Johnson only a trace at Hedley. A part of these outlying areas received good moisture Friday evening or in other showers.

Crops are growing off fine even though they are late and a few more cotton showers like those the past week will push crops along in good order. The showers have cooled the area down some to make ideal growing weather.

## First Of Condemnation Suits Filed In Connection With Greenbelt Dam

Flip Breedlove and his crew will barbecue the chicken and through the courtesy of the Farmers State Bank Cotton John's more recent film, "Go View The Land," will be shown as a part of the program.

Maurice Risley, president of the Farm Bureau, asks that all who plan to attend the barbecue leave a half chicken for each member of your party at the Locker plant either in Hedley or Clarendon no later than noon Friday. The trimmings will be furnished.

### TWO ESCAPE JAIL HERE SUNDAY NITE

According to Sheriff Bill Cornell, Roy Strother Jr., 20, a soldier from Ft. Sill, Okla., who was absent without official leave from the Army, and who was picked up here Saturday night by the Sheriff's Department, and Dallas Clark, 17, who was being held here on a burglary charge in connection with the Moreman Grocery robbery at Hedley some time ago, escaped the local jail about 9:30 Sunday night.

The two inmates removed brick to the side of window bars in a west window and made their way to freedom. This same window has been used in previous breaks as the brick and mortar are old and crumbly. The two escaped in Strother's car which was parked to the west of the Jail.

Bill Lowe, Attorney for the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, reported Wednesday morning that the first of several condemnation suits was filed in County Court here Tuesday afternoon and that Judge R. E. Drennan was in the process of appointing Special Commissioners who will function in connection with the suits.

The first suit named the Panhandle Plains Historical Museum Society which has jurisdiction over the Old Clarendon Town section.

Lowe reported that agreements had been reached with several land owners in the area but other condemnation suits would be filed possibly Friday against those with whom a satisfactory agreement could not be reached. Customarily two to three weeks is all the time necessary to clear the condemnation suits, Lowe added.

He also reported that all necessary material was now ready whereby advertisement for bids on actual construction of the dam could be made and this bid notice will possibly be released for publication within the next two to three weeks.

Lowe received a letter from Greenbelt engineers Wednesday morning dealing with a notice for bid contract No. 7 which is the Supervisory Control System which will be installed at the Filtration Plant north of Clarendon. The letter stated as follows: The equipment for which bids will be received is the remainder of the Supervisory Control System which, when installed, will operate the complete water system from a central point. The estimated amount of the contract is \$85,000. Bids will be opened at 2 p.m. September 2, 1965.

It appears now that actual activity in connection with the construction of the dam itself is not too far away. There are many unforeseen legal technicalities connected with a large project of this nature and these are beginning to disappear rapidly and we can really get down to business, Lowe concluded.

