## New Dean Assumes Duties At College

Mr. Kenneth Vaughan, President of Clarendon College, has announced the recent employment of Mr. Beryl D. Clinton as dean of the college. Mr. Clinton assumed his duties on August 1, following the resignation of the former dean, Mr. Weldon Day.

Mr. Clinton is a native Texan, graduating from Stanton High School in 1941. He is a graduate of West Texas State University, where he played a prominent role in the athletic program. He holds a B.S. degree, with a major in Physical Education and a double minor in Speech and Government, and a Master of Education degree in the fields of Administration and Guidance. He has done additional graduate work at the University of Texas.

Mr. Clinton has been active in the field of Education since 1947, accumulating experience in the areas of teaching, coaching, counseling and administration. He previously taught and coached at Clarendon High School for two years and served as counselor of Donley County for one year. He has been associated with the public school systems at Childress and Amarillo, and prior to his acceptance of the position of Dean at Clarendon College, he served for three years as Superintendent of Schools at Stanton. In addition to his experience as an educator, he also spent three years in the sales and administrative departments of the life insurance business.

Mr. Clinton is a Baptist deacon, a Mason, and is an active member of Lions, Kiwanis, and Rotary Clubs. He is a member of T.S.T.A., N.E.A.; District, State, and National Association of School Administrators; the American Personnel and Guidance Association; and the National Vocational Guidance Association. He is currently serving as secretary of District IV Texas Association of School Administrators.

Mr. Clinton is married to the former Billie Quinn, who is also a graduate of West Texas State University. They have two sons, Gary and Charles.

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**CROP RESIDUE IMPORTANT FOR CONSERVATION**

Grain Sorghum harvest time is about here. The light grain yield on dryland brought about by inadequate moisture will also result in low crop residues.

Yet, in the long run, the residues if properly managed, could mean more than the sale of grain in this dry year. Each single straw that is left following harvest will do a job in soil and water conservation.

The most effective method of managing the residues for soil protection is to leave the stubble high on the surface of the soil.

Research and experience have shown that the expected percent of residue lost for each plowing operation for various types of equipment is as follows:

- a. Large sweeps, rod weeder and blade type 10

- b. Cultivator and close-spaced sweeps 15
- c. Tandem disc harrow 25
- d. One-way disc plow 50

Research and experience have also shown that a minimum of 1000 pounds of residue must be left for protection on the "heavier" soils, 1750 pounds for "medium" textured soils and 2250 pounds for "sandy" soils for crops such as grain sorghums.

The figures mentioned indicate that two operations with a tandem disc would leave only one-half the original amount of residue.

If there is only 1000 pounds to begin with, and your soil requires 1750 pounds of residue for protection, the answer is simple, your soil goes to the man who protects his land.

 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 69 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section, Section 63, to Article III; authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for the accomplishment of governmental functions within any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants by the consolidation of the functions of government or by contract between any political subdivision(s) located within the county and any other political subdivision(s) located within the county or with the county; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III, to be known as Section 63, reading as follows:

 "(1) The Legislature may by statute provide for the consolidation of some functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county in this State having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these political subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require.  
 "(2) The county government, or any political subdivision(s) comprising or located therein, may contract one with another for the performance of governmental functions re-

quired or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe. The term "governmental functions," as it relates to counties, includes all duties, activities and operations of state-wide importance in which the county acts for the State, as well as of local importance, whether required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

PARALLEL TERRACES

Parallel terraces have been constructed on cropland portions of several farms and ranches this year. This type terrace was completed on H. S. Hardins' in the amount of 7162 linear feet. Emmett Brown has just completed 13,720 linear feet of parallel terraces. More than 50,000 linear feet of parallel terraces are under construction on RO Ranch cropland in this district. Ansil Adamson and J. N. Weaver have been farming parallel terraces constructed on their farms. J. C. Shields constructed parallel terraces on his Roberts leased farm and has been farming these terraces two seasons. The above listed parallel terraces have been constructed with 70% cost share under the Great Plains Conser-

vation Program. Most of the terraces being constructed over our state are parallel because it makes the job of farming easier and may spread water more evenly. Parallel terraces are laid off to fit four and six row equipment with no point rows. Construction cost is greater than for conventional terraces because land smoothing is done somewhat like bench leveling. Both cuts and fills are made over wide areas which amounts to bench leveling with wide parallel borders. Smoothing and leveling of the land is done before terrace construction is begun.

