

CC team competition to highlight semester

Team competition will be the center of Clarendon College out of class activities this coming fall semester.

Upcoming at CC this fall is an invitational golf tourney Sept. 10-11; the college N.I. R. A. rodeo Oct. 28-30; and both boys and girls basketball beginning in November.

Five college teams will be competing for honors this semester. Coach Gene Davis' Bulldog Basketball team begins workouts soon as will Susan Addy's girl's team.

CC's N. I. R. A. Rodeo team begins competition in September under the direction of Dick Morgan. Golf tournaments begin soon for the

college golf team with seven events entered this fall. Lloyd Waters coaches the team.

Clarendon College's livestock judging team will also be competing again soon. Coach Jerry Hawkins said a complete competition schedule has not been completed yet, but the team may compete in the Clayton, N. M. meet in two weeks.

The college basketball team starts their regular season on campus Nov. 12 against Trinidad, Colo. Coach Davis had 19 men out for the Bulldog team this year.

Part-time profs at college

Sixteen teachers round out Clarendon College's teaching load this year as part-time instructors for the school.

Six of these teach courses offered locally on campus. The remaining ten instructors teach in CC's extension education programs in neighboring towns of Pampa, Shamrock, Childress and McLean.

Two new instructors have been added to the college's local part-time faculty. They are Marian Stator, new foods and nutrition instructor at CC; and Mike Pelfrey, who will teach English on campus and psychology in a

extension course offered in Pampa.

Mrs. Stator recently moved to Clarendon with her husband, Jerry, the new owner/operator of Bylow Grocery. They moved here from Sunray, where Mrs. Stator had taught high school home economics for the past seven years.

She began teaching in Sunray directly after receiving her BS degree in Home Economics from Texas Tech.

The Stator's have a 19 month old daughter, Shelly. They live at Lake Greenbelt.

Mike Pelfrey came to Clarendon College after teaching child and ado-

lescent psychology the past three years at the University of South Carolina at Columbia. His wife, Betty, served as a part-time instructor for CC last year, teaching English and language learning skills.

Pelfrey earned his doctorate in school psychology from the University of Texas at Austin in 1972. While at UT, Pelfrey taught a college statistics course.

He earned his masters degree in English from Michigan State in 1968 and his bachelors degree in English from McMurry University in Abilene in 1960. The Pelfrey's live in

Memphis. They have two sons: John, age 11; and Robert, 5.

Clarendon College will have four returning part-time college instructors this year. Along with Mrs. Pelfrey will be Clarendon locals, Glenn Wallace, Owen McGarity and James O. Brandon.

Wallace will be teaching college algebra this semester. McGarity will offer instruction in sociology, psychology and philosophy and Brandon will teach a philosophy course with an emphasis in Bible Study.

Ten of the College's part-time professors will be instructing extension courses

in four neighboring towns. In Pampa, four teachers are employed by the college; in Shamrock, four; Childress, one teacher; and McLean, one.

McLean game is previewed

Clarendon's Bronchos go against the McLean Tigers in both teams opening game Friday night at 8 p.m. in McLean.

Newly elected Broncho Football Captains Barry Schafer, Irvan Thomas and Mike Newhouse will lead the team in their opening effort Friday. A pep rally Friday at 3:30 p.m. in the high school gym will send the team off.

The home team defeated the Tigers in a solid 31-10 last season, but Broncho head coach, Jerry Wilson, thinks the going may be a little tougher this year.

"They've improved this year," he said. Wilson and his staff have already seen the McLean team play in two scrimmages this year.

"They've got seven guys back who started for them last year," Wilson said, "and they're bigger than we

are."

Bigger means the tigers average more than Clarendon's overall offensive team weight of 155 pounds. The Broncho offensive line averages a slightly bigger 158 pounds.

McLean dropped out of Class A competition this year along with dropping out of Clarendon's District 2-A. In Class B football, Wilson said, they're rated in the top twenty state teams.

"I don't look for it to be a high scoring ball game," Wilson said, with defense and the kicking game the main factors.

Clarendon's kicking game is untested for the year and Wilson said he wasn't sure who would be doing the kicking Friday for the Bronchos.

