## Area Receives First General Rain Of Year; Prospects Much Brighter

The weather picture finally got right and as a result, the entire plains area has received exceptionally good moisture and the first general rain of the year.

Everything is actually getting soggy from the slow falling rain and the saturation finally reached a point in some areas that the run-off was beneficial in filling stock tanks which had gone dry or were at a very low level.

Ranchers feel that the moisture has arrived in time to be quite beneficial to range grass for winter pasture and it will definitely push the cotton and feed crops. A number of irrigation farmers shut their wells down for the first time in many weeks. The big problem now for cotton farmers is the threat of insects.

Here in town we received a total of 3.31 inches during the spell and now show a total of 5.08 inches for the month so far. Our years total has reached 14.81 inches and places it above the total at the end of August last year which was 14.15. The August total last year was 2.19 inches and the average for the month of August is 2.25.

A survey of the Donley County area rainfall reports for the spell reveals that Robert Rhodes measured 4.90; C. C. Rich at the Country Club 3.90; Willard Knox at Lelia Lake 5.42 and Lacy Noble south of Lelia Lake 6.40; W. G. Johnson at Hedley 7.10; Richard Dinger southeast of town 5.30; the Brice area 2 to 3 inches; the Simms area 2 to 4 inches and the Quill area along the east side of the county over 5 inches.

This was a cool spell for August also with the temperature dropping to 52 degrees Tuesday morning and only climbing to 61 during the day. For the moisture to be most beneficial in every respect, lots of good sunshine is needed now to push crops and grass along.

## Boys Ranch Rodeo Set For September 4-5

Excitement and the desire to win are running high as the elimination rides bring the 22nd annual Boys Ranch rodeo near, and over Labor Day almost 100 boys will be doing their best for awards and honors.

Most of the 246 boys who are now living at the ranch came from large cities where they never had an opportunity to see a horse before, much less the professional broncs and Brahma Bulls which will be used in their rodeo.

Their adaption to horses and cattle comes quickly, mainly because horses and animals are so much a part of their Ranch life. Many of their chores involve horseback riding. For the younger ranchers part of the summer program includes riding, and many boys buy livestock of their own for agriculture projects with the small salaries they earn from chores.

## Forty-Five Broncs Shaping Up For Action

Coach Jeff Walker reported yesterday that a total of 45 boys were now working out for the varsity and B Broncho squads. In reality, they have had very little field practice this week due to the wet weather but this allows more time for skull practice.

## Gooch Stresses Care In Use Of Ag Chemicals

Don't relax your guard when using agricultural chemicals. They can enter the body by ingestion, through the respiratory system and in many cases through the skin, explains County Agent Ronald Gooch.

A person would not knowingly eat a chemical such as a pesticide; however, failure to remove contaminated clothing and to wash thoroughly prior to eating can result in the ingestion of the chemical on food handled by the individual.

Absorption of the chemical thru the respiratory tract can occur by smoking cigarettes that have contacted the chemical on the hands of the individual, says Gooch. Absorption through the respiratory tract can also occur when one is exposed to chemicals in the form of dusts, sprays or vapors, explains the county agent. Adequate ventilation will serve to reduce the degree of exposure and the use of a respiratory protection device is a must in many cases if use hazards are to be minimized, emphasizes the county agent.

He suggests that protective clothing be worn at all times when chemicals are being used. Their use will help prevent contact of the chemical with the skin, either directly or indirectly, or as a result of spillage, exposure to sprays or dusts or indirectly through contact with surfaces, equipment and utensils exposed to chemicals.

To prevent accidental poisoning, Gooch offers these suggestions. Read, understand and follow the container instructions; use protective clothing and respirators as directed on the label; keep soap and water available at all times; they are valuable protective devices; if chemicals are spilled on the skin or clothing, remove the clothing and wash the affected area thoroughly with soap and water; remove contaminated clothing upon completion of the chemical use and scrub with soap and water; place contaminated clothing, equipment and unused chemicals in an area inaccessible to humans or animals and dispose of unused chemicals and "empty" chemical containers immediately in the prescribed manner.

And always remember, emphasizes the county agent, the safe use of agricultural chemicals is largely in the hands of the person who uses them.

## Cotton Growers Urged To Check Fields For Worms And Weevils

Cotton producers should watch their cotton fields carefully for a buildup in bollworm and boll weevils after the good rains that we have received, said County Agent Ronald Gooch. Both of these insects tend to build up rapidly during periods of rainy weather. To check for bollworms examine the terminal buds of 100 cotton plants and 100 consecutive squares and bolls at each of several points in the field. Begin treatment when bollworm eggs and four or five young worms are found per 100 terminals or five percent of the young squares or bolls have been damaged by small bollworms. Apply sprays or dusts at five day intervals or less until the bollworms are under control.