When satisfactory outlets are available, graded parallel terraces may be constructed. Level partially closed and terraces are constructed where soils are on sandy type or where it is not practical to construct graded waterways. Conventional terrace systems have been torn down in some instances in order to install this new type terrace. Both A C P and Great Plains Conservation Program are available for cost share. Contact your local Soil Conservation Service for information.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 6. (a) No appropriation for private or individual purposes shall be made, unless authorized by this Constitution, under oath, and an account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published annually, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law. (b) State agencies charged with the responsibility of providing services to those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped may accept money from private or federal sources, designated by the private or federal source as money to be used in and establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handi-

caped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped. Money accepted under this subsection is state money. State agencies may spend money accepted under this subsection, and no other money, for specific programs and projects to be conducted by local level or other private, nongovernmental associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations, in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handicapped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care or treatment of the handicapped. "The state agencies may deposit money accepted under this subsection either in the state treasury or in other secure depositories. The money may not be expended for any purpose other than the purpose for which it was given. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the state agencies may expend money accepted under this subsection without the necessity of an appropriation, unless the Legislature, by law, requires that the money be expended only on appropriation. The Legislature may prohibit state agencies from accepting money under this subsection or may regulate the amount of money accepted, the way the acceptance and expenditure of the money is administered, and the purposes for which the state agencies may expend the money. Money accepted under this subsection for a purpose prohibited by the Legislature shall be returned to the entity that gave the money. "This subsection does not prohibit state agencies au-

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 59 proposing an amendment to Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, to withdraw Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for the Texas A & M University System, including the Texas A & M University System, including the Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas at Prairie View, Tarleton State College at Stephenville, Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Engineering Experiment Station at College Station, Texas Engineering Extension Service at College Station, and the Texas Forest Service, the Board of Directors is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of one-third (1/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance hereunder; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any institution of the University of Texas System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, The Main University, Western College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than thirty (30) years from their respective dates. "The Texas A & M University System and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, and the University of Texas System, and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, shall not receive any General Revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case

an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of General Revenue funds. "Said Bonds are severally authorized to pledge the respective interests of Texas A & M University and of the University of Texas in the income from the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now apportioned by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such bonds or notes. "All bonds or notes issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable. This Amendment shall be self-enacting provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing any obligation heretofore created by the issuance of any outstanding notes or bonds under this Section by the respective Boards prior to the adoption of this Amendment but any such outstanding notes or bonds shall be paid in full, both principal and interest, in accordance with the terms of such contracts." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund." SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a new Section 12, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, with power to issue general obligation bonds, revenues from either or both of them, for the purchase, acquisition by the exercise of the power of eminent domain or otherwise, construction, reconstruction, repair or renovation of any airport or airports, landing fields and runways, airport buildings, hangars, facilities, equipment, fixtures, and any and all property, real or personal, necessary to operate, equip and maintain an airport; shall provide for the option by the governing body of the city or cities whose airport facilities are served by certificated airlines and whose facility or some interest therein is proposed to be or has been acquired by the Authority, to either appoint or elect a Board of Directors of said Authority; if the Directors are appointed such appointment shall be made by the County Commissioners Court after consultation with and consent of the governing body or bodies of such city or cities, and if the Board of Directors is elected they shall be elected by the qualified taxing voters of the county which chooses to elect the Directors to represent that county; such Directors shall serve without compensation for a term fixed by the Legislature not to exceed six (6) years, and shall be selected on the basis of the proportionate population of each county based upon the last preceding Federal Census, and shall be a resident or residents of such county; provide that no county shall have less than one (1) member on the Board of Directors; provide for the holding of an election in each county proposing the creation of an Authority to be called by the Commissioners Court or Commissioners Court or Commissioned County, as the case may be, upon petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxing voters within the county or counties, said elections to be held on the same day or more than one county is included, provided that no more than one (1) such election may be called in a county until after the expiration of one (1) year; in the event such an election has failed, an election may be called upon a petition of ten per cent (10%) of the qualified taxing voters being presented to the Commissioners Court or Commissioners Courts of the county or counties in which such an election has failed, and in the event that two or more counties vote on the proposition of the creation of an Authority therein, the proposition shall not be deemed to carry unless the majority of the qualified taxing voters in each county voting

