CC Rodeo competition to begin this Thursday

Clarendon College's second annual NIRA Rodeo begins Thursday, Oct. 28, with an estimated 300 contestants expected to compete through Saturday.

An extra feature of this year's rodeo will be the presence of ex-Dallas Cowboy running back Walt Garrison. Garrison will make three scheduled appearances in Donley and Hall county along with appearing each night at the rodeo.

Wednesday, Oct. 27, Garrison spoke to students of Clarendon College and High School at the CC Fine Arts Building. He will also be a guest along with CC Rodeo Instructor Dick Morgan Thursday, Oct. 28, on the KVII noon show, Channel 7, with host Bedford Forrest, the KVII noon show, Channel 7, with host Bedford Ford.

Garrison will be at the First National Bank in Memphis Friday, Oct. 29, to visit with bank customers and rodeo fans. He will make a similar appearance Saturday afternoon at John's, a Clarendon clothing store.

The CC National Intercollegiate Rodeo sponsored by the College's Rodeo Club, will feature contestants from 20 colleges and universities competing in six men's and three women's events. An estimated \$9,000 worth of prize money will be split by the top six contestants in the nine events. Among the expected entering schools are Texas Tech, West Texas, Sul Ross and Eastern New Mexico.

Performances begin each night at 7:30 p.m. at the Rodeo Arena northeast of Clarendon. Events scheduled each night include men's bareback and saddle bronc riding; calf and team roping; steer wrestling; and bull riding. Women's events are breakaway roping, goat tying and barrel racing.

An open-team roping for all entries will be held Sunday afternoon beginning at 1 p.m. at the rodeo arena. Entry fee is \$16 for two steer throws. The public is invited.

Stock for the event will be furnished by Freddie Codell. Judges include past-RCA World Champ Saddle Bronc Rider Bill Riesten and RCA Champ Bull Riding Finalist Walter Hess. Bill Macon will serve as announcer.

Members of the Clarendon College Rodeo team have already placed in many of the five rodeos they have competed in this season.

During September, Reese Bowen of Wellington split 3rd and 4th place bullriding prize money at the Eastern New Mexico meet and 5th and 6th place bull riding money at N.M.M.I. Bowen also won second in saddle bronc riding at the Sul Ross Rodeo.

Carter's poll popularity declines

Jimmy Carter's popularity decreased by 11 per cent in a poll taken Oct. 18-19 by CC instructor Bill Taylor, with an eight per cent increase in undecided voters.

Poll subjects indicating they would vote for Carter in the Nov. 2 Presidential Election dropped from 67 per cent to 56 per cent of the sample. The poll was taken from approximately 100 CC

students in Taylor's Monday and Tuesday college classes. In the latest poll, 30 per cent of the students said they would vote for President Ford. This was a slight increase over the previous week in which 27 per cent said they preferred Ford. There was a larger number of undecided voters in the recent poll, increasing from six to 14 per cent.

Linda Condon of the CC team also won third in goat tying at the Texas Tech Rodeo Oct. 14-17.

A dance will follow each performance of the college rodeo at the slab adjacent to the rodeo grounds.

Nine ballot boxes located in county

Three area and state wide elections along with the Presidential race will be decided Tuesday, Nov. 2, as Donley County and the nation go to the polls.

Nine ballot boxes will be located in the county's four precincts. Residents of the precinct must vote at the boxes allocated for that precinct. The precinct of residence is listed on the voter registration card.

Balloting will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday. In Donley County, 2,869 voters are registered.

As of noon Tuesday, Oct. 26, 64 Donley County voters had cast absentee ballots. Absentee voting ends Friday, Oct. 29, at 5 p.m. These may be cast at the County Clerk's office in Clarendon.

All Democratic candidates for county posts will be unopposed on the Nov. 2 ballot. These include Truett Behrens, candidate for Donley County Sheriff/Tax Assessor; Jerry Hawkins, candidate for County School Superintendent; and two County Precinct Commissioner candidates: Gene White, Pct. 1; and Buford Holland, Pct. 3.

