

# Walt Garrison will appear College NIRA rodeo Oct. 28

Special appearance of ex-Dallas Cowboy running back Walt Garrison will highlight three days of National Intercollegiate Rodeo Assn. (NIRA) events here when the Clarendon College Rodeo begins Oct. 28 with performances set through Oct. 30.

According to CC Rodeo Instructor Dick Morgan, approximately 300 rodeo contestants from 20 colleges and universities will be in Clarendon for the three-day event. Sponsors for the western competition is the Clarendon College Rodeo Club.

Garrison will make special appearances in Donley and Hall County along with being featured each night at the Clarendon rodeo. His first speaking appearance will be at 10 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 27, at the

CC Harned Sisters Fine Arts Building. Students from Clarendon High School along with those enrolled at CC will attend. The public is also invited to hear the free presentation.

Thursday, Oct. 28, Garrison will be a guest along with Dic Morgan on the KVII Channel 7 noon TV show with Bedford Ford. Later Thursday afternoon, Garrison will be at John's, Clarendon men's store, to talk with customers and rodeo fans.

Friday, Garrison will make a similar appearance at the First National Bank of Memphis. Accompanying him on the Donley-Hall County visits will be a representative of the U.S. Tobacco Co. Garrison is featured in many advertisements for the company which contributes \$100,000

each year for NIRA scholarships across the U.S.

The Clarendon College Rodeo will feature six men's and three women's rodeo events during each evening performance beginning at 7:30 p.m. Those include bare back bronc riding, saddle back bronc riding, calf roping, team roping, bull riding, team roping, bull riding and steer wrestling for men and breakaway roping, goat tying and barrel racing for women.

Top six contestants in the nine events will share over \$9,000 worth of prize money. Among the twenty schools expected to enter are Texas Tech, West Texas Sul Ross, Eastern New Mexico and Tarleton State.

Stock for the event will be furnished by Freddie Cordell. Judges include past-RCA World Champ Saddle

Bronc Rider Bill Rienstein and RCACamp bull riding finalist Walter Hess. Bill Macon will serve as announcer.

Members of the Clarendon College Rodeo team have already placed in three of the four rodeos they have competed in this season. During September, Reese Bowen of Wellington split 3rd and 4th bullriding prize money in the Eastern New Mexico meet and 5th and 6th bullriding money at N.M.M.I. Bowen also won second in saddle bronc riding at the Sul Ross Rodeo.

Other CC winners this season is Linda Condon who won third in the Texas Tech Rodeo goat tying event in mid-October.

The rodeo team will be competing at the West Texas Rodeo in Canyon this weekend, Oct. 21-23.

## District has chance for doctor, Korean physician interested

Donley County may be receiving an additional doctor soon, according to board members of the county's Medical District.

Board members said Korean Doctor Kuhn Young Son, a recent visitor in the county, had expressed a desire to establish a practice at the district's Medical Center in Clarendon if he could be guaranteed a salary above what income he could make while building up a clientele of patients.

No offer has been made to Dr. Son by the board. There will be a special called meeting of the board Thursday, Oct. 21, at 7 p.m. in the Medical Center to discuss a possible offer. All interested citizens of the medical district are urged to

attend.

According to Board President Ernest Barbee, "Dr. Son is definitely interested. He has another opportunity in Andrews now, but he told us when he was here he'd prefer Donley County."

Dr. Richard Gilkey, the only doctor in the clinic at present, has offered to assist Dr. Son establish his practice "in any way possible." In conversations with Son while he visited the district, Gilkey said he offered him use of any space he needed at his clinic plus the use of all his (Gilkey's) medical equipment. Gilkey also said he would let Dr. Son use his bookkeeping system for his paperwork.

Dr. Son, 29, is currently in Rutherford, N.J., living with his brother-in-law, a surgeon there. He, his wife and their seven month old daughter have been in the United States for four months.

He received his medical education from St. Mary's Hospital in Seoul Korea, where he graduated 14th of a class of 67. His junior year, Son was 8th of a class of 81. Training at St. Mary's was done with textbooks written in English and all tests were written in English.

He came to the attention of the local hospital board through the Benson doctor placement service based in New York. If placed by the service, Dr. Son would have to pay them one-tenth of his first year's salary. This would include any guaranteed salary by the district but the debt would be Dr. Son's not the district's.