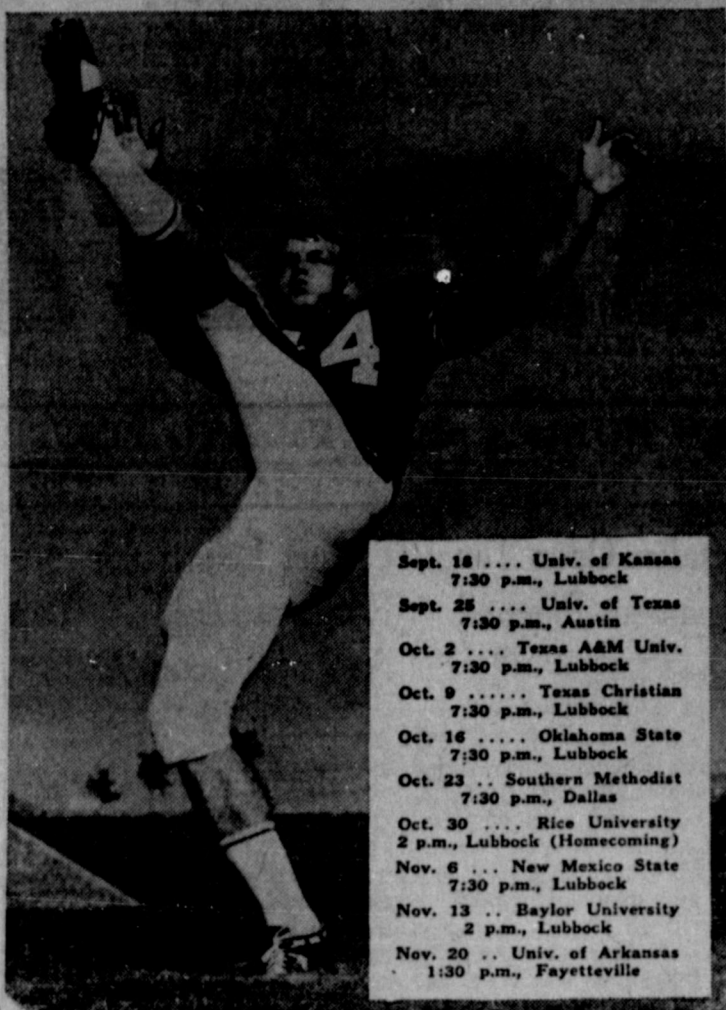

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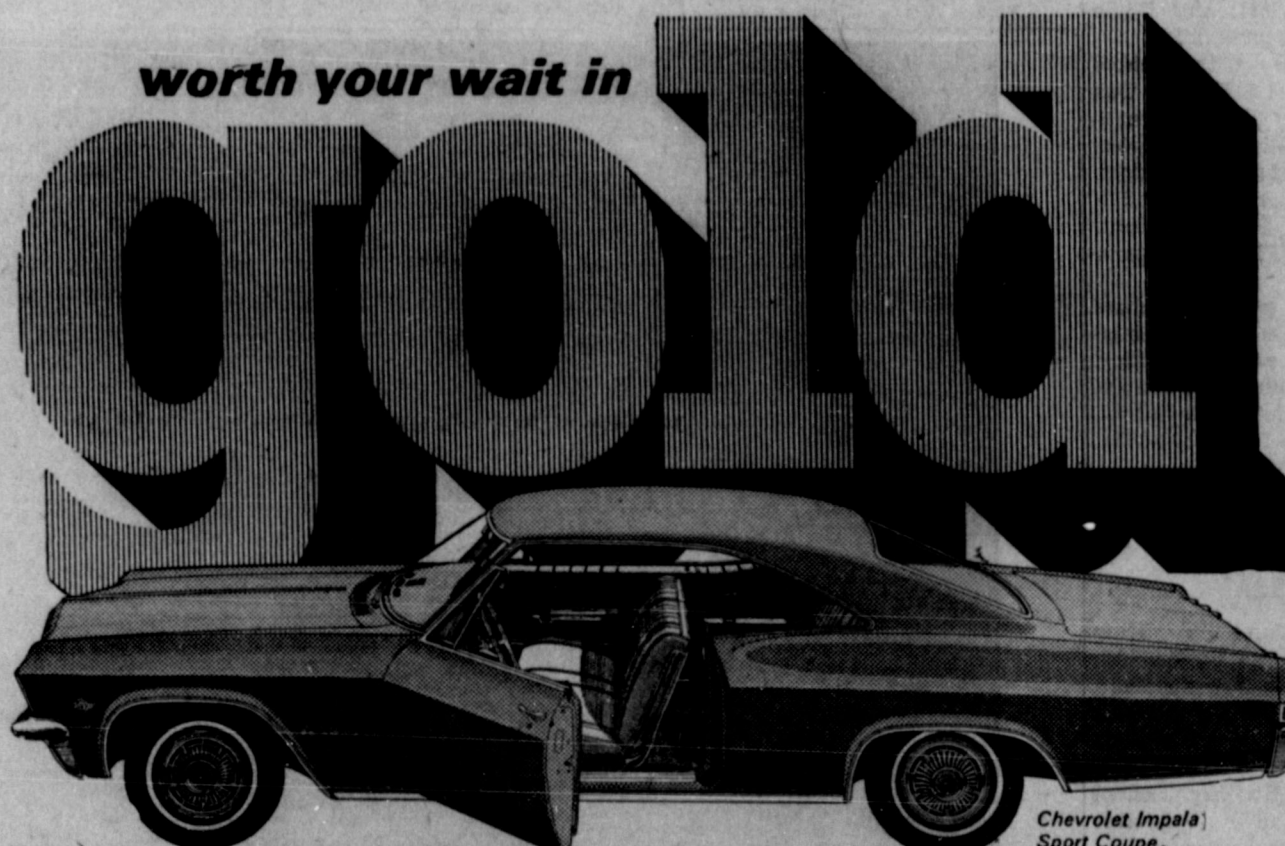

Million Dollars (\$400,000,000);  
providing for the issuance of  
said bonds or obligations and  
the conditions relating thereto  
and the use of the Veterans'  
Land Fund; and providing for  
an election and the issuance of  
a proclamation therefor.