To check cotton for boll weevil pull or examine 100 squares, at least one-third grown, at random, taking a few squares from several places in the field. If 15 to 25 per cent or more have weevil punctures, begin treatment. Apply insecticides at five-day intervals. Under extremely heavy buildups, the intervals may need to be three days.

For the right insecticide and dosage, ask for Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects, available free at the county agent's office.

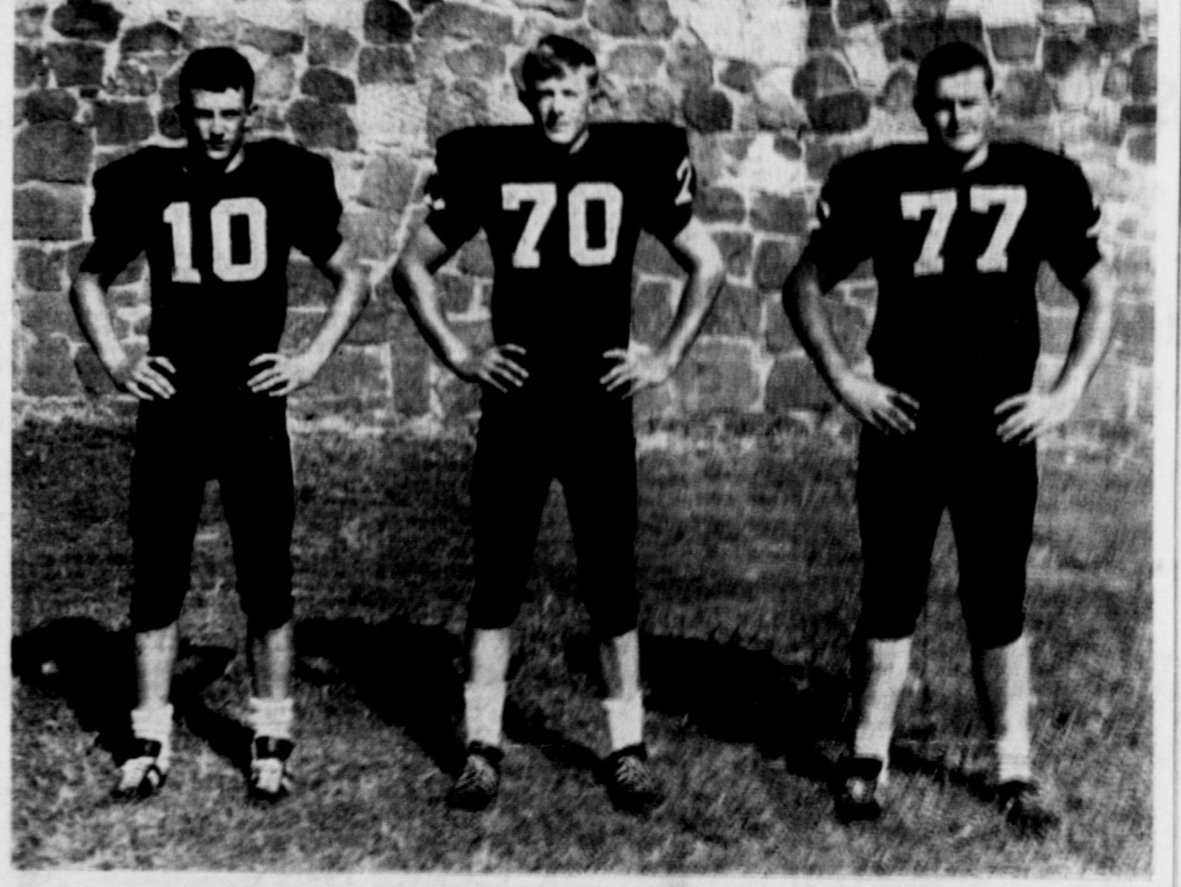

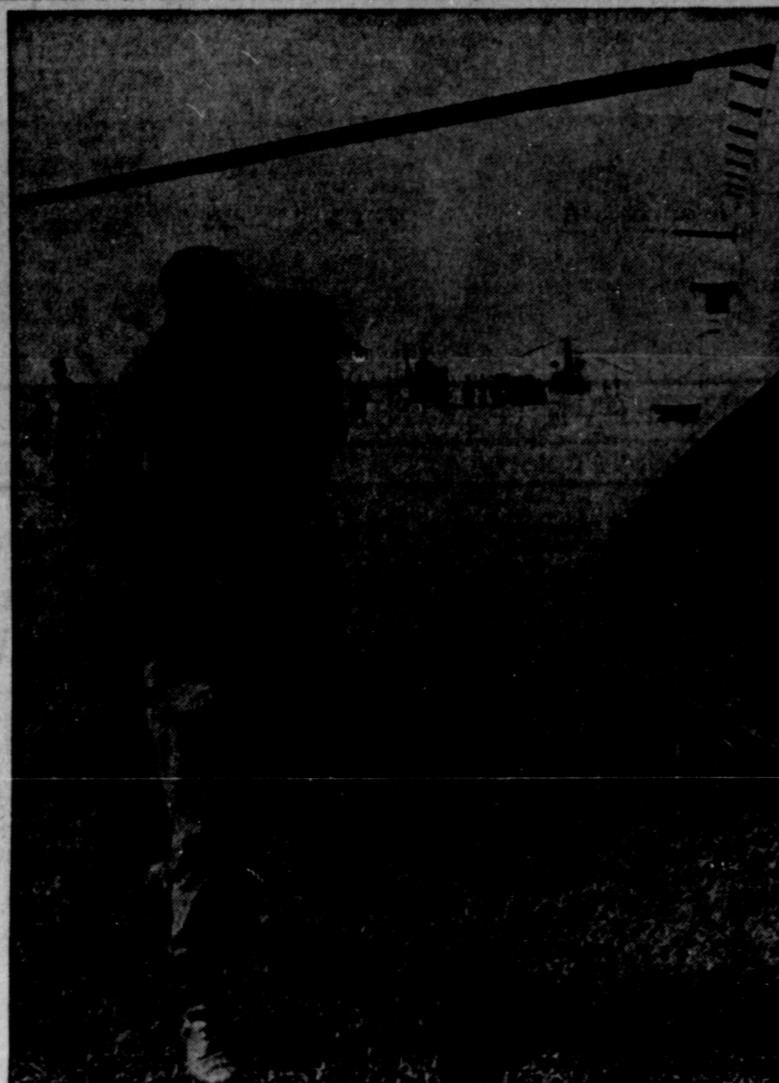

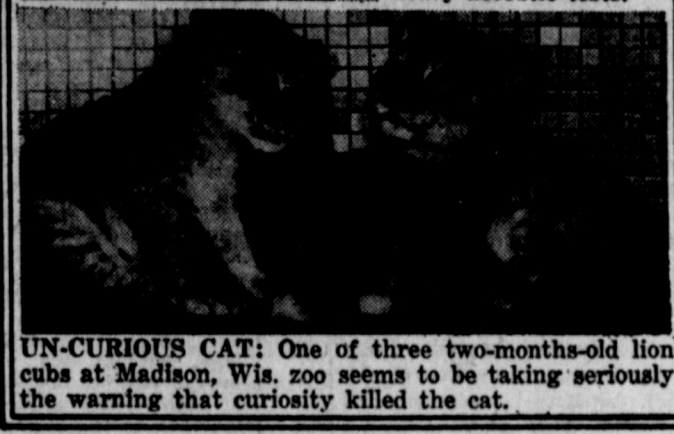

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21** proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the terms of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts.  
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
**Section 1.** That Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section to read as follows:  
**Section 30c.** (a) The terms of office of persons serving on the governing body of a political subdivision of the State created to further the purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, of this Constitution, shall never exceed six years.

purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, are validated, so long as the provisions do not provide for a term of office which exceeds six years.  
**Sec. 2.** The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:  
**"FOR** the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years."  
**AGAINST** the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years."  
**Sec. 3.** The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38** proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to omit the requirement that members of the armed services vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service.  
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
**Section 1.** That Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by deleting the following language:  
 "Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."  
 The text of this Section is shown below, with a broken line through the sentence which is to be deleted:  
**"Section 2.** Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like man-

ner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."  
**Sec. 2.** The only purpose of the amendment proposed in this Resolution is to make the aforesaid deletion. The adoption of this amendment shall not be deemed to have the effect of readopting the remainder of the Section, and if any other amendment to this Section, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this amendment shall not be construed as nullifying the change made by such other amendment.  
**Sec. 3.** The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:  
**"FOR** the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."  
**AGAINST** the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."  
**Sec. 4.** The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.  
**Sec. 5.** If the foregoing amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Section, as amended herein and by any other proposed amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 69** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section, Section 63, to Article III, authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for the accomplishment of governmental functions within any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants by the consolidation of the functions of government or by contract between any political subdivision(s) located within the county or with the county; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.  
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
**Section 1.** That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III, to be known as Section 63, reading as follows:  
**"Section 63.**  
 (1) The Legislature may by statute provide for the consolidation of some functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county in this State having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these political subdivisions under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require.  
 (2) The county government, or any political subdivision(s) comprising or located therein, may contract one with another for the performance of governmental functions re-

quired or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe. The term 'governmental functions,' as it relates to counties, includes all duties, activities and operations of state-wide importance in which the county acts for the State, as well as of local importance, whether required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State."  
**Sec. 2.** The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Monday in November, 1966, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:  
**"FOR** the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."  
**AGAINST** the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."  
**Sec. 3.** The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**  
**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26** proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.  
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
**Section 1.** That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:  
**"Section 4.** The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election.  
**"The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals upon the expiration of the term of office for which each has**

