Murder Charge Filed In Hollis Man's Death

LeForest Sydney Cole, 43, of Hollis, was in Donley County Jail here Tuesday, charged with murder, in the death of another Hollis man, officers said. Cole was held on \$5,000 bond.

The dead man was Marshall Harrison Nichols, 41, who was shot to death following an argument alongside U. S. 287 in Donley County about 3 a.m. Monday.

The shooting occurred five miles southeast of Hedley beside a parked pickup truck in which two couples from Hollis had been riding east on U. S. 287, according to Donley County Sheriff Bill Cornell.

Sheriff Cornell said Cole "flagged" a passing car and rode into Memphis, where he called police and said he wanted to surrender. The Memphis police called me, and I went there and took Cole into custody.

Nichols was shot to death with a single bullet from a .22 rifle. The body was taken to Spicer Funeral Home in Memphis, and then taken to Coley Funeral Home in Hollis.

Both Nichols and Cole have been employed as farm laborers in the Hollis area, the sheriff said.

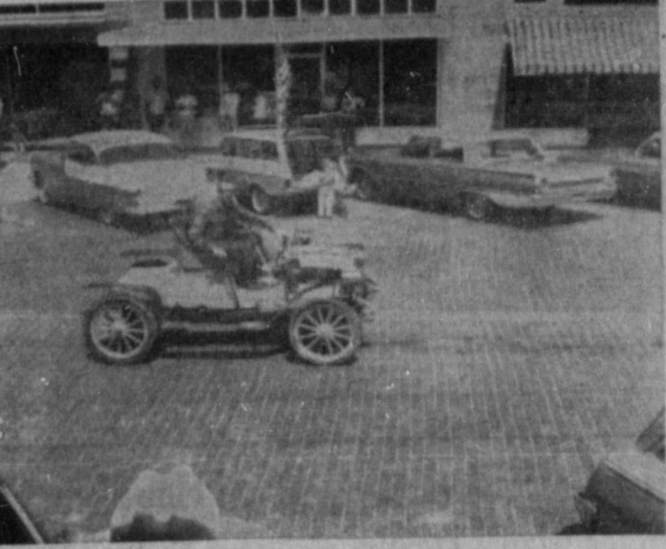
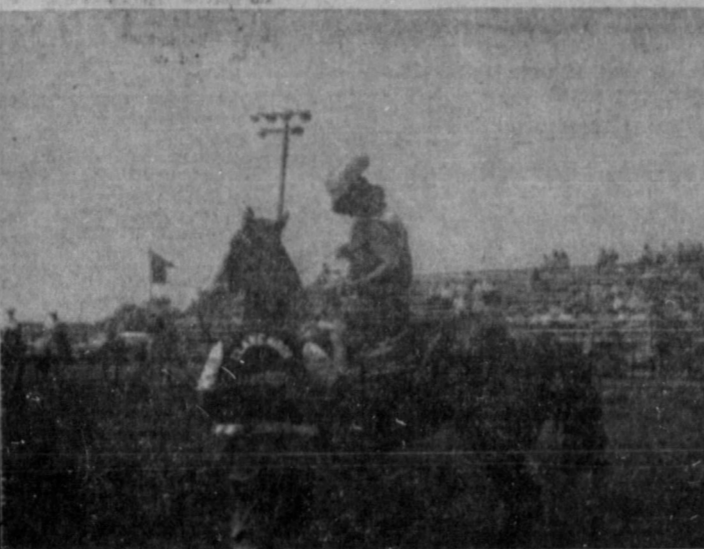

