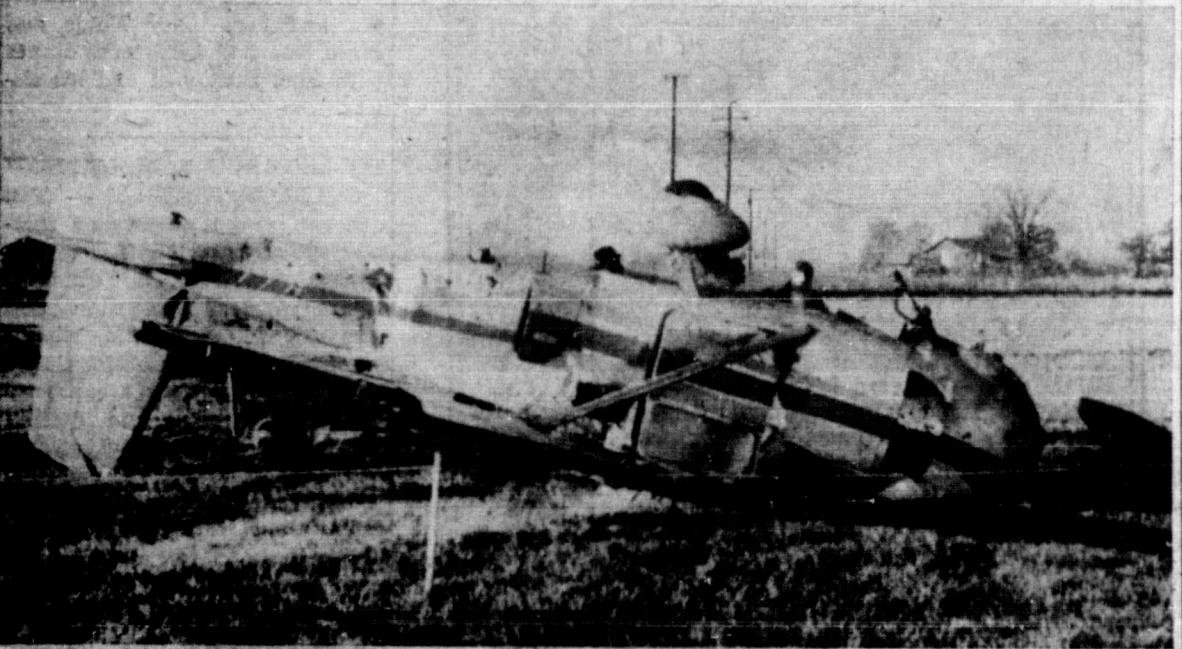

Locals Injured When Plane Crashes In Mississippi Friday Of Last Week

(Editor's Note: Information regarding the article below was furnished the Leader by Bill Richardson, General Manager of the Greenwood Commonwealth, daily newspaper at Greenwood, Mississippi. Pictures were sent by Mr. Richardson also.)
Four local residents were admitted to the Greenwood Mississippi Leflore Hospital last Friday night with injuries when their plane hit a high power line a half mile from the Greenwood Municipal Airport as it was making its final approach for a landing.
Injured in the accident were Dr. George W. Smith who received two broken arms, chemical burns on his back, bruises and lacerations, his son, Charlie Smith who received a fractured vertebra, bruises and lacerations; L. E. Yankie, who received several cracked bones in his back and a broken left leg. His son, Joe Mike, received only bruises and lacerations. Dr. Smith and son, Charlie, were transferred to Baptist Hospital in Memphis, Tenn., and are reported as improving satisfac-

torily at this time. Mr. Yankie is reported satisfactory at this time also and will possibly be able to be brought home this week end. His wife went to Greenwood Saturday to be with her husband and son and return them home.
The crash came when the Cessna 182, piloted by Dr. Smith was making its final approach for a landing on the northeast runway of the field. As the plane slanted downward for its landing it struck a utility pole carrying a 110,000 volt line and sheared it in half. A company official said the line was not hot at the time of the crash.
It then went through a 13,000 volt line of the Greenwood Utilities Co., clipping the line and cutting off power in the immediate area. The plane rammed into the ground and skidded several hundred feet and flipped over on its back. It came to a stop about 750 feet from the end of the runway.
Dr. Smith told hospital officials that he had been heading