thereon vote in favor thereof; provided, however, that an Airport Authority may be created and be composed of the county or counties that vote in favor of its creation if separate propositions are submitted to the voters of the county or more counties that vote for a two or more county Authority or a single county Authority; provide for the appointment by the Board of Directors of an Assessor and Collector of Taxes in the Authority, whether constituted of one or more counties, whose duty it shall be to assess all taxable property, both real and personal, and collect the taxes thereon, based upon the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors, the tax to be levied not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) assessed valuation of the property; provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority; said taxable property shall be assessed on a valuation not to exceed the market value and shall be equal and uniform throughout the Authority as is otherwise provided by the Constitution; the Legislature shall authorize the purchase or acquisition by the Authority of any existing airport facility publicly owned and financed and served by certificated airlines, in fee or of any interest therein, or to enter into any lease agreement therefor, upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreeable to the Authority and the owner of such facilities, or authorize the acquisition of same through the exercise of the power of eminent domain, and in the event of such acquisition, if there are any general obligation bonds that the owner of the publicly owned airport facility has outstanding, the same shall be fully assumed by the Authority and sufficient taxes levied by the Authority to discharge said outstanding indebtedness; and likewise any city or owner that has outstanding revenue bonds where the revenues of the airport have been pledged or said bonds constitute a lien against the airport facilities, the Authority shall assume and discharge all the obligations of the city under the ordinances and bond indentures under which said revenue bonds have been issued and sold. Any city which owns airport facilities Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters." "AGAINST the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of all taxable property within such Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters."

hazards and obstructions which would interfere with the use of the airport and its facilities for landing and take-off; an additional county or counties may be added to an existing Authority if a petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxing voters is filed with and an election is called by the Commissioners Court of the county or counties seeking admission to an Authority, the vote is favorable, then admission may be granted to such county or counties by the Board of Directors of the then existing Authority upon such terms and conditions as they may agree upon and evidenced by a resolution approved by two-thirds (2/3rds) of the then existing Board of Directors, provided, however, the county or counties that may be so added to the then existing Authority shall give representation on the Board of Directors by adding additional directors in proportion to their population according to the last preceding Federal Census." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of all taxable property within such Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters." "AGAINST the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of all taxable property within such Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters." The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

**STATE CAPITAL**  
*Highlights*  
**AND Sidelights**  
by Vern Sanford

Never has the Texas Legislature had money problems like those it will face in 1967.

Although the fact has been little publicized, state agencies are requesting an unprecedented \$1,200,000 in appropriations from the general revenue fund during the next biennium. This figure does not include activities financed by extensive special fund revenues and federal aid. Neither does it allow for the \$120,000,000 pay raise sought by school teachers.

By way of comparison, present general revenue appropriations add up to \$623,900,000, so the agencies are seeking almost twice as much as they are now getting from tax sources controlled by the Legislature.

Sharp pruning is inevitable before official budget proposals are submitted to lawmakers by Gov. John Connally and the Legislative Budget Board. Making the task more difficult is the fact that the bulk of requested increases would go to such worthy purposes as: Improved education, new community action programs for mental health and mental retardation,

tuberculosis control, Medicare implementation, park improvements, a \$50,000,000 mental hospital and special school building program, water facilities and pollution control, new prison buildings and a pay raise for state employees.

Financial authorities estimate state taxes would have to be raised \$400,000,000 to meet the new spending demands.

Most of the demands, of course, will not be met. But higher ranking officials, including House Speaker Ben Barnes, see a tax bill in the magnitude of \$200,000,000 shaping.

Although most forecasters are predicting that a sales tax hike of one per cent in inevitable, look for a "surprise" revenue bill with top-level backing.

**CONNALLY BACKS SENATE**—Governor Connally, returning to this capital city while it still was numbed with shock and grief over the senseless sniper slaying of 13 at The University of Texas, suggested a new state law ordering mandatory life prison sentences for insane killers. Connally said he is considering

a recommendation for a non-parolable life sentence because too many criminals escape punishment on pleas of insanity.

