## Broncho Squad Expands To Forty-Eight Boys

Since the beginning of school, three more boys have joined the Broncho footballers, making a total of 48 boys now working out for the varsity and B team squads.

The Broncos scrimmaged Miami Saturday afternoon in their first test of the season. Their next scrimmage will be with Shamrock at 7 p.m. Friday, September 2nd, in Broncho Stadium. Miami was handicapped by lack of personnel, but Shamrock should provide a much stronger foe for the Broncos.

Coach Walker stated that the coaches were partly satisfied with the performance of the Broncos in the Miami scrimmage, but the coaches are still looking for that championship spark. According to Coach Walker, the potential is there. He believes that the Broncos will be comparably physically to almost every opponent this season; however, state of mind often determines the winner. It is the coaches' belief that the Broncho attitude is as good as ever, but that might not be good enough to produce a championship team.

"Broncho fans can help," stated Coach Walker, "by helping us to instill in our boys the belief that they are just as good as anyone and maybe better. With this attitude predominant, we can win," he continued, "but it will require self-discipline and self-sacrifice by the entire team. The fans can help by adopting this winning attitude also and by either keeping their criticism of the team or coaches to themselves or taking it directly to the coaches, not to the team or other fans. We want loyal, championship caliber fans, not second guessers," stated Coach Walker.

The Broncos will open regular season play against Memphis, formerly a staunch district foe, at 8 p.m. Friday, September 9th in Broncho Stadium. Coach Walker said the Broncos will be looking for a winner.

## PLANS ANNOUNCED FOR WT BUFFALO FOOTBALL SEASON

Plans have been announced for the West Texas State Football season by Coach Joe Kerbel. The first game is scheduled for September 17 at Buffalo Bowl when the Buffs will meet Arlington State. ## 680 Students Enroll In Public Schools

According to High School Principal Morris Ledger and Junior High Principal Stina Cain, enrollment in the public schools is already up six students over last year and more enrollments are expected before the end of the week.

As of Wednesday morning, a total of 680 students had enrolled in all departments of the public school system and both principals reported one of the smoothest, uninterrupted starts in recent years with students already buckling down to the regular routine.

A total of 469 students registered in the elementary grades and Junior High. There were 56 in the first grade; 50 in the second; 62 in the third; 56 in the fourth; 60 in the fifth; 55 in the sixth; 76 in the seventh and 54 in the eighth.

A total of 211 registered in Senior High School. There were 73 freshmen; 56 sophomores; 46 juniors and 36 seniors.

These figures show an increase of 14 students in Senior High over last year but a drop of 8 students in the elementary grades and an overall increase of six students for all grades.

## BOYS RANCH ALL SET FOR LABOR DAY RODEO

A feature attraction of the 22nd annual Labor Day rodeo at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, Sunday, Sept. 4th and Monday, Sept. 5th, will be giant-size barbecued beef sandwiches, prepared and sold by the boys who are learning meat-cutting and cooking as their future vocations.

Spectators and visitors who arrive early can buy the sandwiches for a picnic meal for \$1.25. The boys will include potato chips, all the trimmings, and iced tea.

### FINAL 1966 PAYMENTS

Shy, C. H., and Tex are beginning the spot checks on 25% of the participating farms. As soon as possible after this is completed, we will begin making final payments. If you have a Soil Bank farm and are in compliance, you will need to come to the office and sign the application for payment under the annual cotton and feed grain program as you have done in the past.

### BARLEY BASES

Barley will not be included in your feed grain base for 1967. You may request that your barley base be established on your farm so that you can plant that acreage to wheat; but the barley base cannot be planted to Grain Sorghum or corn. If you have a barley base, you should come to the office and let us discuss this matter with you, and how it will affect your farming operations.

The ballots and instruction sheets have been mailed to all eligible voters. Be sure to vote and return your ballot to the office by September 7.

### 1967 WHEAT ALLOTMENT NOTICES

Your revised wheat notices showing the last allotment increase will be mailed to you in a few days. This will be 115% of the last allotment notice you received.

### 1967 C.A.P.

Wheat and barley will receive payment only at the non-allotment rate if placed in a C.A.P. agreement. The average non-allotment rate for Donley County is \$4.00 per acre.

