FARM NEWS

from County ASCS Committee

REPORTING PERFORMANCE We want to again remind all farmers (except those who still have a Soil Bank contract in effect) that you are responsible for measuring your own crops and diverted acreages and turning them in to the ASCS County Office as soon as possible, but not later than September 1. Failure to make your report and certification by this deadline will result in loss of program payments. About one-half of the farmers have made their reports to date. Too much delay may catch you in the middle of the last minute rush period. Also, the sooner we have these reports, the sooner we will be able to compute payments.

MEASURING SERVICE A measuring service on cotton, feed grain and diverted acres is available by the ASCS Office. Those who plan to request the service must do so by August 5. There will be a charge for this service.

EMERGENCY GRAZING To date approximately 50 producers have filed requests to graze soil bank and diverted acres. Any additional producers wanting to graze any of these acreages should keep in mind that applications must be filed before any stock are turned on them. If our authorized grazing period is extended beyond August 31, it will be necessary to file new applications before grazing can be continued.

PREVENTED FROM PLANTING BY NATURAL DISASTER If any person is prevented from planting cotton or feed grain due to drought and he would have planted if moisture conditions had permitted, he may make application to the county committee to have this acreage that would have been planted counted as planted for the purpose of price support payments.

Martin Named Chief Of Dallas Geomagnetic Center At Richardson

The appointment of Ronny A. Martin, 29, of Clarendon, Texas, as chief of the Dallas Geomagnetic Observatory at Richardson, Texas, was announced today by the Coast and Geodetic Survey of the Environmental Science Services Administration (ESSA), U. S. Department of Commerce.

The C&GS observatory is located on the campus of the Graduate Research Center of the Southwest. The quarter million dollar facility maintains a constant recording of the earth's magnetic field.

Martin, a geophysicist, was born in Memphis, Texas, and grew up in Clarendon, Texas, where he attended high school from 1951 to 1955 and junior college from 1955 to 1957. He received a B. S. degree in geology from Texas Technological College in Lubbock in 1960 and joined the Survey in January 1962. Prior to his present assignment, he served as a staff member of the Fredericksburg Observatory at Corbin, Va.

Martin succeeds David M. Perkins, who has been named chief of the Survey's Castle Rock Observatory near Palo Alto, Calif.

Martin resides with his wife, the former Janice Benson, of Clarendon, and a daughter, Kelly, 4, at 914 Prestwick Lane, Richardson. Martin's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Aubrey Martin, and Mrs. Martin's parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Benson, reside in Clarendon.

Walter Rogers Out Of House Race

Cong. Walter Rogers announced Sunday his withdrawal from the congressional race and his intention to return to private law practice at the end of his term of office which is the end of this year. He has represented this district since 1951.

His announcement was in the form of a letter to county Democratic chairmen in the 18th Congressional District.

His letter to Miss Mary Cooke, Chairman Democratic Executive Committee of Donley County, read as follows:

It is with deep regret that I must advise you that I have decided to decline the nomination to appear on the ballot in the General Election in November. It is my intention to re-enter the private practice of law at the end of this term of Congress. Hence, I feel that this decision should be brought to your attention at the earliest possible moment; also, it would not be fair for me to continue as the nominee and resign after the Election.

Needless to say, this has been one of the most difficult decisions I have ever had to make or will ever have to make. However, after exhaustive and careful consideration of all factors, I have reached this conclusion.

The great wealth of able and qualified individuals of the true American tradition in the Panhandle of Texas should enable the Democratic Party to choose another nominee for this position in accordance with the law and in ample time for such nominee to conduct a highly successful campaign.

Several candidates have already pitched their hat in the ring for the office to be vacated by Rogers and the Democratic Nominee will be chosen by the thirty County Democratic Chairmen in the 18th Congressional District. This nominee is expected to be named possibly at the end of this week.

The Democratic Nominee will then face Bob Price of Pampa, Republican candidate for the office, in the November General Election. This leaves very little campaign time for the Democratic Candidate.

Petitions Withdrawn Tuesday Calling For Wet Election

The Leader was notified Tuesday that the petitions presented last week seeking an election to determine whether the county would remain dry or go wet, were withdrawn Tuesday due to several technicalities that could possibly throw out the election at a later date or prevent the Commissioners Court from calling such an election.

The law states that a serial number be placed on the petitions before they are issued and these were absent, and the petitions were filed later than the time limit.

It was the opinion of those circulating the petitions that all stated requirements of the law be met in every detail so the election would be bonafide in every respect. Rulings in this regard have been received from the Attorney General's office and we understand that work is underway to get new petitions circulated.

CONTRACT LET FOR WIDENING HIGHWAY 287 EAST

Carroll Hudson, Highway Engineer in Clarendon, announced this week that bids were opened Wednesday afternoon, July 27th for construction and widening of 287 east of Clarendon for a distance of 14.3 miles.