for Holly Bluff where he planned to land on a small runway. He said when they arrived there snow was on the ground and he was unable to land. He headed for Yazoo City. At Yazoo City he said the lights were not on at the airport and he turned for the Greenwood field.
He said he saw the utility pole just before he hit it and mashed his left pedal, trying to avoid it, but the pole caught the right wing of the plane. Dr. Smith said, "If we hadn't turned that little bit there is no telling how bad the crash would have been."
The radio operator at the FAA office, Jerry Elman, who had been in contact with Dr. Smith got in his car and headed in the direction the plane would be coming and found the plane and helped pull the four out of the wreckage.
Dr. Smith and Mr. Yankie were taking their sons deer hunting near Yazoo where a cousin of Mr. Yankie's resides.
Wet Snow Puts Moisture Total Over 14 Inches For Year
The wet snow which started falling here about noon Sunday improved the moisture situation considerably melting out 42 inch which brings our yearly total for 1963 to 14.04 inches.
The snow measured around five inches and was very beneficial as it has all gone into the ground.
For the month of December we have received .57 inch moisture as compared with .53 in December, 1962. The yearly total for 1962 was considerably higher with 18.60 inches.

Eugene Lester Welch Dies In Truck-Train Accident Tuesday

Eugene Lester Welch, age 19 years, popular high school student, died in a truck-train accident two miles west of the Martin Community Tuesday afternoon at 4:12 p.m. Lester was driving a truck for Mr. Hall Hardin when struck by the east bound Fort Worth and Denver train.
Lester was born January 24, 1945, at Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia. He moved with his family to Clarendon from Memphis, Texas, in 1950. He was a student at Clarendon High School, captain of the Broncho football team, President of the 1963-64 Senior Class, Treasurer of the Future Farmers of America, member of the track team, winning district honors two years.

Surviving are: his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gene Welch, Clarendon; four sisters, Mrs. Connie Jean Formway, Rosa Lee, Shirley Ann and Linda Sue Welch, all of Clarendon; one brother, Gerald Welch of Clarendon.
Funeral services will be held Thursday, January 2, at 2:00 p.m. in the First Baptist Church of Clarendon with Rev. W. R. Lawrence officiating. Interment will be in the Citizens Cemetery under direction of the Murphy Funeral Home.

Appellate Court Lands Big Blow To C. J. C.; Tax Election Planned

There are always ups and downs in all types of contests and it seems, after winning the first round in court, the Jr. College has lost the second round, temporarily at least, since the Court of Civil Appeals reversed the decision of the District Court here.
This indicates a continued battle as first anticipated by those backing the Jr. College, for the general contention of the opposition was to kill the college, and in referring to the Jr. College elections held previously, a majority wanted the Jr. College to stay, grow and serve future generations; therefore it is assumed these same people will continue to exert every effort to keep the Jr. College.
On December 16th, the case presented before the Court of Civil Appeals, Seventh Supreme Judicial District, Amarillo, entitled Charles F. Derrick, et al, Appellants vs. County Board of Education Donley County, Texas, et al, Appellees, was reversed after less than a week's time with the court rendering a decision that both Jr. College elections were invalid which reverts the district back to the original Jr. College district with a 20 cent tax rate. The ruling was signed by Alton B. Chapman, Associate Justice. The three judges hearing the case were James G. Denton, Chief Justice, Ernest O. Northcutt and Alton B. Chapman, Associate Justices.
The Clarendon Jr. College Board of Regents met Monday night and were unanimous to keep the college in operation if at all possible. College heads were instructed to prepare petitions to be circulated to call an election to set the tax rate at 85 cents per 100 dollar valuation at