LEGISLATURE OF THE  
STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-  
b, Article III of the Constitu-  
tion of Texas, be amended so  
that the same will hereafter  
read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of  
prior Amendments to this  
Constitution, there has been  
created a governmental agency  
of the State of Texas per-  
forming governmental duties  
which has been designated the  
Veterans' Land Board. Said  
Board shall continue to  
function for the purposes spe-  
cified in all of the prior Con-  
stitutional Amendments ex-  
cept as modified herein. Said  
Board shall be composed of  
the Commissioner of the Gen-  
eral Land Office and two (2)  
citizens of the State of Tex-  
as, one (1) of whom shall be  
well versed in veterans' af-  
fairs and one (1) of whom  
shall be well versed in finan-  
ces. One (1) such citizen  
member shall, with the advice  
and consent of the Senate, be  
appointed biennially by the  
Governor to serve for a term  
of four (4) years; but the  
members serving on said  
Board on the date of adoption  
hereof shall complete the term  
to which they were ap-  
pointed. In the event of the  
resignation or death of any  
such citizen member, the Gov-  
ernor shall appoint a replace-  
ment to serve for the unex-  
pired portion of the term to  
which the deceased or resign-  
ing member had been ap-  
pointed. The compensation for  
said citizen members shall be  
as is now or may hereafter be  
fixed by the Legislature; and  
each shall make bond in such  
amount as is now or may  
hereafter be prescribed by the  
Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the  
General Land Office shall act  
as Chairman of said Board  
and shall be the administra-  
tor of the Veterans' Land Pro-  
gram under such terms and re-  
strictions as are now or may  
hereafter be provided by law.  
In the absence or illness of  
said Commissioner, the Chief  
Clerk of the General Land Of-  
fice shall be the Acting Chair-  
man of said Board with the  
same duties and powers that  
said Commissioner would have  
if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board  
may provide for, issue and sell  
not to exceed Four Hundred  
Million Dollars (\$400,000,000)  
in bonds or obligations of the  
State of Texas for the purpose  
of creating a fund to be  
known as the Veterans' Land  
Fund. Two Hundred Million  
Dollars (\$200,000,000) of  
which have heretofore been is-  
sued and sold. Such bonds or  
obligations shall be sold for

not less than par value and  
accrued interest; shall be is-  
sued in such forms, denomina-  
tions, and upon such terms  
as are now or may hereafter  
be provided by law; shall be  
issued and sold at such times,  
at such places, and in such  
installments as may be de-  
termined by said Board; and  
shall bear a rate or rates of  
interest as may be fixed by  
said Board but the weighted  
average annual interest rate,  
as that phrase is commonly  
and ordinarily used and under-  
stood in the municipal bond  
markets, of all the bonds issued  
and sold in any installment of  
any bonds may not exceed  
four and one-half per cent  
(4 1/2%). All bonds or obliga-  
tions issued and sold hereunder  
der shall, after execution by  
the Board, approval by the  
Attorney General of Texas,  
registration by the Comptroller  
of Public Accounts of the  
State of Texas, and delivery  
to the purchaser or purchas-  
ers, be incontestable and shall  
constitute general obligations  
of the State of Texas under  
the Constitution of Texas;  
and all bonds heretofore is-  
sued and sold by said Board  
are hereby in all respects val-  
idated and declared to be gen-  
eral obligations of the State  
of Texas. In order to prevent  
default in the payment of  
principal or interest on any  
such bonds, the Legislature  
shall appropriate a sufficient  
amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such  
bonds or obligations, a prefer-  
ential right of purchase shall  
be given to the administrators  
of the various Teacher Reti-  
rement Funds, the Perma-  
nent University Funds, and  
the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund  
shall consist of any lands  
heretofore or hereafter pur-  
chased by said Board, until the  
sale price therefor, together  
with any interest and penalti-  
es due, have been received  
by said Board (although noth-  
ing herein shall be construed  
to prevent said Board from ac-  
cepting full payment for a  
portion of any tract), and of  
the moneys attributable to  
any bonds heretofore or here-  
after issued and sold by said  
Board which moneys so attrib-  
utable shall include but shall  
not be limited to the proceeds  
from the issuance and sale of  
such bonds; the moneys re-  
ceived from the sale or resale  
of any lands, or rights there-  
in, purchased with such  
proceeds; the moneys received  
from the sale or resale of any  
lands, or rights therein, pur-  
chased with other moneys at-  
tributable to such bonds; the  
interest and penalties received  
from the sale or resale of such  
lands, or rights therein; the  
bonuses, income, rents, royalti-  
es, and any other pecuniary  
benefit received by said Board  
from any such lands; sums re-  
ceived by way of indemnity or  
forfeiture for the failure of  
any bidder for the purchase  
of any such bonds to comply  
with his bid and accept and pay  
for such bonds or for the failure  
of any bidder for the purchase  
of any lands comprising a  
part of said Fund to comply  
with his bid and accept and  
pay for any such lands; and  
interest received from invest-  
ments of any such moneys.  
The principal and interest on  
the bonds heretofore and here-  
after issued by said Board  
shall be paid out of the

moneys of said Fund in con-  
formance with the Constitu-  
tional provisions authorizing  
such bonds; but the moneys  
of said Fund which are not  
immediately committed to the  
payment of principal and in-  
terest on such bonds, the pur-  
chase of lands as herein pro-  
vided, or the payment of ex-  
penses as herein provided may  
be invested in bonds or obli-  
gations of the United States  
until such funds are needed  
for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a  
part of said Fund and not ex-  
pended for the purposes here-  
in provided shall be a part of  
said Fund until there are suf-  
ficient moneys therein to re-  
tire fully all of the bonds  
heretofore or hereafter issued  
and sold by said Board, at  
which time all such moneys  
remaining in said Fund, ex-  
cept such portion thereof as  
may be necessary to retire all  
such bonds which portion shall  
be set aside and retained in  
said Fund for the purpose of  
retiring all such bonds, shall  
be deposited to the credit of  
the General Revenue Fund to  
be appropriated to such pur-  
poses as may be prescribed  
by law. All moneys becoming  
a part of said Fund hereafter  
shall likewise be deposited to  
the credit of the General Re-  
venue Fund.