been elected or appointed under the present Constitution and laws of this state, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified."  
**"The two members of the Commission of Appeals in aid of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and shall hold their offices, one for a term of two years and the other for a term of four years, beginning the first day of January following the adoption of this Amendment and until their successors are elected and qualified. Said Judges shall by agreement or otherwise designate the incumbent for each of the terms mentioned.  
**"The Governor shall designate one of the five Judges as Presiding Judge and at the expiration of his term and each six years thereafter a Presiding Judge shall be elected."  
**Sec. 2.** That Section 5 of the Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:  
**"Section 5.** The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction coextensive with the limits of the state in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law.  
**"The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have power upon affidavit or otherwise to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the exercise of its jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Ap-******

peals may sit for the transaction of business at any time from the first Monday in October to the last Saturday in September in each year, at the State Capitol. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall appoint a clerk of the court who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and who shall hold his office for a term of four years unless sooner removed by the court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said court.  
**"The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment."  
**Sec. 3.** Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:  
**"FOR** the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."  
**Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "AGAINST** the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."  
**If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state.  
**Sec. 4.** The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published and said election shall be held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.****

**INDUSTRIAL FOUNDATIONS**

**... to finance industrial growth**

Competition between states and cities to improve their competitive abilities to attract new payrolls has increased the forming of Industrial Foundations in Texas. Many industries want and need someone else to own the land, brick and mortar, keeping their money available for plant operations. Industrial Foundations indicate the interest and desire of a community for new industry. Local citizens who participate usually figure that they get a return on their money in a Foundation by having an additional payroll circulating in their community.

- PURPOSE** — is to give a community a corporate entity to assist industry to create jobs within the community — can be an existing industry as well as a new one. Foundations usually assist industry that cannot or will not use normal commercial financial institutions.
- EXTENT OF ACTIVITIES** — usually are to acquire and develop industrial property . . . construct buildings for lease . . . provide funds for training workers . . . purchase machinery and equipment . . . prepare promotional material and prospecting expenses and any other function that would give the community a competitive advantage for a new payroll.
- ORGANIZATION** — is usually by a group of businessmen who are interested in the economic growth and development of their community. A local attorney should prepare the application for the charter and by-laws in order to conform to state laws and internal revenue service regulations. The local bankers' support is very helpful in forming an Industrial Foundation.
- TYPE** — of Industrial Foundations vary — profit or non-profit — stock or contributions — the type a town needs depends upon the attitude and characteristics of the local people and its competitive position with other towns to attract new manufacturing payrolls. In most cases, Industrial Foundations are only used to assist industries where labor cost is a big factor in the operation, as the payroll provided is the important thing to the economy of the community.

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39** proposing an amendment to Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, to withdraw Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:** Section 18, that Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for the Permanent University System, including Texas A & M University, Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas at Prairie View, Tarleton State College at Stephenville, Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Engineering Experiment Station at College Station, and the Texas Experiment Station, the Board of Directors is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of one-third (1/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any institution of the University of Texas System, except as provided in the terms of such contracts."

"The Texas A & M University System and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, shall not receive any General Revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements, except in case of fire, flooding, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case

an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of General Revenue funds.

"Said Boards are severally authorized to pledge the whole or any part of the respective interests of Texas A & M University and of The University of Texas in the income from the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now apportioned by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such bonds or notes.

"All bonds or notes issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable. This Amendment shall be self-enacting provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing any obligation heretofore created by the issuance of any outstanding notes or bonds under Section 18 of the Constitution of the State of Texas prior to the adoption of this Amendment but any such outstanding notes or bonds shall be paid in full, both principal and interest, in accordance with the terms of such contracts."

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24** proposing an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President, and on all state-wide offices, questions or propositions by persons qualified to vote in this State except for meeting county or district residence requirements, and to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President by otherwise qualified United States citizens who have moved into or out of the State preceding a presidential election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:** Section 1, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to read:

"Section 2a. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time of such registration, permitting any person who is qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements set forth in Section 2 of this Article, to vote for (1) electors for President and Vice President of the United States and (2) all offices, questions

or propositions to be voted on by all electors throughout this State.

"(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting any person (1) who is qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements of Section 2 of this Article, and (2) who shall have resided anywhere within this State at least thirty (30) days next preceding a General Election in a presidential election year, and (3) who shall have been a qualified elector in another state immediately prior to his removal to this State or would have been eligible to vote in such other state had he remained there until such election, to vote for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in that election.

"(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting absentee voting for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in this State by former residents of this State (1) who have removed to another state, and (2) who meet all qualifications, except residence requirements, for voting for electors for President and Vice President in this State at the time of the election, but the privileges of suffrage so granted shall be only for

such period of time as would permit a former resident of this State to meet the residence requirements for voting in his new state of residence, and in no case for more than twenty-four (24) months."

"Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PERMITTING PERSONS QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN THIS STATE EXCEPT FOR THE RESIDENCE REQUIREMENTS IN A COUNTY OR DISTRICT TO VOTE FOR PRESIDENTIAL AND VICE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTORS, AND FOR ALL STATE-WIDE OFFICES, QUESTIONS OR PROPOSITIONS, AND PERMITTING CITIZENS OF THE UNITED STATES RECENTLY ARRIVED OR DEPARTED FROM THE STATE TO VOTE FOR PRESIDENTIAL AND VICE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTORS."

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1** proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 12; authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties; authorizing the creation of a board of directors by appointment or election; providing that the membership of the board shall be based upon the proportionate part of the population of each county, with no county having less than one member; providing for the necessary taxation; authorizing the levy of an annual tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority;

authorizing the Authority to employ or appoint an assessor and collector of taxes whose duty it shall be to assess and collect the taxes on the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors of said Authority; said taxes to be assessed equally and uniformly throughout the county or counties, comprising the Authority, as required by the Constitution; granting to such Authority the power to acquire by purchase, or through eminent domain proceedings existing publicly financed airport properties or other sites necessary to have and to improve the same, power to issue and sell general obligation bonds and revenue bonds or either of them; authorizing the assumption of outstanding indebtedness secured by general obligation bonds and assuming the obligations of the city or cities under ordinances and bond indentures under which revenue bonds have been issued and sold; to enact zoning regulations and other measures to protect the airport facilities from hazards and obstructions; providing for the adding of an additional county or counties to the Authority.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:** Section 1, that Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 12, reading as follows:

"Section 12. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of

Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, with power to issue general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, either or both of them, for the purchase, acquisition by the exercise of the power of eminent domain or otherwise, construction, reconstruction, repair or renovation of any airport or airports, landing fields and runways, airport buildings, hangars, facilities, equipment, fixtures, and any and all property, real or personal, necessary to operate, equip and maintain an airport; shall provide for the option by the governing body of the city or cities whose airport facilities are served by certified airlines and whose facility or some interest therein, is proposed to be or has been acquired by the Authority; to either appoint or elect a Board of Directors of said Authority; if the Directors are appointed shall be made by the County Commissioners Court after consultation with and consent of the governing body of the city or cities, and if the Board of Directors is elected they shall be elected by the qualified taxpayer voters of the county which chooses to elect the Board of Directors; said county, such Directors shall serve without compensation for a term fixed by the Legislature not to exceed six (6) years, and shall be selected on the basis of the proportionate population of each county based upon the last preceding Federal Census, and shall be a resident or residents of such county; provide that no county shall have less than one (1) member on the Board of Directors; provide for the holding of an election in each county proposing the creation of an Authority to be called by the Commissioners Court or Commissioners Courts, as the case may be, upon petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxpayer voters within the county or counties, said elections to be held on the same day if more than one county is included, provided that no more than one (1) election may be called in a county until after the expiration of one (1) year; in the event such an election has failed, and thereafter only upon petition of ten per cent (10%) of the qualified taxpayer voters being presented to the Commissioners Court or Commissioners Courts of the county or counties in which such an election has failed, and in the event that two or more counties vote on the proposition of the creation of an Authority therein, the proposition shall not be deemed to carry unless the majority of the qualified taxpayer voters in each county voting

thereon vote in favor thereof; provided, however, that an Airport Authority may be created and be composed of the county or counties that vote in favor of its creation if separate propositions are submitted to the voters of each county so that they may vote for a two or more county Authority or a single county Authority; provide for the appointment by the Board of Directors of an Assessor and Collector of Taxes in the Authority, whether constituted of one or more counties, whose duty it shall be to assess all taxable property, both real and personal, and collect the taxes thereon, based upon the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors, the tax to be levied not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) assessed valuation of the property, provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority; said taxable property shall be assessed on a valuation not to exceed the market value and shall be equal and uniform throughout the Authority as is otherwise provided by the Constitution; the Legislature shall authorize the purchase or acquisition by the Authority of any existing airport facility publicly owned and financed and served by certified airlines, in fee or of any interest therein, or to enter into any lease agreement therefor, upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreeable to the Authority and the owner of such facilities; or authorize the acquisition of same through the exercise of the power of eminent domain, and in the event of such acquisition, if there are any general obligation bonds that the owner of the publicly owned airport facility has outstanding, the same shall be fully assumed by the Authority and sufficient taxes levied by the Authority to discharge said outstanding indebtedness; and likewise any city or owner that has outstanding revenue bonds where the revenues of the airport have been pledged or said bonds constitute a lien against the airport facilities, the Authority shall assume and discharge all the obligations of the city under the ordinances and bond indentures under which said revenue bonds have been issued and sold. Any city which owns airport facilities not serving certificated airlines which are not purchased or acquired or taken over as herein provided by such Authority, shall have the power to operate the same under the existing laws or as the same may hereafter be amended. Any such Authority when created may be granted the power and authority to promulgate, adopt and enforce appropriate zoning regulations to protect the airport from

hazards and obstructions which would interfere with the use of the airport and its facilities for landing and take-off; an additional county or counties may be added to an existing Authority if a petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxpayer voters is filed with and an election is called by the Commissioners Court of the county or counties seeking admission to an Authority and the vote is favorable, then admission may be granted to such county or counties by the Board of Directors of the existing Authority upon such terms and conditions as they may agree upon and evidenced by a resolution approved by two-thirds (2/3rds) of the then existing Board of Directors, provided, however, the county or counties that may be added to the then existing Authority shall be given representation on the Board of Directors by adding additional directors in proportion to their population according to the last preceding Federal Census."

"Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIFTEEN ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33** proposing an amendment to Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to authorize state participation in programs financed with funds from private or federal sources and conducted by local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations, in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handicapped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:** Section 1, that Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 6. (a) No appropriation for private or individual purposes shall be made, unless authorized by this Constitution. A regular statement, under oath, and an account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published annually in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

"(b) State agencies charged with the responsibility of providing services to those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped may accept money from private or federal sources, designated by the private or federal source as money to be used in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handi-

capitated, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped. Money accepted under this subsection is state money. State agencies may expend money accepted under this subsection, and no other money, for specific programs and projects to be conducted by local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations, in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handicapped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care or treatment of the handicapped.

"The state agencies may deposit money accepted under this subsection either in the state treasury or in other secure depositories. The money may not be expended for any purpose other than the purpose for which it was given. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the state agencies may expend money accepted under this subsection without the necessity of an appropriation, unless the legislature, by law, requires that the money be expended only on appropriation. The Legislature may prohibit state agencies from accepting money under this subsection or may regulate the manner in which such money is accepted, the way the acceptance and expenditure of the money is administered, and the purposes for which the state agencies may expend the money. Money accepted under this subsection for a purpose prohibited by the Legislature shall be returned to the entity that gave the money.

"This subsection does not prohibit state agencies au-

thorized to render services to the handicapped from contracting with privately-owned or local facilities for necessary and essential services, subject to such conditions, standards, and procedures as may be prescribed by law.

"Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING ASSISTANCE TO THE BLIND, CRIPPLED, OR OTHERWISE PHYSICALLY OR MENTALLY HANDICAPPED, IN THE FORM OF GRANTS OF PUBLIC FUNDS OBTAINED FROM PRIVATE OR FEDERAL SOURCES ONLY, TO LOCAL LEVEL OR OTHER PRIVATE, NONSECTARIAN ASSOCIATIONS, GROUPS, AND NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS FOR ESTABLISHING AND EQUIPPING FACILITIES TO ASSIST THE HANDICAPPED IN BECOMING GAINFULLY EMPLOYED, FOR THEIR REHABILITATION OR RESTORATION, OR FOR PROVIDING OTHER SERVICES ESSENTIAL FOR THE BETTER CARE AND TREATMENT OF THE HANDICAPPED."

## Traffic Accidents Expected High For Labor Day Week End

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reported today that DPS estimates that 41 persons will die in traffic accidents during the three-day Labor Day week end.

"The current traffic trend indicates that Texas is headed for its third straight record high in terms of fatal accidents," Garrison said. "At the present time we are approximately 15 per cent ahead of the same time in 1965.

and we are still faced with the four months of the year which generally produce the most deaths."

"More people are killed in Texas each year in traffic than are killed in all the United States by murder and homicide," Garrison continued, "and the deaths are just as senseless, as needless, and as tragic, but not nearly as well publicized.

"Psychologists say that one reason the general public fails to take positive action in matters of traffic safety is due to a lack of personal identification with the problem. It might behoove each driver in our state to stop and consider that he has less than a

50-50 chance to go through his driving career without being involved in a traffic mishap incurring injury to himself or one of his family. The 41 persons expected to die in traffic during the Labor Day holiday have no idea that they will be involved in an accident, either."

In an attempt to offset dangers caused by the increased traffic on the highways during the holiday period, the Department of Public Safety will conduct "Operation Motorcade." Approximately 150 uniformed officers from other DPS services will be on the road to supplement the Highway Patrol enforcement action. Also, to call public attention to highway dangers, each traffic death will be tabulated and the totals will be announced three times daily from DPS headquarters in Austin.

The Texas Safety Association is carrying on a program stressing the need for courtesy and caution

on the highways and is coordinating the efforts of the Texas Jaycees in sponsoring rest stops with free coffee for fatigued drivers.

And the Texas Council of Safety Supervisors and the Texas Motor Transportation Association is sponsoring a "Holiday Road Patrol" to assist stranded motorists, thereby relieving highway patrolmen for enforcement work.

"This fine attitude of cooperation among these people indicates that Texans do realize the need for adequate safety on our highways," Garrison stated. "If it could carry over into the thinking and action of every driver the death toll would drop considerably under that expected for the week end.

"In the final analysis, traffic safety must rest on the shoulders of every person who gets behind the steering wheel of a car. With the proper attitude of alertness and with the acceptance of re-

sponsibilities we can see positive results in our attempts to halt the increases in the number of traffic mishaps."