Potential players for that position include Irvan Thomas, Barry Schafer, Mike Newhouse or his brother Bubba. Whoever does the kicking, he said, field position is going to be important.

The kicking position isn't the only one still up for grabs. Several starting spots aren't set for the bronchos, and Friday's game will be a testing ground for these.

"We're going to see who can play," Wilson said.

A McLean footballer who seems able to "play", according to Wilson, is Tiger Quarterback Sammy Haynes. Wilson described him as a "real competitor" who has the ability to make long gains against a team. Haynes was

a starting running back for McLean last season. This experience along with his passing abilities, makes him a real threat.

"If we can stop him" Wilson said, "I think we can pretty well stop their offense."

As for the Broncho offense, Wilson said they aren't quite as polished as he would like. This early in the season, however, he said he wasn't too concerned. "It's not good to have your offense peak out too quick in the season."

On defense, Wilson described his crew as "very aggressive," and this aggressiveness should help to overcome the larger size of the McLean Tigers. "It may not be a high scoring game," Wilson said, "but I think we're going to see plenty of hitting."

City presented safety plaque

Panhandle Plains Auto Club presented the City of Clarendon a 17 year Pedestrian Safety Achievement Award last week for its achievement in the reduction of pedestrian fatalities and its outstanding pedestrian safety program.

The award, according to Sam Bell, general manager of the club, was one of 287 top awards and citations presented by AAA, in its 37th Annual Pedestrian Safety Inventory. A record 2,462 cities and 31 states participated in the AAA survey that reviewed pedestrian safety achievements

for 1975. The AAA program, the only one of its kind, focuses national and local attention on pedestrian safety needs.

Recognition is given to cities and states that have shown superior achievement in their pedestrian death and injury records and have conducted effective pedestrian safety programs.

Pedestrian safety often is given limited attention in many traffic safety programs, AAA maintains. Bell noted, however, nearly 20 percent of all traffic fatalities are pedestrians. Through this award program, AAA

and its affiliated clubs hope to increase public awareness of the need for strong pedestrian safety programs.

Awards and citations are presented on the basis of low pedestrian death and injury figures and on accident prevention programs which are evaluated in seven key areas—maintenance of efficient accident records, safety legislation, enforcement, traffic engineering, traffic safety organization, quality of school traffic safety programs, and active public information and education programs.



Howardwick trash truck Sunday

Trash truck vandalized

Vandals struck the Howardwick trash pick-up truck sometime Saturday night, Aug. 28, with an estimated \$450 worth of damage sustained to the vehicle.

Pick-up owner George Howard estimated the damage at that figure. At the time of the vandalism, the pick-up was parked between the Howardwick City Hall and Fire Station. It had been left there Saturday night after being driven around Howardwick Friday and Saturday making trash pickups from land owners.

The pick-up trash service was instituted by Howardwick city officials in cooperation with George Howard as a temporary means of trash pick-up for the city. Howardwick has been without its own trash dump since a landfill previously operated by Sherwood Shores was covered up July 5.

An order to cover the landfill was issued by Sherwood Shores Corp. President George De Armond after negotiations

broke down between he and the city concerning applying for a permit to operate the landfill.

A permit application for a city operated landfill was recently submitted by the city of Howardwick according to lawyer Mike Sanders of Clarendon. Sanders estimated approval of the permit application and instituting construction of a landfill would take from four to six months.

A site for the proposed landfill has already been approved by officials of the Texas Dept. of Health, state agency responsible for licensing all landfills.

Land for the site had been leased to the city of Howardwick by George Howard for \$1 a year for an initial period of seven years. Five acres have been set aside for the proposed site.

Last weekend was the first time the pickup had been used as a means to haul Howardwick trash. Garbage which had been picked up Friday and Saturday was strewn about the vehicle.

White shoe polish was smeared over the pickup and the valve stems had been removed from all four tires.

Howard said there was some evidence sugar had been poured into the pick-up's gas tank. He also said the vehicle would probably have to be re-painted.

Howard said the pick-up would be used again this

week-end as a trash service. He said it would be parked at the Howardwick City Hall and citizens could dump their trash in the vehicle's rear bed.