The contract was awarded to Ivan Dement, Inc. of Amarillo, Texas and S. S. Strain & Sons, Inc. of Tye, Texas on a combination bid. Cost of the project will be \$1,364,000. Work is expected to begin about August 20th. Curb and gutter will be constructed through Lelia Lake and Hedley as has been done in Clarendon.

Monday Is Hottest Day With 105

Monday, August 1st was the scorching and the hottest day recorded here in the past two years according to a report by our official weather observer. The mercury has been hanging around the century mark for a number of days with the highest previous reading at 103.

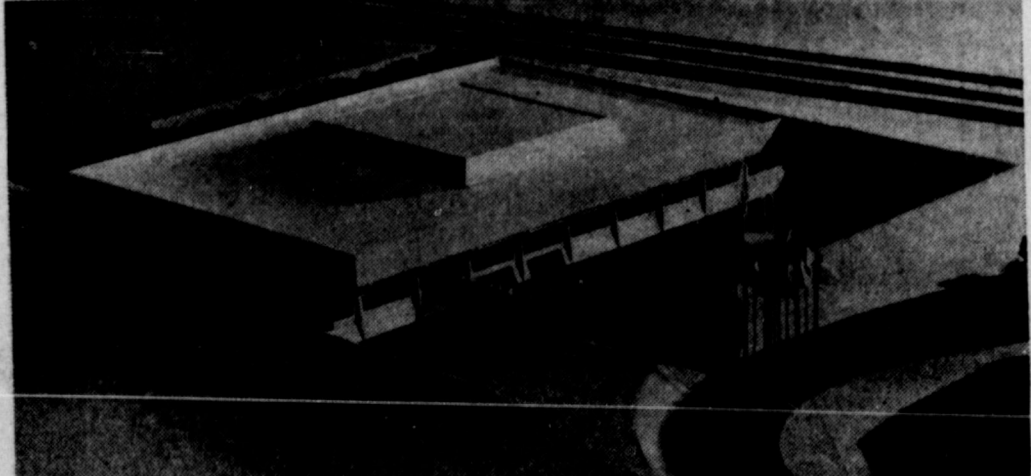

Nation's 300,000th M.D. To Be A 'Family Doctor'

NORMAN, Okla.—The nation's 300,000th physician was graduated from medical school in June at the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine.

Jerry Dean Leu, 29, of Alva, Okla., plans to become a smalltown "family doctor." First, however, he will go on for four more years of internship and residency training in internal medicine.

Dr. Leu's graduation marks a medical milestone—the first time 300,000 physicians have been available to serve Americans. The number of M.D.'s in the U.S. now is increasing faster than the general population. The ratio is better than one physician for every 680 people, compared to one for every 737 in 1960. By 1975, the AMA estimates, the ratio will be down to one physician for every 638 persons.

Even more physicians are needed to meet an insatiable demand for medical services, the American Medical Association says. The increase in demand for medical services has come about through a growing health consciousness on the part of the public, scientific advances in medicine, new government health programs and the growth in population, the AMA pointed out.

Becoming a doctor wasn't easy for Jerry Leu.

"When I was in high school, I wanted to go to medical school, but I had doubts about my ability and whether I could obtain the



necessary funds," he said.

Dr. Leu said his wife's work and loans through the AMA's Education and Research Foundation and the Oklahoma State Medical Association made it possible to obtain his degree.

He was accepted for medical school in 1962 after graduation from Northwestern State College, Alva, and Air Force service as a

medical research technician.

"I want to establish a family-type practice in a smaller town of 15,000 to 30,000 population," Dr. Leu said. "Why a family practice? It's hard to explain. I want to know my patients—know them as individuals and as families."

He plans to take his internship at the University Hospital, University of Oklahoma Medical Center.

MONEY FOR MILITARY STRENGTH SECOND-TO-NONE

The House of Representatives recently voted overwhelmingly to approve what most of us believe should be termed the most important single bill to come before us this Session—the appropriations bill to provide funds for military activities in the 1967 fiscal year, which began July 1. It is the largest defense appropriations bill since World War II.

Defense expenditures must come first in any consideration involving Government spending. The old "guns versus butter" argument is not an either-or proposition. The maintenance of our security is the paramount problem for the United States—the principal responsibility of the Congress and the Administration—and unopposed military power is an absolute necessity.

The defense appropriations bill passed by the House called for additional military spending authority of \$58.6 billion. The De-

partment had on hand, when the last fiscal year ended June 30, approximately \$42 billion in unexpended funds, most of it earmarked for specific obligations in weapons procurement, research and development, and the variety of other commitments entailed in our defense program. Therefore, there will be available for defense purposes in the current fiscal year (assuming the Senate confirms the House action) a total of \$100 billion, although, again, part of this money will not have been expended by the end of the year. Some of it "leadtime" items, such as ships.