Medical Center Director Gerry Knight said the board has discussed offering Dr. Son a monthly salary of \$1,000 with the agreement this payment would be discontinued when his income reached a certain level.

Barbee said the district could afford to pay \$500 per month to Dr. Son. This is money the district receives each month from sources other than county taxes.

The remaining \$500 would have to come from other sources. "When Dr. Son was here, several local businessmen said they would donate money for a temporary guaranteed salary," Knight said.

"Right now, this the crucial part of all this," Barbee said. "We know what the district can do, but we don't know if the people in the district are willing to go along with it and help us."

They speculated Dr. Son would need the guaranteed salary no longer than 12 months, and that the \$1,000 amount would be gradually reduced during that period as Dr. Son's income increased. Money needed above the district's \$500 would possibly not be needed more than six months, Knight said. "Of course, that all depends on how well Dr. Son would be accepted here and how fast his practice could grow."

While a visitor in the county, Dr. Son visited with Doctor Lee of Pampa and Doctor Mok of Claude. Knight said Dr. Mok advised Son he thought a practice could be established in Donley County.

Before Dr. Son could practice medicine in Texas, he has to receive his temporary medical permit from the state. Son applied for this permit in October. According to a spokesman at the Texas Board of Medical Examiners, Son will probably receive his permit within the next four to five weeks.

After receiving his temporary license, Son would be required to take the state FLEX test as soon as possible to receive his Texas medical license. Earliest date the test could be taken would be next June.

Any donations or item contributed to Dr. Son through the Medical District would qualify as tax deductible items.

"I think its an excellent opportunity for the district to get another doctor," Barbee said. "Its just a matter of if the people are ready for it."

**Preference for Carter increasing**

A sizeable number of students polled for their preference in the upcoming Presidential election continue to support Democratic candidate Jimmy Carter over opponent Gerald Ford.

The poll, conducted by Clarendon College History teacher Bill Taylor, Oct. 11-12, indicated 67 per cent of those asked would vote for Carter. Only 27 per cent of the subjects said they preferred Ford. Six per cent were undecided.

The 67 per cent preference for Carter was up from a 65 per cent figure polled from the same group one week earlier. Poll results are taken from Taylor's Monday and Tuesday college classes. Approximately 100 people will be questioned each week until the election Nov. 2.

When the poll was begun in mid-September 58 per cent of those questioned voiced a preference for Jimmy Carter and 33 per cent for Ford.

## Broncho's face tough district foe Friday

The Clarendon Bronchos face a crucial district 2-A match-up early in league play this Friday as the Wellington Skyrockets come to town, kick-off time 7:30 p.m.

In pre-season selections, Wellington appeared frequently as the team to beat in Clarendon's district. At the Skyrockets first 2-A outing last Friday, they waxed the Irish of Shamrock 44-6. No other 2-A teams began district play last week except Clarendon with their 23-14

win over Claude. A win Friday would put the Bronchos in undisputed first place for district competition.

"Sure we'll be the underdogs in Friday's game," said Jerry Wilson, Clarendon head coach, "but that only makes the other team over confident."

Clarendon's and Wellington's game schedules have matched up twice this year. Both were beaten by AA powerhouse Childress. Clarendon lost 26-0. Wellington managed a little better 20-8

defeat. Against the Quanah Indians, Clarendon came out on top 13-6 while Wellington walked away with a lopsided 48-8 win.

But more indicative figures about Friday's match-up deal with poundage, no points scored. Bronc coach Wilson estimates every Clarendon lineman will be outweighed some 20 pounds by his Wellington counterpart. The skyrockets line weighs in at an average 175 pounds compared to the Broncho's 155 figure.

Added to a 175 pound line average are two Senior Wellington backs weighing in at 180 and 190 pounds respectively: Jessie Davis and Dan Ford.

With two backs of this size running at you, Wilson said

he has a simple game plan. "Run right back at 'em." "Its going to be three yards and a cloud of dust," he said. "Weve got to get the ball and hold on to it and then keep them in lousy field position."

For this chore he'll count on Broncho punter Irvon Thomas, who's averaged over 35 yards a game frequently this year. Along with this, the Bronchos will need the workhorse running of back's Barry Schafer and John Hall and hope for the spectacular break-away runs of Howard Weatherston.

"And defense," Wilson said, "we'll have to have the defense. Their runners are big, but coaches have told me if you hit them enough they'll quit."

## County needs foster parent volunteers

Donley County has been without foster homes for the temporary placement of foster children for the past two months and volunteers are urgently needed.