For retirement plan purposes, you are both an employer, being permitted to set aside up to 15% of earned annual income or \$7,500, whichever is less, toward a pension plan, and an employee, not being taxed on such contributions or on the income earned by the funds during the accumulation period. To receive these benefits, you need to be under a qualified Keogh plan. Life insurance plans can pay retirement income as long as you live. Also, in such a plan, the pure insurance proceeds are received by your beneficiary free of income taxes.

Because of factors such as rising real incomes, value of homemaker's time and desire for leisure, the consumption of some categories of convenience foods has been increasing. For example, frozen vegetables offered in bulk bags and pouches, garnished with sauces and creams, or combined with another vegetable or food, have helped increase the per capita consumption of frozen vegetables, on a fresh weight basis, from 15.4 pounds in 1963, to 21.9 pounds in 1973--a rise of over 40 percent. In comparison, per capita food consumption increased by 5.6 percent from 1963 to 1973.

Free school lunch policy set

Clarendon school children may qualify for reduced price or free school lunches if their parents or legal guardians yearly income falls within specified money amounts.

Parents or guardians should apply if they believe the child will qualify. This application may be made anytime during the school year and if turned down, this decision may be appealed to school authorities.

All children qualifying for reduced lunch prices may purchase their school meal for 20 cents or less. The price, never exceeding 20 cents, is set by the school

district. Regular school lunch prices are 50 cents for grades Kindergarten through 5th; and 65 cents for 6th through 12th grade students.

To apply, the parent or guardian should fill out an application form provided by the school system. Notification of eligibility will be received within 10 days of submitting the application. Yearly income levels are the main determining factors.

Other considerations are unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 per cent of annual income, special education expenses

due to mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses. These should be noted on the application. In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for free or reduced lunches.

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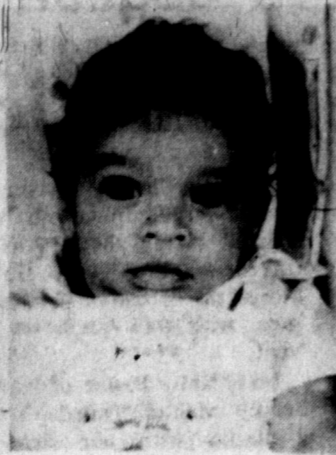

Donley County Land O' Promise

This pioneer history of Donley County is as colorful as variegated brake land of this eastern Panhandle country. Such salty cattlemen as Charles Goodnight and Tom Bugbee along with men of the cloth such as Henry Lewis Carhart helped to settle and civilize one of the nation's last frontiers. Author Virginia Browder covers the days of the Comanche and Comanchero, the rancher and later the farmer and the settlements and towns and communities that made up Donley County. New hunting licenses

The 1976-77 Texas hunting, fishing licenses are available at license deputies and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offices across the state.

The hunting, hunting/fishing combination licenses will be valid on Sept. 1. The hunting license fee is \$5.25, the hunting/fishing combination fee is \$8.75 and a resident exempt license is still 25 cents.

These licenses are similar to last years selection and each license will contain buck, antlerless deer tags, and turkey tags. All licenses are printed on waterproof, tear-resistant paper. The date of kill on deer tags this year either may be marked out in ink or cut from the tag. There is space on the back of the new license for white-winged dove and federal migratory waterfowl stamps.

A resident license is required of every Texas citizen who hunts outside of the county of his residence or who hunts deer or turkey, except persons under 17 or over 65 years of age. Persons hunting on land where they reside are not