Our defense cannot be conducted in this modern age without huge outlays of money. We cannot economize where economy brings risks of disaster and defeat. Despite the uninformed statements of persons who, for their own devious reasons, would seek to have their neighbors believe that disarmament is imminent, the Congress has held unwaveringly to the position that defense comes first—and annually acts accordingly by voting military appropriations bills by majorities such as the House recorded on the current measure 392 to 1. There is nothing new about this. For the four fiscal years 1962-65,

the Congress provided for the military functions of the Defense Department a total of \$198.2 billion, compared with \$156.8 billion provided for the four fiscal years 1957-60. (Fiscal Year 1961 is omitted from the comparison because it was the transition year between administrations and 1965 is used as the terminal date because it immediately preceded the major deployment of U. S. troops in Vietnam.) The United States spent \$41 billion more for defense purposes in the 1962-65 period than in the 1957-60 period. The fact that we have spent money for military purposes at a high level over recent years has permitted us to avoid having to go into a "crash" program to meet increased requirements brought on by the war in Vietnam. We are spending billions more because of Vietnam, but the impact on the economy—and the taxpayer — has been lessened because of the steady preparations made through heavy expenditures of earlier years.

The men and women who serve in the Congress are determined to keep this Nation strong, the strongest in the world. The bill voted by the House contained a variety of provisions. One provision of particular interest to the Panhandle area, because of B-52 Strategic Air Command operations at Amarillo Air Force Base, called for the retention of 45 of the huge B-52 bombers originally scheduled to be phased out in 1967 and to maintain our B-52 fleet at the 600-bomber level. The bill also provided funds to support additional development work on an advanced manned strategic aircraft, the possible successor to the B-52 as our big manned bomber.

MAN SAVES SELF AFTER SNAKE BITE

The well-publicized snake situation this spring found at least one satisfied customer.

A man phoned Dan Klepper, outdoor editor of the San Antonio Express-News, to thank him for describing what to do if a poisonous snake strikes.

The man was picking strawberries when he saw a rattler a split second before the snake bit him astride the knuckle of the middle finger.

Remembering what he read, the man did not panic, walked to his pickup and borrowed some ice from the first house available.

With his hand packed in ice, he drove to a San Antonio hospital where the incision-suction treatment was used because the man was allergic to antiven serum.

Four days later the man telephoned Klepper his gratitude plus

the report he was recovering without permanent ill effects.

Here is what the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department pamphlet on poisonous snakes states on first aid treatment for snake bite:

"It is important that every snake bite victim receive first aid treatment as soon as possible. The patient must not exert himself by running, because increased circulation, brought on by such physical activity, will speed up absorption of the poison. For the

reason the use of whiskey or other stimulants should be avoided.

"The victim's state of mind is important; he must promptly be convinced that his chances of recovery are good—and indeed they are. He should not be terrified by the thought that every snake bite means certain death. Actually a survey of case histories shows that with prompt and proper treatment, only about two percent of all snake bites in this country are fatal."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 69 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section, Section 63, to Article III; authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for the accomplishment of governmental functions within any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants by the consolidation of the functions of government or by contract between any political subdivision(s) located within the county and any other political subdivision(s) located within the county or with the county; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III, to be known as Section 63, reading as follows:

"Section 63

"(1) The Legislature may by statute provide for the consolidation of some functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county in this State having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these political subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require.

"(2) The county government, or any political subdivision comprising or located therein, may contract one with another for the performance of governmental functions re-

quired or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe. The term 'governmental functions,' as it relates to counties, includes all duties, activities and operations of state-wide importance in which the county acts for the State, as well as of local importance, whether required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to omit the requirement that members of the armed services vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by deleting the following language:

"Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

The text of this Section is shown below, with a broken line through the sentence which is to be deleted:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like man-

ner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Sec. 2. The only purpose of the amendment proposed in this Resolution is to make the aforesaid deletion. The adoption of this amendment shall not be deemed to have the effect of readopting the remainder of the Section, and if any other amendment to this Section, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this amendment shall not be construed as nullifying the change made by such other amendment.

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."

Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 5. If the foregoing amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Section as amended herein and any other proposed amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the terms of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 30c. (a) The terms of office of persons serving on the governing body of a political subdivision of the State created to further the purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, of this Constitution, shall never exceed six years.

"(b) Statutory provisions enacted before the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, relating to the terms of office of governing bodies of political subdivisions created to further the

purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, are validated, so long as the provisions do not provide for a term of office which exceeds six years."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election.