The governor, who cut short a South American tour after the August 1 UT tower murders, also directed the State Department of Public Safety to gather all facts on sniper Charles J. Whitman, an ex-marine and honor student. He further directed a study of Whitman's brain by a conference of medical experts at M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute at Houston.

Connally said he does not believe the August 1 tragedies, which "could have occurred in any city in the world," will reflect on Texas or Austin.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith promptly directed the Texas Legislative Council to study the feasibility of enacting mandatory life imprisonment provisions for accused killers pleading insanity.

**HISTORIC SUIT ENDS**—Prompt appeal of final judgment in the 11-year-long lawsuit over Rio Grande Valley water rights is expected to be filed soon.

District Judge J. H. Starley of Pecos entered the judgement ending the trial last week at Edinburg.

A 100-page decree covers the U. S. share of water at Falcon Dam and the Rio Grande flow below the reservoir. Case will have far-reaching effect on land values and water use in Hidalgo, Cameron, Willacy and Starr counties.

Judgement proposes division of water among irrigation districts and independent pumps on a priority system in five categories. It doubles amount of water previously allowed cities in preliminary judgement but retains acreage basis of figuring allotment.

**COURTS SPEAK**—State Supreme Court upheld the Attorney General in refusing to approve \$4,700,000 in the Brazos River Authority revenue bond issue.

Supreme Court justices, holding in favor of a Hopkins County widow's contest of an insurance policy cancellation on her late husband, disagreed over seriousness of angina pectoris heart disease. Majority concluded one who has it can still be considered in reasonably good health.

City of Dallas was entitled to a temporary injunction to block showing of the movie "Viva Maria", the high court said.