Area wide elections include the contest for Representative from the 13th District involving Incumbent Jack Hightower and his opponent Bob Price.

Undecided State wide races include expiring terms for one of Texas' U.S. Senators and the State Railroad Commissioner's post. Incumbent Senator Lloyd Bentsen is opposed by Alan Steelman on the ballot. Four candidates are running

for the Railroad Commissioners post. These are Jon Newton, Democrat; Walter Wendlandt, Republican; Fred Rodriguez, Raza Unida Party; and Pat O'Reilly, Socialist Worker Party.

State wide candidates unopposed on Tuesday's ballot include Senator Max Sherman from the 31st District and State Representative Phil Cates from the 66th District.

County voters living in Pct. 1 will have four locations to vote. These are Box 1, located at Howardwick City Hall; Box 4, at Clarendon's Old College Building next to the high school; Box 6, in the Martin Community Baptist Church; and Box 8, at the Jericho community elevator.

Precinct 2 residents will have one place to vote, Ballot Box 2, located in Clarendon at the Old County Court-house adjacent to the annex. There will be two ballot boxes for those living in Pct. 3. These will be Box 3 at the Lelia Lake Community Building and Box 5 at the Hedley Lions Hall.

In Pct. 4, there will also be two boxes. These are Box 7 at the Farmers State Bank in Clarendon; and Box 9, located in the Glenwood-White Fish, Skillet area. Box 9 will be in the home of James Hefley.

County election judges for Tuesday's vote are: Bernice Littlefield, Box 1; Joan Kidd, Box 2; Luthur Butler, Box 3; Nita Skelton, Box 4; Myrtle Kirkpatrick, Box 5; Pete Land, Box 6; Mrs. Fred Chamberlain, Box 7; Stanley Lamb, Box 8; and James Hefley, Box 9.

Offer extended to Korean doctor

Korean doctor Kuhn Young Son has been offered a guaranteed one-year salary of \$12,000 by Donley County's Medical District Board if he will agree to open a practice here.

As of Tuesday noon, Oct. 26, he had not responded to the offer, however.

The decision to contact Dr. Son was reached at a called meeting of the Hospital Board Thursday night, Oct. 21, 1976. About 25 county residents attended that meeting.

The meeting Tuesday was to give county residents a chance to discuss the proposed offer made Dr. Son by the board. Discussion centered around \$6,000 of the guaranteed salary which

the district would need in donations from county residents. The additional \$6,000 would be provided by the district. This amount is money received by the district in income other than county taxes.

A mailgram was sent to Dr. Son Friday, Oct. 22, by Hospital Administrator Gerry Knight outlining the board's offer. Dr. Son is currently in Rutherford, N.J. He and his family are now living with his brother-in-law, a surgeon there. Knight also attempted to reach Dr. Son through the doctor placement service which referred him to the Medical District. A spokesman at the service spec-

ulated Dr. Son and his family may be out of town and have not seen the mailgram yet.

Dr. Son visited Donley County Oct. 11-13. That visit along with his medical qualifications and the voiced support of those attending Thursday's meeting prompted the board to make him the offer.

Dr. Richard Gilkey, who now operates a clinic at the Medical Center, said at Thursday's meeting, "Dr. Son is the best candidate to come here we've seen. Gilkey told the board he would offer Dr. Son part of his office space at the center plus free use of his medical equipment and his book-keeping system.

"As far as the guaranteed salary," Dr. Gilkey said, "We'd have to offer it to any new physician coming in here. It just takes time to establish a medical practice."

Dr. Son was referred to the hospital board through the Benson Professional Placement Service in New York. If placed by the service, he would pay them ten per cent of his first year's salary, including any guaranteed salary he receives.

Dr. Son was trained in medicine in Seoul Korea at Saint Mary's Hospital. At the school, medical textbooks written in English were used. All tests were also written in English. Dr. Son graduated 14 of 67 in his class.

Ernest Barbee, hospital board president, said Thursday, "If Dr. Son agrees to come down here, we're a step closer to opening the hospital."