"The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and continue in office until the expiration of the term of office for which each has

been elected or appointed under the present Constitution and laws of this state, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

"The two members of the Commission of Appeals in aid of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and shall hold their offices, one for a term of two years and the other for a term of four years, beginning the first day of January following the adoption of this Amendment and until their successors are elected and qualified. Said Judges shall by agreement or otherwise designate the incumbent for each of the terms mentioned.

"The Governor shall designate one of the five Judges as Presiding Judge and at the expiration of his term and each six years thereafter a Presiding Judge shall be elected."

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of the Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction coextensive with the limits of the state in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law.

"The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have power upon affidavit or otherwise to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the exercise of its jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Ap-

peals may sit for the transaction of business at any time from the first Monday in October to the last Saturday in September in each year, at the State Capitol. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall appoint a clerk of the court who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and who shall hold his office for a term of four years unless sooner removed by the court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said court.

"The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment."

Sec. 3. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:

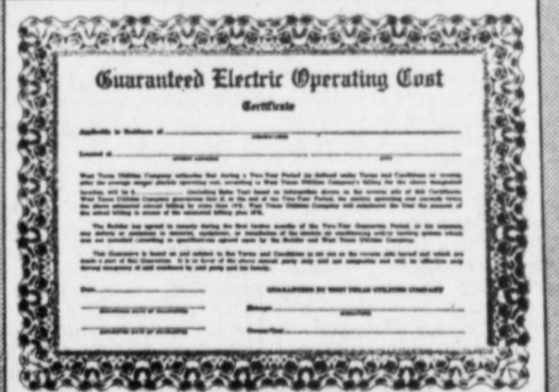
"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published and said election shall be held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.

3 HIGHWAY ACCIDENTS IN COUNTY DURING JUNE

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of June, according to Sergeant J. W. Wilson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in four persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,225.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1966 shows a total of 29 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 12 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$13,030.00.

The number of traffic deaths in Texas continues to rise. For the

first six months of 1966 there have been 1470 traffic deaths compared to 1325 traffic deaths for the first months of 1965. This 11% increase is very alarming, and chances are it will become very critical because of vacation months and holiday periods still ahead to intensify the magnitude of the accident picture.

The Sergeant stated, "It is estimated that at the end of 1966 traffic deaths in Texas will increase about 10% over 1965 which means approximately 3300 persons will be killed in traffic accidents." The Sergeant added one other comment, "To control accidents, we must first learn to control ourselves."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President, and on all state-wide offices, questions or propositions by persons qualified to vote in this State except for meeting county or district residence requirements, and to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President by otherwise qualified United States citizens who have moved into or out of the State preceding a presidential election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to read: "Section 2a. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide a method of registration, including the time of such registration, permitting any person who is qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements within a county or district, as set forth in Section 2 of this Article, to vote for (1) electors for President and Vice President of the United States and (2) all offices, questions

or propositions to be voted on by all electors throughout this State.

"(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting any person (1) who is qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements of Section 2 of this Article, and (2) who shall have resided anywhere within this State at least thirty (30) days next preceding a General Election in a presidential election year, and (3) who shall have been a qualified elector in another state immediately prior to his removal to this State or would have been eligible to vote in such other state had he remained there until such election, to vote for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in that election.

"(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting absentee voting for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in this State by former residents of this State (1) who have moved to another state, and (2) who meet all qualifications, except residence requirements, for voting for electors for President and Vice President in this State at the time of the election, but the privileges of suffrage so granted shall be only for

such period of time as would permit a former resident of this State to meet the residence requirements for voting in his new state of residence, and in no case for more than twenty-four (24) months."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment permitting persons qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements in a county or district to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors and for all state-wide offices, questions or propositions, and permitting citizens of the United States recently arrived or departed from the State to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment permitting persons qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements in a county or district to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors and for all state-wide offices, questions or propositions, and permitting citizens of the United States recently arrived or departed from the State to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 12; authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties; authorizing the creation of a board of directors by appointment or election; providing that the membership of the board shall be based upon the proportionate part of the population of each county, with no county having less than one member; providing for the necessary election; authorizing the levy of an annual tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority; authorizing the Authority to employ or appoint an assessor and collector of taxes whose duty it shall be to assess and collect the taxes on the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors of said Authority, said taxes shall be assessed equally and uniformly throughout the county or counties, comprising the Authority, as required by the Constitution; granting to such Authority the power to acquire by purchase, or through eminent domain proceedings existing publicly financed airport properties or other sites necessary to have and to improve the same, power to issue and sell general obligation bonds and revenue bonds, or either of them; authorizing the assumption of outstanding indebtedness secured by general obligation bonds and assuming the obligations of the city or cities under ordinances and bond indentures under which revenue bonds have been issued and sold; to enact zoning regulations and other measures to protect the airport facilities from hazards and obstructions; providing for the adding of an additional county or counties to the Authority.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 12, reading as follows: "Section 12. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of

Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, with power to issue general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, or either of them, for the purchase, acquisition by the exercise of the power of eminent domain or otherwise, construction, reconstruction, repair or renovation of any airport or airports, landing fields and runways, airport buildings, hangars, facilities, equipment, fixtures, and any and all property, real or personal, necessary to operate, equip and maintain an airport; shall provide for the option by the governing body of the city or cities whose airport facilities are served by certified airlines and whose facility or some interest therein, is proposed to be or has been acquired by the Authority, to either appoint or elect a Board of Directors of said Authority; if the Directors are appointed such appointment shall be made by the County Commissioners Court after consultation with the governing body of such city or cities, and if the Board of Directors is elected they shall be elected by the qualified taxpayer voters of the county or counties, said Directors to represent that county, such Directors shall serve without compensation for a term fixed by the Legislature not to exceed six (6) years, and shall be selected on the basis of the proportionate population of each county based upon the last preceding Federal Census, and shall be a resident or residents of the county or counties in which such Authority is to be created; provide that no county shall have less than one (1) member on the Board of Directors; provide for the holding of an election in each county proposing the creation of an Authority to be called by the Commissioners Court or Commissioners Courts, as the case may be, upon petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxpayer voters within the county or counties, said elections to be held on the same day if more than one county is included, provided that no more than one (1) such election may be called in a county until after the expiration of one (1) year, in the event such an election has failed, and thereafter only upon a petition of ten per cent (10%) of the qualified taxpayer voters being presented to the Commissioners Court or Commissioners Courts of the county or counties in which such an election has failed, and in the event that two or more counties vote on the proposition of the creation of an Authority therein, the proposition shall not be deemed to carry unless the majority of the qualified taxpayer voters in each county voting

thereon vote in favor thereof; provided, however, that an Airport Authority may be created and be composed of the county or counties that vote in favor of its creation if separate propositions are submitted to the voters of each county so that they may vote for a two or more county Authority or a single county Authority; provide for the appointment by the Board of Directors of an Assessor and Collector of Taxes in the Authority, whether constituted of one or more counties, whose duty it shall be to assess all taxable property, both real and personal, and collect the taxes thereon, based upon the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors, the tax to be levied not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) assessed valuation of the property, provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority, said taxable property shall be assessed on a valuation not to exceed the market value and shall be equal and uniform throughout the Authority as is otherwise provided by the Constitution; the Legislature shall authorize the purchase or acquisition by the Authority of any existing airport facility publicly owned and financed and served by certified airlines, in fee or of any interest therein, or to enter into any lease agreement therefor upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreeable to the Authority and the owner of such facilities, or authorize the acquisition of same through the exercise of the power of eminent domain, and in the event of such acquisition, if there are any general obligation bonds that the owner of the publicly owned airport facility has outstanding, the same shall be fully assumed by the Authority and sufficient taxes levied by the Authority to discharge said outstanding indebtedness; and likewise any city or owner that has outstanding revenue bonds or revenue bonds which the airport have been pledged or said bonds constitute a lien against the airport facilities, the Authority shall assume and discharge all the obligations of the city under the ordinances and bond indentures under which said revenue bonds have been issued and sold. Any city which owns airport facilities not serving certified airlines which are not purchased or acquired or taken over as herein provided by such Authority, shall have the power to operate the same under the existing laws or as the same may hereafter be amended. Any such Authority when created may be granted the power herein provided by such Authority, to adopt and enforce appropriate zoning regulations to protect the airport from

hazards and obstructions which would interfere with the use of the airport and its facilities for landing and take-off; an additional county or counties may be added to an existing Authority if a petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxpayer voters is filed with and an election called by the Commissioners Court of the county or counties seeking admission to an Authority and the vote is favorable, then admission may be granted to such county or counties by the Board of Directors of the then existing Authority upon such terms and conditions as they may agree upon and evidenced by a resolution approved by two-thirds (2/3rds) of the then existing Board of Directors, provided, however, the county or counties that may be so added to the then existing Authority shall be given representation on the Board of Directors by adding additional directors in proportion to their population according to the last preceding Federal Census.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of all taxable property within such Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters."

"AGAINST the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of all taxable property within such Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIFTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33 proposing an Amendment to Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to authorize state participation in programs financed with funds from private or federal sources and conducted by local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations, in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped, in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handicapped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 6. (a) No appropriation for private or individual purposes shall be made, unless authorized by this Constitution. A regular statement, under oath, and an account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published annually, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

"(b) State agencies charged with the responsibility of providing services to those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped may accept money from private or federal sources, designated by the private or federal source as money to be used in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handi-

capped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped. Money accepted under this subsection is state money. State agencies may spend money accepted under this subsection, and no other money, for specific programs and projects to be conducted by local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations, in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped, in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handicapped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped.