According to Anna Beth McNabb, Clarendon protective services worker in charge of such cases, the Donley-Hall County has an average of five complaints per month involving possible placement of foster children.

Foster parent homes are used for the temporary placement of children for various reasons. These could be a death in the family, desertion or crippling illness

of one or both parents; or, in some cases, abuse or neglect of the child.

"The idea is to put the child into an atmosphere where they feel secure and wanted," Mrs. McNabb said.

"Foster homes aren't often permanent arrangements. The ultimate goal is to put the child back in their parent's home, but for six months or six years the foster

parents give the child the security they need.

Applicants for foster parents are considered on an individual basis. Applicants must be over 18, otherwise there are no age limits. Married couples are preferred but single people are considered. Including foster children, there may be as many as six children residing in the family's home.

Persons interested in becoming foster parents may also state preference concerning age, sex and race of children to be brought into their home. All foster parents are licensed by the state.

Information booklets concerning foster parents are available at the Welfare office in Clarendon. ## Funds begun here for daughter of Crocketts

A fund has been established in both Clarendon banks to help alleviate medical costs of the Bill Crockett family and their 43 day old baby girl.

The child was born two months premature Sept. 6 in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. The girl, Keli Crockett weighed two pounds, four ounces at birth. She has been in the intensive care ward at Northwest Texas since her birth and will probably have to remain there two to three more weeks. Medical care costs for the child's treatment has been estimated at approximately \$10,000.

The Crockett's have no insurance to help the mounting medical costs and teaching associates of Crockett at Clarendon Public Schools have set up the bank funds. Any donations can be made in either Clarendon's Farmers State Bank or the Donley County State Bank. Donations should be made to the Keli Crockett Hospital Fund. All money in the fund

can be used only for medical costs.

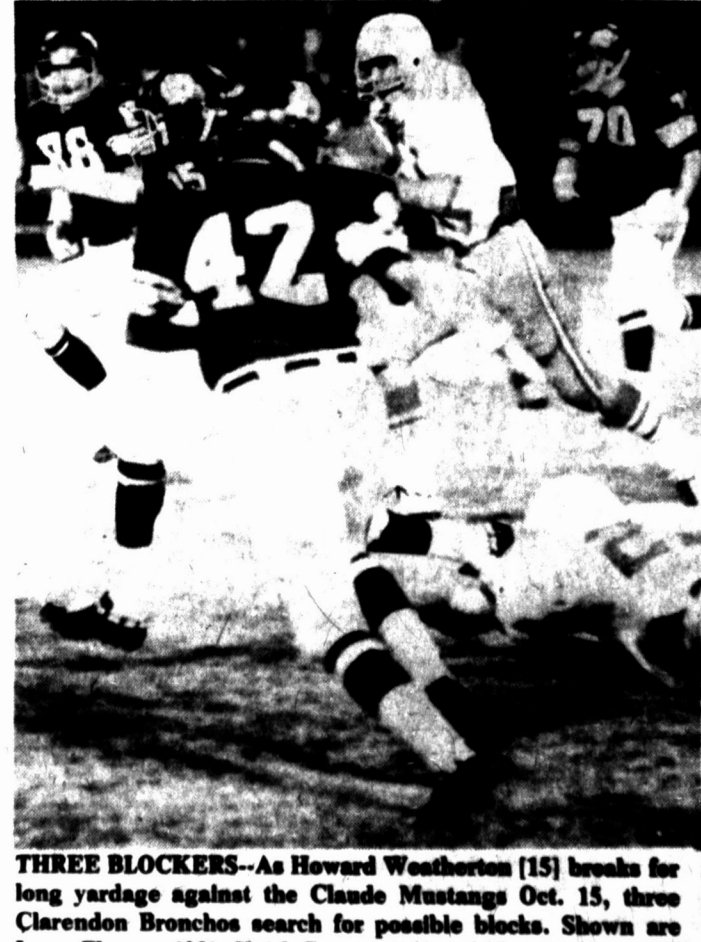

**Swine flu shots now available**

Swine Flu immunization shots will be given free at Dr. Richard Gilkey's clinic in the Donley County Medical Center every Wednesday afternoon until Nov. 20.

The shots, while not mandatory, are highly recommended for persons 18 years of age and older. Adults over 65 years of age are especially cautioned to have the shots because of their greater susceptibility to swine flu.

