

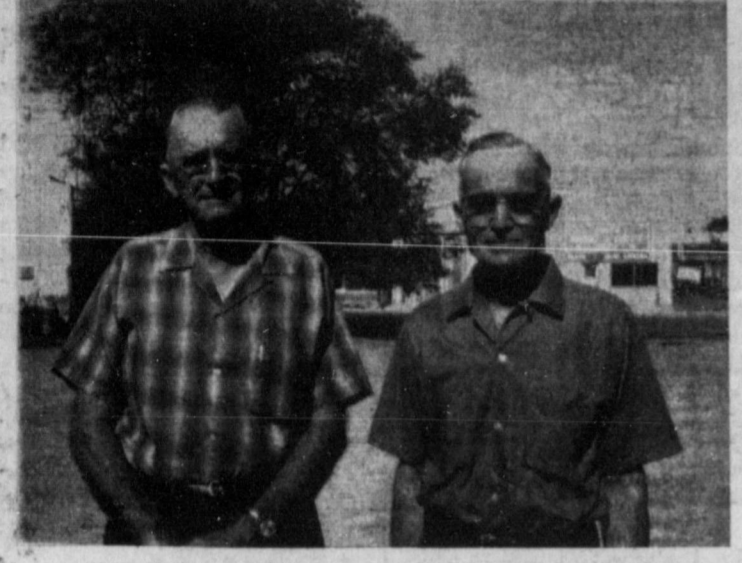

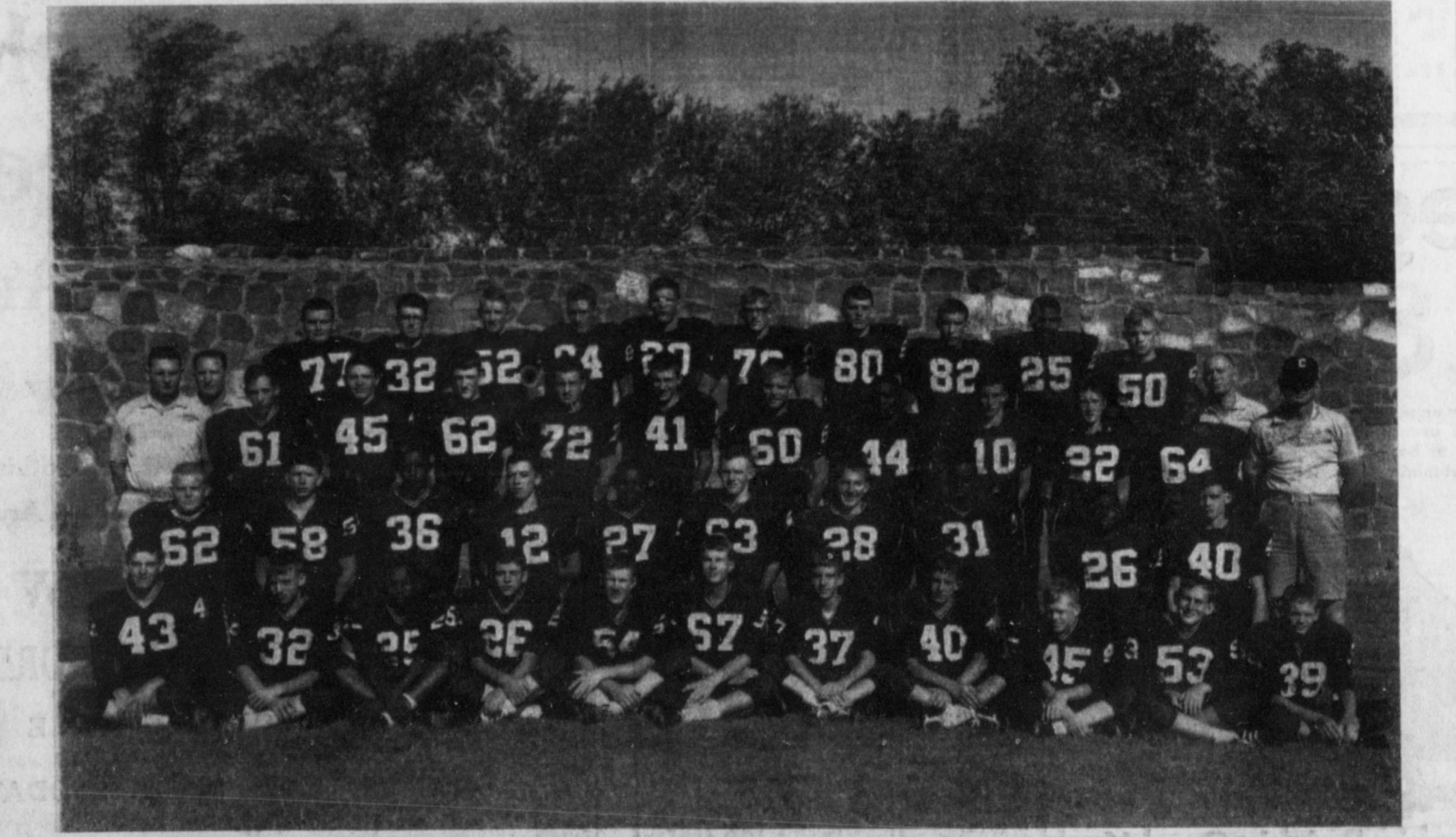

There was a day when a person could drop out of school, readily find a job, and go on to attain marked success in his chosen field. All of us can think of examples of men who, in our own communities, have not been handicapped by the lack of formal education. But a new age has come; today's requirements in business and industry are for trained men and women, for persons with proper preparation for the work ahead. The young person who has dropped out of school may have the will to succeed, the native intelligence to do well, but his lack of a diploma—incompetence with those who have finished school—prevents him from finding the opportunities he'd like.

In the competition for jobs, the drop-out is the loser. The country is the loser too. The United States needs all the trained people our education system can produce. Support "Stay-in-School" campaigns in your community, not only for the good of the young people affected but also for your country's benefit in the future.

DONLEY-HALL COUNTY LAND BANK ASSOCIATION NAMES OFFICERS

The annual meeting of the Federal Land Bank Association of Hall and Donley Counties was held Saturday afternoon, September 3, 1966, at 2:30 p.m. in the Clarendon High School Vocational Agriculture building. M. E. McNally, Jr., secretary-manager of the association, gave the annual report of the association to its members, and presented each member attending with a dividend check of seven per cent of his capital stock. Dividend Checks have been mailed to members not attending the meeting. Secretary McNally reported that the association had over \$2,000,000 in loans to farmers in the two counties.

M. E. Beasley of Memphis and John R. Gillham of Clarendon were re-elected to the board of directors of the association for a three year term. At the meeting of the board of directors following the annual meeting of the members, John R. Gillham was elected chairman of the board of directors and Paul Montgomery was elected vice-chairman. M. 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TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT By Congressman Walter Rogers SUPPORT "STAY-IN-SCHOOL" CAMPAIGNS Dear Fellow Texan: About this time every year, the countless young Americans make a decision that is to haunt them the rest of their lives. They decide not to return to school and jeopardize their futures in an age in which education is a vital prerequisite to success.

If you know of young people, who because of summer jobs that paid well, are considering staying on the job rather than returning to school—please urge them to think of the long-range rather than short-range gains. It is estimated that this year nearly one million young Americans will drop out of school unless they can be convinced of the advantage to themselves and their country of completing their educations. In addition to having the hardest time finding employment, the school drop-out is more likely to become trapped in a routine, low-paying job. Last hired, first fired is too often the economic tragedy that besets school drop-outs.