### ROLLING PLAINS COTTON GROWERS MEET AT STAMFORD

The second annual membership meeting of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers was held August 23 at 2 p.m. in Stamford High School auditorium with approximately 150 present. Principal speaker for the occasion was F. Wainwright Blease, South Central Area ASCS Director. Others on the program were Emory Boring, Earl Younts, and Charles Stenholm.

A meeting of Directors was held following the members' meeting at which time it was approved to set up 10 districts in 31 counties to be based on comparative production bases. J. B. Cooper, Jr. of Roscoe was re-elected president. Paul Montgomery of Memphis was elected a director for District No. 1.

Bill Lowe, attorney for Greenbelt, announced this week that Marvin Springer and Associates, have been hired to make the master plan for the Greenbelt reservoir area.

Mr. Springer, a city planner and recreation developer, was the consultant in the planning of Six Flags near Dallas and we feel that Greenbelt is fortunate in acquiring the services of one of the best in the business, Lowe stated.

Mr. Springer's master plan will include the housing area, park area, recreation, boat ramps, roads, picnic tables and other facilities. Historical data and all other aspects will be taken into consideration also in drawing up the master plan. After the master plan is completed and the dam is far enough along, plans for actual development are already underway.

Work on the dam in general is progressing ahead of schedule with construction of the "Morning Glory" in process at the present time. This structure that you may see in visiting the dam site is the concrete work rising skyward south of the river bridge. It is to be approximately 80 feet high and will spread out at the top to serve as a normal overflow. This same structure will serve as the water inlet to the pipeline. When it is completed, the contractors will start closing the gap in the dam and will be ready in a position to back up water. The emergency spillway will be to the north end of the dam and will flow over the highway which will be lowered at this point. The dam itself and the spillway are being constructed on a 100 year flood frequency basis so ever if the water is expected to ever go over the emergency spillway. By eliminating expensive construction on the spillway and road, the dam is being built five feet higher which will take care of expected silt fill in the lake.

Work is well underway at the present time on the water filtration plant on the ridge this side of the river and will be quite a structure when completed. This part of the Greenbelt complex is being handled by Brown-McKee contractors. This work was started ahead of schedule. In fact, engineers have moved the entire work schedule 30 days ahead of time.

Lowe reported also that 90 percent of the pipe right-of-way between Quannah and Crowell had been secured and that pipe was already being moved to the area.