Public School valuations of property in the old Jr. College District. This would be an increase of 25 cents over the 60 cent rate recently voted for the enlarged college district. These petitions will be completed within a short time and the election called for at an early date.
By increasing the rate to 85 cents on property in the old college district, the Board of Regents feel that the college can continue to operate until the court battle is finished.
The Board of Regents is hoping to solve the situation by taking the case to the Supreme Court. Should the Supreme Court reverse the Appellate Court's decision, the district would then revert back to the enlarged district which was the choice of the majority of voters in the College elections. Residents are asked to go ahead and pay the 60 cent tax rate to allow operation of the college until the above mentioned election is held.
Everyone eligible is urged to pay their poll tax before the deadline this month so you can cast your vote in whatever elections that may come up.

She passed away in the Inez Rest Home Saturday, December 28, at 12:05 a.m. after an illness of 11 years.

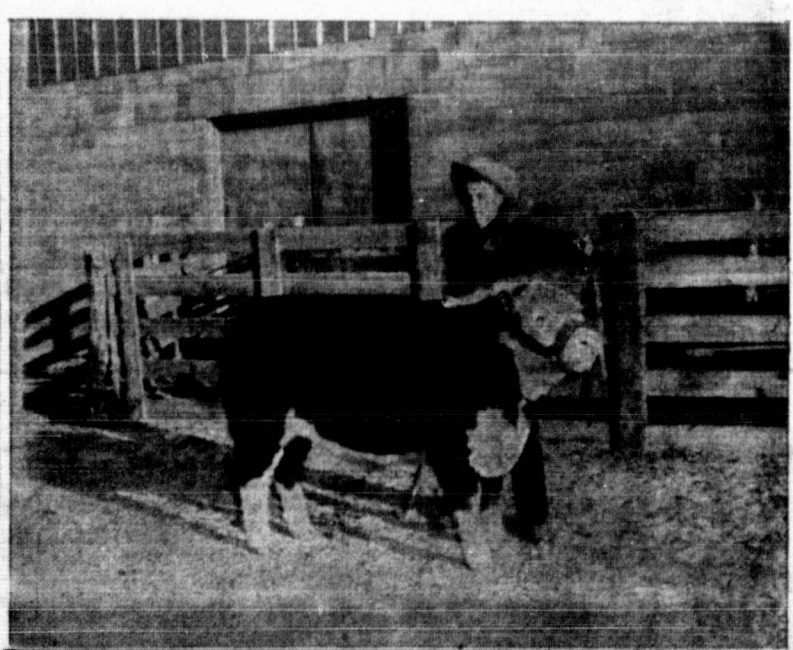

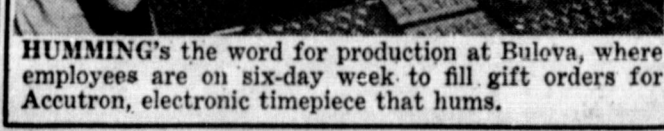

Welch, Extension Soil Chemist at Texas A&M, who is in charge of the laboratory, says that right now they are process- ing the samples and getting the returns to the producer with- in a week. They hope to maintain this prompt service through Jan- uary, Welch says, but generally the requests for soil tests increase after Christmas and there is of- ten a delay in getting a reply.

Welch suggests that you con- sult your county agent on how to take a representative sample. He can also tell you how soil tests can supply you with in- formation that will help you make greater profits from the use of fertilizer.