Throughout the Nation, businessmen, trade associations and chambers of commerce, educators, churches, labor organizations and private citizens are working in active "Stay-in-School" campaigns.

In this day of technology, it is startling to see the statistics: In October, 1965, more than 10 million youths in the 16 to 24 age bracket were out of high school and in the labor force—and more than 3 million lacked high school diplomas. One estimate is that by 1975, there will be some 32 million adults in the labor force who did not finish high school. Yet, in his lifetime, a high school graduate can expect to earn almost twice as much as the person who quit school before finishing the eighth grade. Graduates earn almost 20 percent more than non-graduates with but one to three years of high school. So, the argument to persuade youngsters to finish high school can be put in dollars and cents terms.

The rapid growth of the economy has created serious shortages in some technical and professional career fields. At the same time, the need for unskilled workers has declined. Huge numbers of youngsters are dropping out of school before they get enough education to meet employers' hiring standards for anything but unskilled work. High school drop-

**DEE MILLER MAKES COMMENTS BEFORE QUITAQUE LIONS**

Quitaque—Home town industry should be developed in rural areas to bring the farmer and rancher together with the businessman to jointly produce a more complete consumer package.

Dee Miller, candidate for congress from the 18th district, speaking before members of the Quitaque Lions Club Monday night, urged cattlemen and farmers to think in terms of:

"TV dinners instead of fatted cattle.  
"Tents and dresses instead of bales of cotton."

Miller said it is feasible to believe that such joint community effort would add industry in those areas least likely to get it, and, as a result, boost the economy—and put additional dollars in the pockets of the farmer and rancher.

He cited the growth of the feed lot in the Panhandle as a step in the right direction.

"But that's only a little step. A bigger one would be to think in terms of packaged steaks from Quitaque, not cattle grown here and shipped away to the Eastern market," Miller said.

A man in Congress who recognizes the agricultural problems of this particular area of the nation can do much to further such programs. It will take both of us working together toward that goal to accomplish it."

"And, if successfully accomplished, the rural community will prosper and the farmer and rancher will find himself sharing more of the national income," Miller said.

Miller praised farmers and ranchers for their important contribution to America.

Miller, no newcomer to the 18th Congressional District, was born at Borger. He seeks election as U. S. Representative from this district, a post vacated by Walter Rogers of Pampa who recently announced his decision not to seek re-election.

Miller is former District Attorney for Potter and Armstrong counties. In addition to his law degree, Miller holds a BA degree from the University of Texas in Banking and finance.