If Dr. Son re-located in Donley County, there is also a possibility his brother-in-law would be interested in this area. Knight said. During his visit, Dr. Son said his brother-in-law is interested in eventually moving to a rural area.

Many of those attending Thursday's meeting said raising the additional \$6,000 locally would present no problem. After receiving this positive endorsement from those attending the meeting, the hospital board decided to contact Dr. Son with their offer.

Under terms of the agreement, the \$6,000 paid him through donations by local citizens would be reduced as income from his practice increased. The donations would stop completely when Dr. Son could earn the \$6,000 through his practice. The \$6,000 per year provided by the district would then begin to be reduced.

The board estimated Dr. Son would need the guaranteed salary at least one year.

The board said at the meeting Thursday they are

still looking for other doctors for the center along with Dr. Son. According to Barbee, the hospital could probably be re-opened if three doctors had practices at the Medical Center. The district could only offer one guaranteed salary, he said, so an offer similar to Dr. Son's could not be made to another physician until Dr. Son established his practice.

According to Knight, Dr. Son said he'd be willing to take emergency calls if he re-located here. He also said he was looking for a permanent place to locate his family, if he could establish a practice.

If Dr. Son accepts the board's offer, a tentative plan for salary pledges has been adopted. Those wishing to make pledges would sign pledge sheets located at businesses in the county, listing their name and address. They would then be mailed pledge forms by the Medical district on which they would specify the amount of their pledge. A fund would be established in a local bank for pledge deposits. If, for some reason, Dr. Son left the county, all unspent pledge money would be returned to the donors.

First man born in county dies

First boy child born in Clarendon, Clarendon M. Hilderbrand, 89, was buried at the city cemetery Thursday, Oct. 21.

Mr. Hilderbrand died Monday, Oct. 18, in Amarillo where he had lived since 1925. He was born July 21, 1887, at the present site of Clarendon, and was named for the city by his parents. His father owned a traveling restaurant which followed the gangs of railroad workers as they laid track across the Panhandle.

A retired bricklayer, he periodically visited Clarendon to talk with other longtime county residents. Mr. Hilderbrand's last visit to the city was in April this year. He was a veteran of World War I and a member

He is survived by a stepson, George Protsman of Amarillo; one stepdaughter, Mrs. Lotta Capehart of Canyon; one grandchild and six great-grandchildren.

Clarendon College's Women's Basketball team begins their regularly scheduled season Nov. 4 with a road game against Howard County in Big Springs.

The CC Men's Team begins their season a week later, Nov. 12, when they play in Clarendon against the team from Trinidad, Colo.

The women's season will continue through March 5. They scrimmaged the West Texas women's team Monday, Oct. 25, three half-games, winning each 36-16, 34-19 and 35-24. They will scrimmage WT again next Monday, Nov. 1, in Canyon.

Bronchos lose crucial Wellington game

Clarendon lost big to the Wellington Skyrockets Friday, Oct. 22, in a 47-7 defeat marred by 26 penalties called on the two teams.

The loss drops the Bronchos to 1-1 in district play and 5-3 for the year. The game gave Wellington a perfect 2-0 record for District 2-A action with Memphis and Claude still to play. Clarendon has two games left in the regular season against district foes Memphis and Shamrock.

Personal foul penalty calls were numerous during the hard-hitting game. Wellington was caught 16 times by the officials for rule infractions for a total 146 yards penalized. Clarendon had nine penalty calls for 56 yards.

The Broncho's season-long problem with fumbles culminated Friday night with seven loose balls turned over to the Skyrockets along with two pass interceptions.

Clarendon's "Head Hunter" award went to Keith Topper. Offensive workhorse for the Broncho's was Barry Schafer with 28 carries 110 yards rushed. Clarendon turned in 87 yards net for the evening, compared to Wellington's tally of 378, 318 of these on the ground.

The game held promise for Clarendon fans as the two teams exchanged opening drives. Wellington received and were unable to generate

an offense. They punted away, leaving Clarendon on their own six and too deep to generate a drive. A Broncho punt set Wellington up on their own 48, but the Broncho's held again, forcing another Wellington punt, a punt that ended in a coach's nightmare. The high kick bounced from the arms of Broncho Howard Weathererton into Clarendon's end zone where the opposition fell on it for a give away touchdown. A two-point after TD attempt failed, but Wellington had the lead 6-0.

