All entries must be in place by 9 a.m. on the 17th and ready for judging. Many exhibits will need to be set up on the 16th, the day before the fair opens so they will be ready on opening day.

Chairmen of the various departments for this year's fair include: Flower Show, Mrs. Douglas Shelton; Merchants Exhibits, R. E. Drennan; Community Agricultural Exhibits, Ronald Gooch; Home Economics Department, Mrs. Bobby Dishman. Rules and judging dates for each department are listed in the Fair catalogue. Catalogues are available from most merchants or may be picked up at the County Agent's office. Everyone in Donley County is invited and urged to have entries in this year's Fair.

Night School Registration Set At Clarendon College

Registration for night classes at Clarendon College opens at 7:00 P.M. on Wednesday, September 8th, and will continue thru September 22nd. Enrollment may be completed from 7:00-9:00 P.M. on September 8, 9, 13, 14, and 15, as well as during regular office hours.

After September 15, registration may be completed only during office hours. Night courses offered include Bible, American History, American Government, Psychology, freshman and sophomore English. The tuition charge is \$7.50 per semester hour.

Senate Expansion Rejected In State Vote

The Texas big city vote smashed an attempt Tuesday to expand the state Senate from its present 31 members to 39. The Texas Election Bureau reported 116,604 votes against and 71,596 for in tabulations from 220 of the state's 254 counties, 137 counties complete. That gave opponents of the proposal 61.96 per cent of the vote.

The vote in the amendment election here in Donley County was better than in most places with a total of 334 votes being cast. 288 voted for the amendment with 46 against. A total of 203 votes were cast at the two voting places here in town.

If voters in the rural areas had really turned out in full strength, we might have had better prospects of better representation in Austin.

With the showers over the week end and the addition of .31 here in town, the 1965 moisture total now stands at 14.46 inches. Up to 1 1/2 inches was received in some parts of the county Sunday afternoon.

June was the big month with 7.42 inches. May and August were next with 2.04 and 2.19 respectively. Moisture was slim in January with .20 inch. Other amounts were: Feb. .42; March .49; April .89; July .50 and September so far .31 with two-thirds of the month to go yet.

Young Homemakers Sponsor Baking And Canning Exhibits At Fair

The Clarendon Chapter of Young Homemakers of Texas will sponsor the Baking and Canning department's exhibits at the County Fair September 17-18 and invite you to bring in your canned or baked goods. All exhibits are to be in place by 9 a.m. September 17th and must be displayed both days of the fair.

Entries in the Baked department must be wrapped in saran and tagged with name and address of the exhibitor. You should indicate the class you desire your product to be entered. The Cake division will include special decorated cakes, angel food and sponge cakes, buttered cakes, and chiffon cakes. The division for pies includes fruit pies, cream pies, custard pies, and other open face pies. Cookies should be displayed using one dozen per entry. They may be rolled cookies, drop cookies, other cookies, and doughnuts. The bread division will include yeast bread, cornbread, and sweet breads.

The Canned Goods department should be one of the best ever this year since gardens have been productive all summer. Items should be in glass jars no larger than one quart size. Each should be labeled showing name and address of the exhibitor and class to be entered. Divisions will include vegetables, fruits, jellies, pickles, and meats.

Consult your Fair Catalogue for judging time of these products. An out-of-town judge will view all entries and indicate the placement of ribbons. The Young Homemakers of Clarendon challenge you to participate in this department. Points will be awarded for each ribbon won: five points for a blue; four points for a red; and three points for a white. A trophy will be given to the individual accumulating the most points. If you would like to sell any of your entries, leave the price with the Young Homemaker in charge or include it on your name tag.

Members of Les Beaux Arts Club would like to remind each of you that it's "that time of the year again; time for the flower show, which is to be held in conjunction with the Donley County Fair, September 17th and 18th."

Put your imagination to work and let's make this an outstanding flower show. Your entries add a great deal of color and gaiety to our Fair. Ribbons will be given for first, second, third, fourth, and fifth places in each division.

A sweepstakes trophy will be awarded to the person accumulating the most points. Points will be given in each class as follows: five points for first; four points for second; three points for third; two points for fourth; and one point for fifth place.

Trophies will also be awarded for the best specimen and the best over-all arrangement.

Classes of flowers and the general rules are as follows: Arrangement—Dahlias, Roses, Marigolds, Shadow Boxes, Fall Flowers, Summer Flowers, Wild Flowers, Dried Material, Vegetables and Fruit, Material other than Blossoms, Centerpieces of special occasion tables; Children—(A) eight years and over, (B) seven years and under. Specimen Classes—Dahlias, Roses, Potted Ferns.

General Rules: 1. All entries must be at the Fair Barn not later than 9:30 a.m., Friday, Sept. 17th. Judging will begin at 10 o'clock.

2. All arrangements must be complete upon delivery to the show, or may be arranged, by the contestant only, at the Fair Barn. (Facilities will be available.)

