This is a map of the proposed Greenbelt Water Authority Dam and the area it will embrace. The big X on the map shows the Old Clarendon Town section which was named in the first condemnation suit filed here Tuesday to acquire the necessary acreage for the dam and lake; other suits will follow. The location of the dam is shown to the right of the X mark. The heavy line around the proposed lake shows the actual water level controlled by the spillway and the dotted line shows the area which will be covered in flood stage. The bid notice on the dam should be forthcoming within the next two to three weeks.



PROPOSED CONSTITU-TIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLU-TION NO. 47 proposing an Amendment to Section 4, Art-icle III, Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide four-year terms of office for State Representatives. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the

State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 4. The members of the House of Representatives

A friend of the library gave a bunch of hard backed adult fiction to us. These are in their original dust jackets which are still like brand new.



Another question, and equally mportant, is it safe to pass a 'double-bottom"? We again refer to the Department of Commerce report showing a 10 m.p.h. speed

differential (car at 60 and truck at 50 m.p.h., for example) it takes 15.17 seconds for the car to pass a 55 feet long combination on a two-lane road. If the truck is 65 feet long, the passing time is 15.75 seconds, only two-thirds of a second more.

Mainly, we will need to allow just a little more time and distance in passing these vehicles and look forward to seeing them on our roads day and night.
