

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

ON HELIUM CONSERVATION August 13, 1966 Dear Fellow Texan: One of the first pictures transmitted from the moon by Surveyor I was a picture of a tank of helium. Helium is in increasing demand; during the fiscal year just ended helium sales by the Bureau of Mines set a new alltime record of 773 million cubic feet, about 17 percent more than the previous record set in the \$400 fiscal year that ended June 30, 1964. Thanks to the helium conservation program, an abundant supply of the precious gas is now available-and reserves are being stored in the Cliffside Gas Field northwest of Amarillo. With the Free World's known supply of helium concentrated in the Texas Panhandle area, our people are more aware than most Americans of the vital part helium plays in our defense and space efforts. Approximately three-quarters of the helium sold