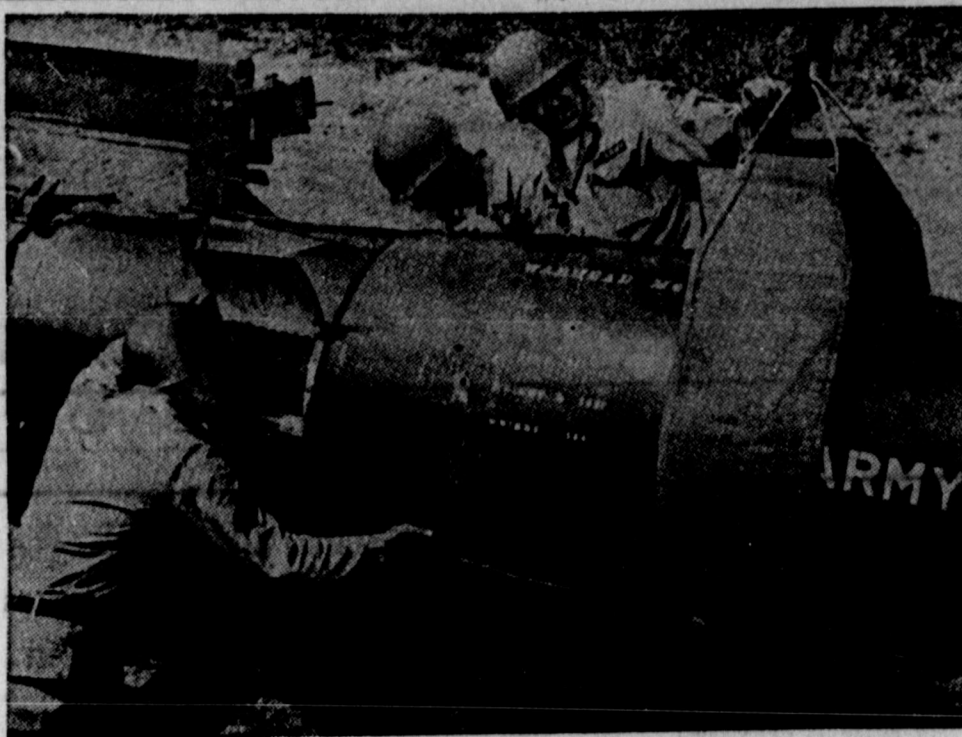

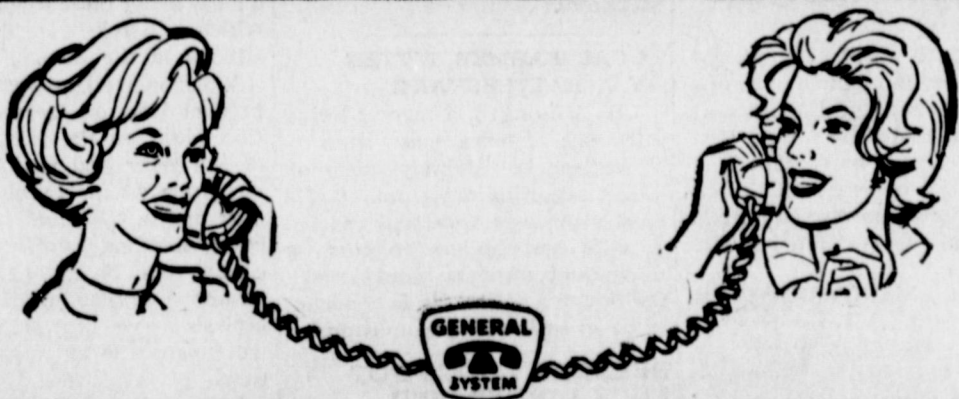
A FAMILY PROBLEM

### Best Way To Place Long Distance Calls

A new and improved method of placing long distance calls is being recommended by General Telephone Company of the Southwest for customers served from the company's Memphis long distance center.

The new method which requires the use of the area code also eliminates the need for giving the name of the town being called, according to Wayne Goodrum, Manager of General's Memphis District.

"The best way to place a long distance call," Goodrum said, "is to give the operator the information in five steps. First, the Area Code of the place being called; next the number you are calling; the person you are calling (but only if you are calling person-to-person); then wait until the operator asks for your number. Your name will not be needed unless

the operator asks for it."

"With the new procedure the operator enters all the necessary information on an IBM card instead of the more familiar tickets. All handling is purely automatic operation once the card passes from the operator's hand", Goodrum explained. "IBM computers, located at San Angelo, do all the rating of the calls automatically, eliminating possibilities of human error."

"Beginning with the October bills details of most long distance calls will be printed directly on the customer's bill and will include the "from" and "to" points, called number, minutes talked and amount of call. A code will be used to indicate the type call and the rate class. This code is explained on the back of the bill.

General's Memphis long distance center serves as the "Master" office for 10 area communities. The exchanges are Clarendon, Dodson, Estelline, Flomot, Hedley, Lakeview, Memphis,

Quitaque, Turkey and Wellington.

### PLANNING TO RETIRE

The compulsory retirement plans of industry today pose a problem for the millions of people reaching older age. Yet, the wise person for sees this period of inactivity by preparing himself for retirement with a hobby. ### NEW, SHORT WHEAT DEVELOPED

The first "shorty" hard red winter wheat capable of high production under irrigation or in high rainfall areas is in final development stages. It was developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the USDA. It's named Sturdy wheat.

Jaycees served cookies, coffee, and Cokes to the visitors.