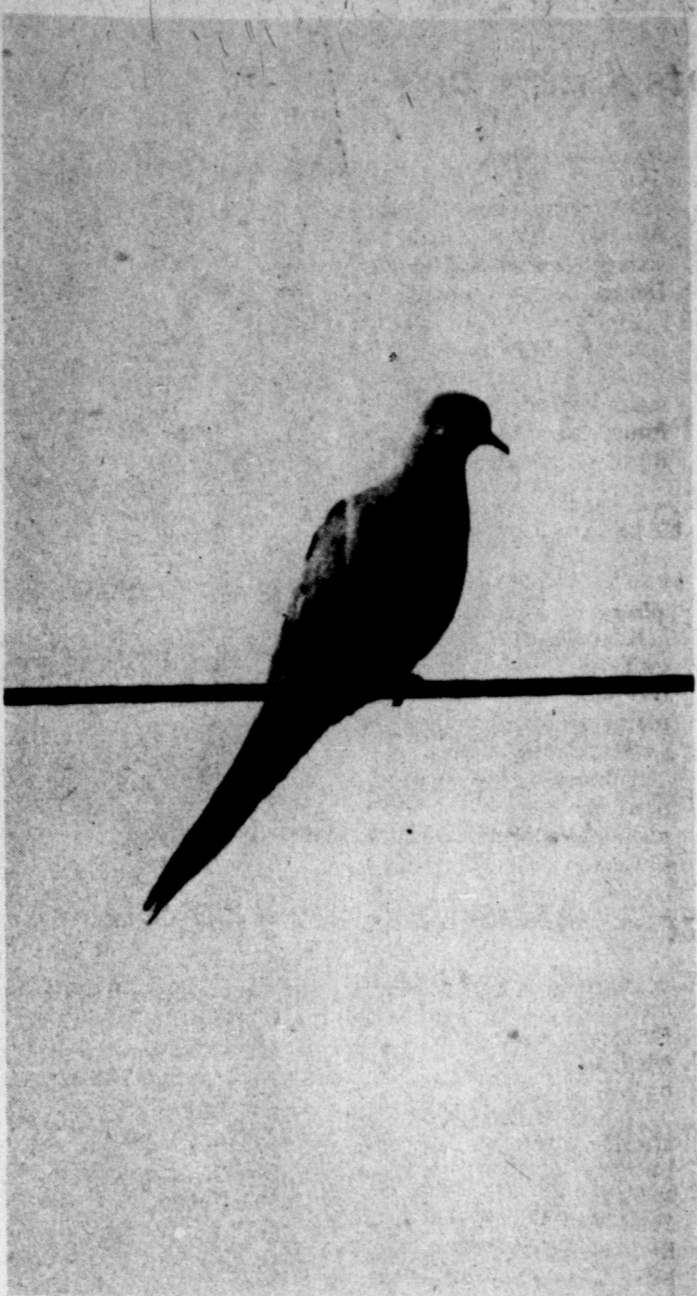
required to purchase this license, but must have an exempt license to hunt deer or turkey.

A citizen is any person except an alien who has been a bona fide resident of Texas for more than six months immediately preceding appli-

cation for a license. Members of the Armed Forces with proof of assignment on active duty at any federal installation within the state for a period of more than 30 days may purchase a resident license.

The \$37.50 non-resident license is the same as last year and a special non-resident five-day migratory game bird hunting license will be available for \$10.25. All persons who hunt wild deer, bear, turkey and javelina during any open archery season in which only long bows and arrows are used, are required a \$3.25 archery stamp in addition to a valid hunting license.

More information is available in the new 1976-77 Texas hunting & sport fishing guide available at all license deputies and P&WD offices.



County dove season is now underway

First half of Donley County's split dove season opened Wednesday, Sept. 1 and is scheduled to run through Oct. 14.

The second half of the season begins again Jan. 1 and will continue through Jan. 16. Different hunting times are scheduled for the two halves. During the first period, Sept. 1 through Oct. 14, sportsmen may hunt legally from 12 o'clock noon till sunset each day. During the second phase, Jan. 1 through Jan. 16, dove hunting will be legal all day, from 30 minutes before sunrise till sunset.

According to local Game Warden, Gary Hunt, bag limit for doves will be 10 birds per day, 20 birds in possession. "In possession," Hunt said, "means no more than 10 birds in your bag and 10 more at home in the freezer."

Reports from the Panhandle indicate plenty of birds, but dry hunting conditions will increase the chances for fires from careless disposal of matches and cigarettes.

South Plains dove populations are scattered with fewer acres of grain and sunflowers than last year. Better shooting conditions will exist near feed fields or on flyways to and from the local roosts.