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# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Heinous, inhuman, unthinkable crimes — such as those that have left a trail of blood across Texas — must be stopped, say state officials.

Gov. John Connally and Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr both have strongly recommended changes in Texas' criminal laws.

Their proposals are the result of three terrible incidents — all committed over a period of two weeks. First, the sniping episode on the University of Texas campus during which Charles J. Whitman deliberately killed 16 innocent persons and wounded 3 dozen more; then the malicious murder of a night watchman in Roscoe, Texas, by a West Texas teenager; and finally, the grotesque murder of three youngsters in Fort Worth.

Connally said he would ask the Legislature for a law requiring a compulsory life sentence for anyone who commits murder, then is found not guilty because of insanity.

Carr concluded — adding that he plans to appear personally before the Texas House committee on revisions of the code of criminal procedure in January.

Meanwhile, the attorney general has asked the governor to appoint a blue ribbon citizen committee to draft legislation for tougher laws and stronger penalties.

Up for study are:

- Stiffer penalties for crimes of violence.
- Stiffer penalties for sex crimes.
- Clarification of laws dealing with carrying arms in public.
- More effective methods of confining those who use insanity as a defense for crimes.

Both Connally and Carr made it clear they are firmly opposed to stringent laws regulating the sale of firearms.

**DRAFT CALL INCREASES** — Texas' draft call for October is the largest since May, 1953, when the Korean War ended.

State quota for October is 2,671 compared to 3,823 at the fighting in Korea, according to State Selective Service Director Col. Morris S. Schwartz.

September quota also is up — from 1,585 to 1,890. National call is for 46,200.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES** — State Supreme Court chief justice may assign retired appellate court judges to duty on courts of civil appeals in case of vacancy or disqualification. Attorney General Carr has ruled.

Assignment would be terminated by return to duty of regular judge.

In other opinions, Carr concluded that:

- Alien employees of Texas colleges, their husbands, wives and children, are entitled to resident tuition rates in all state institutions of higher education.

- Auto certificates of title laws do not permit creation of a joint estate with rights of survivorship out of community property.

- Victoria County school superintendent has general supervision over independent school districts of less than 500 scholastics in county.

- No credit union may serve as a depository for another credit union.

**WATER SPORT RECORDS** — The 1966 summer vacation season seems destined to go into the records as setting a new high for water recreational deaths and for establishing an amazing boating-skiing safety mark.

In a two-week study by the Parks and Wildlife Department, it was pointed out that during that period, 14 persons drowned in Texas, but none was a result of boating or skiing. Nine of the deaths were attributed to bathing accidents, and four were blamed on fishing.

Death toll for the season was increased to 181 and the total for the entire summer of 1965 was 200. So, with a month of vacation time left, the department figures this year's death count will surpass last year's by a substantial margin.

A spokesman for the department said that the new law passed by the last Legislature had cut boating-skiing accidents.

Measures to enforce life-preserver requirement and other phases of the safety law helped cut the accident rate.

**COTTON DEADLINE IS EXTENDED** — Cotton farmers in Cameron, Willacy and southern portions of Hidalgo and Starr counties have been given another 30 days — until September 30, midnight — to gather crops under the Pink Bollworm Control Program.

State Agriculture Commissioner John C. White extended the deadline after conferences with the U. S. and Mexican Departments of Agriculture and Pink Bollworm Advisory Committee concerning late and slow harvest.

White pointed out that only 26,858 bales had been ginned in the Zone control area by August

7, compared with 177,426 by that same date last year.

Delayed spring plantings due to bad weather and adverse growing prompted the extension.

**ELECTION LAW CHANGES** — An election law committee, headed by Sen. Tom Creighton, of Mineral Wells, has named a subcommittee to meet September 29 and October 13 to study recommendations made to date. Afterwards the full committee will hold public hearings.

Texans will have an opportunity to vote on one election law change in November. Already on

the November ballot is a constitutional amendment calling for annual voter registration to replace the poll tax voting requirement.

AFL/CIO is opposing this amendment, seeking instead permanent registration.

Committee recommendations will be made after the November 8 election.

**INTERSTATE SAFETY** — A program to make Texas' safest highways — the interstate system — even safer has been launched by the Texas Highway Commission.

Commission approved a \$3,300-

000 plan which includes replacement of conventional sign supports and illumination pole bases with new units incorporating "breakaway" safety features. New bases and supports are already in place along newer sections of interstate highways in Texas. Program involves putting them in place of conventional equipment in older sections.

Instead of rigid, unyielding hazards, breakaway sign supports and pole bases shear on impact, pivoting up and away from an out-of-control vehicle. The vehicle then rolls to a more controlled stop.

### CONGRESS VERSUS A NEW THREAT FROM THE COURTS

August 20, 1966

Dear Fellow Texan: The Judiciary can correct improper actions of the Legislature, for such is the proper role of the Judiciary in our tripartite system of Government. But to restrain a committee of Congress from meeting at all, from taking action, is an outrageous assault upon the Congress, the people's branch, and upon the very structure of our Federal system.