"When a Division of said  
Fund (each Division consist-  
ing of the moneys attribut-  
able to the bonds issued and  
sold pursuant to a single Con-  
stitutional authorization and  
the lands purchased there-  
with) contains sufficient moneys  
to retire all of the bonds  
secured by such Division, the  
moneys thereof, except such  
portion as may be needed to  
retire all of the bonds secured  
by such Division which portion  
shall be set aside and remain  
a part of such Division for  
the purpose of retiring all  
such bonds, may be used for  
the purpose of paying the  
principal and the interest  
thereon, together with the ex-  
penses herein authorized, of  
any other bonds heretofore  
or hereafter issued and sold  
by said Board. Such use shall  
be a matter for the discretion  
and direction of said Board;  
but there may be no such use  
of any such moneys contrary  
to the rights of any holder of  
any of the bonds issued and  
sold by said Board or viola-  
tion of any contract to which  
said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund  
shall be used by said Board  
for the purpose of purchas-  
ing lands situated in the State  
of Texas owned by the United  
States or any governmental  
agency thereof, owned by the  
Texas Prison System or any  
other governmental agency of  
the State of Texas, or owned  
by any person, firm, or cor-  
poration. All lands thus pur-  
chased shall be acquired at the  
lowest price obtainable, to be  
paid for in cash, and shall  
be a part of said Fund. Such  
lands heretofore or hereafter  
purchased and comprising a  
part of said Fund are here-  
by declared to be held for a  
governmental purpose, al-  
though the individual purchas-  
ers thereof shall be subject to  
taxation to the same extent  
and in the same manner as  
are purchasers of lands dedi-  
cated to the Permanent Free  
Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans'  
Land Fund shall be sold by  
said Board in such quantities,  
on such terms, at such prices,  
at such rates of interest and  
under such rules and regula-  
tions as are now or may here-  
after be provided by law to

Texas veterans who served not  
less than ninety (90) contin-  
uous days, unless sooner dis-  
charged by reason of a serv-  
ice-connected disability, on  
active duty in the Army, Navy,  
Air Force, Coast Guard or  
Marine Corps of the United  
States between September  
16, 1940, and March 31, 1955,  
and who upon the date of fil-  
ing his or her application to  
purchase any such land is a  
citizen of the United States,  
is a bona fide resident of the  
State of Texas, and has not  
been dishonorably discharged  
from any branch of the Armed  
Forces above-named and who  
at the time of his or her en-  
listment, induction, commis-  
sioning, or drafting was a  
bona fide resident of the State  
of Texas. The foregoing not-  
withstanding, any lands in the  
Veterans' Land Fund which  
have been first offered for  
sale to veterans and which  
have not been sold may be  
sold or resold to such pur-  
chasers, in such quantities,  
and on such terms, and at  
such prices and rates of in-  
terest, and under such rules  
and regulations as are now or  
may hereafter be provided  
by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund,  
to the extent of the moneys  
attributable to any bonds  
hereafter issued and sold by  
said Board, as is now or may  
hereafter be provided by law,  
for the purpose of paying the  
expenses of surveying, monu-  
menting, road construction, le-  
gal fees, recordation fees, ad-  
vertising and other like costs  
necessary or incidental to the  
purchase and sale, or resale,  
of any lands purchased with  
any of the moneys attribut-  
able to such additional bonds,  
such expenses to be added to  
the price of such lands when  
sold, or resold, by said Board;  
for the purpose of paying the  
expenses of issuing, selling,  
and delivering any such addi-  
tional bonds; and for the pur-  
pose of meeting the expenses  
of paying the interest or  
principal due or to become  
due on any such additional  
bonds.

"All moneys attributable to  
the bonds issued and sold  
pursuant to the Constitu-  
tional Amendment adopted on  
November 6, 1956, shall be cre-  
dited to said Veterans' Land  
Fund and may be used for  
the purpose of purchasing  
additional lands, to be sold as  
provided herein, until Decem-  
ber 1, 1965; provided, how-  
ever, that so much of such  
moneys as may be necessary  
to pay interest on such bonds  
shall be set aside for that  
purpose. After December 1, 1965,  
all moneys attributable to such  
bonds shall be set aside for  
the retirement of such bonds  
and to pay interest thereon;  
and when there are sufficient  
moneys to retire all of such  
bonds, all of such moneys then  
remaining or thereafter be-  
coming a part of said Veter-  
ans' Land Fund shall be  
governed as elsewhere pro-  
vided herein.