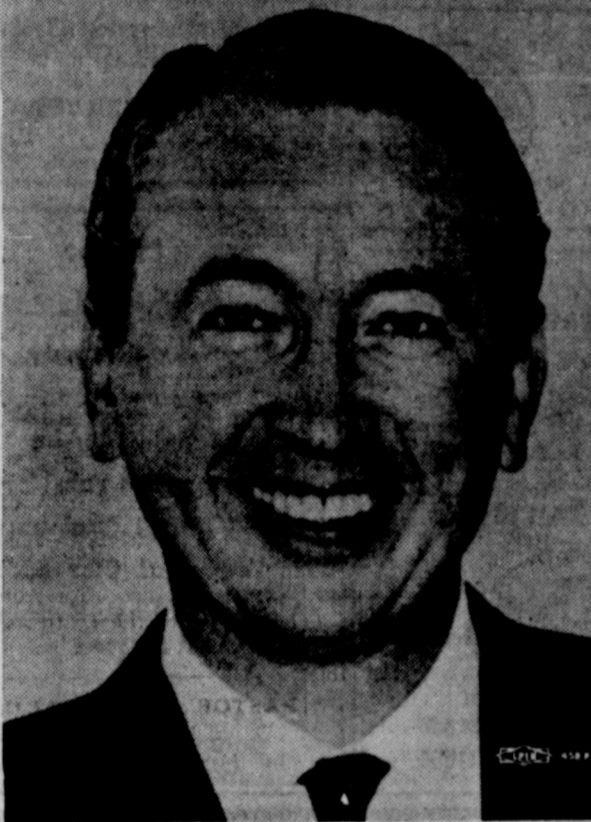
#### Jaycees Move To New City Hall

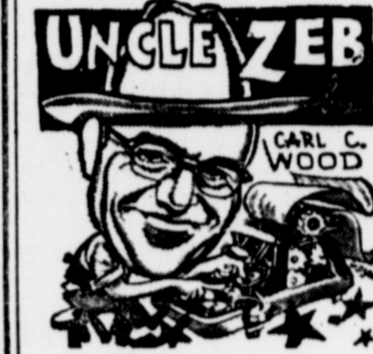

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# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Department of Public Safety estimates that 41 persons will die in traffic accidents on Texas highways during the upcoming three-day Labor Day week end.

"The Current traffic trend indicates that Texas is headed for its third straight record high in terms of fatal accidents," says Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director. "At the present time, we are approximately 15 per cent ahead of the same time in 1965, and we are still faced with the four months of the year which generally produce the most deaths."

Garrison points out that: "More people are killed in Texas each year in traffic than are killed in all the United States by murder, and the deaths are just as senseless, as needless and as tragic, but not nearly as well publicized."

He analyzed the reasons citizens failed to take positive action in traffic safety: "Psychologists say that one reason is a lack of personal identification with the problem. It might behoove each driver in our state to stop and consider that he has less than a 50-50 chance to go through his driving career without being involved in a traffic mishap."

In an attempt to cut back on the number of accidents and deaths during the Labor Day Week end, the DPS will conduct its "Operation Motorcade." Approximately 150 uniformed officers from other DPS services will be on the road to supplement the Highway Patrol. To call public attention to the problem, each traffic death will be tabulated and the totals will be announced three times daily in Austin.

Texas Highway Department, Texas Safety Association, Texas Council of Safety Supervisors and Texas Motor Transportation Association are joining forces to help the DPS.

**ELECTION SYSTEM UPHELD** — Seventh Court of Civil Appeals at Amarillo upheld the Texas "closed primary" election holding that members of one party cannot vote in the primary of another.

Court reversed the district court ruling that would have permitted to stand 71 votes of Republicans in the second Democratic primary for a Pampa judge.

State Democratic Executive Committee had filed a brief urging the court to uphold the closed primary system.

**AG OPINIONS** — State higher education student loan funds not immediately needed to meet loan applications can be invested in direct obligations of U. S. agencies which are not unconditionally guaranteed by the government, Atty. Gen. Waggoner, Carr has held.

Investment is within discretion of Coordinating Board, Texas College and University system. In other opinions, Carr has concluded that:

- A Texas Ranger can execute a writ of commitment for contempt in child custody cases on direction of judge of court of record.

- Money erroneously deposited in State Treasury, cannot be withdrawn except in pursuance of specific appropriations made by law.

- A peace officer must accept cash bond tendered by a defendant in lieu of signature of sureties if he is authorized to take a bail bond.

- Harrison County may not legally reimburse jail prisoners for money and other property belonging to them which was taken from custody of the sheriff by escaping prisoners.