Yet, this was the action threatened when a Federal judge in Washington granted a temporary restraining order against a hearing set by the House Committee on Un-American Activities to uncover the persons and their motives involved in "overt acts" against the U. S. war effort in Viet Nam. The injunction was thrown out by a three-judge panel just in time for the hearing to begin, thus averting for the time being a showdown with Congress as to the proper roles of the two branches.

I hope you believe as I do, that your conviction is as strong as mine, that the Congress of the United States is the cornerstone branch of our governmental system.

tem. Those who serve in the Congress are the direct representatives of the people of this country, and an attack upon the exercise of Congressional functions assails the people themselves. The separation of powers of the Legislative, Executive, and Judicial branches of the Government is delicate and subtle; many of us believe that the Constitutional powers of Congress have been repeatedly infringed by the other two branches and we have repeatedly battled against these intrusions. No threatened assault, however, has been as blatantly aimed at the heart of Congress' right to act as was the ill-advised (and promptly set aside) ruling by the Federal judge in the instance of the hearing scheduled by the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

In 1867, Chief Justice Chase wrote these words in the Supreme Court decision in *State of Mississippi v. Johnson*, turning aside an amendment to the Constitution to forbid President Andrew Johnson from enforcing the Reconstruction Acts: "The Congress is the legislative department of the government; the President is the executive department. Neither can be restrained in its action by the judicial department; though the acts of both, when performed, are, in proper cases, subject to its cognizance." After they are performed, then the acts of the President and Congress are in proper cases subject to judicial review and disallowance. The separation of powers set forth by Chief Justice Chase has never been denied by a subsequent court decision.

let us consider anew the merits of providing the people's arm of Government, the Congress, with authority to nullify unwise acts of the Judiciary.

By the way, I am in full support of the efforts of the House Committee on Un-American Activities to strip the veil of mystery from those persons who oppose efforts of their country in Viet Nam by pursuing tactics and methods giving aid and comfort to our Communist enemies.

and do something about cars that "Are Unsafe at Any Speed." While we are at it we might do something about our unsafe driving habits.

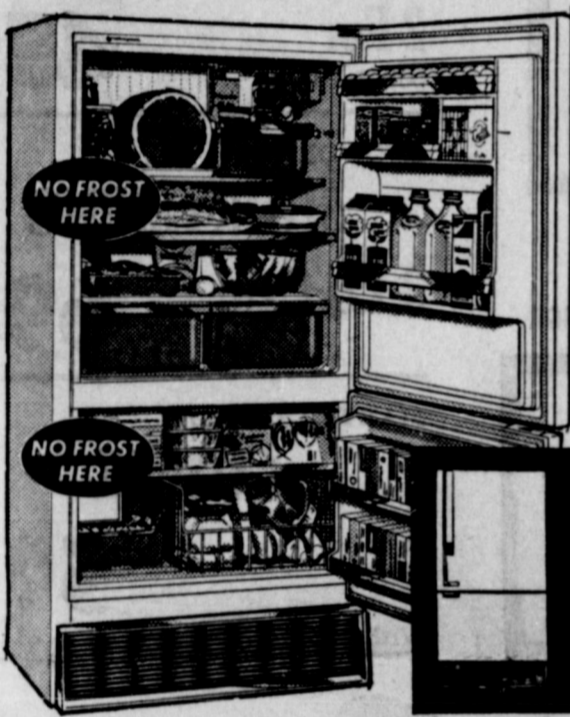

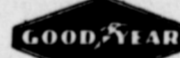

**CARE FOR ROSE BUSHES THRU THE FALL**

For continued flower production throughout the summer and fall, don't neglect your rose bushes, says County Agent Ronald Gooch. Continue to use a disease and insect control program. A preventive spray of folpet every 7 to 10 days will prevent blackspot and help to control mildew.

An application of complete fertilizer scattered over the surface of the rose bed at the rate of one to two pounds of 10-8-6 or 16-20-0 per 100 square feet of bed area every four weeks will insure continued growth and strong canes for late summer and fall bloom. To conserve moisture and reduce soil temperature, use a two to three inch mulch of sawdust, shavings, cotton burrs or other organic matter.

As the mulch decomposes, it should be replaced, says Agent Gooch.

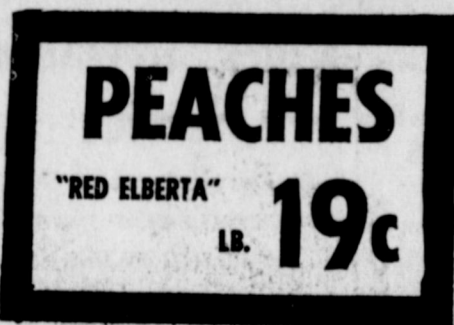