"All of the moneys attrib-  
utable to any series of bonds  
hereafter issued and sold by  
said Board (a series of bonds  
being all of the bonds issued  
and sold in a single transaction  
as a single installment of  
bonds) may be used for the  
purchase of lands as herein  
provided, to be sold as herein  
provided, for a period ending  
eight (8) years after the date  
of sale of such series of bonds;  
provided, however, that so  
much of such moneys as may  
be necessary to pay interest on  
bonds hereafter issued and sold

shall be set aside for that pur-  
pose in accordance with the  
resolution adopted by said  
Board authorizing the issu-  
ance and sale of such series  
of bonds. After such eight (8)  
year period, all of such moneys  
shall be set aside for the  
retirement of any bonds here-  
after issued and sold and to  
pay interest thereon, together  
with any expenses as provided  
herein, in accordance with the  
resolution or resolutions au-  
thorizing the issuance and sale  
of such additional bonds, until  
there are sufficient moneys to  
retire all of the bonds here-  
after issued and sold, at which  
time all such moneys then re-  
maining a part of said Veter-  
ans' Land Fund and there-  
after becoming a part of said  
Fund shall be governed as  
elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being in-  
tended only to establish a ba-  
sic framework and not to be a  
comprehensive treatment of  
the Veterans' Land Program,  
there is hereby reposed in the  
Legislature full power to im-  
plement and effectuate the de-  
sign and objects of this A  
mendment, including the  
power to delegate such duties,  
responsibilities, functions, and  
authority to the Veterans'  
Land Board as it believes nec-  
essary.

"Should the Legislature en-  
act any enabling laws in anti-  
cipation of this Amendment,  
no such law shall be void by  
reason of its anticipatory na-  
ture.

"This Amendment shall be-  
come effective upon its adop-  
tion."  
Section 2. The foregoing  
Constitutional Amendment  
shall be submitted to a vote  
of the qualified electors of  
this state at an election to be  
held on the first Tuesday  
after the first Monday in  
November, 1965, at which elec-  
tion all ballots shall have  
printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to  
Section 49-b of Article III  
of the Constitution of Texas  
to increase the Veterans'  
Land Fund by \$200,000,000;  
said Fund to be used for  
the purpose of purchasing  
land in Texas to be sold to  
Texas veterans who served  
in the Armed Services of  
the United States between  
September 16, 1940, and  
March 31, 1955; such funds  
to be expended in accord-  
ance with instructions and  
requirements that may be  
provided by law"; and  
"AGAINST the Amendment  
to Section 49-b of Article  
III of the Constitution of  
Texas to increase the Veter-  
ans' Land Fund by \$200,  
000,000.00; said Fund to be  
used for the purpose of pur-  
chasing land in Texas to be  
sold to Texas veterans who  
served in the Armed Ser-  
vices of the United States  
between September 16,  
1940, and March 31, 1955;  
such funds to be expended  
in accordance with instruc-  
tions and requirements that  
may be provided by law."

If it appears from the re-  
turns of said election that a  
majority of the votes cast  
were in favor of same Amend-  
ment, the same shall become a  
part of the State Constitu-  
tion and be effective from the  
date set forth in said Amend-  
ment, and the Governor shall  
issue a proclamation in keep-  
ing therewith.

Section 3. The Governor of  
the State of Texas shall issue  
the necessary proclamation  
for said election and shall  
have the same published as  
required by the Constitution  
and Laws of this state.

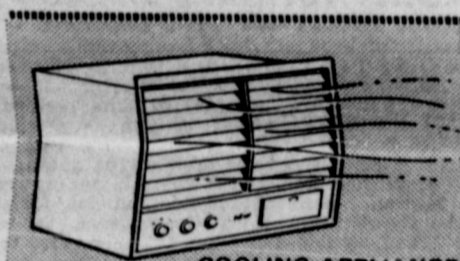

paid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"(d) The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

"(e) All bonds issued under such higher education by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution.

"(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature.

"FOR THE Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for loans to students at institutions of higher education to be known as the Texas Opportunity Plan."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 87 proposing an Amendment to Section 1 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding to said Section as presently written, the following provisions: requiring automatic retirement of certain District and Appellate Judges at age seventy-five (75) or such earlier age, not under seventy (70), as may be provided by law; creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission and providing for its composition and the qualifications, methods of selection and terms of office of its members; defining the functions and procedures of said Commission, including the duty to investigate, and hold hearings in respect of disability and misconduct of District and Appellate Judges and to make recommendations to the Supreme Court of Texas for involuntary retirement or removal of such Judges; empowering the Supreme Court of Texas, in its discretion, to retire such Judges for disability and to remove them for misconduct, upon recommendation of the aforesaid Commission and consideration of the record made before it; defining misconduct for which said Judges may be so removed; providing that the proceedings of said Commission shall be confidential until filed in the Supreme Court with recommendation for retirement or removal; and providing that the removal provisions hereby established shall be alternative to and cumulative of those provided elsewhere in the Constitution.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that said Section shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1-a. (1) Subject to the further provisions of this Section, the Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Justices and Judges of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age and disability, and for their resignation to active service when and where needed. The office of every such Justice and Judge shall become vacant when the incumbent reaches the age of seventy-five (75) years or such earlier age, not less than seventy (70) years, as the Legislature may prescribe; but, in the case of an incumbent whose term of office includes the effective date of this Amendment, this provision shall not prevent

him from serving the remainder of said term nor be applicable to him before his period or periods of judicial service shall have reached a total of ten (10) years.