**FUTURE PARKS** — State Parks and Wildlife Commission next month will officially review proposals to purchase more than 100,000 acres of land by the year 2000.

Preference reportedly would be shown to parks connected with water recreation, those near big city areas, and sites of statewide significance, including historic sites.

Gov. John Connally has given his strong backing to a massive parks acquisition program. At one time, he indicated he was thinking in terms of recommending a \$25-\$50,000,000 expenditure.

Plan evolving undoubtedly will be the largest in history — to provide more room to romp for

recreation-minded Texans.

**COLLEGE BONDS** — Texas colleges slowly are selling their building bonds authorized by the constitutional amendment raising the ad valorem tax to 10 cents-per-\$100-valuation. But there's still \$18,710,000 worth to go.

Issue started at \$333,420,000. At end of the regular bid-taking Texas Tech and the University of Houston sold their \$7,000,000 worth. Then, as a result of an exclusive option given a New York syndicate, four more schools — Texas Southern, Texas Woman's, Lamar State and Pan American — sold their bonds, a total of \$7,710,000.

College officials now are going out on their own to sell the remaining \$18,710,000 worth of bonds. It's hoped that local backers will buy them, so the colleges can proceed with construction to meet the mounting demands of college enrollments. Problem is that interest is held to 4 per cent, which is below present market.

**SHORT SNORTS**

Governor Connally approved applications for \$893,881 in grants under Federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 for pilot programs relating to supplementary learning centers for talented elementary and secondary pupils.

A three-year U. S. Public Health Service grant of \$267,734 has been presented to the Texas Department of Health for the control of leprosy—which is on the increase in the state.

Governor Connally announced more than \$2,000,000 in Neighborhood Youth Corps grants for San Saba, Cherokee, Harris, Limestone, Taylor and Eastland Counties; Burkburnett and San Angelo; Southwest Texas State College and West Texas State University.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has announced that Garner State Park is back in operation, despite record high water from the Frio River that damaged a few shelters.

Forty-one cases of paralytic polio among pre-school and infant children (none of whom were fully immunized) have been reported to the Department of Health to date.

Governor Connally appointed John L. Paxton of Fort Worth as chairman of the state United Nations Day, to be observed on October 24.

Texas Highway Department has produced full-color travel folders advertising the state in German and French languages, in addition to the English and Spanish versions, to be distributed at U. S. Travel Service offices, international travel agents, and steamship-air lines.

## "Red Means Wrong" On Texas Freeway

"Red means WRONG" and, if you drive the wrong way on a Texas freeway you will soon see a lot of red, thanks to the Texas Highway Department's latest move to prevent accidents caused by wrong-way freeway traffic.

The Department announced today it will begin installing red traffic buttons and reflective pavement markers on Interstate and other controlled access highways in Texas.

The thing for drivers to remember, a Department spokesman said, "is that red means WRONG."

"If you see a red arrow pointing at you from the pavement as you start to enter a freeway

ramp, you are entering the wrong way," he said.

"If you see a straight, red line pointing against you on the lane lines of a freeway you are going in the wrong direction. Get off the freeway or get turned around fast."

Installation of the markers is the Highway Department's second major innovation this year to minimize wrong-way movement on freeways.

Earlier the Department began supplementing its "Do Not Enter" signs along freeways with "Do Not Enter Ramp" signs and "One Way" signs in the freeway median.

In an effort to cut wrong-way accidents even more, the Department then began experimenting with the reflective, red ramp arrows and freeway lane lines.

Both the arrows and the lane lines are made up of plastic markers which are highly reflective. They show white to traffic going the right way and bright red to traffic going the wrong way.

The lane lines in most cases will be limited to metropolitan areas where there is a high volume of traffic. The reflective markers for the lane lines will be placed on 80-foot centers unless the grade is greater than two percent. Then 40-foot spacing may be used.

The arrows will be placed on all exit ramps to two-way frontage roads, on all exit ramps that have had any history of wrong-way entry and on all exit ramps where the design of the connection with the cross street or highway is such that traffic may have an easy

access to the exit ramp for wrong-way movement.


"The Texas Highway Department has been concerned for some time with the problem of wrong-way accidents on our freeways," State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said.

"We hope these new markers will help solve the problem."