The rolling hills off the caprock are holding good numbers of birds with more grain fields and plenty of water.

The delay of any cold, wet, rainy spell during the first part of September will increase the sportsman's chances of harvesting locally grown doves before they head south for the winter.

Firearms used to hunt doves must be plugged to hold no more than three shells at one time and may not be larger than 10 gauge. No rifles or pistols are legal for dove hunting.

No hunting is permitted in game refuges, state and federal parks, game reserves, or from the public road or road right-of-way. More citations are issued by P&WD wardens for shooting from the road than any other dove violation.

Sportsmen are asked to get permission to hunt as required by Texas law. The yearly increase in number of hunters per county warrants an early contact with the landowner before the season starts.

Hunt said in Donley County, the hunter need not have written permission from the land owner, but if a land owner presses charges for

hunting on his land against his wishes a \$25 to \$200 fine may be levied.

This same amount of money may be charged for other hunting violations such as hunting without a license, shooting birds over the bag limit, hunting with more than three shells in your shotgun or hunting birds with a rifle. Exact amount of the fine is set by individual Justice of the Peace officers.

Dove is the first hunting season to open for Donley County hunters. Quail season will open here Nov. 13 through Feb. 13. Bag limit will be 12 pe. day. Turkey and deer season will run simultaneously from Nov. 20 through Dec. 5. Hunt said information concerning the upcoming duck season has not as yet been released by Federal hunting authorities.

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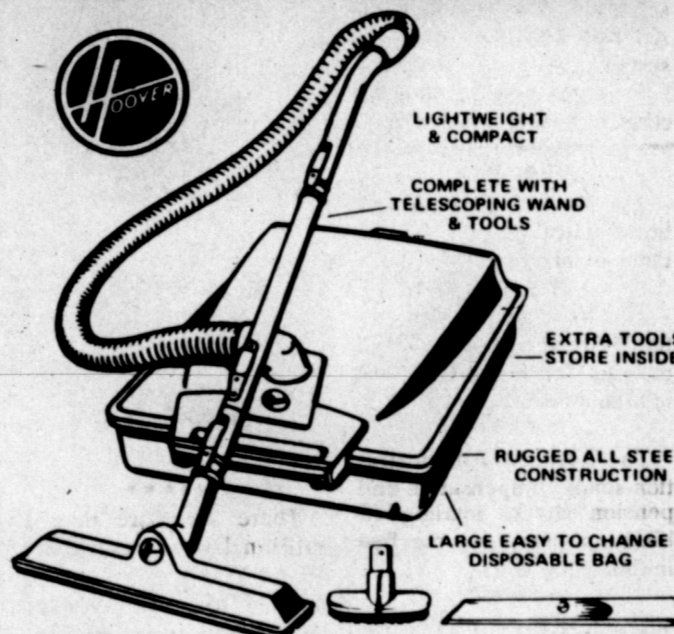

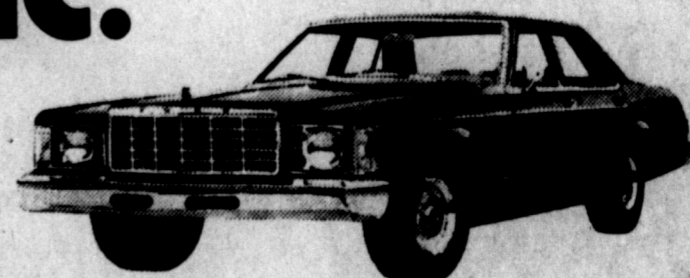
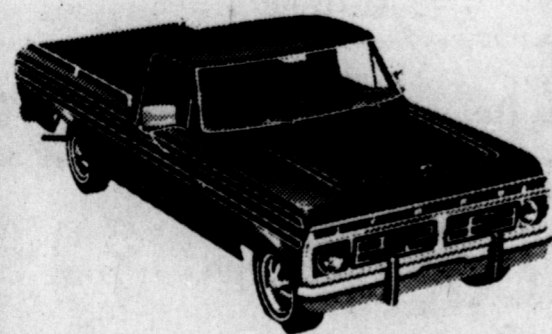