"(2) There is hereby created the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, to consist of nine (9) members, to wit: (i) two (2) Justices of Courts of Civil Appeals; (ii) two (2) District Judges; (iii) two (2) members of the State Bar, who have respectively practiced as such for over ten (10) consecutive years next preceding their selection; (iiii) three (3) citizens, at least thirty (30) years of age, not licensed to practice law nor holding any salaried public office or employment; provided that no person shall be or remain a member of the Commission, who does not maintain physical residence within this State, or who resides in, or holds a judgeship within or for the same Supreme Judicial District as another member of the Commission, or who shall have ceased to retain the qualifications above specified for his respective class of membership.

"(3) The regular term of office of Commissioners shall be six (6) years; but the initial members of each of classes (i), (ii) and (iii) shall respectively be chosen for terms of four (4) and six (6) years, and the initial members of class (iii) for respective terms of two (2), four (4) and six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. Commissioners may succeed themselves in office only if having served less than three (3) consecutive years.

"(4) Commissioners shall receive no compensation for their services as such. The Legislature shall provide for the payment of the necessary expense for the operation of the Commission.

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement or removal of Justices or Judges shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) Any Justice or Judge within the scope of this Section 1-a may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any such Justice or Judge may be involuntarily retired for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to misconduct or disability of particular Justices or Judges, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) The Commission may, after such investigation as it deems necessary, order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal or retirement of a Justice or Judge, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefore, it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal or retirement, as the case may be, of the Justice or Judge in question and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order removal or retirement, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement or disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary.

"(10) All papers filed with and proceedings before the Commission or a Master shall be confidential, and the filing of papers with, and the giving

of testimony before, the Commission, Master or the Supreme Court shall be privileged; provided that upon being filed in the Supreme Court the record loses its confidential character.

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the judge in remaining in office is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings of this nature.

"(12) No Justice or Judge shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to, and cumulative of, the methods of removal of Justices and Judges provided elsewhere in this Constitution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing Amendments to Section 4, 22 and 23 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; and certain statutory state officers; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 4, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty-three years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this state at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Section 22, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the state in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the state in which the state may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the state, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Section 23, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

Sec. 4. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be construed so as to extend the term of office of any officeholder previously elected to a two-year term.

Sec. 5. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

"FOR THE Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

"AGAINST THE Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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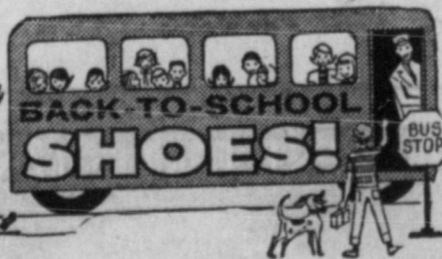

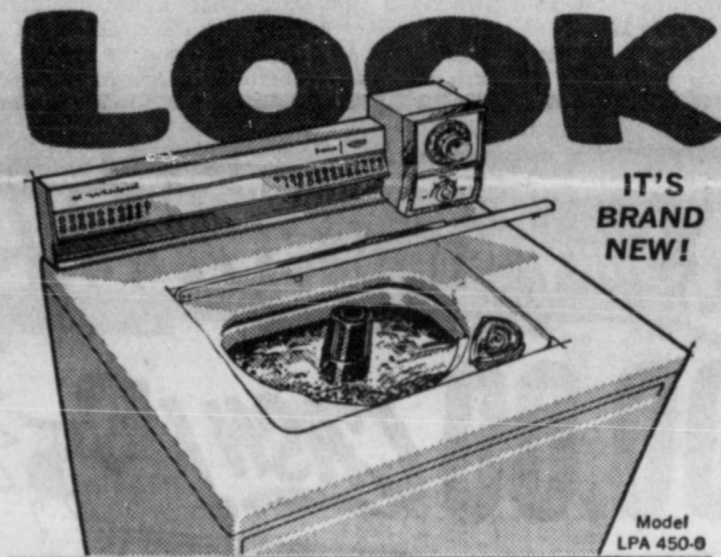

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Gov. John Connally's future plans are the talk of the capital. On his decision hinges the political future of many Democratic candidates for numerous federal and state offices.

No one in the party wants to run against the popular Democratic leader and top vote-getter, but there is talk of his possible retirement. This would change the complexion of many races in 1966.

Connally has indicated that he will make his plans known before the General Election in November. This in order that other state political figures, whose moves depend on his, can set their own sails.

In the latter category are Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr. Both want to run for governor.

A race by Smith and Carr for the higher office naturally would place their own jobs up for grabs—and plenty of candidates would file for these posts.

Connally says that neither the four-year term amendment, which will be voted on November 2, nor the possibility of a federal ap-

pointment will play a part in his decision whether or not to retire.

Other speculations is that he may run for the U. S. Senate next year against the incumbent, Republican Sen. John Tower.

