Copter-Borne Air Cavalry Activated



ACTIVATION CEREMONIES—During recent activation ceremonies at Ft. Knox, Ky., Troop "C,"

17th Cavalry, becomes the Army's first troop of helicopter-borne air cavalry. Commanded by
Capt. Calvin R. Bean, its mission is to bolster reconnaissance capabilities of an armor unit. Troop "C," completely air mobile and air equipped with assigned helicopters, uses the H13 armed with the .30 cal. machine gun, the H34 with .50 cal. machine guns, and the HU1B to launch the S5-11 anti-tank missile. The helicopters not only increase firepower of reconnaissance elements but also can be used as assault forces. In combat, this 147-man, 27-helicopter unit, would seek out targets for artillery and rockets, scout ahead of moving columns, and reconnoiter flanks.