"The state agencies may deposit money accepted under this subsection either in the state treasury or in other secure depositories. The money may not be expended for any purpose other than the purpose for which it was given. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the state agencies may expend money accepted under this subsection without the necessity of an appropriation, unless the Legislature, by law, requires that the money be expended only on appropriation. The Legislature may prohibit state agencies from accepting money under this subsection or may regulate the amount of money accepted, the way the acceptance and expenditure of the money is administered, and the purposes for which the state agencies may expend the money. Money accepted under this subsection for a purpose prohibited by the Legislature shall be returned to the entity that gave the money.

"This subsection does not prohibit state agencies au-

thorized to render services to the handicapped from contracting with privately-owned or local facilities for necessary and essential services, subject to such conditions, standards, and procedures as may be prescribed by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing assistance to the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped, in the form of grants of public funds obtained from private or federal sources only, to local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations for establishing and equipping facilities to assist the handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, for their rehabilitation or restoration, or for providing other services essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing assistance to the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped, in the form of grants of public funds, obtained from private or federal sources only, to local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations for establishing and equipping facilities to assist the handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, for their rehabilitation or restoration, or for providing other services essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

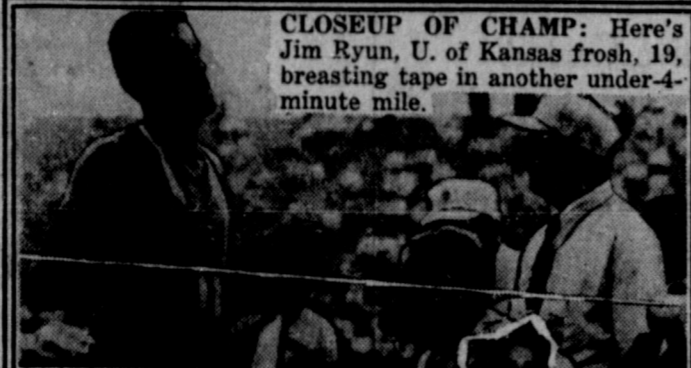

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

A \$10,000,000 state bond sale has launched a new "opportunity plan" designed to bring college educations within financial reach of all qualified Texas youth.

"Never again will students of this state be denied higher education because of lack of funds," commented John E. Gray of Beaumont, chairman of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System. Initial bond sale was awarded to a Chicago bank.

Action by the Coordinating Board set in motion the loan plan approved by Texas voters as a Constitutional amendment last year. Amendment authorized a total of \$85,000,000 in bonds to provide funds for students unable to continue education beyond high school without financial assistance. Initial \$10,000,000 sale is believed to be more than adequate to carry the program thru the first year.

Ceiling on available loans is \$1,000 a year for undergraduates and \$1,500 for graduates. Al-

though a six per cent interest rate is authorized, the U. S. government will pay all interest while a student is in school—and half of it afterwards for borrowers eligible for federal interest subsidy.

A borrower's family income must be less than \$15,000. Loans are limited to the difference between available resources and reasonable expenses. Money will be available for the 1966 fall semester. Interested students are advised to contact the financial assistance officer at the school of their choice. Applicants must be accepted for enrollment and have two recommendations.

In other action last week, Coordinating Board:

- Approved request for legislative appropriations totalling \$56,100,000 for the 1968-69 fiscal period, most of which would go to an adjustment of funds to meet financial needs due to enrollment increases at public colleges, universities and junior colleges.

- Authorized election for Angelin County junior college but rejected request for Rains, VanZandt and Kaufman Counties junior college.

OIL ALLOWABLE CUT—Railroad Commission has reduced the August oil allowable for the third straight month.

August production factor of 33 per cent of potential will allow top production of 3,138,611 barrels a day. This compares with present allowable of 3,118,042 barrels daily under 33.3 per cent factor.

HUNTING SEASONS SET—State Parks and Wildlife Commission set November 12-December 31 deer hunting season in most major hunting counties under its regulatory powers. Opening date is earliest on record.

Season in general-law counties—those fixed by specific general statute—is November 16-December 31.

Shortened seasons were ordered for counties on the Trans-Pecos and Panhandle—16 days starting November 26 for the Trans-Pecos and November 12-November 29 for the 32 Panhandle counties. Antelope season in these areas will run from October 1-9 and October 1-4, respectively.

Turkey and javelina seasons generally remain the same. Commission allowed special bow and arrow hunting in some counties October 1-31.

PALO DURO FUNDS OKAYED—Federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation approved \$271,494 in matching funds for the development of facilities at Palo Duro Canyon State Park.