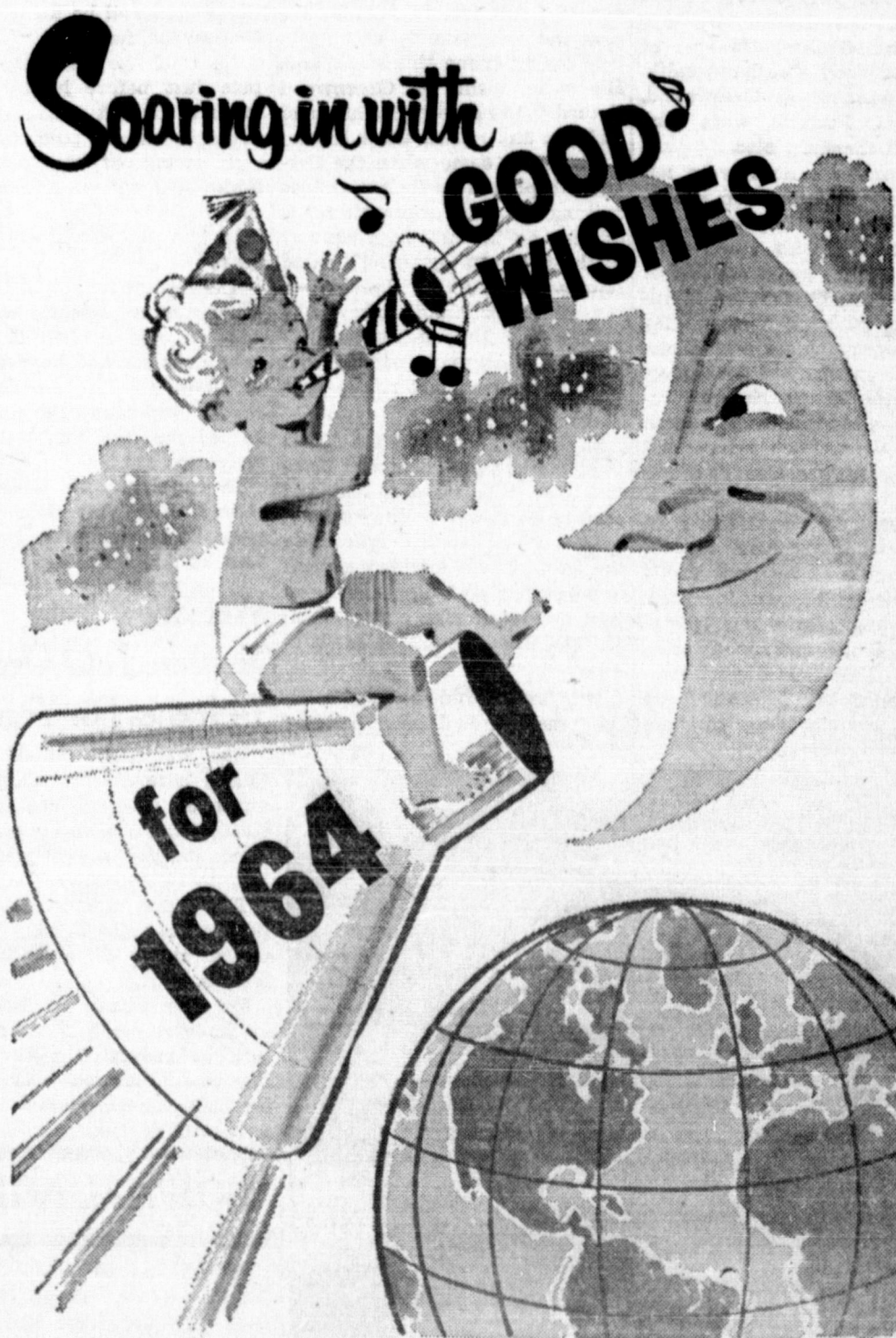

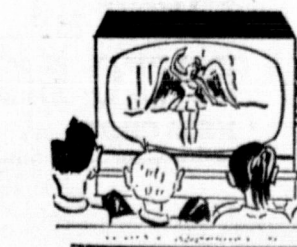

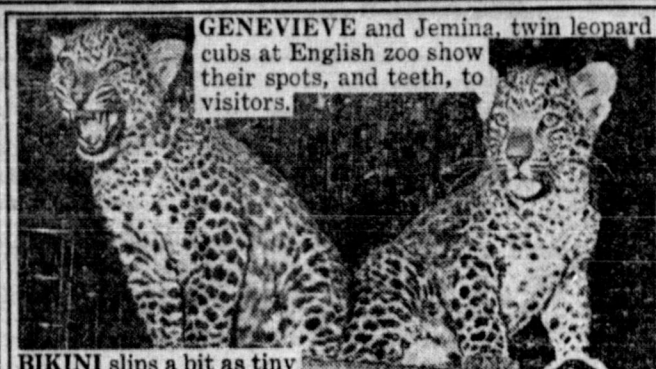

FARMERS MAY GET HEAD START ON MOTHER NATURE COLLEGE STATION — Farmers may soon be able to keep two steps ahead of mother nature by accurately predicting the growth rates of their crops, says the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

By the use of a formula developed by the Department, plant response to specific environmental influences can be measured. The formula is based on the relationship between leaf development and environmental factors. It is applicable to any plant species and could be used with equal success to calculate the importance of any environmental influence on any crop. The scientists have already measured four influences known to have a strong effect on plant development. They are temperature, moisture, light intensity and day length, according to the Department.

The researchers says that a grower could tell ahead of time just when to irrigate or fertilize his crop and in some seasons he would be able to save water and fertilizer and the labor required to apply them. The formula would also help scientists in developing new crops of value by enabling them to predict their adaptability to the various growing areas of the U.S.