Clarendon came back scrappy, moving the kick-off

to their 30. Barry Schafer broke a 46 yard for the home team and set the Broncho's up on the Skyrocket's four yard line. Howard Weathererton managed to take it as close as the six-inch line before being knocked out-of-bounds by the Wellington line. On 4th and inches, Barry Schafer lost the ball and the Skyrockets recovered to stop the Clarendon threat. With few exceptions, this offensive drive was the last chance for home town fans to cheer.

Wellington took the fumble and began a 98 yard march across the field for

their second touchdown of the night. The extra points made it 14-0. They had doubled this score before half's end, going into the locker room at half with a 28-0 lead.

Things didn't get better after the half. Clarendon fumbled on their first play after intermission. Wellington soon had another score and a 34-0 lead. The Bronchos fumbled away on their next series of downs, and again Wellington took advantage of the break and punched over a TD. With 2:33 left in the third quarter, Wellington led 41-0.

The Broncho's ignited briefly in the fourth quarter when a Tony Wallace pass interception set Clarendon up on the Skyrocket 47. The Bronchos were forced into a 4th and six situation when kicker Barry Schafer was roughed as he attempted to punt away. The resulting penalty call put Clarendon on Wellington's 29 with four more downs of offensive time. They only took one of them, as Howard Weathererton rambled the required distance for Clarendon's only score. A Barry Schafer extra-point kick made it 41-7.

More Clarendon sparks came as Wellington fumbled during their next possession. John Hall fell on the loose ball at the Skyrocket 39. Hall followed this with a pass reception on the 11 from QB Weathererton. One play later, however, the Bronchos were intercepted at the goal line to cease all possible point hopes. Wellington took this interception and, starting from the one, marched across the field in their final scoring possession. A 65 yard draw play put them across the goal line and added their final 47-7 point spread.

Clarendon's district hopes now hinge on someone knocking off the Skyrockets in their two remaining district games. They face Memphis this Friday at Wellington, game time 7:30 p.m.

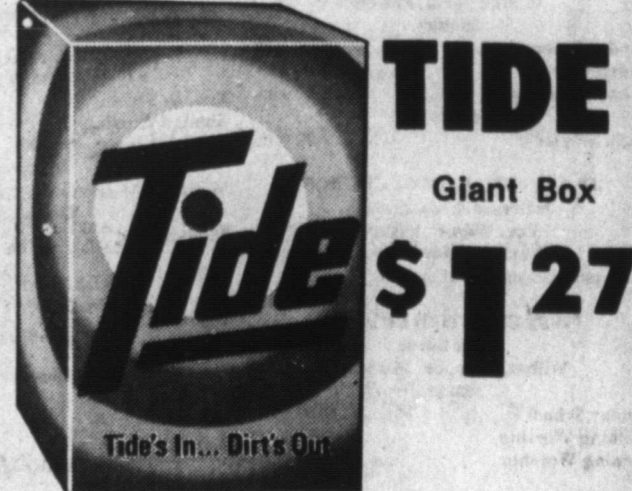

County corn harvest shows profit, but with large investment

With the 1976 corn harvest now completed in Donley County, area growers have learned a crop that promises more profit potential than other feed grains but requires more investment.

The boom or bust syndrome associated with sunflowers may be avoided with corn but as some corn growers in the county agree, to harvest breakeven yields of good number two corn the investment has been con-

siderable.

On the newly installed center-pivot irrigation systems owned by James McAnear, two diesel engines burned two gallons of fuel per hour during the long hot summer and fall. McAnear's system is designed to use the irrigation system to apply herbicides, micro nutrients and fertilizer which cuts down on manual labor.

The center-pivot was used to irrigate half a circle of corn and a half circle of grain

sorghum this year—about 170 acres in all. Both pieces received about the same fertilizer and water.