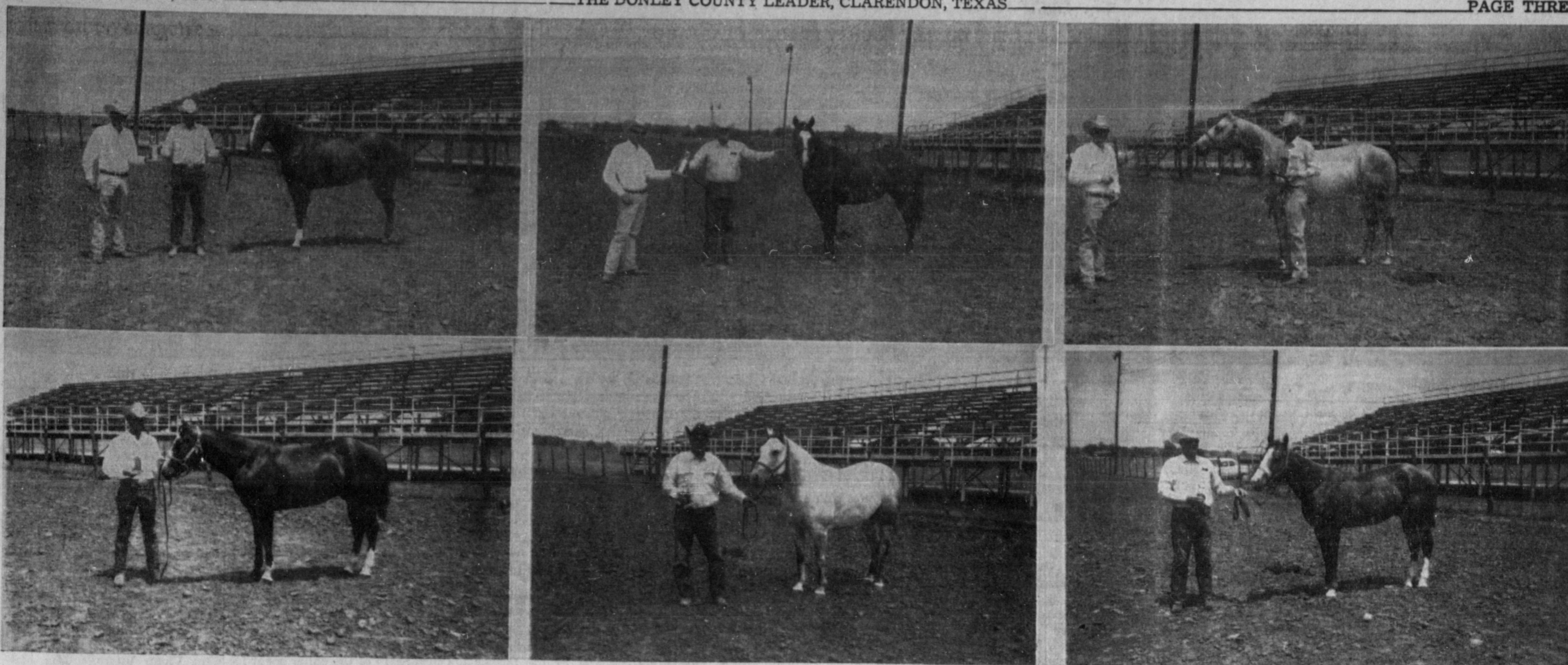

THE FOOD DOLLAR AND THE FARMER

The farm share of the consumer's dollar spent for food ranges from about 10 to 70 percent, according to the recently issued report of the National Commission on Food Marketing. This lengthy survey of the economics of food marketing, which from farmer through retailer comprises the Nation's largest industry, shows that farmers are not to blame for higher food prices in recent years. The report points up the extent to which farmers are being made the scapegoats by other segments of the economy.

The Commission's report is highly controversial, especially as it concerns ostensible problems of size and bigness in food marketing and in proposing new regulations and restrictions. In the view of many, the Commission exceeded its grant of Congressional authority by making recommendations for action to be taken—and these aspects of the report, to which some Commission members issued strong dissents, are sure to be followed by a long round of argument and debate in

Congress and the country.

But the factual side of the report—the studies on where the housewife's food dollar goes—are very revealing, and in this research the Commission and its staff performed a helpful service.

It is obvious that when the housewife buys a food product in the market, she pays for all services involved in producing, processing, and distributing the food. Many housewives, however, don't understand the relationship of the price received by the farmer to the price she pays. Since the product is food, too many housewives tend to blame the farmer for the cost. The Commission report should help many Americans to understand the truth in the farm-retail price spread. Using figures for 1964, the Commission determines that consumers expenditures for domestically produced farm food totaled \$69.8 billion. The marketing bill made up 68 percent of the consumer's food dollar that year; the farm value was 32 percent.

That \$69.8 billion spent by consumers in 1964 breaks down as follows: Of the \$47.3 billion marketing bill, \$20.8 billion went to labor costs; \$5.1 billion went to transportation; \$18.7 billion is classed as "other" costs, including costs of buildings and equipment, containers & supplies, and advertising and promotion; and \$2.7

billion were corporation profits. The farm value—again, 32 percent of the total spent—was \$22.5 billion.