All persons should be able to take the shots except individuals allergic to eggs. The shot will not immunize against other types of flu viruses and persons who normally take flu shots each winter should do so again. The two varieties of flu immunization shots should not be taken within two weeks of each other, however.

# Clarendon wins first 2-A District contest

Clarendon's Bronchos put together good offensive and defensive play Friday night Oct. 15, to satisfy a homecoming crowd with a 2-14 victory over the Claude Mustangs, 2-A district rivals.

Offensively, Quarterback Howard Weatherton turned in 177 yards, the majority on two long runs including an 80 TD and a 46 yard second half dash. On defense, the Bronchos stopped Claude twice in the second half within their own 20 yard line and limited them to 12 completions out of 33 pass attempts.

Head hunter awards were presented to Broncho Back's John Hall and Barry Schafer for two hard tackles that loosened the ball from Mustang runners.

Wilson had special praise for Schafer and his defensive linebacker play.

conversion made it 10-0. The game's second quarter had just started when Weatherton again took off for the longest run of the night, an 80 yard scamper from his own 20 which widened the Clarendon Claude gap 16-0.

It wasn't all roses for Weatherton, however. On the next Broncho possession he threw a pass into the arms of a Mustang defensive man. With the resulting run-back, Claude was threatening on the Clarendon 19. A 14 yard pass play into the Broncho endzone consummated the

drive. The same type pass play was successful for the extra points, allowing Claude to cut the Clarendon lead in half 16-8 with 6:22 left in the half.

When Clarendon got the ball again, misfortune struck twice. The first time was a called back 51 yard touchdown run by John Hall because of a Broncho personal foul. The second was a Clarendon fumble a few plays later to give the Mustangs possession on their 33.

Before the half ended, Clarendon managed to drive to Claude's 18, but the Mustangs held and eventually took over the ball from that point. Claude's last scoring effort of the half was scuttled, however, by a pass interception by Irven Thomas. Clarendon went to the locker room with an eight conversion made it 10-0.

It all started with breaks for Clarendon. After receiving the opening kick-off, the Mustangs fumbled on the first play to give Clarendon's Mike Newhouse the ball at the Mustang 13. For openers, Broncho John Hall kicked an 8 yard field goal for the early 3 point lead.

On Claude's next series they fumbled again, with Broncho Irven Thomas coming up with the ball on his own 34. The Bronchos failed to turn this break into points, however, and punted Claude back to their 26, holding

them there for four downs.

Weatherton took the resulting punt and put Clarendon in good position on the Claude 40. He followed his fine run with a fine pass to End Irven Thomas for a 40 yard touchdown. A Barry Schafer point advantage intact.

Second half action was delayed by a procrastinating Claude team. The Mustangs came out of their locker room after the officials had signaled the half to start. Claude was penalized 15 yards, dropping them back to their 25 for the opening kick-off.

The penalty plus Tony Wallace's run-back put Clarendon to work on the Claude 48. A fumble three plays later, however, gave Claude the ball and suddenly the Broncho lead looked endangered. Claude marched the ball deep into Broncho territory, first down on the seven yard line. Outstanding defensive play frustrated the Mustangs into three straight incomplete passes from there. The Mustangs faked the pass on fourth down and handed-off for a halfback run. The play ended with a fumble, however, and Broncho Jackie Longan fell on it in the endzone.

Clarendon and Claude's next possessions both ended with punts. With four minutes left in the third quarter the Bronchos fumbled on their own 19 and the defensive was again called in to contain a threatening Mustang team. Claude tried and failed on three consecutive pass plays. While attempting to pass on fourth down, Claude's Quarterback was decked resulting in a fumble and a Barry Schafer recovery on the 26.

From there, Clarendon put together an impressive offensive drive culminating with John Hall bullying it in with the TD from the one yard line. The TD was set up by a long 24 yard run by Hall plus an earlier 16 yard pass completion from Weatherton to Bubba Newhouse. With

Schafer's extra point kick, Clarendon tacked on their final score of the night, 23-8.

Claude came right back with a scoring drive which began on their own 35. The Mustang score came with a 10 yard run into the endzone with 5:20 remaining in the game. An attempted extra-point run failed, however, and the score changed to 23-14.

Claude came back with a low, tumbling kick-off in hopes of a Clarendon fumble, but Broncho Barry Schafer fell on the ball and the home team retained it until game's end.

