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

under. General rules governing the judging include the following tips. Arrangements must be complete upon delivery to the show, or may be arranged by the contestant only at the Fair building. (Facilities will be available.) Contestants names should be affixed on the bottom of containers where they can not be seen. Specimen should be put in tin cans using one full bloom, one bud, some foliage and no more than three flowers displayed together.

Be sure they are of the same kind. Card tables will be furnished for centerpiece and special occasion arrangements. These may be accompanied by completing tablecloths, place mats, and accessories. If you need transportation call Mabel Mongole, 874-2468 or Mrs. W. K. Hardin, 874-3562.

To make your flowers last longer cut them the night before and place them in warm water, then use cold water for arranging them the next morning.

TWO PROMINENT GIN MANAGERS RETIRE

An accumulated eighty years For County Fair of gin service has been climaxed here by the announcement of the retirement of two Paymaster Gin County Fair and Flower Show managers, J. R. Brandon of Clar-Lake. Named as manager of Paymaster Gins here, Ashtola and Lelia Lake is Eldon Lyles, who took over management of the Ashtola Gin last year.

Mr Brandon has completed 41 years in the gin business and gin manager since 1938. He began his career as a ginner at Ashtola in 1925 and became manager of the Ashtola Gin in 1938. Paymaster purchased the gin here and at Lelia Lake in 1946 and Mr. Brandon became manager of the local gin in 1949, and has also managed the Ashtola gin for six years.

Mr. Aten started his gin career at Lelia Lake in 1927 and became manager of the Smith Bros. gin in 1934 and has managed the gin since that time while under the ownership of Memphis Cotton Oil Co. and later Paymaster, a total of 39 years gin service. Sunday Afternoon Reception To Honor The Dee Millers



startling to see the statistics: In October, 1965, more than 10 million youths in the 16 to 24 age bracket were out of high school and in the labor force-and more than 3 million lacked high school diplomas. One estimate is that by 1975, there will be some 32 million adults in the labor force who did not finish high school. Yet, in his lifetime, a high school graduate can expect to earn almost twice as much as the person who quit schoo lbefore finishing the eighth grade. Graduates earn almost 20 percent more than non-graduates with but one to three years of high school. So, the argument to persuade youngsters to finish high school can be put in dollars and



OCCUPATION & INVASION CURRENCY ON DISPLAY AT FARMERS STATE BANK

Twenty-odd years after the start of World War II, the currencies planned for both the Allies and the enemy in the invasion and occupation of other countries in concentration and Don went to Amarillo Saturday prisoner of war camps, has been gathered together in a unique collection which will be on public display in the lobby of the Farmers State Bank of Clarendon dur-

ing the month of September. The collection of Allied Occupational and Invasion Notes is owned by First National City Bank of New York and is being placed on public exhibition for educational purposes. It includes more than 20 different currency issues ranging from U.S. "vellow seal" notes first issued in the invasion of North Africa-and still in circulation until worn out-to Japanese military notes issued in guilders, sterling, dollars and

pesos for their designs of empire. On display will be actual prisoner of war and concentration camp notes issued by the Nazis,

including Wahrmacht prison and Mike of Panhandle visited camp marks issued to Allied forces as prisoner of war pay while held captive by the Nazis.

Representing the fighting free world of that era are DeGaullist francs issued by the Free French Government, Philippine "Victory" notes issued to the invasion forces of Gen. Douglas MacArthur and Allied military lire, francs and marks for the invasion of Sicily and France on "D" Day.

The collection represents the first time this unique currency has been exhibited and represents a historical money collection of interest to the public and school