There, also is talk, that regardless of Connally's decision, US Senator Ralph Yarborough may enter the Governor's race next year. He could do this without relinquishing his present post.

So goes the talk in the state capital where speculation always runs high.

**NOT SO BAD** — Dr. James Schless, director of the state's TB hospital system, isn't claiming perfection, but he doesn't think the number of persons leaving the hospital against medical advice is alarming.

"We don't bat a thousand," said Schless, "but a layman looking at the figures could easily get the wrong impression."

Figures he referred to reveal that out of the 2,914 persons who left the state's TB hospital's last year, 601 of them left without medical advice.

Dr. Schless says most of those 601 were non-contagious. They

were cured and they are not a menace to public health. But they left before receiving the 18-24 months of treatment necessary to give them a 98-percent chance of never having TB again.

Those who leave before getting past the contagious stage usually are returned quickly by health authorities. After "going over the hill," such patients usually are quarantined.

**ORANGE POLLUTION**—State Water Pollution Control Board has asked officials of the City of Orange to try again to get approval of a bond issue to provide funds for correcting the city's pollution of the Sabine River.

Orange voters recently turned down a \$3,000,000 bond issue by a mere 29 votes. It would have corrected the city's sewer troubles.

Mayor Neil Miller Jr. admits that the city's sewer system is polluting the river at six points within the city limits. He said the city must re-submit the matter to the voters.

**INTERSTATE HIGHWAY** — Plans for development of a section of Interstate Highway 10 west of Fort Stockton in Pecos County have been approved by the Texas Highway Commission.

Area extends from 5.9 miles west of Fort Stockton to 7 miles east on the present US 67.

**HIGHWAY HEARINGS**—Texas Highway Commission, working on its busiest docket in years, heard 19 county delegations request \$82,167,010 for highway construction projects.

By far the largest requests came from Dallas and Harris counties.

The Falcon Tourist Route Association gained a generally favorable reaction from the Commission when it asked that a 207-mile route from San Antonio to Zapata be given a single number.

They preferred that it be designated as US 283 or Texas Highway 16. Route through Bexar, Atascosa, McMullen, Duval, Jim Hogg and Zapata counties now has a number of designations.

**SALES UP** — June retail sales in Texas was up 2 percent over May, reports the University of Texas' Bureau of Business Research.

Ordinarily, June sales are down an average of 6 percent from May. Bureau's only explanation for the rise was the fact that June was the state's first month of consistently sunny, pleasant shopping weather.

**COMMITTEES APPOINTED**—Additional interim committees have been named by House Speaker Ben Barnes and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith.

Barnes appointed Reps. Paul Floyd, Wayne Gibbons, Gene Hendrix, George Hinson, Randy Pendleton, Tommy Shannon, Richard Slack, James Slider, Terry Townsend and Ralph Wayne to the Legislative Council.

Smith named Sens. A. M. Aiken Jr., Dorsey Hardeman, Grady Hazelwood and Bill Moore to the Budget Board.

He also appointed:

- Sens. Tom Creighton, Ralph Hall, Jack Hightower, Abraham Kazen, Jr., and Don Kennard to study elections.
- Sens. Criss Cole, Martin Dies Jr., Bill Patman, Walter Ritcher and Franklin Spears to study the nursing profession.
- Sens. Roy Harrington, Andy Rogers and Pete Snelson to study college faculty compensation.

**TEXAS TOURISM GETS NEW BOOST** — A Texas movie entitled "TEXAS — Land of Contrasts" soon will be available for showings before civic groups throughout Texas and the nation.

It is a professional job produced entirely within the Texas Highway Department, except for the guest commentator. Its estimated value is \$70,000. But the department self-produced it for \$9,300.

The 28-minute production was filmed by Hal Stegmen. Script was written by Keith Elliott. Dave Smith, Austin public relations executive, is commentator.

More than 100 copies of the color film are being made by the Department.

In discussing the film Herb Petry, chairman of the Highway Commission, said: "This is Texas as it really is — a Fun-tier State — offering recreational attractions to suit every taste. It features our forests, mountains, plains, seashore, caverns, lakes and many cultural attractions.

Said Tom Taylor, director of the Travel and Information Division, "Texas is so large that to depict its many wondrous attractions in a single 30-minute film is virtually impossible. This,

therefore, is the first of a series designed to make Texas better known to both residents and outsiders as a recreational center."

First to sign up for a showing was the Texas Press Association. TPA scheduled the film for its 15th Annual Advertising Convention in Galveston on September 11. Bob Warner, former newspaperman now a Highway Department information officer, will handle the Galveston presentation.

**VISITORS GET BREAK**—Free parking for tourists who wish to visit the state capitol has proved a boom.

Perennial parking problem around the capitol for years has kept many visitors away. But no more.

Where the Old Walton Building once stood, directly in front of the capitol grounds at 11th and Congress, the state has provided plenty of parking space exclusively for tourists. Two hours of free parking are furnished in a supervised lot.

Results is a noticeable increase in the number of in-state as well as out-of-state visitors.