As I indicated above, the report notes differences in the farm share of the consumer's dollar for specific products. For example, the farm share for butter is approximately 70 percent because processing is relatively simple, transportation costs are low since the product is highly concentrated, and handling costs are moderate. By contrast, the farm share of the dollar spent for canned tomatoes is low—16 percent—mainly because of high processing and container costs. Twenty-one leading farm food products were surveyed in detail. This is the breakdown for a pound of choice beef retailing for 70.8 cents: Retailing costs were 17 cents; wholesaling, transportation, and other distribution costs were 2.3 cents; processing costs were 5.3 cents; assembly costs 3.8 cents; and farm value 42.4 cents. For one pound of white bread, retailing at 20.7 cents, the breakdown is: Retailing, 3.7 cents; wholesaling, transportation, and other distribution, 6.1 cents; processing, 6.7 cents; assembly, 2 cents; and farm value, 4 cents.

Hand it to the farmer and his efficiency. The report states that although farm prices of a market basket of foods were unchanged between 1950 and 1965, the farm-

retail spread rose 37 percent and retail prices increased 20 percent.

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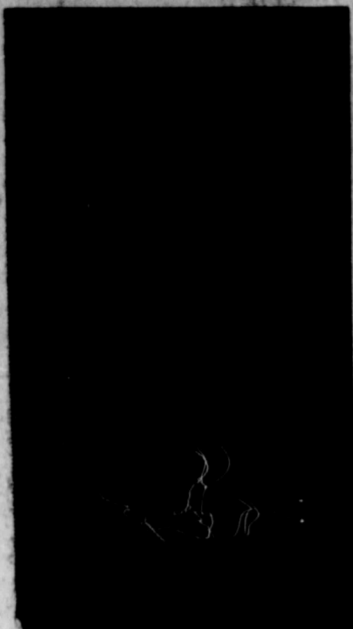

Gooch Says Control Bagworms In Evergreens Now

Bagworm damage to evergreens such as arbutus, cedar and other evergreen species is being found now, says County Agent Ronald Gooch. Evergreens should be watched carefully at this time of year, especially if old worm bags are found on the tree. Wingless females crawl out and die after laying eggs inside the bag. In this case, each bag may contain hundreds of eggs which hatch into tiny larvae.

The newly hatched larvae immediately start to make bags by chewing off small pieces of the tree. Young worms carry the bags wherever they go. The larvae can be killed with insecticides applied when the bagworms are still small. Chemical controls are ineffective when worms are full grown.

Chemicals suggested as control include Sevin, Malathion or Toxaphene. The insecticide application should be applied at 7 to 10 day intervals until the bagworms are eliminated. Directions on the container should be followed carefully, the county agent emphasized.

The feeding worms, when infestations are heavy, will remove the foliage and bark from all or parts of a tree or shrub, resulting in death of the plant or the heavily infested part. If control measures are started too late, hand pick and burn the bags, because the worm goes through the winter in the egg stage within the bag, said Gooch.

HAYING AND GRAZING

We have received a memorandum concerning our application for emergency haying and grazing on Conservation Reserve land and diverted acres. After considering our application, the USDA State Disaster Committee felt that the drought situation is not critical enough to justify the program at this time.

PREVENTED PLANTING DUE TO NATURAL DISASTER

A legislation was signed into law June 17 to provide benefits and authorize planting alternate crops on acreage which was unplanted to cotton, feed grain or wheat because of natural disaster. If the County Committee determines that an acreage of the above crops was not planted because of drought, flood or other natural disaster, they can consider it as having been planted for the purpose of program eligibility and payments. A crop of wheat, feed grain, cotton, peanuts, sugarbeets, or sugarcane cannot be planted for harvest on this land for the current year.

If you have any questions concerning this matter, come to the office.

DESTROYED COTTON OR FEED GRAIN

If your cotton or feed grain was destroyed by rain, wind, hail or any natural disaster, you may still draw price support payments on this acreage; however, you will still need to come to the office and certify to this acreage.

MEASUREMENT SERVICE

We want to remind you again about the measurement service which is available through the office. The final date to apply for the measurement service is August 5.

Measurement of Soil Bank farms is under way. If yours is a soil bank farm and the crops are ready to be measured, we would appreciate it if you would let us know.