Total cost of the project will be \$542,988. Included in the program are two concession areas, 26 trailer-camp sites, 45 tent-camp sites and 75 picnic sites, in addition to such miscellaneous items as restrooms and showers, an interpretive building and a park headquarters building.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES A divorced husband cannot claim a \$3,000 homestead tax exemption when he continues to reside alone in the family home after the divorce decree, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr held.

In other opinions, Carr ruled that:

- Texas Liquor Control Board is not authorized to issue a U. S. bonded liquor permit, since courts have ruled the law authorizing such permits is unconstitutional.

- Trailers used to convey horses to and from rodeos are not exempt as farm trailers and must be licensed under state law.

- Harrison County commissioners court can pay \$8 a day to jurors and \$4 a day to prospective jurors summoned and excused after questioning, but nothing to those summoned but excused without examination.

ADVANTAGES OF SWITCHING TO THE METRIC SYSTEM

There are several advantages to changing to the metric system of weights and measures. It would help standardize U. S. weights and measures with those of the major countries in the world. This would be a great advantage to those people who deal with international trade or travel. The metric system, based on multiples of ten, is easier to compute than the old English system now in use. This step, however, would involve a long period of adjustment, and would involve a large investment to change our present methods of weighing and measuring.

5-BREED CROSS LOOKS GOOD

A rotational crossbreeding program with five different breeds of cattle is producing noteworthy results at Texas A&M University's Gulf Coast field station near Angleton. Brahman, Hereford, Angus, Santa Gertrudis and Charal bulls are being mated with crossbred cows in the experiment. The program is designed to maintain high hybrid vigor in all generations of cattle.

GOOCH EXPLAINS FEDERAL GAS TAX DEDUCT FOR FARMERS

Farmers and ranchers will not file a claim for refund of Federal tax on gasoline used on their farm or ranch as they have done in past years according to Ronald Gooch County Agent. Instead, the refund of Federal tax on gasoline used on or after July 1, 1965 must be claimed as a credit on their annual income tax return.

This credit will be taken on the return for the first full tax year beginning after June 30, 1965. If the return is filed on

a calendar year basis, the credit for gasoline tax refund taken on their 1966 return will include the tax on gasoline used in the period from July 1, 1965 through December 31, 1966.

The refund is claimed as a credit in a manner similar to the credit for tax withheld on wages, Gooch said.

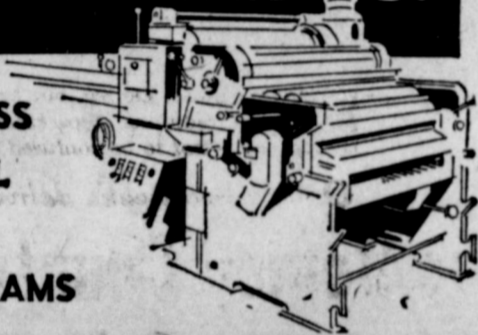

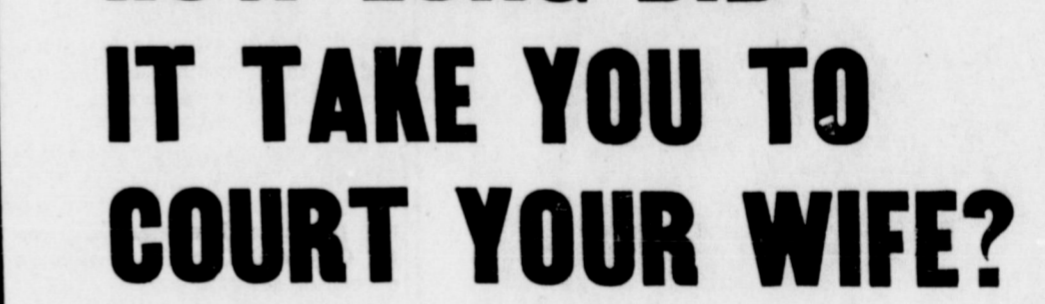

There are a few items that occur in City Hall and in our town that come to the attention of our aldermen, but need no legislative action; hence, they do not appear in the minutes of our meetings. Here are some that you should know about.

We are pumping more water this month and last month than any time in the history of Clarendon. I know that your water pressure is low, occasionally the water appears turbid, and this month's bill is big. We've had a pump break down and a well cave-in on days when we pump more than a million gallons a day. Were we not to purchase water from the "Greenbelt" in the near future, we would have to dig a new well just to keep up with our city's increasing demand for water.

Congratulations to the Clarendon Little League. Although our teams didn't win, we had the opportunity to see great baseball and we had the play-offs here in Clarendon. I'd like to see an article from the Little League on the cost of operation for a year. The Clarendon Little League is a big and expensive business. I wonder if we are doing our part to help them?