Since McAnear and his sons, James Allen, David and Monte couldn't justify the purchase of a corn head for the number of acres they grew this year, they hired a custom operator, Everett Williams from Antelope, to harvest their crop.

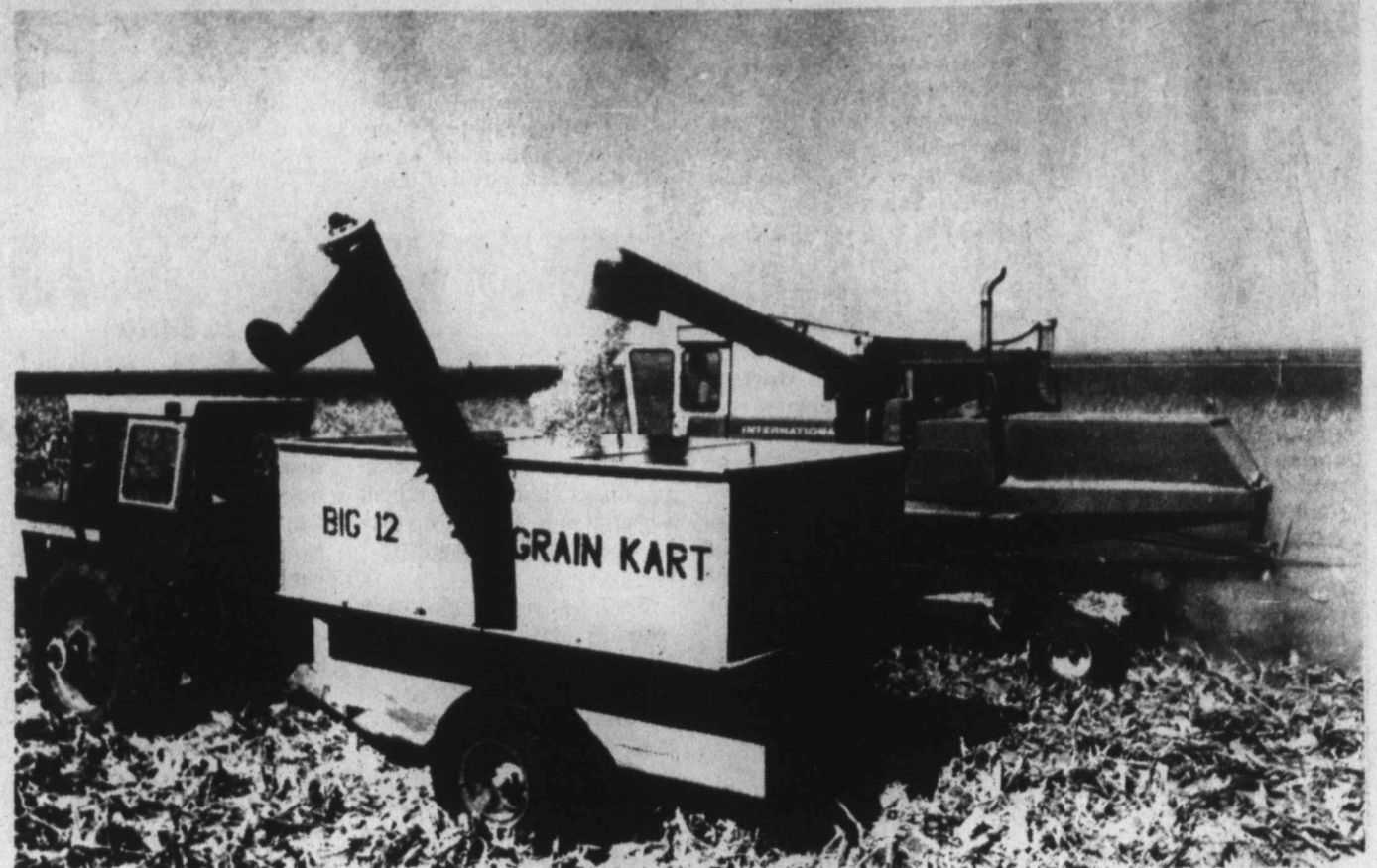
During the summer, David McAnear, who farms land adjacent to his father's center-pivot acreage, ran variety yield trials on a number of hybrids adapted to this part of Texas. Testing eight varieties of Dekalb hybrids along with somePAG varieties, corn yields averaged from eighty bushels to one hundred and ten, with Dekalb yielding the most on the averages. On one plot of PAG he recorded a one hundred and twenty-six bushel average. Like more and more farmers who run the risk of big crop

investments, McAnear compared these crop varieties to make choosing his top variety easier.