He and his wife, Joan, and their two daughters, Jennifer, 4, and Joni, 3, live at 5315 Berget in Amarillo.

**Garrison Announces 5 Day Week For DPS**

The Texas Department of Public Safety announced today that all of its uniformed patrol personnel are going on a five-day week, effective immediately, in an effort to attract and retain adequate personnel, thus providing better law enforcement coverage and service over the state.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., Director, announced at the same time that there were some 125 vacancies in the patrol services, including Highway Patrol, Li-

cense and Weight, Motor Vehicle Inspection and Driver Licensing.

"Applications for these career positions are now being accepted, with an October 17 deadline for the next statewide examination on October 22," Garrison said. "The next training school will begin January 3.

The five-day week will apply during the training period also, and the training period has been extended from 16 to 18 weeks to cover the shorter school week."

Garrison said cadets at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin will receive \$400 per month while in training, and will

be off Saturdays and Sundays. Upon graduation, they will be assigned to the field with salaries ranging from \$468 to \$484, depending on branch of service.

Garrison said implementation of the five-day week was imperative because of the manpower shortage in the patrol ranks. He said it is believed that the six-day week, inconsistent with work periods in almost all competitive businesses and industries, was a major deterrent to young men, particularly those with families, who could otherwise apply for jobs in the uniformed services. "Men of good character who

are physically fit and between 21 and 35 are invited to obtain information if they are interested in becoming a DPS patrolman," Garrison said.

**OCCUPATION & INVASION CURRENCY ON DISPLAY AT FARMERS STATE BANK**

Twenty-odd years after the start of World War II, the currencies planned for both the Allies and the enemy in the invasion and occupation of other countries in concentration and prisoner of war camps, has been gathered together in a unique collection which will be on public display in the lobby of the Farmers State Bank of Clarendon during the month of September.

The collection of Allied Occupational and Invasion Notes is owned by First National City Bank of New York and is being placed on public exhibition for educational purposes. It includes more than 20 different currency issues ranging from U. S. "yellow seal" notes first issued in the invasion of North Africa—and still in circulation until worn out—to Japanese military notes issued in guilders, sterling, dollars and pesos for their designs of empire.

On display will be actual prisoner of war and concentration camp notes issued by the Nazis,

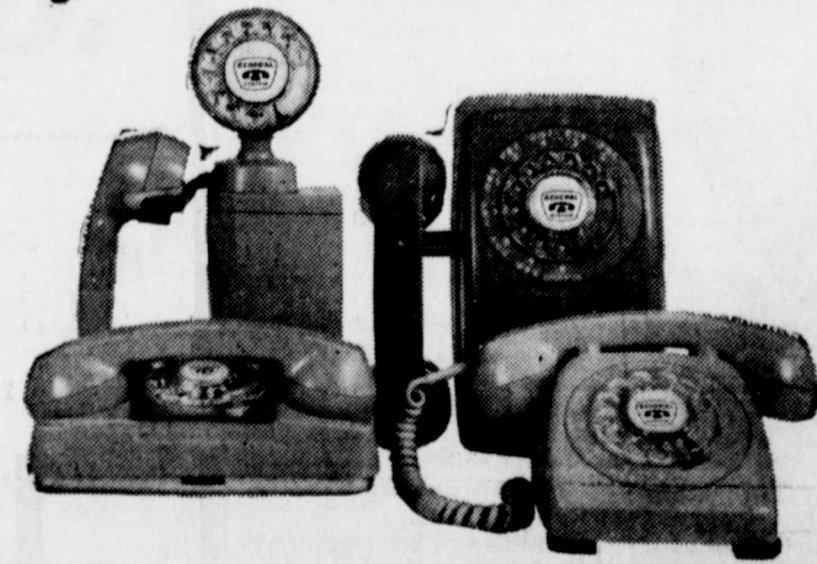

**COTTON MARKETING CARDS**

You will not receive a cotton marketing card this year. You will, however, be required to present the correct number of the farm from which the cotton was harvested when marketing cotton. This may present a problem to those who operate several farms. If you would like for us to help you by making a card with each farm number and the owner's name to carry in your billfold, we will be glad to do so. It is very important that you give the buyer the correct farm number.

**SOIL BANK PAYMENTS**

These payments will be made in October. For those of you who will be grazing, it will be somewhat later. If there is to be no reduction for grazing the soil bank on your farm, you may come by and sign your application for payment at any time.

**1967 WHEAT PROGRAM**

Wheat growers who participate in the 1967 Wheat Program will be eligible for domestic marketing certificates on about the same amount of wheat as in 1966. The percentage is 35 compared with 45 in 1966; however, the increased allotment makes the amount about the same. We do not know what the values of these certificates will be for 1967. They are valued at \$1.32 this year.

Please remember that barley will not be included in the feed grain base for 1967. However, if you have had barley base in the past, you may plant wheat in place of this barley. You may substitute on an acre-for-acre basis, but you must request a special barley base for this purpose from the ASC County Committee.