The "Greenbelt" dam is far ahead of schedule. It should be completed early next year. The construction crew is a hard-working, quiet, pleasant group of people. We are pleased to have them as our temporary neighbors, friends and customers. Tell them so when you see them. We'll be glad to have the dam finished, but sorry to see them go.

There has been an "epidemic" of auto accidents. Don't be right and let the other driver's mistake cause an accident. Practice "defensive driving." It just might save your life.

And now a word about the proposed sale of alcoholic beverages in Precinct Two of our county. If such an election is called by our county commissioners, think seriously about facts and fallacies before you vote. As with any such election there are two views. Here are some of both.

1. "Off Premises" consumption means a package store. It does not mean that restaurants can serve beer or wine. This is not the plan recommended by the Texas Restaurant Association. The Restaurant Association proposes that any person of age has the right to decide if he wishes a glass of wine with his meal or not. This plan is endorsed by Speaker of the House, Ben Barnes.

2. It is our right to control the sale of any such beverage within our county. We cannot, by any means, control its consumption without control of its sale. It would make law enforcement easier for county and city officers. It would put the "Bootlegger" out of business.

3. We can prevent the sale of such beverages to minors within our county and prosecute those who purchase such for them.

4. It would not bring any appreciable gain in tax revenue to our county. It would keep, however, the profit of such sales within our county, rather than in nearby counties.

5. It will have little effect on the alcoholic for the alcoholic

will obtain liquor wherever it may be.

6. Availability of liquor has little bearing on its consumption. We will have neither more nor less drunken driving.

7. Alcohol has been with mankind and has brought its problems to civilized man since Bible times. It is available throughout our fifty states and most of the countries of the world. It is a personal decision to consume alcohol. It can create personal or social problems. The time has come for each of us to make our personal decision, then vote as you believe.

AUTOPSY ON TOMMIE CARL SAYE, JR. RECEIVED HERE

For the information of close friends, the Physician's autopsy of Tommie Carl Saye, Jr. is being published at the request of the family since it is a rare occurrence and hard to explain otherwise.

The report reads as follows: Tommie was found to have a tumor on the left ventricle of the heart. The particular type of tumor will not be known for several weeks. However it most likely is not cancerous, since this is extremely rare. This probably is a myxoma of the endocardium which was pendunculated. This means it has the appearance of a mushroom—a ball at the end of a stalk. This type of lesion rarely gives any symptoms or

signs and, therefore, is seldom found except at post-mortem examination. This ball of tumor floats in the cardiac chamber unnoticed until it moves into the out-track and occludes the bloodflow track and occludes the blood from out of the heart into the body.

DEFERRED GRAZING AIDS IN FORAGE PRODUCTION

Deferred grazing is one of the best means of utilizing the maximum forage production of a ranch, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch.

The stocking of a ranch must be flexible enough so that a deferred program can be set up to allow from a sixth to a fourth of the total ranch acreage to be deferred during each growing

season, from 4-6 months. The other pastures on the ranch should not be overgrazed while trying to improve one pasture.

Deferred grazing refers to the practice of removing livestock from grazing the area for a specified period of time during the growing season to promote plant reproduction, establishment of new plants, or restoration of vigor by old plants.

Deferred rotation grazing is another type of deferred grazing, according to Gooch. This is the practice of removing livestock from various parts of a ranch while other parts are being grazed at various seasons of the year. At least 2, 3, or 4 pastures are necessary to establish a systematic plan. Only one herd of livestock is moved at any one time from a grazed to a deferred pasture.

Checker-board deferred grazing is the removal of livestock from grazing a pasture that receives effective rainfall during the growing season. Leave livestock from the pasture for 6-12 weeks or until grasses mature seed, says Gooch. This system has been found to be effective in the Trans-Pecos area.

Some of the benefits from deferred grazing listed by Gooch include the establishment of new plants, restoration of vigor of old plants, seed production, reduction of internal parasite infestations, improved range conditions, re-establishment of plant varieties, and allows for increasing stocking rates.

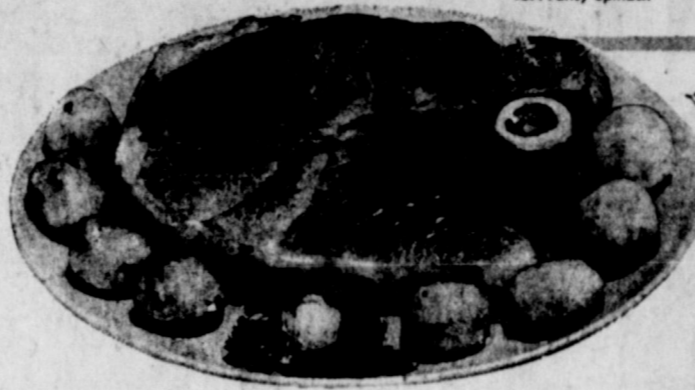