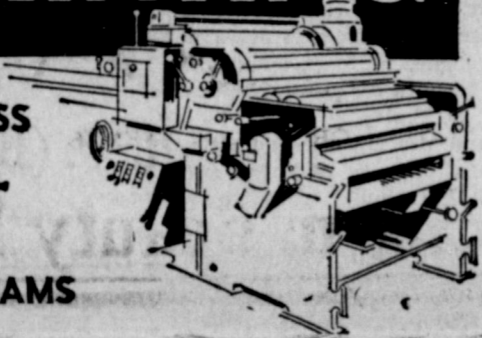

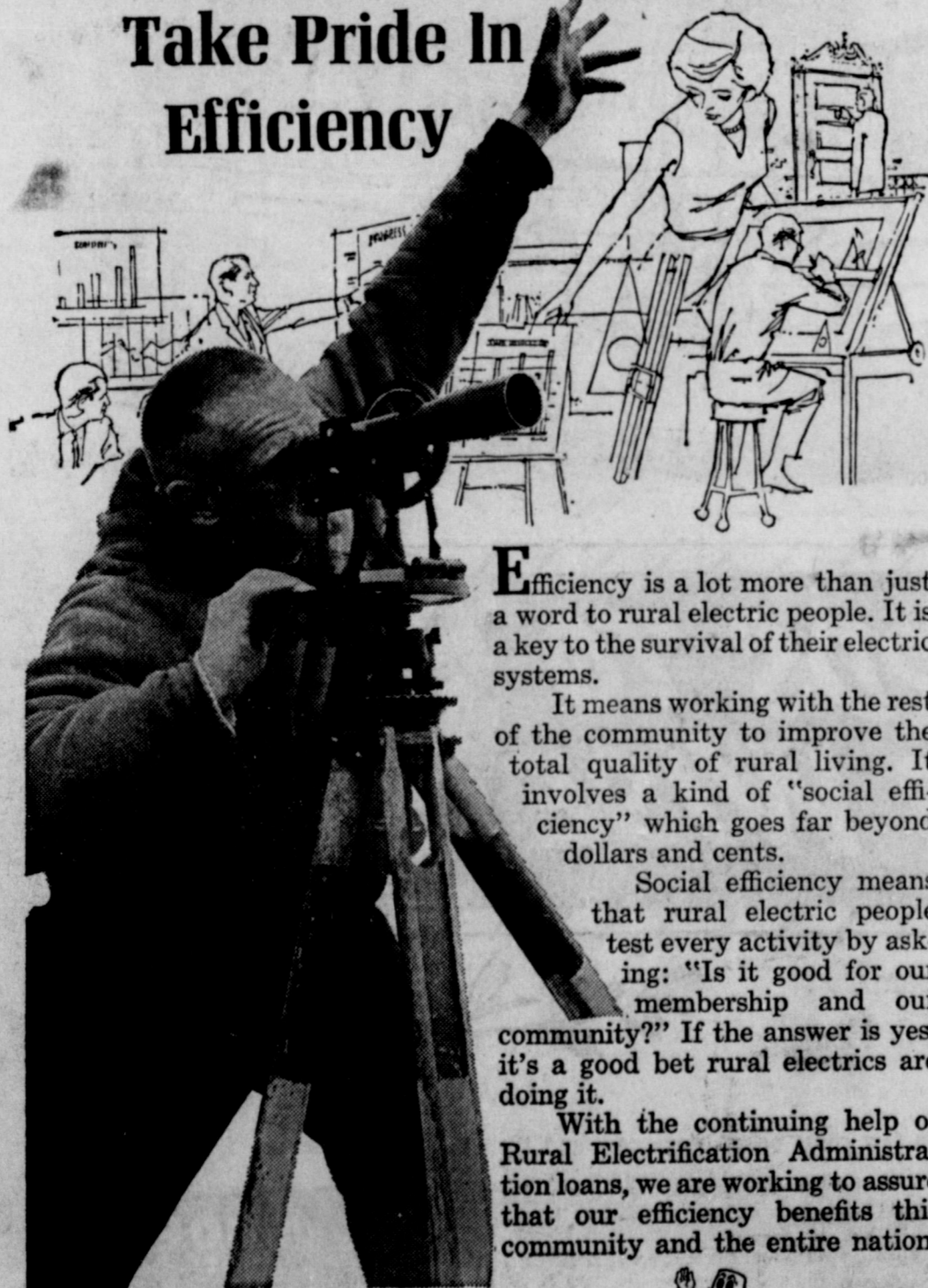

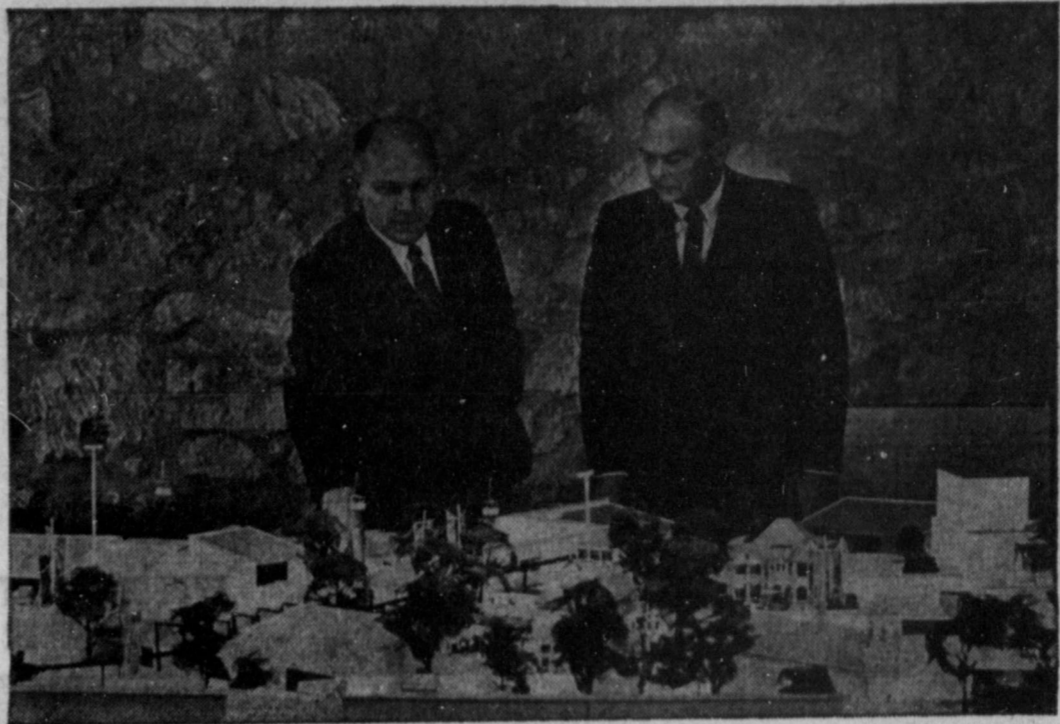

**ON HELIUM CONSERVATION**

August 13, 1966

Dear Fellow Texan:

One of the first pictures transmitted from the moon by Surveyor I was a picture of a tank of helium. Helium is in increasing demand; during the fiscal year just ended helium sales by the Bureau of Mines set a new all-time record of 773 million cubic feet, about 17 percent more than the previous record set in the fiscal year that ended June 30, 1964. Thanks to the helium conservation program, an abundant supply of the precious gas is now available—and reserves are being stored in the Cliffside Gas Field northwest of Amarillo.

With the Free World's known supply of helium concentrated in the Texas Panhandle area, our people are more aware than most Americans of the vital part helium plays in our defense and space efforts. Approximately three-quarters of the helium sold last year was sold to Government agencies, with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) the largest single user. Nearly half of all helium sold was

used in the space program, and space requirements in the past a year just about equalled the total production of helium at the 1959 rate. Had production not been increased, there would have been no helium for many other essential defense need and none for helium's many applications in civilian industry. Needs for helium are increasing and production, which doubled in the first five years of this decade, is keeping pace. In addition to its uses in rockets and missiles, helium's many uses include production of nuclear power for civilian purposes as well as production of nuclear devices in our defense arsenal; in the Telstar system of communications satellites; in weather balloons and balloons for holiday parades, in shielded-arc welding of stainless steel equipment. Helium will undoubtedly help the United States put a man on the moon.

The U. S. helium program has three phases: the production and distribution of helium to supply current requirements; the acquisition and storage for future use of helium that otherwise would be wasted—the conservation program enacted by Congress in 1960; and, research and development directed toward a more beneficial use of our helium resources. Amarillo is the focal point of all three phases. As the field headquarters of the Bureau of Mines' helium activity, Amarillo is the site of an important helium production plant and the Helium Research Center and near the vast underground Cliffside storage field where crude helium, extracted from natural gas being sent to market, is being stored to meet future needs of the Nation. Not only is Government-purchased helium being stored there under provisions of the helium conservation program but, in addition, helium extracted and owned by a private corporation is being stored there under a contract with the Bureau of Mines. All helium possible should be conserved, and I am proud to have had a part in the legislative activity that made the program possible.

Conservation and storage of this vital resource will amount to two or three times the usage during the next 20 to 25 years, and thus give good assurance of a continuing supply of helium

for many years in the future.

The arrangement by which private industry "strips" helium from market-bound natural gas and delivers it to the Bureau of Mines for storage is a valuable cooperative relationship between the Federal government and private industry. In order to bring about construction of the five privately owned helium extraction

plants, the government entered into contracts assuring the purchase of the helium produced. The authority to purchase the helium produced by private enterprise corporations can be expected to be expanded as the Nation's requirements for helium continue to increase.

We in the Panhandle can be proud of our part in this program.

**GUAR ON DIVERTED ACRES**  
If you have planted guar on your diverted acres for cover only and not for harvest, be sure and come to the office before October 1 and give us a statement to that effect. Otherwise, the diverted acres payment will be reduced.

**REMINDER**

September is the last date to certify to final feed grain, cotton, and diverted acres. If you have paid for a measurement service on your farm, you will still need to come to the office and certify. If we at the ASCS Office can assist you with computing your acreages from the aerial photographs or your ground measurements, please feel free to call on us.

September 1 is also the final date to destroy excess crops on still bank farm and report it to the office.

**ADDITIONAL WHEAT ACREAGE**

We have received numerous questions concerning the additional 15 percent wheat allotment increase. At this time we do not know any more than we have read or heard through the news media. We should be getting the new county allotment and details of the 1967 program shortly. New allotment notices will be mailed as soon as possible to all wheat producers.

**1966 PROGRAM PAYMENTS**

We have received many inquiries about the when final payments under the 1966 program will be made. We will not begin to compute the payments until all measurements are turned in and the 25% spot checks are complete.