Technically the formula is a mathematical equation that expresses the relative monthly contribution that each environmental influence makes to a plant's growth. The scientists used corn and three new crops in their experiments which may some day put farmers two steps ahead of nature

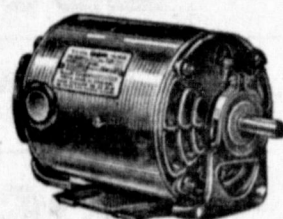

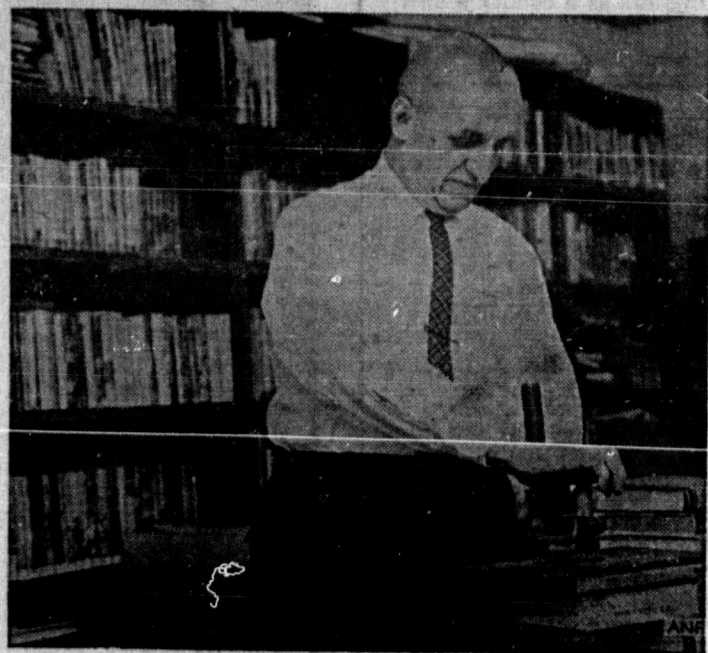

Producers are reminded that the 1963 marketing year under the National Wool Program ends December 31. The 1963 marketing year has been shortened to nine months in order to shift the wool marketing year to a calendar year basis, beginning in 1964. Because this is a change from previous programs, some producers may let the deadline slip by, thinking that they have several more months before the current program's end.

Applications for payments under the National Wool Act may be filed with the ASCS county office up until January 31, 1964. Since the program year will end earlier than usual — on December 31, the 1963 payments will likely begin in April of next year instead of late summer, as under previous programs.

Producers are reminded to report any 1963 ACP practices by the end of the year. The 1964 program will be ready to start on January 1.