The contest ended with Clarendon on Claude's five after the Mustang's were penalized for an illegal block thrown during a Clarendon punt. The win makes the Broncho's 5 and 2 for the year and 1-0 for district play.

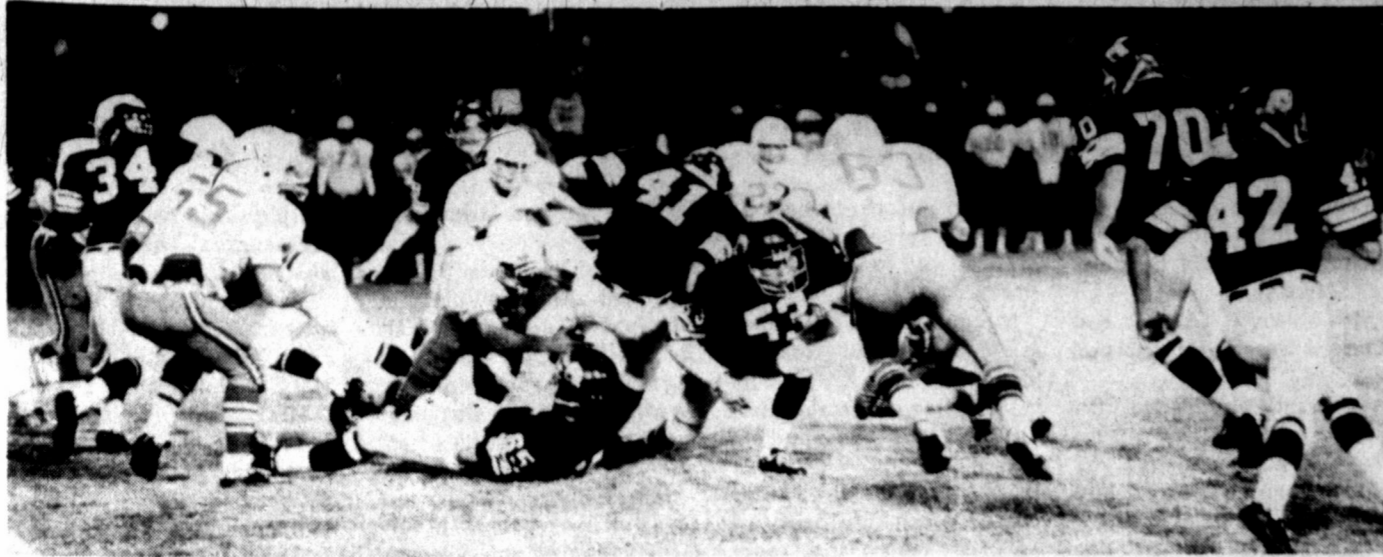

## U.S. college enrollment on decline

**Editor's Note--Clarendon College's fall enrollment was down this year, apparently part of a nation-wide trend. The following article is an Associated Press story reprinted from the Hobbs, N.M., "Daily News-Sun" edition, Sept. 16.**

For the first time since World War II, the nation's college and school enrollment appears to have declined. And, says a federal government forecast, thanks to the falling birth rate, the trend is only just beginning. An annual back-to-school report released Tuesday by

the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare predicted a decline this fall of about 100,000 students from last year's historic high of 60.2 million.

HEW said the enrollment decline can be expected to continue for several years, led by elementary school enrollments which have been dropping slowly but steadily since 1970. Secondary school enrollments will peak this year, and college and university enrollments should begin falling around 1983 or 1984, HEW said.

The agency may not be

precise, however. Last year, it predicted a total nationwide enrollment of 58.9 million underestimating by about 1.3 million, because of higher-than-anticipated private school figures and a larger number of students who went to college or graduate school during the tight job market.

HEW officials noted that the birth rate has been falling for 10 years. It showed its biggest drop from 1970 to 1975, when it fell from 18.3 to 14.8 for each 1,000 persons in the country.