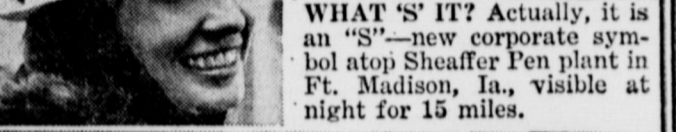

## NEWS FROM CITY HALL

by R. L. Gilkey, Mayor

No business can run smoothly all the time. This is true of city business also. During the month of July we all used a lot of water, hence our income is up this month. Also during July our expenses increased, about \$4000.00 during July alone, so we will end up in the red. But the city has been in the red before.

Careful review of income and expenses in years past reveals that we have operated on an extremely narrow budget for many, many years. I wonder how the city administration in years past has been able to operate as efficiently as it did. It has been difficult to operate the city on water revenue, for the taxes do not begin to pay for the cost of city operations. Hopefully in 1966 true tax valuations can be made.

There is a silver lining in this black financial cloud. In 1971 we should be debt free. Here is what is taking our money:—

- 1927 Water Works Bond
- 1927 Refunding Bond
- 1929 Water Works Refunding Bond
- 1952 Permanent Improvement Bond

These bonds were necessary for our city, but the amount was so great that we can't afford any further debt. This year alone we will pay \$18,472 toward the retirement of these bonds.

When these debts are completed we will then have the money to provide the services a city should provide for its citizens. We can then vote to have more street paving if we wish, we can then become a truly progressive city if we desire. But right now I am not in favor of spending my tax dollar or yours on a large bond issue. We simply can't afford the interest over such a long period

of time as we have in the past twenty-five years. We just have to "do without" another five years, and then we'll be free to spend today's money on today's problems, not on a 25 year old debt.

## JAMES D. HOWZE RECEIVES TECH PROMOTION

Promotions announced by the Texas Tech Department of Architecture and Allied Arts this week included the naming of James D. Howze to the position of Associate Professor in the Art program there.

Howze, who is a former Clarendon resident and the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Howze of this city, is an award-winning graphic designer and a 1966 nominee for a Danforth Foundation grant in painting. His paintings are to be found in several private collections in the southwest including those of William J. Lowe, Mrs. C. G. Stricklin, and Mrs. Walter Taylor of Clarendon. He has been a national committee chairman for the American Academy of Advertising, president of the Texas Watercolor Association, and an officer in the Lubbock Art Association. His work has been exhibited most recently in the West Texas Museum at Lubbock, The Dallas-Ft. Worth Art Directors' Club, and a one-man showing sponsored by an architectural firm.

In discussing his role as a teacher, Howze acknowledges the debt that graphic design owes to the pure painter, and he recognizes a lack of understanding of the relationship between the two fields that seems peculiar to America. He hopes by further investigation in the painting area to prepare himself to bridge this gap in the minds of his students so that they may reach the point of specialization with a broader basis of understanding.

## LONGER VEHICLES DUE ON TEXAS ROADS

The Legislature has seen fit to allow the operation of longer vehicles on Texas highways. These vehicles can be a maximum of 65 feet. The present length for a combination of vehicles is 50 feet. The law has been changed as a result of the trucking industry seeking to improve the efficiency and quality of service to the public.

These combinations commonly known as "double bottoms," although used extensively, are virtually unknown in many areas of the country. Texas has been one of these areas. However, beginning September 1, 1965, we will begin seeing the "big-rigs" on the roads.

Our purpose in this article is to acquaint the motoring public with the fact that the bigger and longer vehicles will be on our roads. And, though we occasionally see a long truck, mobile home, or some oil field equipment on the highway and we need to drive accordingly — these are not too numerous. The "double-bottoms" will be there day and night, especially on our thru highways.

In the past a vehicle combination of this type would have required a permit and would not have been allowed on the roadway at night.

Since the picture is changing, Texas motorists will need to change some driving habits. Look for these longer and larger vehicles at night.

Naturally your question is, can they "fit" into present day traffic? Let's look at the turning movements of these 65 feet length "double-bottoms." According to Traffic Safety, a National Safety Council publication, the Department of Commerce says that, after tests they ran, the 65 feet combinations have less off-tracking than the 50 feet, five-axle tractor semitrailers.

"For a 90 degree turn, such as a city street intersection, the 65

feet 'double' has a track width 2.7 feet narrower than the 50 feet tractor semitrailer."

Turning on the cloverleaf intersections of the Interstate System, the Department of Commerce tests show the "doubles" are 1.2 feet narrower than those of the smaller combinations.

Another question, and equally important, is it safe to pass a "double-bottom"? We again refer to the Department of Commerce report showing a 10 m.p.h. speed differential (car at 60 and truck at 50 m.p.h., for example) it takes 15.17 seconds for the car to pass a 55 feet long combination on a two-lane road. If the truck is 65 feet long, the passing time is 15.75 seconds, only two-thirds of a second more.

Mainly, we will need to allow just a little more time and distance in passing these vehicles and look forward to seeing them on our roads day and night.