When asked if he planned to increase his corn acreage after this year's experience David answered no. "Right now I'm still limited to row watering, it takes time and labor, something I'm short of right now. With cotton prices riding high, I think farmers considering corn will probably wait and plant cotton."

Corn was \$3.92 per hundred October 3 when McAnear's corn was combined. This was as high as he'd hoped. The problem McAnear said, is it takes bumper yields every time, something he's learned not to anticipate, to break even with the high cost of inputs in corn.

Looking back it wasn't the best year to break into corn production. Herbicides applied early this spring failed to work satisfactorily because of dry field conditions. Weed infestations cut some yield potential from this crop that thrives best with no competition. Ear worms also

built up along with stalk bore damage. If harvest had been delayed by bad weather field losses would have been

excessive. Still, the potential is there. Given the same conditions, water and fertilizer, corn can

outyield grain sorghum. Last year in fields side-by-side corn outyielded milo at least fifteen hundred pounds per acre. The corn went 7500 pounds (that's one hundred and thirty-five bushel corn) compared to five to six thousand pounds per

acre of milo. The big bottleneck now is water and the price of getting that water to corn. The technology is here, with irrigation systems like the McAnear's, the questions is how much of it can one afford?

CHS students polled on political opinions

Students and teachers of Clarendon High School were polled recently concerning their opinions and favorites in upcoming political races. Sixty-eight students and

teachers were polled on nine political issues including who they would vote for at present in the Nov. 2 races for U.S. President, Texas Senator, and the local State District Representative races.

Of those polled, 48 per cent said they would vote for Carter, compared to 42 per cent for Ford and 10 per cent undecided. Senator Lloyd Bentsen polled 54 per cent of the votes in his upcoming re-election bid. His opponent Alan Steelman polled 16 per cent with 30 per cent undecided. in the U.S. Representative race, Jack Hightower polled 55 per cent; Bob Price, 31 per cent; and 14 per cent undecided.

Political questions asked the poll subjects included: Do you feel the PLAYBOY interview hurt Carter politically? Yes, 58 per cent; NO, 31 per cent; UNDECIDED, 11 per cent.

Do you feel President Ford's remarks about Soviet domination of Eastern Europe hurt him politically? YES, 46 per cent; NO, 24 per cent; UNDECIDED, 30 per cent.

To date which candidate do you think has made the best showing in the presidential debates? (taken before

the Oct. 22 debates) FORD, 31 per cent; CARTER, 39 per cent; UNDECIDED, 30 per cent.

To date who do you think has made the best showing in the vice-presidential debates? DOLE, 28 per cent; MONDALE, 32 per cent; UNDECIDED, 40 per cent.

Do you feel Carter's involvement in agriculture will aid him in his presidency bid? YES, 51 per cent; NO, 24 per cent; UNDECIDED, 25 per cent.

Do you feel President Ford made the right decision asking Secretary of Agric-

ulture Butz to resign? YES, 48 per cent; NO, 20 per cent; UNDECIDED, 32 per cent.

Do you feel the Democratically controlled Congress has hindered President Ford's effectiveness as President? YES, 48 per cent; NO, 22 per cent; UNDECIDED, 30 per cent.

Do you feel Carter is trying to be all things to all people in order to win the election (60 per cent); unify the country (25 per cent); demonstrate a basic character flaw (15 per cent).

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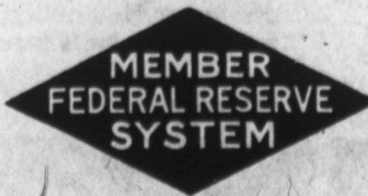