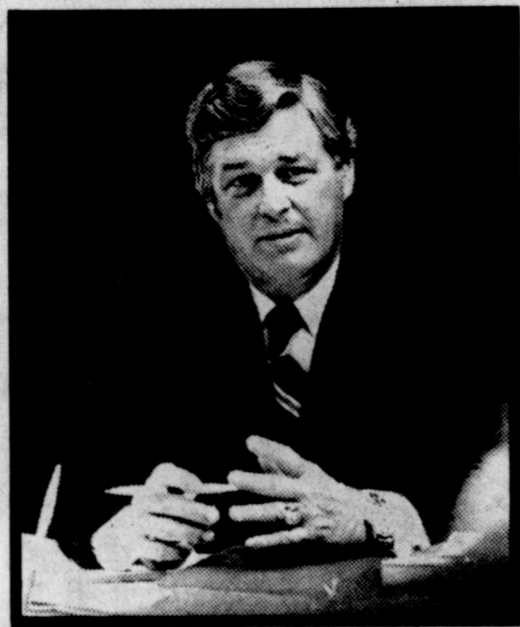

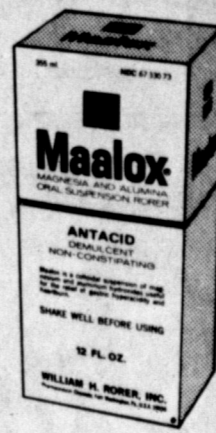

## Clarendon School Board approves hiring of aide

Clarendon's Public School Board formally approved the hiring of a new aide at their October meeting to teach students qualifying under the school's federally financed Migrant Education Program.

Hired for the position was Betty Jane Hampton, a 1972 CHS graduate and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Hampton of Clarendon. Miss Hampton has been working in the system since mid-September.

She instructs language arts and math to Clarendon students at all grade levels, kindergarten through twelve grade, who qualify under the Federal Migrant Education Program.

The Federal program was originally designed to aid

children of transient migrant workers. In Clarendon's school district, however, most children of families working in agriculturally related fields are eligible.

The program is designed for Miss Hampton to work with advanced as well as remedial students who qualify. Thirty-Three students were enrolled in the Clarendon system last year under the program.

In other school business, Superintendent Jeff Walker presented a letter to the members from the Texas Education Agency stating the Clarendon system had met all the agency's criteria and was fully accredited by TEA. The accreditation was granted based on an evaluation study conducted last spring in Clarendon by TEA and Clarendon school officials.

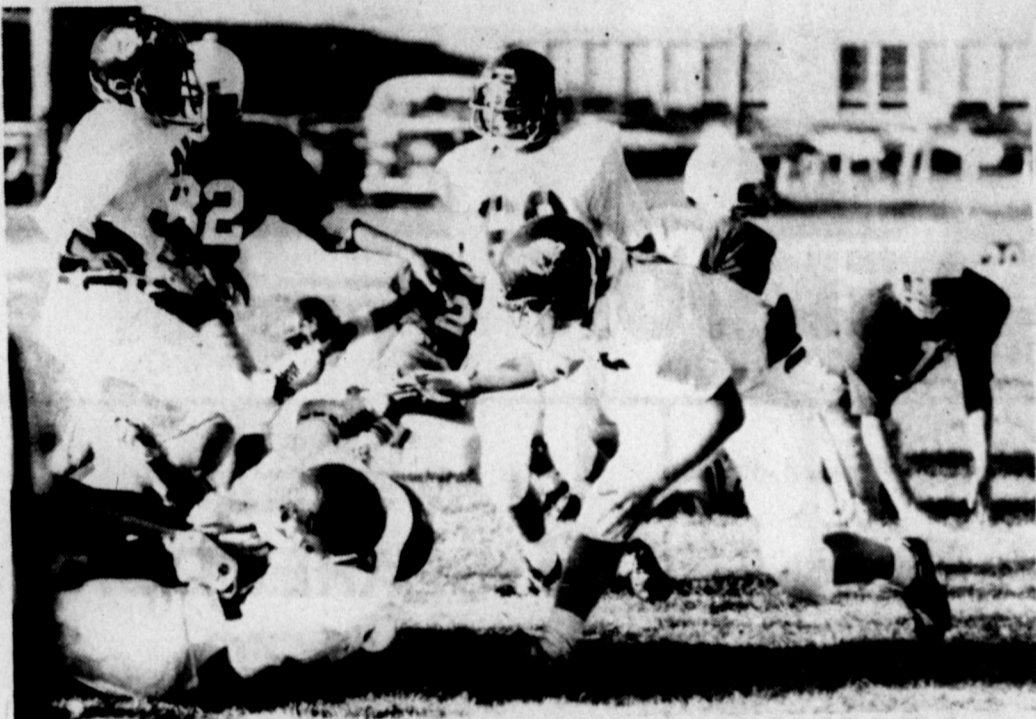