3. Contestants names should be affixed to the bottom of containers where they cannot be seen.

4. Specimen flowers must be displayed in attractive containers.

5. Card tables will be furnished for centerpieces and special occasion arrangements. These may be accompanied by complementing tablecloths, place mats, candleholders, etc. Any holiday or special occasion may be used.

6. All late entries, and those not conforming to above classifications will be displayed, but will not be judged.

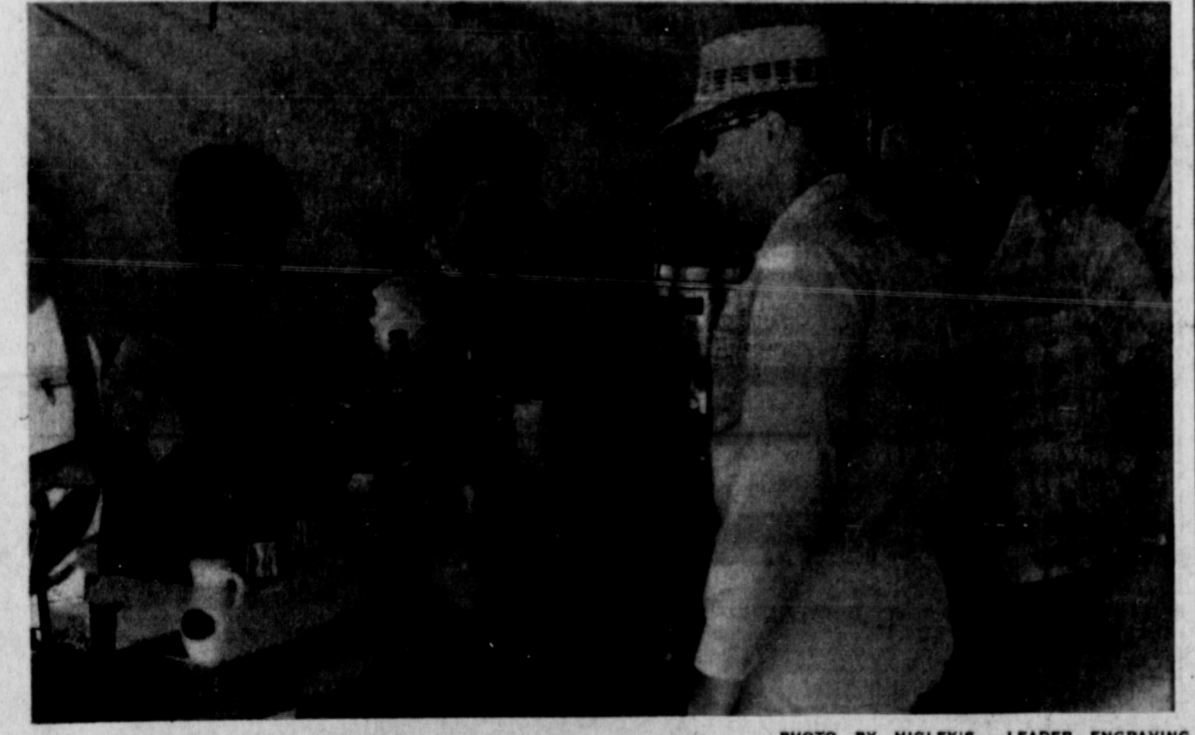

NEWS FROM CITY HALL

by R. L. Gilkey, Mayor

Financially we are in much better shape this month than last. Income should be \$10,300 and the expenses, including the payroll, should be approximately \$9,900.

With the starting of school let's be on the lookout for children crossing the streets near school and crossing the highway. Traffic through Clarendon is ever increasing and some of the cars and trucks are speeding. Speeding traffic violations are rarely committed by our own townspeople; it is usually a traveler. Occasionally one of our teenagers will be caught speeding, but for the adults our primary violation is illegal parking. As Judge of the Corporation Court, I am lenient with first offenders, strict with second offenders and harsh with third offenders. Last week I fined a 15 year old for being caught a second time without a driver's license. A driver's license doesn't sound like much, but this person caused an accident then left the scene to prevent being apprehended. If this person had just waited until legal age, then taken the driver's test, she possibly would not have been involved in the recent accident. Be sure that your child has a license before driving on public thoroughfares.

The hardest job for your present mayor is to wait. It has always been my policy to complete a task as soon as possible, as well as possible. This can't be done in Clarendon. Progress is a slow process in our city. We lack the funds for paving streets, for sewer extensions, for city services that the taxpayer deserves. We will make some sewer extensions in the next few months and pave a portion of West Third street I hope. Only now are we thinking more than just a month, or a year or two ahead. Now we need to plan five, ten and twenty-five years ahead. Clarendon has been here a long time and will be here a lot longer, so we need long range plans. And we need an administrator to help with these plans.

More than a dozen new state boards, agencies and licensing organizations go into effect this week.

Heading the list of important new agencies are the Coordinating Board, Texas Colleges and Universities to direct the state's higher education system (replacing the Commission on Higher Education) and the new State Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. The latter supplants the Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools.

Tuberculosis control functions of the old hospital board to go to the State Health Department assisted by a new Tuberculosis Advisory Committee to the State Board of Health.

Among other groups which began functioning September 1 under broad reorganization plans ordered by the 59th Legislature are the Texas Water Rights Commission and the Water Development Board.

Legislation also set up an Air Control Board (for air pollution regulation), an Indian Affairs Commission, a Fine Arts Commission, and special licensing organizations for pesticide applicators, sanitarians and polygraph examiners.

All have legislative-directed missions in the rapidly-changing scene of a growing state government. Broadest changes in state history are expected of new programs for the hospital and higher education systems under revamped administrative organizations.

APPOINTMENTS — Gov. John Connally has buckled down to work on the mass of appointments to the many, generally unpaid, state boards, and commissions which run these state agencies.

Many of his choices are reappointments, either of his own earlier appointees or those of

former Gov. Price Daniel.

New State Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation will contain six from the old Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools. They are Ward Burke, Lufkin attorney; Dr. Horace Cromer, Austin physician; Mrs. H. E. Butt, Corpus Christi psychiatrist; and former State Rep. Jesse Osborn, Muleshoe business.

FPC ASKED TO RECONSIDER — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has filed a rehearing motion with the Federal Power Commission on its recent decision to set the area price for old gas in the Permian Basin at 14.5 cents per mcf and for new gas well gas at 16.5 cents.

Both the oil industry in the basin and the State had requested a price not less than 20 cents mcf on all gas.

Carr said the lower ceiling price set by the FPC would have a direct and material effect on the State's revenue from taxation.

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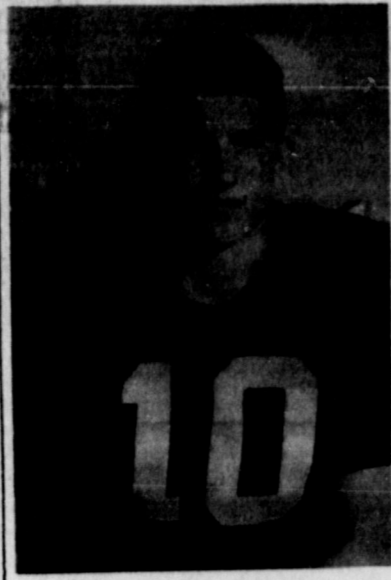
Greyhounds Out-Race Broncs 44-12

Inexperience hurt Friday night as the Clarendon Bronchos, six-point underdogs before the game, fell before the Gruver Greyhounds, 44-12, in the opening game of the season.

Gruver, with plenty of experience to go around, was ranked second this week in Class A Pan-handle teams by the Amarillo paper. First ranking went to White Deer, a District 2-A foe of the Bronchos.

Despite the score, Clarendon had several things to brag about. Among them was the running of sophomore wingback Mac McClellan who scored both of Clarendon's touchdowns; defensive play by David Mooring, Lance Gardner, Odell Louis, Richard Thornberry and Barry Tyler; and the "come-back" feeling during the second half.

Gruver clobbered the Bronchos in the first half with sophomore halfback Frank Silva gaining 160 yards in 21 carries for a 7.2

the first quarter. Silva added the conversion points.

Clarendon received the kickoff and in three plays, two of them attempted passes, lost 13 yards and was forced to kick. Gruver quarterback Mack Hoel returned the kick 27 yards to the C27 and the Greyhounds scored in four plays with Don Matthews doing the honors with a six yard run. Silva again converted.

In the second quarter, Gruver added another touchdown with Sam Arnold running 14 yards over left tackle and Hoel converted on a rollout.

With 5:47 left in the half, Hoel attempted a draw play but the fullback was stopped and the former Gruver guard saw light and dashed 18 yards for another touchdown and then followed it with a two-point conversion.

McClellan put the Bronchos into the scoring action and capped a 51 yard drive in 11 plays when he dove over the goal line from the one-foot line with 1:36 left in the half. The conversion attempt failed.

Clarendon started a rally in the second half and looked like a different team. The Bronchos took the kickoff and marched 60 yards in eight plays with McClellan scoring on a fine 35 yard scamper while the clock showed 8:25 left in the quarter.

The two teams played on even terms until the final quarter when Gruver lucked into a fumble following an interception for a score.

Hoel attempted a pass to end Richard Razor and the ball was juggled, then intercepted by Clarendon defensive linebacker Mike Horton on the C17. Horton returned it to the C22 where he was hit and the ball squirted into the air and into the hands of Silva who dashed the 22 yards into the end zone. The conversion attempt failed.

Gruver followed with another touchdown in only five plays after a Clarendon fumble when Matthews dashed 20 yards with 7:57 left in the game for the final score.

Clarendon will be hosted this week by the Claude Mustangs in a game starting at 8 p.m. Friday.
